## **MINUTES OF THE SCHOOL ORGANISATION COMMITTEE OF CABINET**

**Held remotely via MS Teams on THURSDAY 11 MARCH 2021 at 3.30pm**

### **Present: -**

### **Apologies for Absence**

Apologies for absence were submitted on behalf of Councillor Stewart.

### **Minutes**

1. RESOLVED that the Minutes of the meeting held on 1 October 2020 be agreed as a correct record.

### **Proposed Enlargement and Lowering of the Age of Admission at Hetton Primary School**

The Executive Director of Neighbourhoods submitted a report setting out proposals to enlarge Hetton Primary School and to lower the age of admission from four years old to two years old.

Hetton Primary School was a maintained primary school maintained by Sunderland City Council and was due to relocate to a new building on the current school site in September 2022. The current school accommodated 140 primary age children and was over capacity in four of the seven year groups. Each class offered 20 places,

however most year groups currently had between 20 and 27 children on roll. The school did not have the capacity or additional resources to support this ongoing oversubscription and did not currently have a nursery provision.

The development of additional housing in the Hetton area was anticipated to further increase demand for places and it was projected that over 100 primary school places would be required to meet the demand from new housing in the area. The expanded Hetton Primary School would have the facility to offer the required places at a suitably located setting while also ensuring that nursery capacity in the area remained sufficient.

In July 2020, the Cabinet had approved a proposal to commence the School Organisation processes required for the enlargement of and the lowering of the age of admission at Hetton Primary School. The school was developed with five classrooms and it now wished to offer one class per year group with an overall PAN of 210. The plans for the enlargement of the school would meet the needs of the children currently on roll and provide the flexibility to allow for future expansion.

The Retained Education Functions Lead advised that there was an increasing trend towards having nursery classes in schools and a shift in preference away from maintained nurseries. The provision of a nursery class at the expanded school responded to local trends and demands.

A pre-publication consultation was carried out between 30 November 2020 and 15 January 2021. The consultation contained the Council's proposal to both expand the existing capacity and lower the age of admission at the school. The following groups were consulted: -

- Parents of pupils attending Hetton Primary School
- Current staff
- Trade Union Representatives
- The wider local community

61.7% of 60 respondents agreed with the proposal to increase the capacity of the school and 53.3% of 73 respondents were in favour of the proposal to lower the age of admission.

The statutory proposals were published on 25 January 2021 and the statutory notice period ended on 17 February 2021. The statutory notice was published on the Council's website, the school's website, in the Sunderland Echo and was displayed at the entrance to the Hetton Primary School buildings.

There were 13 objections to the proposals, the majority of these noted a separate proposal which had been published on 23 February 2021 to discontinue Hetton-le-Hole Nursery School. It was highlighted that the two proposals were not interdependent and should it be decided to retain the provision at Hetton-le-Hole Nursery School, the proposal for the development of a nursery at Hetton Primary School would continue as a complementary provision for the local area.

Issues were also raised with regard to traffic in the area and it was advised that these would be considered as part of the full planning application which was to be

heard in the near future. Reference had been made to the quality of education offered by the school and it was noted that it had most recently been graded as 'Good' and therefore the expansion proposals did not have to be referred to the Department for Education.

Subject to the decision of the Committee and obtaining the required planning approval, it was anticipated that the works would commence on site in June/July 2021 with the build to be concluded in July 2022. The new school would then open in September 2022; should the nursery provision be established from September 2021 it would be delivered from the current main school buildings in the 2021/2022 academic year. The PAN of the school would be increased in September 2021 and temporary classrooms would be utilised to allow for all year groups to have their own designated area.

Councillor Williams noted that the birth rate in the area had been described as 'spiky' and queried if there was any reason for that pattern. The Retained Education Functions Lead explained that the birth rate had been erratic across the city for the past few years and it remained to be seen how Covid may have impacted on the rates.

Councillor Williams went on to ask about the proposed temporary classroom bases and it was confirmed that these would be bespoke units and linked to the school by a corridor.

With regard to the proposed class size of 30, Councillor Williams asked if there was confidence that this was achievable and the Retained Education Functions Lead stated that the school tended to grow as children moved through, for example Reception class in 2016 had 20 children and this year group had now expanded to 26 in 2021. The school was over its PAN in all year groups apart from current Reception and Year 6.

At this juncture, the Chair of the Committee invited individuals who had made representations on the proposal to address the Committee.

Clare Donoghue, a parent, had submitted an objection based on the current proposal to increase the number of children on roll and to lower the age range. Ms Donoghue acknowledged that there was a need for a new build in relation to the mainstream school, however while demand for Reception was still relatively low she felt that increasing the capacity would increase traffic on what was already considered a dangerous road when there was no need for the nursery provision. This would also increase the number of staff vehicles and there had been many issues raised about the traffic in the past.

In relation to numbers of children on roll, Ms Donoghue said that it was hard to predict birth rates and numbers of children going into pre-school and queried the capacity to maintain standards for two and three year olds when there was not already a provision there and the school was taking in larger numbers. She was concerned as to how the nursery class would be filled and made financially sustainable.

Ms Donoghue explained that she was an Early Years Lead in a different school and in her experience, two-year olds needed something completely different in terms of staff skills and expertise and questioned how the quality of education could be ensured. She noted that parents were able to have children at Hetton Lyons Primary School from birth all the way through primary education but a family with children both under and over the age of two would still have two drop offs if their older child attended nursery at Hetton Primary and this would not assist working parents.

With the current pandemic situation, Ms Donoghue raised the issue of protecting an additional bubble of children within the school and the ongoing costs of maintaining staff numbers.

The Retained Education Functions Lead stated that the traffic issues would be picked up by the Highways section as part of the main planning application. A full drop-off system would be implemented and parking was to be increased as part of the new build to mitigate issues. Together for Children would support the team at the school in developing the nursery provision and there were resources available to support the headteacher and staff. The nursery would be built to a size relative to the flexibility which was being put into the new building to allow future expansion.

Ailsa Higgins, Headteacher of Hetton Lyons Nursery School, explained that her school had always worked closely with Hetton Primary but her concerns were around the impact of lowering the age range and how this could affect the sustainability of Hetton Lyons Nursery. The potential high numbers of children in the nursery provision was concerning. She accepted that it would be beneficial for parents with a child attending primary school to have one drop off if they had another child attending the nursery but felt that 78 pupils was very high.

The Reception class was only for 30 children so all nursery children would not be able to move through to Reception. She felt that there needed to be an explanation of where the numbers came from and what consideration had been given to the impact on other early years providers in the area.

The Retained Education Functions Lead highlighted that not every three-year-old would go straight to Reception so not all children from the nursery would transition. It was the intention to have a sustainable nursery and the flexibility in the planned build meant that it would be of relative size to the rest of the school and would also be futureproofed for further development in the area. The school envisaged that there would be a smaller nursery class in 2022 and there would not be 78 children attending from year one.

Councillor Michael Hopper, Hetton Town Council, told the Committee that he had objected to the proposal on the grounds of highway safety. He was of the opinion that local people would welcome the new building for Hetton Primary School but not the expansion.

In relation to the designated drop off point, there could be up to 300 drop offs and this and the school entrance would become congested. There was further housing development planned in the area which could significantly increase traffic. There had been traffic calming measures discussed for North Road and Moorsley Road was

being used as a cut through. The school was in a dangerous location and he queried whether there had been any discussion about actually moving the school building. Councillor Hopper could not support the increase in numbers and lowering the age range of the school.

The Retained Education Functions Lead confirmed that the local authority would be working with the school on a home to school transport plan and were mindful to the fact that the school was the nearest to the new North Road development and would be a walkable distance for families living there and in fact work to reduce the number of people travelling to school by car.

Efforts had been made in the design of the new building to work in more car parking and drop offs as part of the footprint. There had been significant input from the Council's engineers as part of the development of the plans and it was felt that these changes would reduce traffic and would be picked up as part of the planning process.

The Chair conveyed her support for traffic management measures on North Road which were in line with the Council's aims to be carbon neutral and to encourage walking and cycling.

Ruth Williamson, Headteacher of Hetton-le-Hole Nursery School, communicated the response of the Governing Body of the Nursery School to the Committee. The objections did not relate to the provision of the new primary school but the lowering of the age of admission. It was their contention that the proposal for the new nursery unit should not and could not be considered in isolation as it impacted directly on all of the existing provision in the local area and was predicted for on the assumption of a closure of a maintained nursery school, Hetton-le-Hole Nursery. It was believed that this was contrary to the DfE guidance which was to take a presumption against the closure of a maintained nursery school.

There were clear criteria which should be applied when considering provision of one nursery and the closure of an existing provision. The local authority had been clear that this was not an amalgamation. There was no guarantee of likely quality or quantity of the new provision and no evidence that the new provision would be more accessible or convenient for parents. Data for Hetton-le-Hole Nursery School provided a very high benchmark and the new provision had no track record and existing data for Hetton Primary did not allow any such assumption to be made. The 'all thorough' approach which was being advocated could only benefit a small number of children.

Arguments in relation to the financial viability of Hetton-le-Hole Nursery could be challenged in a local authority where nursery provision was in surplus not deficit. Irrespective of this, the financial impact extended beyond Hetton-le-Hole Nursery.

There had been little or no joined up thinking for local nursery provision, and it was assumed that planned developments from the pre-Covid period would still take place. Existing nursery provision was not currently at capacity and the plans assumed a very different economic environment to what was now being seen. Existing housing developments were also close to Eppleton and East Rainton

primary schools and there was no guarantee that parents would choose to enrol their children at Hetton Primary.

The Retained Education Functions Lead explained that he had worked closely with Hetton-le-Hetton Nursery School regarding their own provision but the proposals for Hetton Primary School were separate to this. It was envisaged that all providers would work together as a community provision for parents to have a wide range of options and flexibility. It was not assumed that the nursery would have 78 children or take children away from other settings; parents could choose to have their children together in one setting. Projections showed that there could be 70 primary age children living on the new North Road development within 0.7 miles of Hetton Primary School and this would fill the additional PAN.

Councillor Williams asked about the surplus which Ms Williamson had alluded to and the Retained Education Functions Lead commented that the Reception intake at Hetton Primary had tended to be lower whereas Hetton Lyons was oversubscribed and Eppleton was heading in that direction. Surplus places at Hetton Primary were taken up by families moving into the area.

Nicola Hill, Headteacher of Hetton Primary School spoke to express support for the proposal. She stated that when she arrived at the school in April 2017 there were 127 children on roll and all of the classes were mixed. Children were taught in the five teaching spaces available and there were now 156 children attending and all available space was being utilised. She added that 13 children had transferred to the school during lockdown.

The staff and parents at the school were very excited by the prospect of a new school building. It had been a rigorous process to develop the proposal and there were many benefits to be gained including a seamless transition between pre-school to Reception and for younger siblings to be seen as part of the school family.

The flexible use rooms in the new build could be utilised for many groups such as baby clinics and parent classes. The new build would improve car parking and drop off facilities, therefore reducing congestion on the main road.

The school had been Ofsted rated as 'Good' since 2008 and most recently in 2019. Ms Hill assured the Committee that the children attending Hetton Primary had strong skills and the right attitude towards lifelong learning. Year 6 had been predicted to obtain 82% combined in Reading, Writing and Maths in 2020. All staff worked extremely hard to ensure children made progress and provision was amended to meet the needs of every child in a school where cohorts could vary considerably from year to year.

Several members of staff had experience in nursery teaching, including in establishing new provisions. Typically children came into the school with lower than expected starting points, particularly for communication and language. Hetton Primary provided a nurturing environment where as many opportunities as possible were given for children to be the best that they could be.

The new build was two storey, younger children would not be in the upstairs part of the building and security doors would mean that nursery pupils could not access the



teaching areas designated for the older children. The school was very excited and ambitious for the future in the new building.

Having fully considered the report, the statutory proposals and all of the representations made, the Committee: -

2. RESOLVED that: -

- (i) the statutory proposal to enlarge the premises of Hetton Primary School, Moorsley Road, Hetton, DH5 9ND, which will increase the capacity from 140 places to 210 places with effect from 1 September 2021 be approved; and
- (ii) the statutory proposal for the age range of Hetton Primary School, Moorsley Road, Hetton, DH5 9ND to be lowered from 4-11 years of age to 2-11 years of age with effect from 1 September 2021 be approved.

### **Proposed Increase in the Number of Pupils at Sunningdale Primary School**

The Executive Director of Neighbourhoods submitted a report setting out a proposal to increase the number of primary school aged pupils at Sunningdale Primary School from 108 to 120.

Sunningdale Primary School was a maintained special primary school which provided education for children aged between two and 11 with Severe Learning Difficulties (SLD), Profound and Multiple Learning Difficulties (PMLD) and Physical Disabilities (PD). The school was currently rated as 'Outstanding' by Ofsted and was designated as a teaching school.

The school building was constructed in the 1950s and over time, the cohort of children had changed and also the ability of the building to meet the needs of the children attending the school. The average class size at the school should be six to eight pupils however it was currently operating with between nine and 11 pupils per class. A number of the classrooms within the current build were smaller than the recommended physical size for six pupils.

In March 2019, the Cabinet had approved a proposal to relocate the school to a new site and in July 2020 the School Organisation processes for the enlargement of the school were commenced. A pre-publication consultation took place between 12 October 2020 and 27 November 2020 on the proposal to increase the number of pupils at the school and the proposed relocation. It was highlighted that as the new school would be within two miles of the current Sunningdale Primary School, no statutory proposals were required by the relevant School Organisation Regulations to facilitate the relocation of the buildings. The following groups were consulted: -

- Parents of pupils attending Sunningdale Primary School
- Current staff
- The wider community
- Neighbouring local authority areas with children currently placed at the school

40 responses were received to the pre-publication consultation with 89% agreeing with the proposal to increase the capacity and 73% in favour of the relocation of the school.

The statutory notice was published on 25 January 2021 and appeared on the Council website, the school's website, in the Sunderland Echo and was displayed at the entrances of the school building. The statutory notice period ended on 21 February 2021 and there were no responses received.

Councillor Williams asked if increasing the capacity of the school to 120 would actually be enough. The Retained Education Functions Lead commented that it was difficult to judge but the proposal was considering the needs of the children attending the school and that a lot of the facilities on the site were not directly class based. The footprint and ability of the school to accommodate 120 children felt manageable.

Councillor Williams went on to enquire if the majority of places at the school were commissioned in the city and it was confirmed that the pupils mainly came from the Sunderland area.

Having considered the proposal, it was: -

3. RESOLVED that the statutory proposal to increase the number of pupils at Sunningdale Primary School, currently located at Shaftoe Road, Sunderland, SR3 4HA from 108 places to 120 places with effect from 1 September 2022 be approved.

**EXECUTIVE SUMMARY SHEET – PART I**

Title of Report: Proposed Closure of Hetton le Hole Nursery School and Childcare Provision

Author(s): Executive Director of Neighbourhoods

Purpose of Report: The purpose of this report is to request a decision on the proposal to discontinue Hetton le Hole Nursery School and the associated childcare provision at Hetton le Hole Nursery School.

Description of Decision: School Organisation Committee of Cabinet is asked to:

Note the responses to the statutory and pre-publication consultations and consider the statutory proposal which is:

To discontinue (close) Hetton le Hole Nursery School, Victoria Street, Hetton le Hole, DH5 9DG and associated provisions from 31<sup>st</sup> August 2021.

Under the provisions of the relevant legislation, the Authority may approve published proposals with or without modification or may reject them.

The Committee is requested to consider the proposal as detailed above.

Suggested reason(s) for Decision:

In recent years the Nursery has become financially vulnerable. The Nursery has a deficit budget that has increased each year over the previous five years. The Nursery's financial deficit exceeded £200k at the close of the 2020/21 financial year and, based on current staffing structures combined with projected numbers on roll, the deficit is projected to continue to increase in future years. The Nursery has been subject to falling rolls in recent years which has impacted on the available funding at the setting.

