Minutes of the Last Meeting of the Committee held on 5th March, 2015

1. RESOLVED that the minutes of the last meeting of the Committee held on 5th March, 2015 (copy circulated) be confirmed and signed as a correct record.

Partner Agency Reports

(a) Report of the Washington Area Community Voluntary Sector Network

The Washington Area Community Voluntary Sector Network submitted a report (copy circulated) to inform the Committee of activity, progress, issues and concerns of the sector.

John Rostron, VCS Representative, presented the report and wished to place on record the Networks gratitude to former chairman of the Washington Area Committee, Councillor Scaplehorn for his support over the years.

2. RESOLVED that Members noted the contents of the report.

(b) Northumbria Police

Sergeant Wayne Sinclair of Northumbria Police presented the Washington Sector Performance Update – Initial 8 week financial year performance data.

Sgt Sinclair advised that the figures presented were from April 2015 to 22nd May 2015 in comparison to April 2014 to May 2014.

Sgt Sinclair informed the Committee that the statistics for burglary were down 22% due to the arrest of a significant repeat offender.

Theft and Violent Crime figures were high but looking at violent crime across the whole force, Washington was the below the average. A lot of work was going on to tackle violent crime such as Pubwatch and Operation Dove. The Police were having input with the comprehensive schools with 20 sessions scheduled in the next 8 weeks.

The increase in Theft figures were mainly due to Wheelie Bin thefts and the change in Council policy requiring a crime number before a replacement would be issued.

Sgt Sinclair advised that there was a great deal of change occurring in the Police Authority with different ways of working, new equipment (Phablets/Tablets) and a new command team.

Sgt Sinclair also advised that Sgt Ron Hyde was to retire and he had requested his thanks be passed onto the Committee for their support. His successor was still to be appointed and Members would be informed once they were in place.

Members commented that they would like their thanks to be passed on to Sergeant Hyde as he had carried out a great deal of good work over the years.

3. RESOLVED that the report be received and noted.

Place Board – Progress Report

The Chair of the Place Board submitted a report (copy circulated) to provide the Committee with the annual update of the 2014/15 Work Plan, including SIB funded projects. The report also sought approval for priorities to be taken forward as part of the Work Plan for 2015/16 and to provide an update on Place Board Governance Arrangements for 2015/16.

Councillor Fiona Miller, Chair of the Place Board presented the report and advised that suggestions had been put forward for the proposed 2015/16 work plan to

- Develop a strategy for Washington and use as part of the Core Strategy
- Commission a study/consultation in respect of Albany Park and include the refresh of the Heritage Document Report
- Align £30,000 SIB in respect of Heritage to generate opportunities to use heritage and culture for a positive impact on the community and attract match funding to maximise potential.

Members noted the suggestions put forward.

Councillor F. Miller referred to paragraph 5.3 – Area Governance and requested Members consideration of the proposed Place Board Core Membership. Members agreed the Core Membership proposal.

In relation to the Highways Maintenance Local Priorities Councillor F. Miller advised that officers' recommendations for the additional spend of £75,000 had been considered at an extraordinary meeting of the Place Board and were outlined in Annex 5 for Members agreement. However since that meeting, Members of the Washington North Ward had asked that the recommendation be changed so that Pensher View be resurfaced rather than Waterloo Road – part – Phase 1. This would then leave an underspend of £5,000.

Members requested that Officers of Highways be approached to see if the £5,000 underspend could be put towards the £22,000 resurfacing costs for Craggyknowe and if Highways would be able to obtain the remaining costs needed..

Members agreed the schemes listed in Annex 5 with the amendment to change Waterloo Road to Pensher View.

People Board Progress Report

1 Purpose of Report

1.1 To provide an update of progress against the current year’s (2015/16) People Board Work Plan.

2. Background

2.1 Earlier this year the Local Area Plan’s priorities associated with People were referred to the Washington People Board to action on behalf of the Area Committee. The People Board continue to initiate action on those priorities and **Item 3 Annex 1** outlines progress to date.

3 Area Governance Arrangements

3.1 The Area Committees are part of the Council’s Executive Function and have two key roles:-

- a. Influencing decisions on services delivered at a local level; and
- b. Identification of key priorities for their areas, in the context of supporting the delivery of the Council’s Corporate Outcomes Framework at a local level and ensures maximum impact where necessary through utilising its own resources.

3.2 Area Place and People Boards were set up to support the Area Committee in identifying areas of priority and ensure action in line with those priorities.