The falling rolls and the statutory requirements relating to staffing ratios, combined with current funding rates and methodology has previously resulted in the Nursery being unable to implement a structure and delivery model that can operate within the financial model required of a maintained nursery school. On that basis it has been identified as unviable as a long-term provision.

To safeguard the wider sufficiency of nursery places in the Hetton Ward, for both current and future cohorts of children, the Council has proposed that Hetton le Hole Nursery and

its separately registered childcare provision are discontinued from 31st August 2021. In addition to the surplus places already available at other early years providers and school nursery classes in the ward, additional alternative places for 2, 3 and 4-year olds (including both 30 hours provision and disadvantaged 2-year-old places) will be offered at Hetton Primary School.

**Alternative options to be considered:**

- Retain Hetton le Hole as a Local Authority Maintained Nursery Provision
- Amalgamate Hetton le Hole Nursery with another nursery provider
- Federate Hetton le Hole Nursery with Houghton Nursery and Mill Hill Nursery
- Discontinue provision at Hetton le Hole Nursery on August 31<sup>st</sup>, 2022
- Re-locate Hetton le Hole Nursery School to an alternative site
- Parent/ Carer Proposals

**PROPOSED CLOSURE OF HETTON LE HOLE NURSERY SCHOOL AND CHILDCARE PROVISION****REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR OF NEIGHBOURHOODS****1. Purpose of the Report**

The purpose of this report is to request a decision on the proposal to discontinue Hetton le Hole Nursery School and the associated childcare provision at Hetton le Hole Nursery School.

**2. Description of Decision****2.1 School Organisation Committee of Cabinet is asked to:**

Note the responses to the statutory and pre-publication consultations and consider the statutory proposal which is:

To discontinue (close) Hetton le Hole Nursery School, Victoria Street, Hetton le Hole, DH5 9DG and associated provisions from 31st August 2021.

Under the provisions of the relevant legislation, the Authority may approve published proposals with or without modification or may reject them.

The Committee is requested to consider the proposal as detailed above.

**3. Current Position**

3.1 Hetton le Hole Nursery School (the Nursery) is a maintained nursery school, maintained by Sunderland City Council. In addition to its statutory nursery provision for 2 to 5-year olds, Hetton le Hole Nursery delivers a separately registered childcare provision. At its last full Ofsted inspection (March 2015) the Nursery was awarded an overall grade of Good. At the independently registered childcare provision's last full Ofsted inspection (February 2015) that provision was awarded an overall grade of Outstanding.

3.2 Maintained nursery schools, as with nursery classes within maintained schools, are subject to requirements relating to staff and qualification levels that are not required from private nurseries and childminders. However, the funding received by maintained nurseries for pupils is not differentiated from those other providers to support these additional requirements. This has led to some providers in the sector reporting financial difficulties and contributed to the closure of Millfield Community Nursery in 2018.

**4. Current Financial Position**

4.1 In recent years the Nursery has become financially vulnerable. The Nursery has a deficit budget that has increased each year over the previous five years and is projected to continue to increase in future years. The Nursery's financial deficit exceeded £200k by the close of the 2020/21 financial year.

- 4.2 In March 2021 the Nursery provided the Council with projected financial estimates indicating surplus financial positions will be achieved in 2021/22 and 2022/23. Achievement of this financial outcome is subject to the implementation of a staff restructure that would result in approximately £70k of savings. Further alternative proposals were discussed with the Council in April and May 2021 which, while resulting in lower savings, delivered projected surplus budgets in the period 2021 - 2024.
- 4.3 The Nursery has subsequently communicated to the Council that it will not be seeking to proceed with the restructure identified in the March 2021 budget submission at this time, nor any of the potential alternative restructures proposed in May 2021. The Council has evaluated the impact of the retention of the existing staffing structure on the Nursery's projected financial position and has identified that, based on existing funding rates, supplementary funding and pupil projections, the Nursery will continue to record in year deficits in the years 2021 – 2024. This should be considered when evaluating the Nursery's own financial projections presented in table 4.5.
- 4.4 Regarding the makeup of the Nursery's outgoings, 83-84% of the Nursery's current costs are related to staff salaries and oncosts.
- 4.5 The Nursery has been subject to falling rolls in recent years which has impacted on the available funding at the setting. The table below includes previous year end financial positions. The table also includes the Nursery's own financial projections for 2021/22 and 2022/23.

- 4.6 At the start of each financial year the Nursery, in liaison with TfC Finance, projects an estimated end of year financial position which is then signed off by the Nursery's Governing Body. This is calculated using projected income (from pupil funding, grant funding and private income from fee paying parents amongst other factors) versus costs (such as staff and building costs). In recent years the Nursery has not achieved its projected end of year financial outturn. This could be attributed to several factors including unplanned in-year delivery costs and a shortfall in fees and per pupil funding as a result of pupil recruitment being lower than projected.
- 4.7 The table below identifies the variance between the Nursery's projected financial outturn and actual financial outturn in the period 2015/16 to 2019/20. It is recognised that during 2020/21 restrictions associated with Covid have impacted on the Nursery's income and therefore this period has not been included for evaluation. The Council recognises that the Nursery has projected a surplus budget for the 2021/22 and 2022/23 financial years. However, the Council has also considered the accuracy of previous budget estimates as well as the impact that factors such as citywide birth rates, the decline in the proportion of the current local nursery aged population attending the nursery and projected reductions to supporting funds when considering that projection.

- 4.8 The Nursery failed to achieve its projected budgets between 2016/17 and 2019/20 the average variance between the Nursery's projected end of year balance and actual end of year balance is a deficit of £28k. This is equivalent to 7% of the nursery's income in 2019/20. This variance should be considered when evaluating projected outturns for future years.
- 4.9 Hetton le Hole Nursery, as with all maintained nursery schools in the city, currently receives additional financial support through the Maintained Nursery School Supplementary Funding Allocation (the Lump Sum). This funding is provided in order to enable local authorities to protect their 2016-17 funding rates for the universal 15-hour entitlement for maintained nursery schools (that is, the rates that existed before the development of the Early Years National Funding Formula in 2017) and the government expects it to be used in this way.
- 4.10 The Lump Sum is calculated using the number of 3- and 4-year olds attending the first 15 hours of statutory provision at each maintained nursery school in the city, each year at January Census. As the total funding value is calculated based on actual pupils on roll the City's total Lump Sum allocation varies, year on year, depending on the pupils on roll at each maintained nursery school setting. Sunderland Council, rather than utilise the funding to protect 2016-17 funding rates, pools and re-distributes the full allocation equally across the city's eight maintained nursery schools, as opposed to each setting receiving the proportion of the allocation that it would receive if allocated on each setting's per pupil basis. Importantly, this has resulted in settings that are net contributors to the fund receiving funding rates at a lower level than the benchmarked 2016/17 funding rate while others, such as Hetton le Hole Nursery, receive a much higher rate.
- 4.11 The Nursery has received between £75k - £85k funding in each of the previous five years. However, despite this additional financial support the Nursery has continued to increase its deficit budget. It has also been identified that the allocation methodology used to provide the additional financial support to the Nursery has led to three occasions in the previous four financial years where another maintained nursery school in the city that has been a net contributor to the Lump Sum in previous years has accrued an in-year deficit budget, and subsequently, also being identified as financially vulnerable. The table below identifies the proportion of Lump Sum received by the Nursery and the proportion of the city's allocation generated by pupils on roll at the Nursery.

- 4.12 Since 2017/18 the Nursery has received a cumulative allocation of £188k more than it would have received had the Council allocated the Lump Sum according to national guidance. In 2020/21 the increased allocation to Hetton le Hole Nursery School was equivalent to £8k for each of the seven other maintained nursery settings in the city. Over the same period, since 2015-16, when comparing other local maintained nursery settings, Hetton Lyons Nursery School has contributed £18k more than it received from the city's Lump Sum and Houghton Community Nursery School contributed £85k more than it received from the city's Lump Sum.
- 4.13 While there are no plans to amend the mechanism currently used to allocate the Lump Sum it is noted that the funding itself has been identified as a temporary funding allocation. At this point it is only guaranteed on a year by year basis and therefore, while it is considered unlikely that it will be removed with no replacement implemented, reliance on the funding at its current value has been identified as a significant risk.
- 4.14 The Council has considered this, as well as the variance between previous projected in-year budgets and final outturns, when considering the Nursery's financial projections for the 2021/22 and 2022/23 financial years. With the Nursery's current staffing structure, the average pre-Covid variance between the projected in year position and final outturn between 2016/17 and 2019/20 was a £28k deficit with a minimum variance of £10k and a maximum variance of £40k. Should the Nursery's current staffing structure be retained and the average variance of £28k be applied to 2021/22 and 2022/23 projections the in-year balances reduce to deficit positions with a projected range between 40k and £55k in 2021/22 and between £42k and £68k in 2022/23
- 4.15 Should the Nursery achieve its projected income targets for 2021/21 and 2022/23 but fail to implement the changes to the staffing structure included in proposed budgets provided to the Council in March or April 2021 the projected outturn for 2021/22 and 2022/23 would be deficit positions with a range of approximately £12k and £27k in 2021/22 and £14K to £40k in 2022/23. It is noted that the Nursery's own income projection decreased between March 2021 and May 2021 and the decreased income levels are not included in paras 4.13 and 4.14.
- 4.16 It is therefore not considered practical that the Nursery can achieve a surplus budget within the current staffing structure, even if income targets are achieved. Should the Nursery implement the changes proposed to the Council then the likelihood of achieving a surplus budget, and consequently reducing the overall deficit position, would increase.



## 5.0 Numbers on Roll, Local Trends in Participation and Availability of Alternative Provision

5.1 The Nursery building has capacity to accommodate 55 children at any one time. This is equivalent to 110 children attending on a part time basis (15 hours per week). Census data identifies the number of children in a funded placement at a setting and is collected in the Autumn, Spring and Summer Terms. Census was not collected in Summer 2019/20 and Spring 2020/21. The table below shows available pupil data for Hetton le Hole Nursery from Autumn, Spring and Summer Census from 2016/17 to 2020/21.

5.2 In the period since September 2016 the number of pupils on roll at Hetton le Hole Nursery has declined. The Council has used census data to identify funded numbers of children on roll in both maintained nursery schools and in nursery classes in a school setting within a two-mile radius in the period 2016/17 to 2020/21. The settings evaluated were Hetton le Hole Nursery, Hetton Lyons Nursery, Houghton Nursery, Easington Lane Primary School and Eppleton Primary School.

5.3 Between Autumn 2016 and Autumn 2020 there was a reduction of 15% in the total number of funded places across all the settings identified above. This equated to a decline of 44 pupils across the five settings. However, the reduction in the roll at Hetton le Hole Nursery was greater than the overall pupil decline. At Autumn 2020 census there were 58% fewer children on roll at the Nursery than at the same point in 2016. This was inconsistent with other settings in the area where the largest reduction at any single setting, aside from Hetton le Hole Nursery, was a 4% decline in the number on roll.

5.4 It is noted that the reduction in pupils on roll outlined above occurred in a period of falling rolls across the area. However, the Nursery has also demonstrated falling demand in periods of pupil growth. Between Autumn 2016 and Autumn 2018 there was an increase of 8% (from 302 pupils to 327 pupils) in the number of pupils attending a nursery provision at one of the settings identified above. However, despite the increase in available pupils the cohort at Hetton le Hole Nursery fell by 43% over that period.

5.5 Over the census period Autumn 2016 to Autumn 2020 there was also an increase in parental preference demonstrated towards attendance at a nursery class in a school over attendance at a maintained nursery with the proportion of the total cohort in school nursery classes increasing from 20% to 24% over this period.

5.6 Hetton le Hole Nursery demonstrates similar pupil recruitment trends at other census period points. The most recent Summer Census collection (May 2019) identifies a 2% decline in overall participation across all the five schools and nurseries assessed in this document from the Summer 2017 Census. However, Hetton le Hole Nursery demonstrated a 26% decline in numbers on roll over the same period. Other settings (such as Easington Lane Primary School and Houghton Nursery School) demonstrated growth in recruitment over the same period while Hetton Lyons Nursery maintained 96% of the 2017 roll at that census point.

5.7 While the above identifies pupil recruitment across the maintained nursery sector and in maintained nursery classes there has also been an increased preference demonstrated in the Hetton Ward towards participation at private nursery settings. This has led to a reduction in the overall proportion of the local nursery aged children attending maintained nursery settings. The table below shows the proportion of children attending either a maintained nursery school, nursery class at a primary school or a private nursery located in the Hetton Ward at Autumn Census for the period 2016/17 to 2019/20.

5.8 In the period 2016/17 to 2019/20 the proportion of children attending a maintained nursery provision in the Hetton Ward fell by 19% as a proportion of the total local nursery population. Conversely the proportion of children attending both primary school nursery classes and private nursery provision increased, with the share of children at private provisions increasing by 17%. The local increase in demand for private nursery places accounts in part for the reduced demand for places at Hetton le Hole Nursery.

5.9 The table below compares the shift in parental preference when comparing the distribution of participation at a private nursery setting to Hetton le Hole Nursery using Autumn Census data 2016/17 – 2019/20

5.10 Data demonstrates an increased trend in preference towards attendance at the private setting to Hetton le Hole Nursery with a shift in participation preference of 38% between the two provisions.

5.11 The birth rate has also fallen in the Hetton Ward in recent years leading to a reduction in nursery age children. ONS Birth-rate data indicates that in the period 2013/14 to 2018/19 the birth-rate in the Hetton Ward fell by 11%. The reduction in nursery aged children combined with the increased preference for alternative early years provision indicates that there is a greater chance of a reduction in the number on future rolls at the nursery rather than an increase.

5.12 The development of new housing is not anticipated to sufficiently mitigate the fall in the local birth rate. An assessment of pupils attending a maintained nursery school from newly registered postcodes in Sunderland between 2010 and 2016 identified that for each new house built there was an increase of 0.068 pupils accessing a place at a maintained nursery setting. There are currently approximately 500 new homes either under development or with planning applications pending in the local area. Once completed these new homes would result in a total requirement for 34 additional nursery places in the Hetton Ward using the above ratio. Based on changes in demand for types of earlier years provision, as noted in para 5.7, it is considered likely that a proportion of those additional children would access provision at either a school nursery class or private nursery provider.

- 5.13 As of April 2021, in addition to surplus places at Hetton le Hole Nursery there remain surplus places at Hetton Lyons Nursery School, Easington Lane Primary School's Nursery Class and Eppleton Nursery School. Should the decision to close Hetton le Hole Nursery be taken there remain a range of places at both local maintained nursery schools and nursery classes within primary schools.