3.3 Each ward has one elected member representative, whose role it is to liaise with their ward colleagues in between meetings and feedback collective views into the Board meetings. Members will work alongside key officers in what will be practical action orientated groups. It should be noted that the Board is not a decision making body and the work / recommendations of the Board will be presented to the Area Committees for final endorsement. Supporting families to deal with the impact of Self harm in young people

Both Washington Area Committee and the VCS have both recognised a need to consider providing local support for young people who self-harm, **and their families**. The People Board has already identified the need to develop a cross cutting partnership approach as a range of health related issues are dropping out of this priority:

- Impact of self-harming in young people on their families and families in crisis
- Impact of other addictions on families – drugs, alcohol and substance misuse
- Suicide prevention
- Transition support services between Children's Services and Adult Services
- Broader Information, Advice and Guidance Services linked to the Strengthening Families Agenda
- Live Life Well agenda

There is already the recognition that delivering activity against this priority requires shared ownership and a partnership approach. The People Board should also note that Public Health is already leading on key pieces of work which could impact on local need being identified – this includes a Health Needs Assessment re Young People Self Harming and a Suicide Audit. SCC Scrutiny are also considering this issue with a report pending.

Objectives and Outcomes to be included in Health and Family Support Project.

This project should address at least one of the following:

- Identify additional local support services for young people from Washington who self-harm, and their families or carers
- Provide appropriate support, information and guidance for Washington families who are dealing with the impact of drug or alcohol misuse, or substance misuse
- Raise awareness of and promote relevant support services across Washington that can positively impact on the emotional health and well-being of young people and their families or carers. This can include the development and delivery of appropriate communications, campaigns and promotion of services along with better use of on line tools and apps to encourage self help
- Provide help and support for families in crisis including those families suffering with debt related issues
- Work with local schools and relevant partner organisations to gather relevant data and information
- Provide additional support to help local people make the necessary changes to improve their mental and physical help and to access opportunities and activities to improve their health, in partnership with local Wellness Co-ordinators (Live Life Well)
- Consider proposals to develop a one stop shop approach for services in the community to direct young people and their families and carers to places that help
- Encourage commissioned and non-commissioned services and partners to improve transition for young people from young person's provision to adult. This could include proposals more effective communication and information sharing between services, working collaboratively and providing continuity of care

The project will also:

- Deliver benefits through shared ownership and a partnership approach
- Respond to identified need and evidence – ensuring reference to up-to-date data and locally identified risk factors

The project will also:

- Consider Scrutiny Panel data, information and recommendations
- Take into consideration the results from the Health Needs Assessment for young People Self Harming
- Take into consideration the on going work and education programmes being delivered in schools
- Take into consideration issues raised re transition from young person to adult provision

Timeline and process

1. September People Board agree outline proposals and project outcomes presented to Washington Area Committee October 2015
2. Washington Strategic Health Group (WSHG) membership agreed at October Area Committee and group established immediately. Meeting schedule to be confirmed
3. Evidence gathered re need and gaps end of October via WSHG
4. Draft Project Brief for Health and Family Support Project approved at October Area committee.
5. Call for Project released October. Closing date for submissions November.
6. People Board consulted November meeting re applications
7. December Area Committee to agree and approve project.

Financial Inclusion Project

Washington Area Committee People Board : Recommendations to October Area Committee

Objectives and Outcomes to be included in **Financial Inclusion Project/Financial Resilience** Brief.

This project should:

- Improve the resilience of families most in need, through the provision of co-ordinated services focusing upon increasing financial capability, improving health and well-being and enhancing community self-help support systems.
- Be based on robust evidence and identified need, provision of local financial inclusion and support services for Washington residents
- Provide information, advice and guidance to support Washington residents to access financial inclusion services, debt advice, and relevant employability support services
- Tackle problems which have an impact on family resilience such as low income/financial difficulties and poor mental and physical health
- Address the increasing demand for mental health services especially from those dealing with financial difficulties and a subsequent increase in demand for financial capability support
- Support for more vulnerable families, including those supported by carers who need to increase their emotional resilience to maintain their caring role;
- Support for families affected by low incomes to improve their financial capability and ability to eat healthily within strained budgets
- Provide a listening service for those dealing with increasing family pressures to get immediate support and referral for mental health and/or financial capability advice and support;
- Provide support for community based self-help groups to help provide sustainable support solutions for those most in need.

Proposals will directly benefit families in the Washington particularly those dealing with mental health issues or caring responsibilities. They will include carers, people with mental health problems, people affected by benefits cuts and parents in need of training, information, advice and support. These beneficiaries are most likely to be those on low incomes for whom welfare reform will have significant negative impact.

Outcomes

1. Family members will have increased financial capability as a result of accessing one-to-one information, advice and guidance.
2. Carers will have improved emotional resilience and increased confidence to support their caring role.
3. Adults will experience improved physical and emotional well-being leading to stronger more resilient family life.
4. Local people will have increased access to support through the development of community self-help groups.