### **Impact on Other Providers**

- 6.1 The closure of the Nursery is anticipated to lead to a re-allocation of financial resource that will positively contribute towards the sustainability of the wider Sunderland maintained nursery sector.
- 6.2 The redistribution of the Lump Sum would result in an increased financial allocation between £5k - £7k per nursery setting per year. In previous years this would have resulted in providers who reported an end of year deficit budget instead reporting a balanced or surplus budget, therefore reducing any additional financial vulnerability.
- 6.3 Feedback from the consultation indicates there remains a local demand for maintained nursery settings over school nursery classes from a proportion of the local community. This indicates that demand for places at alternative local maintained nursery settings, namely Hetton Lyons Nursery School as the nearest alternative provision, will increase as a result of this proposal. It is likely that the increased funding that any increased demand at those settings creates will further strengthen the sustainability of those alternative maintained nursery settings.
- 6.4 The Council has also proposed the creation within a maintained school (Hetton Primary School) setting of an equal number of 2, 3 and 4-year old places to those currently offered by Hetton le Hole Nursery. Should the proposal to discontinue Hetton le Hole Nursery be implemented for the 2021/22 academic year the Council and Hetton Primary School will accelerate the proposal to develop a nursery setting within the school from September 2022 to September 2021 in order to provide this provision as an additional option for parents of displaced pupils.
- 6.5 The Council is aware that both maintained nursery schools in the Hetton Ward are currently projected to report cumulative deficit budget positions for the 2021/22 and 2022/23 academic years with both identified as financially vulnerable at this time. However, of the two nursery schools, Hetton Lyons Nursery contributes the greatest amount to the Lump Sum, has retained a greater proportion of its market share and has a consistently larger roll than Hetton le Hole Nursery. On this basis the Council has evaluated the likely sustainability of Hetton Lyons Nursery should there be a re-distribution of local demand from Hetton le Hole Nursery to Hetton Lyons Nursery should the decision be taken to discontinue the provision at Hetton le Hole Nursery.
- 6.6 Feedback from the Council's pre-publication consultation indicated that a number of respondents would seek an alternative maintained nursery school provision should Hetton le Hole Nursery close. The Council has identified that should 25 of those pupils seek an alternative placement at Hetton Lyons Nursery this, once additional staff costs have been subtracted, combined with an additional £7k Lump Sum payment in 2021/22, would generate additional income of £23k. This would be sufficient to meet Hetton Lyons Nursery's deficit position and ensure that a maintained nursery provision could be sustained in the ward.

## Presumption Against Closure of Maintained Nursery Schools

- 7.1 The Statutory Guidance ‘Opening and Closing Maintained Schools’ (November 2019) identifies the presumption against closure of a maintained nursery school. The Guidance states that this does not mean that a nursery will never close, but the case for closure should be strong and should demonstrate that:
- plans to develop alternative early years provision clearly demonstrate that it will be at least equal in quality and quantity to the provision provided by the nursery school with no loss of expertise and specialism; and
  - replacement provision is more accessible and more convenient for local parents.
- 7.2 Due consideration has been applied to those circumstances within this proposal.
- 7.3 The Council has proposed that should the Nursery be closed an alternative provision representing an equal number of places for 2,3 and 4-year-olds will be made available at Hetton Primary School. At present, as with Hetton le Hole Nursery’s nursery provision, Hetton Primary School has a Good Ofsted rating, although the nursery’s Outstanding grade for its separately registered childcare provision is noted.
- 7.4 The alternative provision is proposed to provide 39 full time places for 3 and 4-year old children and a further 16 places for 2-year olds. It is proposed that any vacancies for staff places at the provision to be established at the school are filled from staff currently employed at Hetton le Hole Nursery. This will ensure both continuity for children at the setting and ensure that expertise and specialism is retained in the local early years sector.
- 7.5 There are also surplus places at all alternative settings in the Hetton Ward, including Hetton Lyons Nursery School.
- 7.6 Including the proposed new provision at Hetton Primary School, of those families attending Hetton le Hole Nursery at the last full year Census point (May 2019), 73% live closer to at least one other setting rated as good with a nursery provision than they do to Hetton le Hole Nursery School with 47% living closer to 3 or more good settings than Hetton le Hole Nursery School. Of those, 51% live closer to the proposed alternative provision at Hetton Primary School.
- 7.7 Alternative provisions identified as within a shorter walking distance for those living closer to 3 or more alternative settings but on roll at Hetton le Hole Nursery School include;

7.10 In addition to the alternative academies, maintained schools and private nursery providers in the local area there is one additional maintained nursery school within 2 miles of Hetton le Hole Nursery School. Houghton Community Nursery School, based in the Copt Hill Ward, is 1.8 miles from Hetton le Hole Nursery. It was judged as Outstanding in its most recent Ofsted inspections for both its nursery provision and separately registered childcare provision.

## **8.0 Consultation**

8.1 On 9<sup>th</sup> February Cabinet approved a proposal to commence the School Organisation processes required to discontinue Hetton le Hole Nursery School.

8.2 Prior to this the Council had commenced a pre-publication consultation on potential proposals relating to the sustainability of the Nursery. The consultation ran between 4th January 2021 – 14th February 2021.

8.3 Responses to the consultation were received from

- Parents of pupils attending Hetton le Hole Nursery School
- Current staff
- Local schools and nurseries
- The wider local community and others

In total the Council received 541 responses to the pre-publication consultation. Of the responses received 92% disagreed with the proposal to close the Nursery. Responses are collated as Appendix 1 of this report.

8.4 Those disagreeing with the proposal highlighted the benefits that the Nursery offers to the local community including its location, the quality of provision offered and the range of provision offered (such as 30-hour provision, two-year-old provision and wraparound care). The quality of the staff currently employed at the Nursery featured in many of the responses. Continuity of transition for young people currently attending the Nursery was also noted in responses.

8.5 Comments received were noted. However, as no alternative, viable solution for the Nursery was identified, notification and a full statutory proposal to discontinue the Nursery was subsequently published.

8.6 The full proposal and associated statutory notices were published on 23<sup>rd</sup> February 2021 with the statutory notice period ending 5pm on 23<sup>rd</sup> March 2021. The statutory notice was published in the following places:

- Sunderland City Council's website
- The Sunderland Echo
- At the entrances to Hetton le Hole Nursery School

8.7 In addition to the publication of notices the following groups were provided the opportunity to make representation as part of this process:

- Parents of pupils attending the nursery
- Current staff
- Unions
- Local members

- The local Church of England diocese
- The local Roman Catholic diocese and
- The Secretary of State for Education.

8.8 The notice and full proposal was provided to the local Town Council for its consideration

8.9 On 25<sup>th</sup> February, the Council attended a virtual session for parents and carers of pupils and the staff and governors of Hetton le Hole Nursery. The meeting was also attended by Bridget Phillipson (MP for Houghton and Sunderland South) and Cllr Louise Farthing (Portfolio Holder for Children's Services). The Council's proposal was outlined to those attending the session and parents, carers and staff were provided with the opportunity to seek clarification on any element of the Council's proposal.

8.10 The Council has received 272 responses to the notice. The statutory notice and the full proposal document are attached at Appendix 2 and Appendix 3 with responses included as Appendix 4.

## **9.0 Next Steps**

9.1 Should the School Organisation Committee of Cabinet approve to the implementation of the closure of Hetton le Hole Nursery it is proposed that the Nursery closes on 31 August 2021.

9.2 It is also proposed that the adjustment to the lower age of admission at Hetton Primary School, proposed for 2022, is brought forward to September 2021. The decision relating to that proposal facilitates that action.

## **10. Reasons for the Decision**

10.1 In recent years the Nursery has become financially vulnerable. The Nursery has a deficit budget that has increased each year over the previous five years. The Nursery's financial deficit exceeded £200k at the close of the 2020/21 financial year and, based on current staffing structures, is projected to continue to increase in future years. The Nursery has also been subject to falling rolls in recent years which has impacted on the available funding at the setting.

10.2 Falling rolls and the statutory requirements relating to staffing ratio, combined with current funding rates and methodology have resulted in the Nursery being unable to implement a structure and delivery model that can operate within the financial model required of a maintained nursery school. On that basis it has been identified as unviable as a long-term provision.

10.4 To safeguard the wider sufficiency of nursery places in the Hetton Ward, for both current and future cohorts of children, the Council is proposing that Hetton le Hole Nursery and its separately registered childcare provision are discontinued from 31st August 2021. In addition to the surplus places already available at other early years providers and school nursery classes in the ward, additional alternative places for 2, 3 and 4-year olds (including both 30 hours provision and disadvantaged 2-year-old places) will be offered at Hetton Primary School.

## 11. Alternative Options

Viability options have been evaluated on the following basis

1. Do alternative options result in the increased viability of Hetton le Hole Nursery and
2. Do the alternative options result in the increased viability of the wider maintained nursery sector should Hetton le Hole Nursery be retained?

### Retain Hetton le Hole Nursery School.

- 11.1 In April 2021 the Nursery provided the Council with updated budget projections for the financial years 2021/22, 2022/23 and 2023/24. Budget projections were based on a revised staffing structure, to be implemented September 2021, which would have resulted in savings of approximately £60k of expenditure in each of the three years. Subject to implementation of the revised staffing structure, achievement of target pupil numbers, achievement of private income and the current levels of the Maintained Nursery Supplementary Funding remaining at 2020/21 levels the Nursery had projected that its deficit position would decrease by £3k at the close of 2021/22 and by a cumulative £27k by the close of 2023/24
- 11.2 The Council was scheduled to meet with the Nursery in late April 2021 to discuss the projected budgets for 2021/22 – 2023/24 and the implications for the Nursery's outstanding cumulative deficit. At the Nursery's request this meeting was re-scheduled to May 2021. The re-arrange meeting was then cancelled at the Governing Body's request. The Nursery also communicated to the Council that the restructure proposed to the Council was considered inappropriate at this time and instead reverted to the budget projections set in March 2021. However, as noted in section 4 of this paper, that March 2021 budget also was based on the premise of staff re-structure and as that re-structure will also not, at this time, be proceeding the Council has estimated that as opposed to a surplus or balanced budget the 2021/22 – 2023/24 outturns will continue as deficit projections with the projected deficit range for 2021/22 to be between £12k and £27k and the cumulative deficit to 2023/24 increasing by a minimum of £51k to a total deficit position of £255k.
- 11.3 The Council is aware of the historical discrepancy between the Nursery's previous in year projections the subsequent end of year outturn positions with the Nursery failing to achieve its projected outturn in the period 2014/15 to 2019/20. The Nursery's 2021 – 2023 projection also requires the current level of Lump Sum to remain consistent.
- 11.4 The Nursery has become increasingly reliant on the proportion of the city's Lump Sum that is allocated to the EYDSG through enrolment of pupils at other maintained nursery settings across the city. This indicates that any change in demand for places across the wider maintained nursery settings will have a negative impact on Hetton le Hole Nursery. It should be noted that while indicative allocations have been issued for 2021/22 funding has not yet been confirmed for subsequent years. On that basis the 10% decrease in the citywide birth rate between 2016/17 and 2018/19 is likely to have a significant impact on the finances at Hetton le Hole with a potential reduction in the Lump Sum from 2022/23, and therefore income at each maintained nursery setting, of £9k. However, the decline in births across the seven wards containing maintained nursery schools, at 16% in the period 2016/17 – 2018/19 is greater than the citywide decline over the same period. Should that decline be reflected in future enrolments at nursery places it will reflect a decrease in the Lump Sum allocation of between £13k -£14k per setting.

## **Amalgamate with an Another Maintained Nursery Provider**

- 11.5 The Council has explored the viability of merging Hetton le Hole Nursery with another local nursery setting. For the settings existing deficit position to be written off this would involve the closure of one of the two nursery schools identified for merger with that site then established as a satellite provision of the remaining nursery school setting. Delivery would take place from both sites under one school with one headteacher.
- 11.6 Savings would come from the removal of one of the two existing headteacher posts across the two schools with the remaining headteacher post assuming leadership responsibilities for both schools with 2.5 days a week allocated to each setting. This estimated saving would be circa £37k per nursery per year.
- 11.7 However, that cost is offset by a requirement to increase support posts to provide, for example, full time SENCO support at the nurseries (this role is currently carried out by the headteacher at most maintained settings), support for pupils when the headteacher also carries out a teaching role within their post or back office/ admin support. Should the requirement to backfill these rolls be met through the appointment of a Full Time Nursery Assistant across both settings then this would reduce the potential saving by circa £11k per existing nursery. Should it be backfilled with additional teaching or leadership capacity the saving would be reduced by £20k per setting.
- 11.8 The closure and establishment of two sites as a single nursery school would also result in a re-allocation of the Lump Sum, with the Lump Sum split between seven nursery schools as opposed to eight. Based on 2020's allocation this would result in a £7k increase in the single allocation but would also result in a £48k decrease in the funds currently allocated to Hetton le Hole Nursery. The net £41k reduction in funding for the settings combined with the costs associated in increasing support staff would therefore result in an increase in the funding required at the Nursery by £15k.
- 11.9 As noted in this paper the Council has evaluated the sustainability of Hetton Lyons School should they continue to operate as the sole maintained nursery school in the Hetton Ward. It has been identified that the redistribution of a proportion of the pupils on roll at Hetton le Hole Nursery (25 children accessing a mixture of 15 and 30 hours) would be sufficient to meet the Hetton Lyons Nursery's projected deficit position. On this basis it is considered more sustainable for Hetton Lyons Nursery, and the wider nursery sector, should there be only one maintained nursery provider operating from a single site within the ward.

## **Federation between Hetton le Hole Nursery and Houghton/ Mill Hill Nursery Federation**

- 11.10 In March 2021, following evaluation of the 2020/21 financial outturn for all nursery schools across the city, the Council identified a potential federation option that would result in sufficient long term savings at the Nursery to enable the long term viability of the setting. The federation proposal, presented to the Governing Body of the Nursery in March 2021, would result in Hetton le Hole Nursery becoming part of the already established federation between Houghton Community Nursery School and Mill Hill Nursery School. The proposal would have resulted in the three nursery schools



operating under a single headteacher. No further staffing changes were proposed or required at any of the three nursery schools to accommodate the proposal.

- 11.11 It was projected that the proposal would result in initial savings of approximately £44k per year at Hetton le Hole Nursery. This would increase when joint commissioning of goods and service level agreements was factored in. When the previous average deficit of £24k per year was considered the Nursery would be anticipated to make a minimum of £20k per year surplus. The combined balances of the three nursery schools would be a surplus budget at the point of federation.
- 11.12 The proposal was rejected by the Governing Body of Hetton le Hole Nursery in April 2021.

### **Relocate Hetton le Hole Nursery**

- 11.13 It is estimated that £18k – 20k of the Nursery's current yearly expenditure is related to premises costs. The average year end deficit at the nursery over the period 2016/17 to 2019/20 was circa £24k. For the purpose of identifying the savings that could be made through relocation the Council has evaluated costs associated with a move to the new Hetton Primary School. Benchmarking data suggests that premises costs for a school of that size are between £95k and £125k per year of which the Nursery would be expected to meet between 10% and 12% of the costs. This is factored on the proportion of floor space for the Nursery and the Nursery being the sole operator from the building for 10 weeks of the year (the school does not operate a primary provision during school holidays). The planning application for Hetton Primary School seeks to establish around 130m<sup>2</sup> of nursery space, although this does not include the additional 40m<sup>2</sup> required to deliver a baby provision. On that basis, premises costs for the Nursery would range between £9.5k and £15k per year. While providing a saving on premises costs of between £5k - £10k per year this does not amount to the average deficit.
- 11.14 This solution would also not minimise the Nursery's reliance on the Lump Sum and the impact that reliance has on other settings.

### **Seek to re-allocate alternative funding to/ from Hetton le Hole Nursery**

- 11.15 Opportunities to increase external funding to the nursery are limited to the Lump Sum and Early Years Dedicated Schools Grant. In the period since 2017 the Nursery has benefited from £414k from the Lump Sum. This is £188k more than the Nursery would have received had the Council and Schools Forum allocated funding according to the guidance set out by the DfE, i.e. that funding should be allocated to protect the pre- Early Years National Funding Formula rate. This has resulted in the Nursery being a net beneficiary of this funding. It has been identified in this document that this allocation methodology has been to the detriment of other local settings, including Hetton Lyons Nursery which has previously recorded a deficit budget due to the allocation methodology used. The lump sum to Hetton le Hole Nursery increased following the closure of Millfield Community Nursery in 2018 despite the Nursery's contribution to the city fund declining. It is not considered viable to further increase the proportion of funding allocated to Hetton le Hole Nursery.
- 11.16 The Council is aware that a request has been made to consider an allocation from the Early Years Dedicated Schools Grant (EYDSG) to support the Nursery's ongoing deficit position. Allocation from this funding is subject to Schools Forum approval.

However, it is also noted that while there has been underspend against EYDSG in recent years there is not an underspend against the overall Dedicated Schools Grant (DSG) allocation. The wider grant currently has a cumulative shortfall of circa £1.4m. This is largely attributed to increased costs associated with provision of Special Educational Needs Provision, including to children accessing provision at maintained Early Years settings. Therefore, re-allocation across the Universal DSG block would impact on the Council's ability to source and fund places and support for children with special educational needs with no alternative mechanism to provide this support.

11.17 It is also noted that the years before 2017/18 the EYDSG was overspent. This resulted in resource being re-allocated from elsewhere in the wider DSG block to enable the funding of the agreed early years priorities and provide sufficient pupil funding to settings. This mirrors the current funding situation where underutilised funding within the EYDSG been re-allocated to support and mitigate the overdemand on the High Needs block within the DSG. It should be noted that any re-allocation of funding within the DSG only occurs once the requirements within the relevant, in this case the early years block, have been met.

11.18 As noted in this paper, the Council is aware of the impact that the disproportionate local allocation of the Lump Sum vs the methodology expected within national guidance has on other maintained nursery schools. Nursery schools are entering an increasingly financially challenging environment and, as indicated in this paper, the requirement for the wider sector to support Hetton le Hole Nursery has now led to occasions that either directly led to another setting reporting an end of year deficit budget or contributing to a deficit budget. To mitigate this would require a re-allocation of the Lump Sum where an individual nursery school's yearly allocation reflected the actual pupils on roll at each setting. However, this would result in further increase of the Hetton le Hole Nursery deficit. The average additional sum provided to the Nursery over the amount required to protect the pre-Early Years National Funding Formula rate over the previous 5 years as a result of this re-allocation is £32k per year. Without this support the Nursery's current deficit position would be around £350k.

### **Retain Hetton le Hole Nursery until August 31<sup>st</sup>, 2022**

11.19 The Council has previously agreed a proposal to provide a nursery provision at the new Hetton Primary School buildings. It is proposed that provision commences from September 2022 when the school takes occupation of its new buildings. However, should the proposal to discontinue Hetton le Hole Nursery proceed that nursery provision would instead commence in September 2021. The nursery class would be accommodated in the current school buildings in order to maintain the number of local nursery places. Any staff positions at that setting will be ringfenced for existing Hetton le Hole Nursery staff to ensure the children attending the provision have a degree of continuity in their nursery experience.

11.20 An alternative option is for the Council to agree the proposals to discontinue the Nursery in August 2022, as opposed to August 2021. Hetton Primary School would, on that basis, commence its new nursery class on the opening of its new school with Hetton le Hole Nursery operating in the year that the school is under construction. Any staff vacancies involved in the delivery of nursery provision at Hetton Primary School in 2022/23 would be ring fenced for staff currently employed at Hetton le Hole Nursery.

11.21 However, the following factors should be considered. While not measurable there is also the potential for instability in provision, such as higher staff turnover in year which would lead to higher cost agency staffing requirements and lower pupils on roll as parents may not wish to enrol their children in a setting where closure has already been agreed. Those factors could lead to a higher end of year deficit position as opposed to the Nursery's current surplus projection.

## **Parent/ Carer Proposals**

11.22 Feedback from the Council's pre-publication survey (section 8 of this paper) included an alternative fees proposal developed by parents at the Nursery. The proposal identified variances between fees currently charged by other local settings and Hetton le Hole Nursery. The proposal identified an increase in fees from £4.50 per hour to £5 per hour. The proposal identifies the potential increase in revenue at £17,436 over a full academic year. The proposal also identifies potential for additional income through parent fundraising. It also proposes retaining the Nursery until September 2022.

11.23 Variable factors that are not catered for within the proposal are potential impacts of any reduction in the local birth-rate both locally and across the wider city. It also places a requirement to ensure sustainability on regular parental and community fundraising.

11.24 The Nursery's reliance on the Lump Sum is noted. The parent proposal identifies fundraising as an alternative to the Lump Sum. This would require £38k - £48k to be raised yearly by the local community to maintain the current level of support. This, however, would result in the long term sustainability of the Nursery being dependent on crowdsourcing as opposed to the development and implementation of a sustainable model.

## **12. Impact Analysis**

**Sustainability** – It has been identified that, because of Hetton le Hole's projected financial position, the setting is not sustainable within current funding conditions.

The Council has recently approved proposals to establish a nursery class at the neighbouring Hetton Primary School so there will remain enough alternative local 2, 3 and 4-year old nursery places in the Hetton ward.

Hetton le Hole Nursery, as with all local maintained nursery settings, is currently a recipient of a yearly lump sum payment. The Lump Sum is calculated based on the number of pupils attending statutory aged nursery provision across the city. The Lump Sum is divided equally across all local settings, regardless of the numbers of pupils attending the settings. This results in some nursery schools receiving a greater proportion of the Lump Sum than they generate through their own pupil numbers. However, Hetton le Hole Nursery generates a lesser proportion of the Lump Sum than they receive as a setting. Therefore, the discontinuation of the Nursery will result in increased funding to other maintained nursery schools. This would result in increased viability of the wider sector, including alternative maintained nursery provision in the Hetton Ward and neighbouring Copt Hill Ward.

Feedback received through the pre-publication consultation conducted between 4th January and 14th February indicates that, despite the shift in local preference towards school nursery classes and private nursery provision in the ward, there

remains a support and demand for maintained nursery places. On that basis it is considered that a proportion of the children currently enrolled at Hetton le Hole Nursery would seek a place at one of the two neighbouring-maintained nursery settings. This would add further funding and further increase the viability of those settings therefore contributing to the long term safeguarding of the remaining maintained nursery provision in the Hetton Ward.

**Equalities Analysis** – Given the availability and accessibility of other local provision, including alternative maintained nursery provision at two neighbouring settings, no groups are projected to be disadvantaged by this proposal. The Equalities Assessment is included at Appendix 5.

### **13. Other Relevant Considerations / Consultations**

**13.1 Co-operative values** – At Annual Council in May 2015, it was resolved that the following statement be included in the Constitution to reflect the values of the “Co-operative Council”.

*“Sunderland City Council is a co-operative council and in being so will act ethically in all its actions while adhering to and actively promoting its co-operative values of self-help, self-responsibility, democracy, equality, equity and solidarity. These values will underpin its decision making and actions.”*

### **13.2 Financial implications**

While the Council will seek to support the redeployment of staff currently employed at the Nursery within the local maintained school sector or wider Council any redundancy costs associated with this proposal would be met through the Maintained Schools Redundancy Reserve.

Governmental funding regulations prohibit the writing-off of any deficits for ongoing schools to a Council’s General Reserves, though the deficit would fall to the Council should the setting close. If the school remains open, the cumulative deficit for the setting, which is in excess of £200,000, could only be written off to the Dedicated Schools Grant. This, as noted in paragraph 11.16 is already in a cumulative deficit position of £1.4m at 31 March 2021. Any such write-off would be reported to the Schools Forum.

The above would apply should the decision be taken to discontinue the Nursery, either to facilitate a merger with another setting(s) (which would result in multiple nurseries operating as a single registered school with multiple satellite delivery sites) or to cease the provision. Should the Nursery continue but continue to increase its deficit position in future years the Council’s financial exposure, and therefore the potential cost to the Dedicated Schools Grant would increase accordingly.

### **13.3 Legal Implications**

Throughout the process, from informal consultation to the publication of the statutory proposals, the Council has complied with the requirements of the applicable legislation (the Education and Inspections Act 2006 and the School Organisation (Establishment and Discontinuance of Schools) Regulations 2013) and has also adhered to the Department for Education’s Statutory Guidance – Opening and Closing Maintained Schools, November 2019.

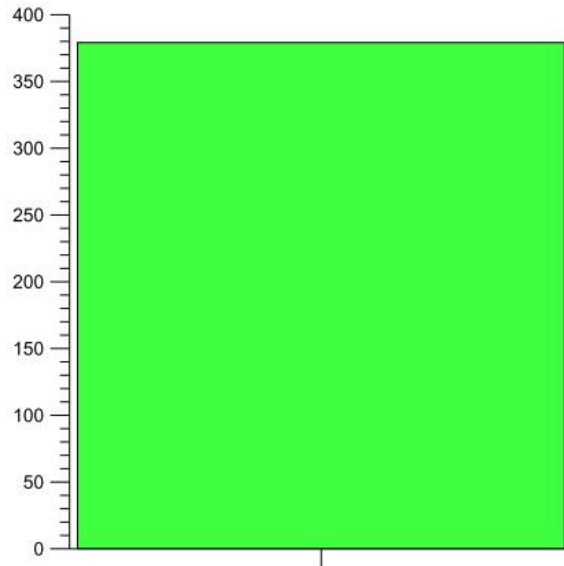

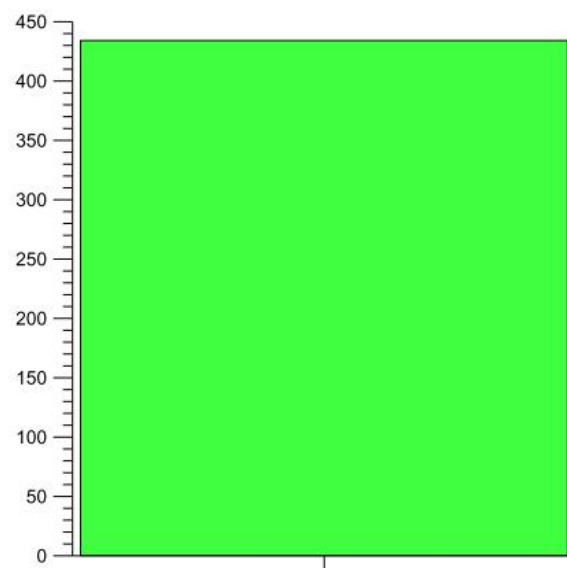

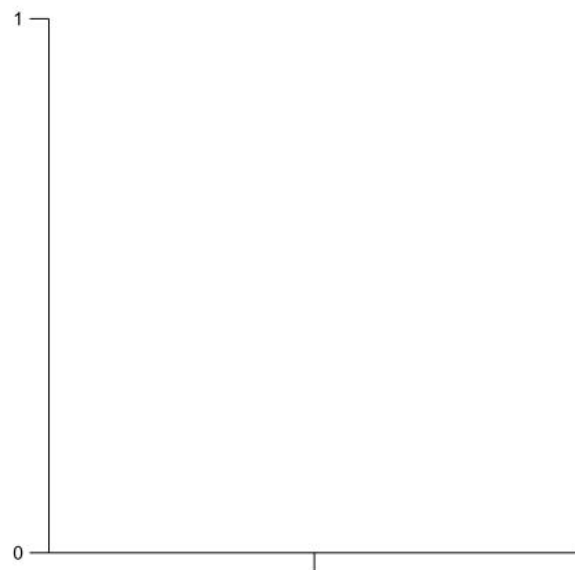

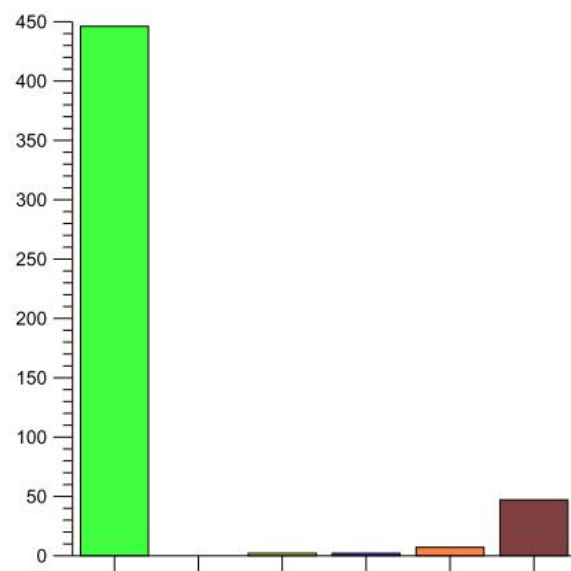

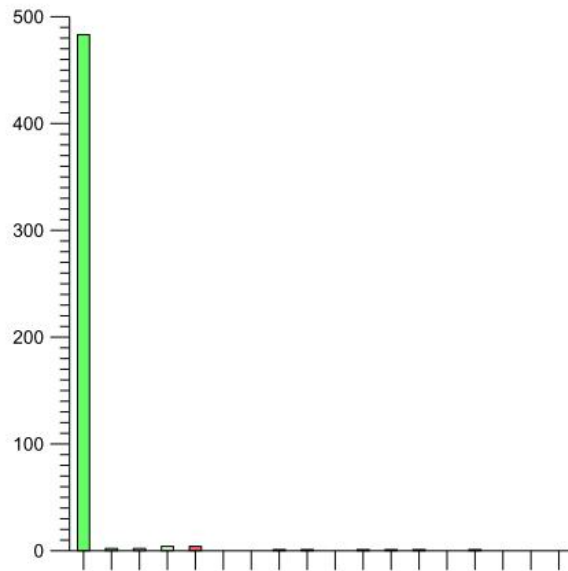

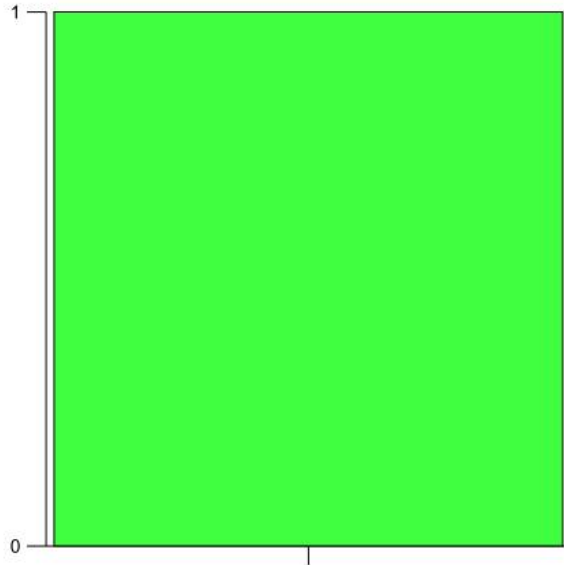

Do you consider yourself to have a disability?

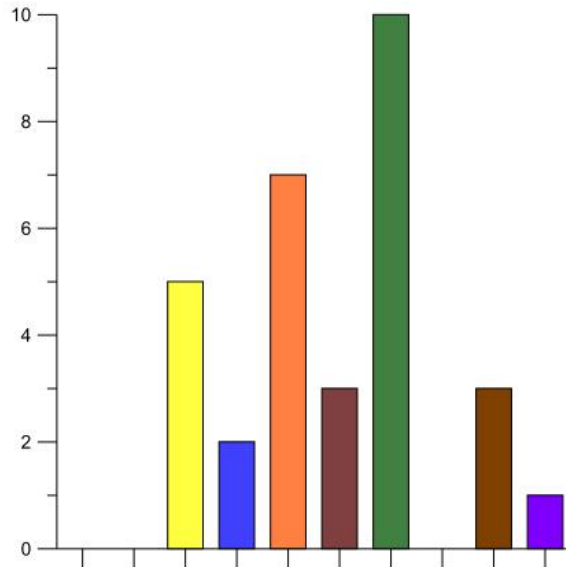

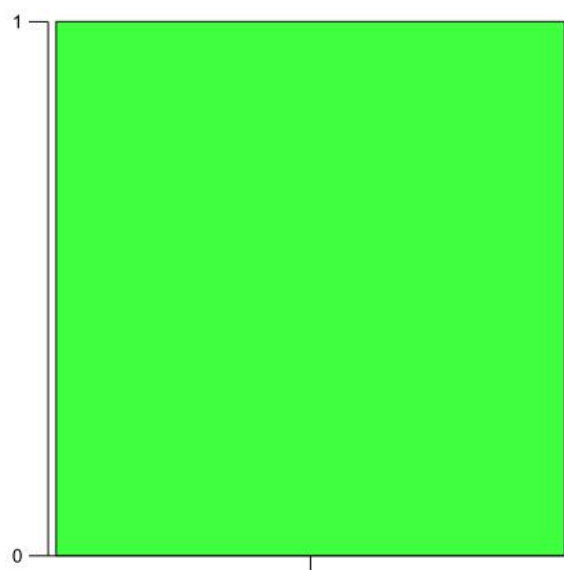

In addition to its statutory nursery provision for 3 to 5-year olds the Nursery delivers a separately registered childcare provision. It is proposed that both the nursery and childcare provision are discontinued under this proposal.