Project could provide

- A Project Co-ordinator to oversee project activities, facilitate steering group meetings, produce publicity, supervise staff, establish referrals pathways, work with the local infrastructure organisation to ensure the development of self- help groups.

OR

- Welfare Rights/Financial Capability Workers to provide one to one support sessions to be delivered in partner's premises and community venues

PLUS

- Support for an apprentice post to signpost into project services and prepare/provide materials and resources to aid financial and emotional well-being
- Links and signposting to relevant courses each year to promote mental health and emotional resilience. Carer's resilience training programmes per year? Healthy eating courses each year and Food Hygiene courses per year. Financial Capability courses and programmes.
- Volunteer run listening service with information on/referrals to other project services
- Training for x staff as health champions to enable them to signpost centre users to relevant services.

Strategic Initiative Budget (SIB), Community Chest – Financial Statement and proposals for further allocation of resources

1. Purpose of Report

1.1 Area Committee has delegated budgets to allocate to specific strategic priorities identified in the Local Area Plan, with the overall aim to benefit the wider community and to attract other funding into the area. The report provides a financial statement as an update position on progress in relation to allocating SIB and Community Chest and presents proposals for further funding requests.

2 Strategic Initiatives Budget (SIB)

2.1 The table below shows the financial position of SIB for 2015/2016:

2.2 Members are asked to note the balance of **£278,319.50**. This includes returns to the budget as detailed in the table above in 2.1.

3. People based priorities

3.1 Following the September People Board it was agreed to seek approval from the Area Committee to align **£50,000** SIB 2015/16 to develop the People based priority for Health and Well Being. Proposals for developing a collaborative and partnership approach for a Health and Family Support Project, for families of young people who self-harm as detailed in **Item 3** People Board Progress Report. All proposals will be subject to a Call for Projects and an Area Committee decision. If this request for alignment of funds is approved the balance of SIB funding remaining to be allocated would be **£228,319.50**

3.2 Following the September People board it was agreed to seek approval from the Area Committee to approve **£10,000** SIB 2015/16 to develop the People based priority to support Community Inclusion. Proposals for a Young Person's 'Can Do' Small Grants fund are set out in

detail in **Item 3**. All proposals and applications will be subjected to the SIB Smalls Grants protocol and Members are asked to approve the methodology outlined, i.e. People Board to award grants utilising the SIB Smalls Grants Procedures. If this request is approved the balance of SIB funding remaining to be collated would be **£218,319.50**

Members are also requested to approve the Call for Projects Project brief as outlined in **Annex 1** of this report and to identify any further targets, outcomes or objectives they would like to see included in the brief.

3.3 Following the September People Board it was agreed to seek approval from the Area Committee to align SIB 2015/16 to develop the People based priority for Health and Well Being. Proposals for developing a Financial Inclusion Project as detailed in **Item 3** of the People Board Progress Report are presented to the Area Committee for consideration. All proposals will be subject to a Call for Projects and an Area Committee decision. Members are requested to align a budget of **£40,000** to develop this project. If this request for alignment of funds is approved the balance of SIB funding remaining to be allocated would be **£178,319.50**

3.4 Following the September People Board Area Committee is also asked to note the People Board recommendation as detailed in **Item 3** to return the aligned £20,000 SIB 2014/15 to the SIB budget. This funding had been identified to support the development of Employability Support Services via the VCS. The balance of SIB funding remaining would then be **£198,319.50**

4. Place based priorities

4.1 Following the September Place Board it was agreed to seek approval from the Area Committee to align SIB 2015/16 to develop the Place based priority for Heritage and Culture. Washington Area Committee has for some time maintained 'Heritage and Culture' as a local priority, identifying and generating opportunities to use heritage and culture for a positive impact on the local community, to maximise the 'Washington Offer', and to generate and attract match funding to maximise potential.

Proposals to develop an approach to support the local offer are detailed under **Item 4** and are presented to the Area Committee for consideration. All project proposals will be subject to a Call for Projects and an Area Committee decision. Members are requested to align a budget of **£30,000** to develop this project. If this request for alignment of funds is approved the balance of SIB funding remaining to be allocated would be **£168,319.50**

4.2 Following the September Place Board it was agreed to seek approval from the Area Committee to align SIB 2015/16 to develop the Place based priority for developing local industrial areas. Place board recommends the development of a local Business Watch scheme targeting the local industrial estates. The aim is to encourage a group of business' who work together with the Police and other agencies to make their area a safer place for all to work, live and visit.