### NOTIFICATION OF STATUTORY PROPOSAL FOR THE DISCONTINUANCE (CLOSURE) OF HETTON LE HOLE NURSERY SCHOOL

#### **Local Authority Proposal and Contact Details**

Notice is hereby given in accordance with Section 15 of the Education and Inspections Act 2006, that it is the intention of Sunderland City Council, Civic Centre, Burdon Road, Sunderland, SR2 7DN to:

- Discontinue the provision at Hetton le Hole Nursery School, Victoria Street, Hetton le Hole, Tyne and Wear, DH5 9DG with effect from 31<sup>st</sup> August 2021.

Hetton le Hole Nursery School (the Nursery) is a maintained nursery school maintained by Sunderland City Council. In addition to its statutory nursery provision for 2 to 5-year olds, Hetton le Hole Nursery delivers a separately registered childcare provision. At its last full Ofsted inspection (March 2015) the Nursery was awarded an overall grade of Good. At the independently registered childcare provision's last full Ofsted inspection (February 2015) that provision was awarded an overall grade of Outstanding.

It is proposed that both the nursery and childcare provision are discontinued under this proposal.

#### **Reason for the Closure of Hetton le Hole Nursery School**

In recent years the Nursery has become financially vulnerable. The Nursery has a deficit budget that has increased each year over the previous five years and is projected to continue to increase in future years. It is currently projected that the Nursery's financial deficit will amount to between £163k and £172k by the close of the 2020/21 financial year. The deficit is projected to continue to increase to up to £200k by the close of the 2022/23 financial year. The Nursery has also been subject to falling rolls in recent years which has impacted on the available funding at the setting. The table below includes future years' financial projections for the Nursery, established during October 2020. These projections do not include the further impact on the nursery's finances as a consequence of Covid restrictions that commenced in January 2021.

Additional financial support mechanisms made available to the Council from central government to support the costs associated with maintained nursery schools have been fully utilised. This has resulted in the Nursery receiving between £70k - £80k of additional funding in each of the previous three years. However, despite additional financial support the Nursery has continued to increase its deficit budget.

It has also been identified that the allocation methodology used to provide the additional financial support to the Nursery has led to three occasions in the previous four financial years where at least one other maintained nursery school in the city has accrued an in year deficit budget, and subsequently, also being identified as financially vulnerable. On this basis it has been determined that the level of financial support required to sustain Hetton le Hole Nursery is not

enough to ensure the Nursery's viability and cannot be provided without further risk to the wider maintained nursery sector in the city.

Falling rolls and the statutory requirements relating to staffing ratio, combined with current funding rates and methodology have resulted in the Nursery being unable to implement a structure and delivery model that can operate within the financial model required of a maintained nursery school. On that basis it has been identified as unviable as a long-term provision.

To safeguard the wider sufficiency of nursery places in the Hetton Ward, for both current and future cohorts of children, the Council is proposing that Hetton le Hole Nursery and its separately registered childcare provision are discontinued from 31<sup>st</sup> August 2021. Alternative places for 2, 3 and 4-year olds (including both 30 hours provision and disadvantaged 2-year-old places) will be offered at an alternative mainstream school setting (Hetton Primary School). There are also alternative surplus places at other settings within the ward and within a 2-mile travel area (offering Good and Outstanding maintained nursery places) for parents and carers who do not wish to take up a place at the proposed alternative provision.

### **Effect on other Schools, Academies and Educational Institutions in the Area**

The closure of the Nursery is anticipated to lead to a re-allocation of financial resource that will positively contribute towards the sustainability of the wider Sunderland Maintained Nursery sector.

All maintained nursery schools in the city currently receive additional financial support through the Maintained Nursery School Supplementary Funding Allocation (the Lump Sum). The Lump Sum is calculated using the number of 3- and 4-year olds attending the first 15 hours of statutory provision at each maintained nursery school in the city each year at January Census. While each nursery's contribution to the Lump Sum is different in the case of Sunderland the combined sums generated by all nursery schools in the city is pooled and re-distributed equally, as opposed to each setting receiving the proportion of the allocation that it generates. This has resulted in some nurseries receiving a lower allocation than they generate and others, such as Hetton le Hole Nursery, receiving a greater share of the allocation than they generate.

Based on the number of pupils attending the Nursery in 2018/19 and 2019/20, the Nursery generated £41,167 and £33,573 respectively towards the City's combined total funding. However, due to the allocation methodology employed in Sunderland the Nursery received £75,449 and £82,037 respectively. The required uplift for the Nursery resulted in at least one other setting reporting a deficit budget in a financial year on three occasions in the previous four financial years. On that basis the methodology required to maintain the Nursery's current level of in year deficit is directly impacting on the sustainability of other settings across the sector. It has been estimated that the cost of the Lump Sum uplift at Hetton le Hole Nursery in 2019/20 was the equivalent of approximately £7k per setting. Despite the provision of additional funding the nursery returned end of year deficits for each of these years.

Feedback from the consultation indicates there remains a local preference for maintained nursery settings over school nursery classes from a proportion of the local community. This indicates that demand for places at alternative local maintained nursery settings may increase as a result of this proposal. It is likely that the increased funding that any increased demand at those settings creates will further strengthen the sustainability of those alternative maintained nursery settings.

The Council has also proposed the creation within a maintained school setting of an equal number of 2, 3 and 4-year old places to those currently offered by Hetton le Hole Nursery. Should the proposal to discontinue Hetton le Hole Nursery proceed there will be a requirement for the Council and Hetton Primary School to accelerate the current proposal to develop a nursery setting within the school from September 2022 to September 2021.

### **Project Costs**

Financial requirements because of the proposal to close Hetton le Hole Nursery School to meet any staff redundancy requirements are to be funded via the Dedicated Schools Grant Redundancy Reserves.

Costs associated with the delivery of an alternative provision, should the decision be taken to close Hetton le Hole Nursery, are contained within the wider construction costs for the new Hetton Primary School.

### **Pupil Numbers and Admissions**

In the period since September 2016 the number of pupils on roll at Hetton le Hole Nursery has declined. The Council has used census data to identify funded numbers of children on roll in both maintained nursery schools and in nursery classes in a school setting within a two-mile radius in the period 2016/17 to 2020/21. The settings evaluated were Hetton le Hole Nursery, Hetton Lyons Nursery, Houghton Nursery, Easington Lane Primary School and Eppleton Primary School. Due to Covid restrictions school census data was not collected in Summer 2020 so alternative available Census data has been used.

Census data identifies the number of children in a funded placement at a setting and is collected in the Autumn, Spring and Summer Terms.

Between Autumn 2016 and Autumn 2020 there was a reduction of 15% in the total number of funded places across all the settings identified above. This equated to a decline of 44 pupils across the five settings. However, the reduction in the roll at Hetton le Hole Nursery was greater than the overall pupil decline. At Autumn 2020 census there were 58% less children on roll at the Nursery than at the same point in 2016. This was inconsistent with other settings in the area where the largest reduction at any single setting, aside from Hetton le Hole Nursery, was a 4% decline in the number on roll.

It is noted that the reduction in pupils on roll outlined above occurred in a period of falling rolls across the area. However, the Nursery has also demonstrated falling demand in periods of pupil growth. Between Autumn 2016 and Autumn 2018 there was an increase of 8% (from 302 pupils to 327 pupils) in the number of pupils attending a nursery provision at one of the settings identified above. However, despite the increase in available pupils the cohort at Hetton le Hole Nursery fell by 43% over that period.

Over the census period Autumn 2016 to Autumn 2020 there was also an increase in parental preference demonstrated towards attendance at a nursery class in a school over attendance at a maintained nursery with the proportion of the total cohort in school nursery classes increasing from 20% to 24% over this period.

Hetton le Hole Nursery demonstrates similar pupil recruitment trends at other census period points. The most recent Summer Census collection (May 2019) identifies a 2% decline in overall participation across all the five schools and nurseries assessed in this document from the

Summer 2017 Census. However, Hetton le Hole Nursery demonstrated a 26% decline in numbers on roll over the same period. Other settings (such as Easington Lane Primary School and Houghton Nursery School) demonstrated growth in recruitment over the same period while Hetton Lyons Nursery maintained 96% of the 2017 roll at that census point.

The table below identifies the numbers on roll at the Nursery at each of the three census points in the years 2016/17 to 2020/21. Census was not reported in Summer 2020 and has not yet been collected for Spring or Summer 2021,

It is noted that while there has been a decline in overall numbers and the proportion of overall take up at the setting there is a strong track record in recruitment of younger year groups with the Nursery achieving 97% of the number of two- year olds on roll in the summer 2019 Census (the most recent summer census collection) as the number reported in Summer 2017. This indicates an ongoing demand for 2-year-old places in the ward that should be provided if the proposals are to proceed. However, this recruitment is not later reflected in recruitment of the older class group at the setting.

### **Displaced Pupils**

The Council currently has a proposal under consideration to lower the age of admission at Hetton Primary School. Should the proposal to discontinue Hetton le Hole Nursery proceed it is considered that the new school provision will have the capacity to offer the number of 2,3 and 4-year-old places currently offered by the Nursery. Parents currently attending Hetton le Hole Nursery will be prioritised for admission at that setting should proposals proceed. However, there remain vacancies at other good and outstanding provisions within the Hetton and Houghton wards for parents who may seek an alternative place to Hetton Primary School.

There are currently considered enough places for 0-2-year olds at alternative settings and childminders to accommodate local demand for places.

## **Impact on the Community**

The Nursery is considered locally as a community asset. 35% of those responding to the Council's pre-publication consultation identified as residents. This was a greater proportion than the 31% who identified as parents of children attending the Nursery.

The closure of the Nursery would result in the removal of a Good nursery provision and Outstanding childcare provision from the local area. However, it is noted that there would be sufficient alternative local nursery places at good schools with nursery provisions or maintained nursery settings, as well as an Outstanding nursery provision within two miles of Hetton le Hole Nursery, to enable residents from within the community to access suitable alternative early years provision.

The Nursery building is in the ownership of Sunderland Council. There is currently no projected use for the building should this proposal be implemented. However, there remain opportunities to seek an alternative educational use for the building post September 2021.

## **Maintained Nursery Schools**

This proposal is for the discontinuation of an existing maintained nursery provision. The Statutory Guidance 'Opening and Closing Maintained Schools' (November 2019) identified the presumption against closure of a maintained nursery school. The Guidance states that this does not mean that a nursery will never close, but the case for closure should be strong and should demonstrate that:

- plans to develop alternative early years provision clearly demonstrate that it will be at least equal in quality and quantity to the provision provided by the nursery school with no loss of expertise and specialism; and
- replacement provision is more accessible and more convenient for local parents.

Due consideration has been applied to those circumstances within this proposal.

The Council has proposed that should the Nursery be closed an alternative provision representing an equal number of places for 2,3 and 4-year-olds will be made available at Hetton Primary School. At present, as with Hetton le Hole Nursery's nursery provision, Hetton Primary School has a Good Ofsted rating, although the nursery's Outstanding grade for its separately registered childcare provision is noted.

The alternative provision is proposed to provide 39 full time places for 3 and 4-year old children and a further 16 places for 2-year olds. It is proposed that any vacancies for staff places at the provision to be established at the school are filled from staff currently employed at Hetton le Hole Nursery. This will ensure both continuity for children at the setting and ensure that expertise and specialism is retained in the local early years sector.

There are also surplus places at a number of alternative settings in the Hetton Ward, including Hetton Lyons Nursery School.

Including the proposed new provision at Hetton Primary School, of those families attending Hetton le Hole Nursery at the last full year Census point (May 2019) 73% live closer to at least one other setting rated as good with a nursery provision than they do to Hetton le Hole Nursery School with 47% living closer to 3 or more good settings than Hetton le Hole Nursery School. Of those 51% live closer to the proposed alternative provision at Hetton Primary School.

Alternative provisions identified as within a shorter walking distance for those living closer to 3 or more alternative settings but on roll at Hetton le Hole Nursery School include

In addition to the alternative academies, maintained schools and private nursery providers in the local area there is one additional maintained nursery schools within 2 miles of Hetton le Hole Nursery School. It is;

- Houghton Community Nursery School – 1.8 miles

Houghton Community Nursery School was judged as Outstanding in its most recent Ofsted inspections for both its nursery provision and separately registered childcare provision.

### **Rural Primary Schools**

Hetton le Hole Nursery School does not fall within the categorisation of a rural primary as set out in Section 15 of the Education and Inspections Act 2006. Furthermore, the school is not listed on the DfE's List of Designated Rural Primary Schools 2018.

### **Balance of Denominational Provision**

There would be no impact on the balance of denominational provision as the Nursery does not have a religious character.

### **Special Educational Needs Provision (SEND)**

Hetton le Hole Nursery School is not designated as a specific provider of Special Educational Needs Provision. This proposal will not result in the discontinuation of a SEND specific provision in Sunderland.

### **Travel**

The Council has considered the impact of travel within this proposal. It is considered that there is suitable alternative provision to that currently offered at Hetton le Hole Nursery for those parents currently on roll. Data indicates that 73% of parents on roll at the Nursery at the last full census point live closer to an alternative Good nursery provision than Hetton le Hole Nursery while 47% of those on roll live closer to at least three alternative good early years providers.

## Consultation

An informal (pre-publication) consultation upon the proposals took place during the following dates:

- 4<sup>th</sup> January 2021 – 14<sup>th</sup> February 2021

Consultees recommended in the relevant statutory guidance were consulted via a Consultation Document that was made widely available on the Council's website and the website of Hetton le Hole Nursery School. Consultees were asked:

***Sunderland Council considers that the proposal to close Hetton Le Hole Nursery and to create an equal amount of 2, 3 and 4-year-old nursery places within a local primary school setting from September 2021 would result in a viable and sustainable way to safeguard the long-term availability of nursery places for parents in the Hetton Ward.***

### ***Do you agree with the proposal?***

Consultees included parents, staff, the local ward councillors and staff representatives (unions) as well as those who had expressed an interest in consultations relating to developments in Hetton, Houghton and Copt Hill wards.

The consultation received 541 responses. Of these;

- 92% disagreed with the Council's proposal

Those disagreeing with the proposal highlighted the benefits that the Nursery offers to the local community including through its location, the quality of provision offered, the range of provision offered (such as 30-hour provision, two-year-old provision and wraparound care). The quality of the staff currently employed at the nursery was a feature of many responses. Continuity of transition for young people currently attending the nursery was also noted in responses.

The Council has sought to address issues raised in responses to the consultation. As such the alternative provision at Hetton Primary School;

- Will offer a 30-hour provision to parents who require this provision across all the 2,3 and 4-year old age ranges. This will apply to government funded or privately funded places.
- Staff vacancies at the alternative setting will be recruited from the existing Hetton le Hole staffing base to ensure children have access to staff they are familiar with and the expertise of those staff can be retained as much as is possible within any agreed delivery structure.

Further consideration will also be given to areas such as holiday provision and flexible opening and closing times. However, this provision is also available locally at other maintained nursery schools that currently have surplus places and therefore it is currently not proposed to be incorporated into the alternative provision at Hetton Primary School at this time.

It is also noted that several responses noted the Nursery's Outstanding Ofsted rating. While the

feedback provided in the Nursery's most recent Ofsted short visit is recognised, at the Nursery's last full inspection (31<sup>st</sup> March, 2015) it was issued an overall grade of Good with the Leadership and Management and the Behaviour and Safety of Pupils at the nursery graded as Outstanding within that overall grade.

The separately registered childcare provision is subject to independent inspection and that was rated as Outstanding at the Nursery's last full inspection (23<sup>rd</sup> February 2015).

There is currently only one maintained nursery school in the Coalfields area (Houghton Community Nursery School) that has overall Outstanding Ofsted ratings for both its nursery provision and its separately registered childcare provision.

The Council is mindful of the comments raised to date and the public support for Hetton le Hole Nursery and its staff. However, at this point no alternative option has been identified that would increase the viability, and therefore long-term sustainability, of the Nursery. Comments received to date, as well as any future comments from the remaining consultation period and the subsequent statutory notice period, will be submitted to the Council's School Organisation Committee of Cabinet (SOCOC) for its consideration when making any final decision on the future of the provision.

I am writing to you to express my concerns regarding the closure of Hetton Le Hole Nursery School.

I currently have 2 children who both attend the Nursery school and they have attended the school since 12 months old. Closing the Nursery in September would mean that they would not finish their time before school at the Nursery, as they would not start school until Sept 2022. If the Nursery were to close in September this would be truly devastating for myself as a parent and my children. As I would like them to go to the school in the village that we live (which does not offer 30 hours free funded places only 15) I would be unable to send them there from September. As a working parent, who is also a key worker I rely on the wrap around care that Hetton provides and the full 30 hours which I am entitled to. To move the children to another private Nursery for 1 year before they start school would be too much for their emotional wellbeing, especially taking into consideration that they will have to make a further change the following year.

When looking at childcare options when back in 2018 one of the main points to consider was the fact that Hetton Nursery has an outstanding ofsted rating, in fact the school was recommended for this from a relative

who is a head teacher at an infant school. There are no other Nursery environments in the area which I could send my children which has an outstanding rating on Ofstead.

Taking into consideration that the Nursery may close I looked at Nursery closer to my work and none could offer me the 30 hours I required only 15. This is not suitable for me and Hetton has been able to support my needs as a working parent. I also will not be sending my child to Hetton primary school and this is the one highlighted will have space for children if the Nursery was to close. It is assumed my child will move across to this Nursery as they would have the space, but this is not the case. I will have to find a Nursery that can take my children for 1 year until they are school age. Many of the top rated Nurseries simply do not have these spaces available. Hetton Le Hole Nursery is outstanding and my children already go there I would much prefer to not have this added stress to think about a new nursery when they are so close to school age.

2020 was already a very tough year for any child to go through. The Nursery supported myself as a key worker and took my children on days when they would not normally attend at no extra cost. I was very grateful of this and it been nothing but exceptional to help my children throughout this pandemic. The Nursery was kept open during the pandemic and I felt much safer as a parent them going to a nursery setting rather than a school setting. If we were to go into a lockdown again and the Nursery was closed this would be very worrying for me as parent.

I know the Nursery and the staff there are doing all they can to stay open all whilst still providing the outstanding care of the children who go there. This is worrying times for them as they will need to find new jobs, finding a job at any time is worrying but even more so after the effects covid 19 has had on the local labour market. If more funding was put into the Nursery, then it would keep people in jobs and most importantly children in an excellent education setting. A setting which supports the needs of many working parents, which I feel that school Nursery's do not. Please take all these points into consideration when making your decision to close such an outstanding Nursery in the heart of the environment. It would be a real shame to lose such an amazing place that has created the foundation of my children's learning. My children are excited to go to school, I do not want this impacting on their mental health.

The impact on children like my niece should be the first priority of the council, not finances. The cost of moving children to new settings away from peers and staff, they have for the last year treated as their family without proper time for them to adjust to a new and busier world, could not only result in the council still having the outstanding deficit and redundancy fees incurred, but also an increased number of children 🥹 including my niece needing additional emotional support at an increased cost to new setting and thus the council. I urge you to reconsider the timing of this and put the children's well being first in a time when they need stability most. - Our 3yr old son has been attending Hetton le Hole nursery since he was 12 months old. He loves been there and has made so many friends.
- He will be starting school in September 2022. If his nursery is closed it means he will have to move from his safe place which he loves, to a different setting where his friends might not go to plus he won't have his teachers. He will be there for a year and then have to move to a new school and do it all again. This will have a major impact on his emotional well being.
- Hetton le hole nursery have helped and supported not only our son but us as parents.
- Our son was recently diagnosed with a rare brain defect and all staff and Ruth have communicated with his health professionals to put a plan in place to help with his educational and complex needs. They have gone above and beyond to help him. Another reason we are really concerned about him having to move from nursery to nursery and then school. It could take months for another nursery to learn his needs.
- Our son is learning makaton sign language at nursery. They have trained staff who are amazing and he's picking it up really good. They have also given us help sheets so we can learn at home. I've looked around and do not see any other nursery that have trained staff in this field.
- Our son will NOT be attending Hetton primary, so why would we move him to the nursery for a year when he's in a perfectly outstanding nursery now.
- Putting children into Porter cabins and asbestos class rooms is really bad for their health. Esp for nursery aged children. I worked in construction and no full well the dangers of building sites, with dust, rubble, cement etc. Which is made more dangerous with children under 4yr old been put in that environment.
- A big concern is Hetton primary is right next to a busy road with no parking and also right next to Hetton comprehensive. So you have the danger off construction workers, more busy traffic and older children, with no parking. Doesn't take much for an older child to push one of the little ones into the road.
- Why will SSC not use the underspend to help out Hetton le Hole nursery and others that are facing closure?
- Hetton le hole nursery is set back away from roads and other schools. There is also a car park.

- The nursery garden has everything. There are nature walks, trees, etc. Not paving slabs like other nurseries around. One of the reason I decided to send my child to Hetton le hole and not one of the others.

Is closing a nursery, putting the staff out of guaranteed work in an already terrible year morally correct? They've spent the last year, putting their own health at risk looking after other people's children and their thanks from the council is their p45? I appreciate SOME of the staff MAY be able to gain employment at the new Hetton nursery but that doesn't justify it when some of the staff will still be left looking for alternative employment, especially the leadership team- what a waste of highly qualified staff!

Looking at the statistics of the nursery, you can't argue the provision is incomparable to other provisions in the area. None of the other nurseries in Hetton are ofsted rated outstanding.

In fact, In the Ofsted report, it notes that ' The hard working staff team put children and their parents or carers at the centre of all they do. This strong ethos results in staff listening to children and their parents and carers, valuing their views and acting on what they say'

Along with

‘Staff are loving, friendly and considerably caring as they carefully tend to each child's individual needs and facilitate their learning throughout the day. As a result, children are extremely happy and self-motivated in this fully inclusive environment’

These are the staff who are going to lose their job? It doesn't make sense. I could go on to quote other stand out points in the ofsted report, but I'm sure you must have familiarised yourselves with it, just before flipping the coin on the staff and children's futures?

Currently, I don't have a child who attends the nursery but I can speak from the point of view of a parent of a past pupil. My daughter started at the nursery in 2017 when she was 11 months old. I don't live particularly local to the nursery, nor do I work in the same direction but I choose the provision based on the quality of education, the staff, the setting, the results, recommendations and the nurseries history. None of these things I felt were replicated like for like at any other nurseries closer to home. My daughter started as a baby and when she left (sept 2000) she was a bright, well mannered, thriving 4 year old with excellent social and communication skills which I can only express my thanks to the staff at the nursery for.

The opportunities she was given during her time there went above and beyond. She learnt self care, care for animals, the environment, others and basic life skills alongside an educational base beyond what would be expected.

She is now in reception and although one of the youngest in the class, she is by far above many of her older peers in terms of education. She's one of the top at reading, writing and maths and hetton le hole nursery have helped her blossom into an independent young lady with a passion to try her best and for that I will be forever grateful.

Luckily I now have another child who will be attending Hetton le hole nursery school in September 2021- why shouldn't I be able to give both my children an equal start in life?

I truly don't feel like there's any other setting that offers the same opportunities as this nursery which is especially worrying if, heaven forbid, she ever needed extra support for special needs, as this setting has a qualified SENDCO which is invaluable.

Does the new build at hetton primary school offer equal provision? I'm not sure how putting my youngest daughter into demountable classrooms to kick start her early years education compares to the nursery gardens and



purpose built classrooms that my eldest was offered. Do I not deserve the choice to give both my children the same start?

You say there's no planned use for the building as yet? You won't need to think of a use if you let it stay open.

As we are all well aware, maintained nursery schools are severely underfunded by central government. Year on year budget cuts in early years have made it near impossible for maintained nursery schools to be financially stable and it has been noted that the financial status of the nursery isn't due to mismanagement of funds but the unavoidable costs related to maintained nursery schools. That said, government funding decisions about MNS's haven't currently been made and government are urging LA's to hold off making decisions about their long term future.

Additionally, the government have provided £60million in supplementary funding for maintained nursery schools and have confirmed this will continue into 21/22 whilst they are considering what is required to ensure a clear, longterm picture of funding for maintained nursery schools.

I was present recently at the meeting organised for the staff and parents of the nursery with Sunderland council, and to be quite honest, I was shocked at the meeting. It was clearly nothing more than a box ticking exercise for the council. To state that the nursery is destabilising other mns's in Sunderland due to a lower contribution-higher outtake of the lump sum is basically irrelevant when you consider the massive underspend the council have accrued over the past three years in early years and specifically special needs. Where are these funds and why can't they be used to save the maintained nursery sector in Sunderland?

Correct me if I'm wrong but it seems to me the only reason to close this nursery is solely based on finances.

Over 5 million pounds have been allocated to build a new school but they can't find money to pay off the deficit, which in the grand scheme of things is nothing.

In fact, the DFE state that maintained nursery schools should not be closed solely because of a deficit.

In government guidance it also states that to close a maintained nursery, EQUAL provision must be available that's both convenient and accessible to parents. Where is this? Hetton primary school won't cater for my 1 year old?

I feel this is a short term money saving exercise but the impact of sharing the lump sum amongst the other maintained nursery schools is insignificant with 5 out of 8 of Sunderland's maintained nurseries ending the year 2019-2020 with a deficit.

The council state that the nursery has a deficit upto £200000 that they don't have the capacity to clear , even though a large sum of this is 'old debt' which Ruth has had to deal with since taking over.

This is disappointing especially when you consider you have not provided any COVID relief funds from the millions you have received from central Government, allowing the nursery to accrue an extra £76000 deficit as staff couldn't be furloughed.

It also came to light in the meeting that the council have 'explored other options, non of which are viable'. Can you expand on this? What are the other options that have been disregarded? As members of the public we can think of several ways to help the nursery financially, other than wiping the deficit

- Raising the fees by 50p per hour to put the nursery in line with others in the area would generate over £17000 per year based on children on the roll today, which is more than the predicted in year deficit.

- allowing the nursery to become a feeder nursery for the new build, which would increase the children on the register

- broader advertising and not allowing anymore nurseries to open with the vicinity. Increasing the children on roll will clearly make a huge difference and New build housing is everywhere in Hetton. As Mr Rowan knows for every 100 new build houses there's approx 30 primary age children, all of which start at nursery and many of which start in childcare so increase in numbers is likely. Also, hopefully there's a chance of funding increasing to offer 30 free hours to all 2 year olds- therefore more appealing to working parents of young children

- Fundraising-a massive part of nursery which has been put on stop Due to Covid. Give people a chance to turn things around. In three weeks supporters have raised over £3000- imagine what we could do in a year, two years, five years-through sheer determination

Where's the honest consultation with the community?

92% of the 541 preconsultation responses were objections- yet it closed early?

How many objections hold weight?

What happened to 'for the many not the few' when does a few turn into the many?

Where's our local mp supporting the views of her constituency?

Where are the labour candidates in the hetton town council meetings?

The people of the nursery are reasonable people who would be willing to work with the council to make things better. Sometimes you've got to follow your heart over your head. Let's plan for the future.

I write to object to the closure of Hetton le Hole Nursery School. My niece goes to the school and has done since she was 8 months old. Due to covid she has become exceptionally shy and becomes extremely distressed if she is not with a familiar adult to the point where she can vomit. She is extremely happy at nursery and the staff she has known from starting this amazing school. This results in her being happy and ready to learn in a place where she feels safe and secure. To close the nursery when so many young children are so severely affected emotionally and socially by the pandemic we find ourselves in, is both irresponsible and neglectful of the council. The impact on children like my niece should be the first priority of the council, not finances. The cost of moving children to new settings away from peers and staff, they have for the last year treated as their family without proper time for them to adjust to a new and busier world, could not only result in the council still having the outstanding deficit and redundancy fees incurred, but also an increased number of children 🥺 including my niece needing additional emotional support at an increased cost to new setting and thus the council. I urge you to reconsider the timing of this and put the children's well being first in a time when they need stability most. The parents, school staff, Hetton Town Council and school governors are more than willing to set an agreed financial plan with the council to ensure the deficit does not increase in this next year and they can work on reducing the deficit. No members of the council have engaged in conversations around a financial plan with all stakeholders and those most directly impacted by this decision, the parents. I have listened to my sister becoming increasingly unwell due to the additional worry caused by this and the upset at the council's inability to have these conversations and set action plans to make this nursery once again viable. It is evident that if there are still avenues and financial options available that could be explored that all of these options should be explored and exhausted first before a council even considers closing a nursery. This has not been done.

To whom it may concern,

I wish to put forth my reasons below why I am against the proposed closure of Hetton le Hole nursery. Please see below.

- I have a child who is attending the nursery.
- There is no other setting I feel can meet the needs of my daughter as well as Hetton-le-Hole Nursery does.
- Hetton-le-Hole Nursery School is the only early years provision/ nursery that is graded as outstanding by Ofsted. No other setting currently can match the standard of the provision provided.
- The nursery has a qualified SENDco who is an early year's specialist and is able to support all children who have additional needs to make outstanding progress during their time at nursery .My daughter has progressed amazingly because of this vital support.
- Children and parents have suffered immensely as a result of the Covid pandemic and do not need this type of upheaval. It's not fair or just.
- The Council has not provided any Covid-19 relief funds to the nursery despite having received many millions of pounds from central government. The Nursery has incurred £76,000 of Covid-19 losses this year, however despite this the closing deficit (in year) was £58,449. The nursery was unable to furlough staff due to them being council employees.
- Limited staff may have the opportunity to gain employment at Hetton Primary, but it will not be all, especially the leaders, so viral expertise will be lost.
- I'm not planning on sending my daughter to Hetton Primary for their primary education. There seems to be an assumption that children will just move across to this new provision. Where is parental choice?
- I was extremely concerned around hearing about asbestos and the additional money spent on reconfiguring the building, rather than making use of the already established nursery.
- The council is allocating in excess of 5 million on a new build. In the consultation report it mentions further funds to be spent on ICT, furniture, and demolition, which is predicted to be in the region of £2-£12 million. The council will not clear the nursery deficit or provide adequate funding. Leaders and governors have worked extremely hard to balance the budget in difficult circumstances.
- It has been acknowledged in documented meetings that the financial vulnerability of the Nursery is not due to mismanagement of funds but due to the methodology behind the funding formula and the unavoidable costs associated with a Maintained Nursery School.
- Funding decisions about Maintained Nursery Schools have not been made by parliament and the government is urging local authorities to hold off making decisions about their longer-term futures.
- The council are arguing that the nursery has a deficit of up to £200,000 that they do not have the capacity to clear and they cannot support financially moving forward. They also say that the nursery is de-stabilising the other maintained nurseries because of the lower contribution and higher outtake of the lump sum. The main reason put forward for this closure is financial, however there are significant underspends in both the Early Years Inclusion Funding and Pupil Funding budgets. The combined underspend in the last three years amounts to £4,014,000.