Proposals to develop this approach are detailed under **Item 4** and are presented to the Area Committee for consideration. All project proposals will be subject to a Call for Projects and an Area Committee decision. Members are requested to align a budget of **£10,000** to develop this project. If this request for alignment of funds is approved the balance of SIB funding remaining to be allocated would be **£158,319.50**

4.3 Following the September Place board it was agreed to seek approval from the Area Committee to align SIB 2015/16 to develop the Washington Events Programme for 2016. Aligning funding now will allow a more planned approach and will allow Area committee to consider and build on a 'business approach' to events to encourage additional resourcing. It will also allow identification of priority events at the beginning of the year and help confirm scheduling and programming.

Proposals are detailed under **Item 4** and are presented to the Area Committee for consideration. All project proposals will be subject to a Call for Projects and an Area Committee decision. Members are requested to align a budget of **£50,000** to develop this project. If this request for alignment of funds is approved the balance of SIB funding remaining to be allocated would be **£108,319.50**

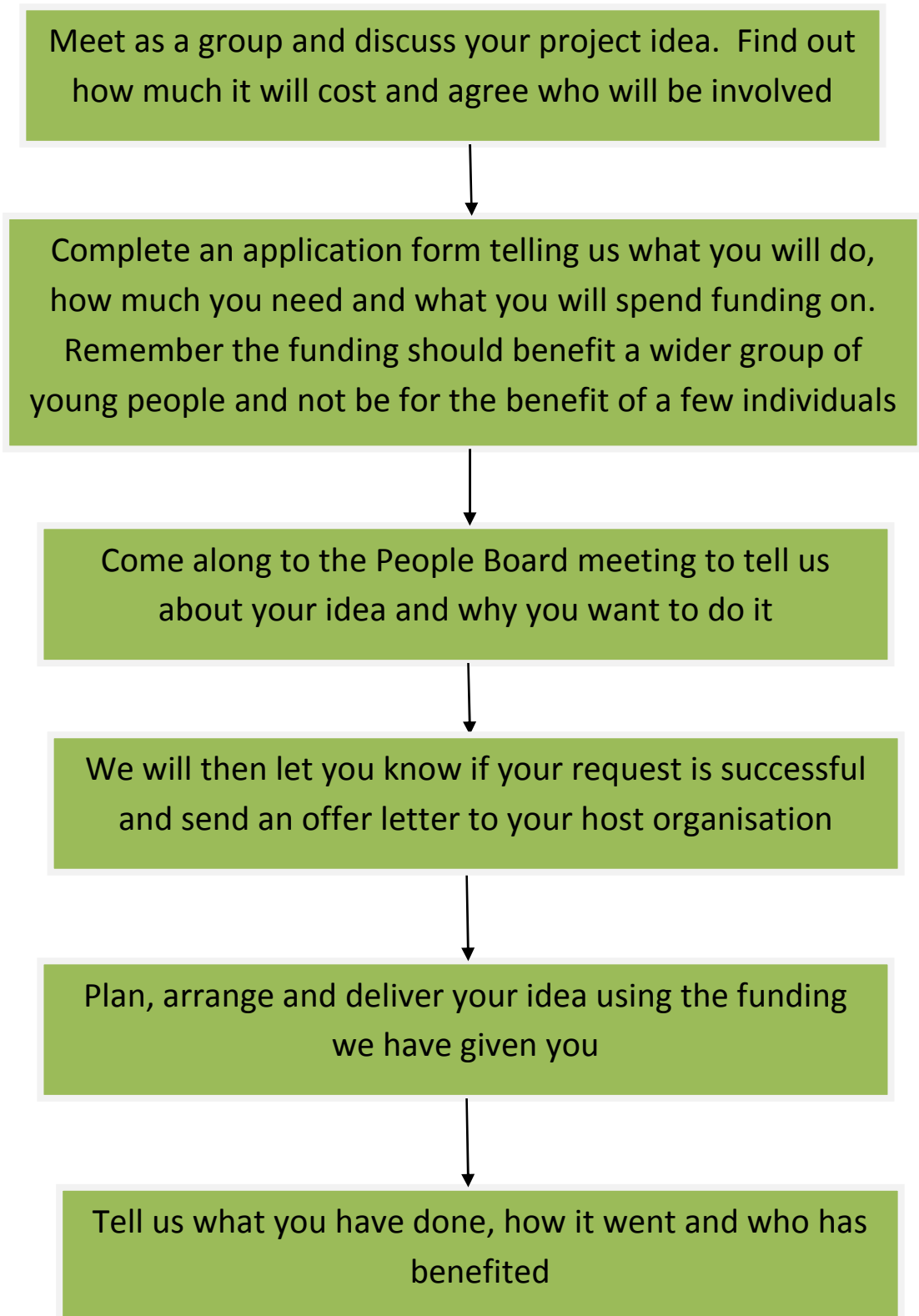