- Such underspends have resulted in a direct impact on the budgets and survival of all of the Maintained Nursery Schools. The council could utilise those underspent funds to save the maintained nursery sector in Sunderland, who are currently being disadvantaged by surplus funds not being used effectively.
- The local authority is yet to provide the governors or parents with alternative options that they have considered before planning a full closure. In discussions with the school and governors it was made clear there are no alternatives, despite leaders being open to suggestions.
- DFE guidance states that maintained nursery schools should not be closed solely because of a deficit budget position.
- Nursery Schools are required to provide high quality early education, led by specialist headteachers, and delivered by qualified teachers especially in deprived areas and to put parents and families at the centre of their work. DFE guidance (November 2019) stipulates that the decision-maker should give the greatest weight to responses from those stakeholders likely to be most directly affected by a proposal – especially parents of children at the affected school. The decision-makers are expected to adopt a presumption against the closure of maintained nursery schools. The pre consultation received 541 responses, in which 92% of those responding did not agree with plans to close the nursery.
- In the government guidance for opening and closing maintained schools it also makes it clear that proposers should be aware that decision-makers are expected to adopt a presumption against the closure of maintained nursery schools. It states:
  - Nursery schools are expected to operate in a competitive market without having the same freedoms as their private sector competitors. Sunderland City Council has permitted unfair competition by allowing a private nursery to open within 0.5 miles of the nursery. The market for early years provision in Hetton is already inundated with providers. Hetton Primary nursery will be within 0.5 miles of Hetton Lyons Nursery School, will this have a similar effect on their fate?
  - The plan allows the only Ofsted graded outstanding nursery in Hetton-le-Hole to be lost in the interest of short-term cost saving. The long-term impact of the lump sum being shared amongst the other maintained nursery schools will be insignificant.
  - You may like to refer to school performance data. The nursery has consistent outstanding data year on year. Children make outstanding progress from their starting points and leave at or above age-related expectations. Data on all local schools will be shared.
  - There appears to be a lack of consultation with the community.
  - The nursery provided extra support and care for a child – medical, family, or additional needs.
  - Research shows that Maintained Nursery Schools provide a better quality of education.

I write to stress my deep concerns over your proposal to close the above Nursery.

My first child, attended the nursery from 9 months old, through to primary school.

My second child has attended since 9 months old, and still has a full term 2021/22 remaining at the nursery before he attends primary school in 2022/23.

I can't stress enough how much my children love this nursery, they both have benefited so much from attending, and I am at a lost to where Jude will go next year if the nursery will close.

I feel like no thought has been taken into account for the wellbeing of these children, especially given what's going on in the world currently, and what they have all been through this last year. Taking my child out of the nursery for his final year will have a major detrimental effect on him, taking him away from his norm, his friends, and more importantly his teachers, who have given him so much love and attention making him the child he is today.

I understand that the nursery has been running at a deficit the last year, which is why this is being pushed through. But I can't help that there is something underlying which you aren't being clear and upfront on.

- There has been a major lack of consultation in the community, which is so wrong given that the nursery has been at the heart of the community since 1945!

- We aren't the only nursery running at a deficit, there are others in the Sunderland Area.

- Why can't more funds be allocated to ease this deficit, we aren't talking big figures, given that there has been a combined underspend of £4m over the last 3 years?

Where is this money going, surely there is people in charge to allocate this budget fairly, especially if there is money available to utilise.

- I also raised the point about Furlough funding for the nursery, and that the nursery were advised against claiming CJRS funding. You need to take a clear look at the rules, as the nursery CAN claim the % of the non-funded wages (Based on funded v non-funded income). The nursery still received the funded allocation (Which covers part of the staff costs) but what about the non-funded income which naturally dried up.

That's the whole point of the CJRS. To help cover the staff wages (Non-funded element).

This again hasn't been addressed properly from the council's end, vital funding is available to help businesses through this pandemic, this nursery has had no funding at all. Instead you use the additional costs incurred by the nursery to add to the deficit.

- Why are you trying to push this through so quickly, it's just wrong. The government itself are urging councils to hold off making decisions on their futures giving what is going on. Also reading into the DFE guidance, they advise that nurseries should not be closed solely because of a deficit budget. What other reasons do you have for closure??

It's outstanding grading?!?

The list of objections could go on.....

I am so annoyed that you are even considering this and really fear for the wellbeing of my 3 year old child given that his routine will be smashed into pieces, all his friends and teachers taken away from him, and have to be placed in a totally unfamiliar surroundings for his final year in nursery. Happy days ahead!

A question which is been asked by many; The Council has not provided any Covid-19 relief funds to the despite having received many millions of pounds from central government. Where did this money go? Why was part of this funding not distributed to this nursery?

[REDACTED] nursery journey began in November 2019. Initially we had chosen a different nursery (closer to home) but they had let us down and we did not feel this was right for [REDACTED]. So as a family we contacted Hetton Nursery School. On our first visit – we just were overwhelmed by the feeling that this was the right nursery for her. Despite the travel time, this was the best place her to be. Since November we have seen her grow into confident, sociable little girl who absolutely adores the nursery team and her time there. As a family, the staff and wider team are outstanding in their approach to the children and we know when [REDACTED] is at nursery she is safe and supported.

As a key worker, working on the front line during both the first and second wave of the pandemic, the nursery went above and beyond to support us as a family and accommodate [REDACTED] in attending nursery. This gave peace of mind that we could continue to go to work and help fight this horrific virus. The staff have put themselves on the front line so that many of the nation's key workers can continue to work, often leaving their own families at home. I have never (and highly doubt I will ever) come across a provision which develops the whole child so effectively and has an inclusive approach where every child thrives and reaches (and often exceeds) their potential.

My youngest child is also due to attend this setting. I am now absolutely devastated that this may not be the case. I have investigated nearby alternatives and ones further afield and nothing comes close to Hetton Le Hole Nursery. The suggestion of putting my child in a demountable in a Primary school which has never had experience of nursery provision previously, is simply unacceptable when compared to what Hetton Le Hole Nursery offers. Their Ofsted reports, environment and the skills of the staff are significantly above any alternative I have and I am now going to be forced to give my youngest child a poorer start in comparison to that which my eldest had. I am so worried that my little one will not be nurtured and educated to the same standard and this will impact negatively on the rest of her life, limiting her future opportunities. All because the Local Authority and government are not providing sufficient support and funding to ensure the best provision in the area can continue to have such a positive impact on the lives of our children.

The main reason being put forward by the council for the closure of this outstanding nursery is around financial stability and due to the fact the nursery has a deficit of up to £200,000 that they do not have the capacity to clear and they cannot support financially moving forward. How can the council not have the funds to support our nursery when there have been significant underspends in both the Early Years Inclusion Funding and Pupil Funding budgets? The combined underspend in the last three years amounts to £4,014,000. This money which has not been spent, could have been used to clear the deficit of this nursery and allow the continuation of outstanding results for our children and children of the future within Hetton le Hole. In addition to this, the DfE clearly states that maintained nursery schools should not be closed solely due to a deficit budget. This amazing Nursery cannot be ruined as a result of poor budget management from Sunderland City Council. This is completely unfair on our children and the fantastically hardworking staff in the nursery.

Furthermore, the pre-consultation received 541 responses, in which 92% of those responding did not agree with plans to close the nursery. It is clear that this decision is not one that is right for the community, for the families or for the staff of Hetton Le Hole Nursery. I cannot see any reason why this outstanding nursery should face closure given the fact that there is surplus funding in the council budget allocated for this (and other) provisions which could eradicate the deficit and support all maintained nurseries to move forward successfully. Our community needs this nursery and we ask your support to keep it open for our children and for our growing community.

On top of all of this, this has been brought about in the middle of a global pandemic. Further stress has been brought to my family because of this proposal. The staff who are working tirelessly to educate the children to the highest standard, who are no doubt worried about their own health and that of the children and their families, now have the threat of losing their jobs and their livelihoods to worry about too. Not to mention the Headteacher who has worked so hard to develop this outstanding provision, develop her staff, make wonderful relationships with the families and has had to maintain this through the pandemic.

Please do not allow Hetton Le Hole Nursery to close. It is an outstanding provision in which the children of Hetton le Hole (and beyond) deserve to have access to. Our children and children of the future will significantly benefit from this amazing start to their school life and there is simply no alternative that can match the quality offered by Hetton le Hole Nursery.

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As a parent of a current pupil at hetton-le-hole nursery I strongly oppose the closure for a number of reasons; As a key worker for the ambulance service I rely on the government funded childcare offered outside normal term time at hetton-le-hole nursery, something that won't be available from Hetton Primary.

I had no intention on sending my child to Hetton Primary and it distresses me that the council would even consider closing a nursery such as hetton-le-hole, with its huge outdoor space and outstanding ofsted report, without any actual building or facilities to accommodate the needs of children under school age.

Sadly it appears the only reason for closure is financial. More consideration should be given to 89% of pupils who left hetton-le-hole nursery meeting age related expectations in 2019 due to the dedication and expertise of the staff. Plus, the overwhelming response from Hetton as a community, 92% of the 500+ responses opposed the closure and already in just a few weeks we have raised more than £3000 in fundraising.

Please reconsider the closure, this year has already been challenging enough without this added strain to staff, parents and MOST importantly the children.

I am writing this in relation to the consultation of closing down Hetton Nursery School in which I would like to state I am **AGAINST** the proposed closure for the following reasons:

My niece attended this nursery from being only a few months old and her parents made the decision to keep her there until she transitioned to a Primary school at aged 5 years old. My niece was 10 weeks early and spent the

first 2 months of her life in neonatal care due to being premature. Her time at the nursery not only enabled my niece who was extremely small to grow, develop and flourish in not just meeting but exceeding her educational milestones and this was down to the dedicated and highly trained staff at this nursery. As a parent who didn't know for the first few months whether there child was going to survive to then hand over there precious daughter to strangers was a huge step, yet the staff here made my sister feel safe and supported to do such a thing.

This provision is OFSTED rated Outstanding, I work within Education in a neighbouring local authority and know how hard it is to get this rating initially but then to maintain this takes pure commitment and dedication from all staff starting with the head teacher. This nursery school has designated teachers and trained staff in SEND which most nurseries do not have, I am aware that a lot of families who are presently paying for their child to attend this nursery do so because of these attributes.

Early Years research states the importance of the first five years of a child's life, the current children attending this nursery have quite frankly been put through quite an ordeal this last year due to the Covid pandemic and this will have had an effect on their emotional wellbeing as well as their education, a move to a building site where their environment, staffing, routine and possible friendship group changes, could have a long lasting effect on not only the children but also their families. Placing children in temporary classrooms for at least a year is not good enough and I would be interested to know how much this will cost? Are you telling me this will be cheaper to run than the existing provision and what will you be offering in ways of outdoor play when they are being educated on a building site? Ventilation and outdoor play is extremely important in these current times of a global pandemic, that is without taking into consideration the concerns regarding the findings of asbestos on the new site and the implications this has including additional cost!

The impact on staff will be just as severe, not knowing what the future holds regarding their own jobs but being expected to continue to work through the pandemic to offer a continued service to the children. Sunderland Council has not provided any Covid-19 relief funds to the nursery despite having received many millions of pounds from central government. The Nursery has incurred £76,000 of Covid-19 losses this year; however, despite this the closing deficit (in year) was £58,449. Limited staff may have the opportunity to gain employment at Hetton Primary, but it will not be all, especially the leaders, so expertise will be lost.

The council is allocating in excess of 5 million on a new build. In the consultation report, it mentions further funds to be spent on resources and demolition, which is predicted to be in the region of £2-£12 million. Sunderland council will not clear the nursery deficit or provide adequate funding. Leaders and governors have worked extremely hard to balance the budget in difficult circumstances.

Year on year budget cuts have been made to the nursery funding, making it impossible for it to be financially stable. The leadership team have completed extensive restructures and the head teacher has taken on many roles to reduce costings. I am aware that it has been acknowledged in documented meetings that the financial vulnerability of the Nursery is not due to mismanagement of funds but due to the methodology behind the funding formula and the unavoidable costs associated with a Maintained Nursery School. Funding decisions about Maintained Nursery Schools have not been made by parliament and the government is urging local authorities to hold off making decisions about their longer-term futures, so therefore why is Sunderland Council trying to push through the closure of this Outstanding Nursery. A nursery that offers places for 0-5 years whereas the new site will only offer places for 2-5years. Can you explain where the existing 0-2years will go, not to mention the children whose families were planning on using these spaces in the future.

The council are arguing that the nursery has a deficit that they do not have the capacity to clear and they cannot support financially moving forward. The main reason put forward for this closure is financial, however there are significant underspends in both the Early Years Inclusion Funding and Pupil Funding budgets. The combined underspend in the last three years amounts to £4,014,000. Why has none of this underspend been considered to clear the deficit so that the current staff team can start a fresh and prove to Sunderland Council that they can be financially stable. I am aware of other schools that have run in deficit and this has been done, so I see no reason as to why they cannot be given the same opportunity. DFE guidance states that maintained nursery schools should not be closed solely because of a deficit budget position; if this is not the case can, you clearly explain the reasoning for this closure? It states in Government guidance in any closure of a maintained nursery school the provision should demonstrate that new provision should be offering at least equal places and quality and that it should be more accessible to parents. I am aware that this is not the case, as stated earlier no 0-2 year's provision will be available and the new site has been spoken about numerous times due to the high level of traffic and accidents that have occurred in this area. The Local Authority is yet to provide the governors or parents with alternative options that they have considered before planning a full closure. In discussions with the school and governors, it was made clear there are no alternatives, despite leaders being open to suggestions.

The council's plan allows the only OFSTED rated outstanding nursery in Hetton to be lost in the interest of short-term cost saving. This nursery has consistent outstanding data evidencing that the children attending this nursery make outstanding progress from their starting points and leave at or above age-related expectations. My niece is

evidence of this currently seen as a Gifted & Talented pupil in her primary school, and the school staff stating that this is partially down to the excellent start she had in her life attending the nursery you propose to close.

The community cohesion is immense and has brought not only the people of Hetton together but also families who live outside of the area wanting to show their support. They have shown passion, commitment and sheer determination to help in the quest to save the nursery. Parents have put together a financial plan to improve the nursery's situation, however they have not been allowed to share this plan with the council as of yet. They have also raised funds in the region of £3,000 in a short number of weeks. The community feels that it should be allowed time to try and turn this situation around before such a major proposal is undertaken. The local Hetton Town Council have shown continued professional support and have listened attentively to their local community in trying to get a fair and consistent hearing when it comes to discussing the future of this nursery.

This nursery is at the heart of the community and has been established since 1945. This was the first ever Maintained Nursery School in Sunderland, I had the pleasure of doing some of my training here as a Nursery Nurse in 1990-91 and it enabled me to progress into a profession that I see as a vocation not just a job! I have continued to climb through my profession throughout the past 29 years working with children and families within various roles and there is nothing more rewarding than playing a part in seeing children and their families grow into inspiring young people, adults and eventually parents themselves. These small people are our future and they are depending on us the local people to fight for what is right and that is to continue to keep open this Educational establishment that is far exceeding the needs of the children & families they are working with. They are not only their teachers, but are also their caregivers, nurturers, supporters, counsellors, speech therapists, physiotherapists, cooks, nutritionists, mentors the list goes on....

The government introduced Maintained Nursery Schools to combine a multitude of services, which were designed to improve the life chances of young children, with a particular focus on the poorest families, in areas of deprivation. Family members have attended and are now highly successful because of the excellent foundation they received from the nursery.

I urge Sunderland Council to rethink their plans, listen to the people who live, eat and breath this nursery, find a way to work together in partnership, do not throw away 76 years of quality education all because of a deficit that could be easily salvaged if given a chance.

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I am deeply upset and angry to hear of the proposed closure of Hetton Nursery. They are Hetton's hidden gem, having served our community since 1940's.

My son attended this nursery, there were closer ones, within walking distance but I chose Hetton because of their reputation to be the best. They are the only ones in our area with Ofsted outstanding rating. I am sure you will know this is difficult to achieve and maintain. Surely this speaks for itself how fantastic they are. It makes no sense to close it! When the children leave Hetton Nursery their standard of learning is higher than peers who have attended others in the area.

My son is severely autistic. He is non verbal, Hetton Nursery provided recordable talking buttons so that he had a voice and was able to communicate his needs. Hetton Nursery have a sensory room which proved invaluable to him. He accessed it everyday so that he could self regulate before joining everybody else. The staff understood his needs. Having a qualified SENDCO and early years specialist at Hetton is what makes this nursery stand apart from the rest.

They always gave him the very best care and kept him safe. This was no small feat as he had limited understanding and had to be watched constantly. (He had tried to pour water onto the electrics and on another occasion tried to stand on an outdoor guinea pig cage). I was never made to feel my son was a nuisance, quite the opposite. The atmosphere is very much a home from home, safe, educational environment.

Ruth Williamson worked hard to help Josh get an EHCP (I'm sure beyond her working hours). This legal document meant my son could go to a specialised school. The EHCP process is an absolute nightmare to go through with no guarantee of success but Ruth and her team did it. I will never forget that day when I turned up at the office with the letter in my hand, there were tears from the staff. They were as joyous and relieved as I was. I was supported the whole way through the process from beginning to end.

You cannot pay people to care but the staff at Hetton Nursery do, they need to stay open.

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My name is Rebecca Hill, and I am the Teacher at Hetton-le-Hole Nursery School. I am writing to you to fully object to the proposed closure of the nursery. The following are my reasons for objecting to this proposed closure:

1. The nursery is rated 'outstanding' and is the only one in Hetton. I do acknowledge that our Main Nursery provision is rated 'good', however in our last short visit, myself and my team were observed and received immediate feedback that our teaching was outstanding. We would be given the opportunity to upgrade our judgement in the subsequent inspection which would be within the next 2 terms. Unfortunately, the ongoing pandemic paused all inspection activity thus causing us to miss out on this. I feel like the closure would have a detrimental impact on the quality of education offered to the children in Hetton, particularly those most vulnerable. Our data outcomes are outstanding, with all children making exceptional progress from their starting points, exiting in line with age-related expectations when they leave us for school. The nursery truly gives all children the best start to their education. Furthermore, as a Maintained Nursery School we are subject to a rigorous Ofsted inspection similar to those in Primary Schools.
2. As the wellbeing champion of the school, I have seen the detrimental impact of the pandemic for both children and staff alike. As a school, this year our main priority has been to support mental health and wellbeing. This has been a difficult process with recurrent lockdowns and disruptions, but staff have persevered through their own difficulties and stress relating to this

proposed closure to provide the best education and nurturing care for the children. If the school closes, the disruption to both families and children will be immeasurable. Some of the children I teach and care for only see myself and the team, and the family they live with. I have heard stories of how they have cried when they have seen their aunties who they haven't seen since Covid began. The continuity for these children must continue, in order for them to recover from the emotional trauma that this pandemic has caused them. For the youngest children, this pandemic has enveloped from a quarter to the whole of their lives. This is harrowing and they do not deserve further disruption.

3. The nursery acts as a hub for the community, this is outlined as a role of Maintained Nursery Schools following the closure of Children's Centres due to funding cuts. We provide support for families and offer services to support them. In my time as Teacher, I have had the pleasure of closely supporting families who need it most. The closure of the nursery will impact on those vulnerable families who need our provision.
4. Our falling pupil numbers coincide with the opening of a PVI nursery in Hetton-le-Hole in 2016. This setting is merely 0.2 miles away, and is situated on the main road so has increased visibility compared to our school which is tucked away in amongst the streets. In the proposal it states that our numbers began to fall in September 2016, this highlights the immediate impact that the opening of this PVI had on school admissions. Furthermore, the proposal document also admits that numbers across Hetton-le-Hole fell during these periods; it is safe to assume that this PVI setting impacted upon them also. This PVI setting should not have been able to open, especially when there were adequate places for children across the whole of Hetton-le-Hole from the current providers.
5. Additionally, there appears to be a lack of consultation with settings in Hetton-le-Hole regarding the opening of the new nursery provision in Hetton Primary School. Is there not a duty to involve schools in such huge decisions which directly affect them in such a substantial way? With new settings opening, and Alan Rowan admitting that birth rates are 'spiky', what is the direction that the council is heading in? Surely all settings will have low pupil numbers which has an impact on their sustainability and further closures of established settings.
6. It has been argued that parents would prefer a 'whole through' approach with single drop offs. We have parents whose older children attend a school with an attached nursery yet make the choice to send their children here as they are happy with the education and care we provide. It appears that parental choice has been disregarded in this proposal with options being given to parents as to where their children can attend. This particularly impacts upon toddlers and 4 and 5 term children who would continue their educational journey with us following September 2021.
7. In the proposal, it is stated that the expertise of staff will be transferred to the new Hetton Primary nursery. However, during the meeting on Thursday 11<sup>th</sup> March, it was made clear that the school already has staff with the appropriate expertise. This insinuates that there are no plans to relocate our staff team. During this pandemic, there is a lot of anxiety and uncertainty. The closure will displace staff, who may not be able to find further employment. Redundancy is a shallow option, which can only support them for a very limited time. For myself, teaching is an extremely competitive job market and it took me years to gain my Newly Qualified Teacher post. The staff need security in these challenging times and the closure will result in the loss of expertise across Hetton-le-Hole.
8. It is disheartening to hear that Sunderland City Council currently has an underspend of 4.14 million pounds in the Early Years. What makes this particularly distressing is the underspend in Early Years Inclusion Funding. I am the SEND practitioner of the school and I have had children with profound needs have their applications refused by the panel resulting in us having to support them ourselves. I hope you can appreciate the fact we are in a deficit and we are 'financially unviable' therefore we have had to utilise support for these children ourselves. Surely underspent funds could be used to support the Maintained Nursery School sector in Sunderland to ensure their longevity?

9. Our deficit has been largely publicised and teaching in a deficit is difficult. Due to the deficit, we have had to provide a high quality of education with very little money. Personally, I have spent money on resources, so the children I teach have the very best education. Why close the nursery when we have been able to do this for numerous years? Some parents came up with ideas to help improve the deficit, which included increasing the hourly rate by 50p, which would still remain a competitive price amongst providers in Hetton-le-Hole. It is unfortunate that these alternative options have not been entertained. I would welcome these alternative options as a means to save the school.
10. Maintained Nursery Schools in Sunderland are a benchmark of educational excellence, offering education to those most deprived. It was most upsetting to witness the closure of Millfield Nursery School and it feels like the council are looking to close them all. The nursery schools in Sunderland work closely together within a supportive group known as the PiP (Partners in Pedagogy). We provide training to settings, peer mentoring sessions and mentor trainee teachers, which I myself have been involved in this year. To close the school would impact on the dissemination of pedagogy and skill to other settings to improve education across the city.
11. In the pre-consultation, which was taken to cabinet before it has concluded, 92% of respondents disagreed with the proposal. It is safe to say, that the local community does not agree with this proposal, so why did it go to formal consultation. I would speculate that there is an ulterior motive.
12. I have read on numerous occasions that all alternative options have been considered to save the nursery. However, these have not been shared despite being requested by the Headteacher. Why have these not been discussed. I'm sure that an agreement could have been made to secure the nursery, especially when Alan Rowan has repeatedly praised the quality of education and the staff team.
13. Despite this proposal to close we have had new admissions, with numerous admissions to our Main Nursery provision. Parents are still choosing to send their children to our nursery, and I believe that speaks for itself in this situation.

In conclusion, to close this school would have detrimental effects on many different stakeholders. I urge you to consider my objections. Why close a well established, high quality educational provision in a time when families need us most?

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To whom it may concern

I am writing this email in response to the proposal to close Hetton-le-Hole Nursery School. My child currently attends this setting, and I am appalled to think the council would deprive my child of outstanding education because of money. Which I have recently learnt is down to under funding from the council!

All Nursery Schools are currently at risk due to lack of funding. How can a maintained Nursery School be inspected as a school but yet not receive adequate funding for the required elements such as qualified teachers?

You are making the suggestion to close **THE ONLY** outstanding provision when there are no other early years settings in Hetton graded as outstanding. I'm not sure where the logic is or what the rationale is behind the proposal. Does Ofsted grading mean nothing?

In accordance with the DfE guidance on opening and closing maintained Nursery Schools, it states:

***Proposers should be aware that decision-makers are expected to adopt a presumption against the closure of maintained Nursery Schools. This does not mean that a maintained Nursery School will never close, but that the case for closure should be strong.***

***Where a proposal is for the closure of a maintained Nursery School, the proposer should set out:***

- ***plans to develop alternative early years provision clearly demonstrating that it will be at least equal in quantity and quality to the provision provided by the Nursery School with no loss of expertise and specialism;***  
***and***
- ***Replacement provision is more accessible and more convenient for local parents.***

I have two arguments:

- 1) There are plans to rebuild Hetton Primary and include an early year's unit, however there will be no provision for babies. Therefore, going against the DfE guidance as it clearly states plans to develop alternative provision should be **EQUAL** in quantity and quality. The absence of provision for babies means the quantity is not equal. As for equal in quality, Hetton Primary school's data makes it very obvious to a parent that this school is failing to support children to achieve levels of attainment in line with national average, Hetton Primary's data is well below national average. Why would I send my child to a failing school? Hetton-le-Hole Nursery Schools data shows that children make outstanding progress and leave in line with age related expectations!

Other alternative provision in Hetton is actually very limited in terms of baby provision and none are graded as outstanding for early years. Therefore, there is no other option which meets the same quality as Hetton-le-Hole Nursery School.

- 2) How do you deem the alternative provision at Hetton Primary to be more accessible? Parents chose to put their children in quality provision based on that, quality, not accessibility. I choose to travel from outside of Hetton for my child to access Hetton-le-Hole Nursery School. I do not choose to send my child into provision close to home for convenience, as they are not graded as outstanding therefore the quality of care and education will not be to the same standard as the Ofsted graded outstanding Hetton-le-Hole Nursery School. Convenience does not outweigh quality! It is interesting to that a strong argument has been made by the council to say these two proposals are not link however all answers about the alternatives revolve solely around that individual school.

The main reason put forward for this closure is financial, however it is now public knowledge that there are significant underspends in both the Early Years Inclusion Funding and Pupil Funding budgets. The combined underspend in the last three years amounts to £4,014,000. The council are therefore withholding money which is rightly allocated to go to education settings. If you as the council were to adequately fund early years setting, with the funding they are entitled to, then there would be no underspend, especially such a significant one! This underspend has a direct impact on the budgets of all settings, consequently exasperating the budget issue at Hetton-le-Hole Nursery School.

We as parents feel the proposal to close Hetton-le-Hole Nursery School is astonishing. Why does money matter more than our children? Particularly in such an unsettling, extraordinary time!

The staff have knowledge and skills like no other, they love and care for our children like their own. We want our children to be healthy, happy and safe. This nursery has been the only safe and familiar place for our children over the past year. Our children have been through unprecedented heartache during the COVID pandemic, they have missed out on family time, normal routine and being children. This has significantly impacted on the well-being of them all. This nursery has been the only norm in their lives this past year and I will be forever grateful that the staff kept my baby safe and happy and provided her with stability. Making a transition to a new provision would be totally devastating for them and would in no doubt impact significantly on their learning and development.

As a parent I believe that we have not had access to any form of real consultation opportunity. The meeting with Alan Rowan and the parents only occurred because the Hetton Town Councillors, the school and the parents applied pressure for this to happen. There has been lots of excuses given around the covid pandemic and the lack of opportunity to hold meetings, this has resulted in parents being frustrated, feeling unheard and undervalued in this process. The pre consultation further confirmed those feelings when the decision was made before the end of the consultation and the significant objections weren't mentioned, nor taken into account. What is the point of a consultation? It appears that the local authority has a plan, those objections didn't suit those plans so were dismissed quickly. I'm unsure of the legalities of this.

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My name is Kirsty Kipling and I am a Nursery Officer at Hetton-le-Hole Nursery School, where I have worked with the 3-4 year olds for the past 6 and a half years.

I was utterly shocked when I first heard from Alan Rowan in November that the school was going to begin the closure process. I believe that it is shocking that this process was even considered during a global pandemic, which is a very scary time for everyone in the world. It immediately caused me to panic as it has been well documented in the news about job losses and redundancies during Covid. This causes me a great deal of anxiety about having to potentially seek new employment during these difficult times.

Furthermore, the impact on the families in our setting has been astonishing and they have suffered immensely as a result of the Covid pandemic. Parents have spoken at length about their worries about the impact the closure would have on their children, especially with them having to transfer to a different setting when they are settled in our nursery and have strong relationships with their key workers.

The main point of the nursery's proposal to close is financial. The nursery has a deficit of up to £200,000 that you say you do not have the capacity to clear and cannot support the nursery financially moving forward. However when information came to light about a huge underspend of over £4,000,000 in the Early Years Inclusion Funding and Pupil Funding budgets our deficit seems like a very small amount to be cleared with all of this money being left over for the last three years.

I am particularly angry about the underspend in the SEND inclusion funding. We have children with severe SEND denied this funding, and as a result we have had to support them using our already diminished budget. Over the years, I have had the pleasure of supporting many children with additional needs and our school has a SENDCo who has extensive knowledge and expertise in the Early Years. No other setting in Hetton can offer these levels of expertise, especially in those younger children.

It really does feel like the council puts money and finance before the quality of education. Why close a well-established nursery over a deficit which could be cleared?

Our community have shown us extremely high levels of support and have come up with plans to save the nursery. It is really upsetting that they have not had the opportunity to share these with the council. Surely these could be shared before any major decisions are made?

To conclude I just wanted to say that it is with deep sadness that I am actually having to write this after years of hard work being put into our outstanding setting. We are an incredibly hard working team and go above and beyond for our children and parents. The praise we receive each year when the children transition to primary school really shows their appreciation. However it doesn't seem enough



due to the proposal that has been set out. Let's remember what is the most important aspect in all of this; the children!

I completely oppose this proposal for closure, both as a parent and a staff member of the nursery. Why close a nursery that is successful?

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I am writing to object to the proposal to close Hetton-le-Hole Nursery School.

I am truly saddened at the proposal to close Hetton-Le-Hole Nursery School. I have been an employee for the past 5 years and it has been my passion to teach children. As a male in a nursery setting I have faced many stereotypes and judgements but the staff and parents of the nursery school have made me feel welcome and secure from day one. The news of this proposal has made me lose all faith in the Local Authority and the education system. The nursery school is the only school in the area with an outstanding OFSTED grade.

Not only this but the school's local area is one of depravity and many children are considered vulnerable. We provide a safe haven for children to feel secure and cared for. Many of these children will not have access to outstanding childcare if the nursery were to close. This itself means that if the school to close, I would make the difficult decision to leave my career in education altogether. I no longer feel that the Local Authority believes in the education system.

Outstanding education should be promoted and be the main target for all settings. If the only setting in the area with this grade was to close it shows that the main priority for the Local Authority is purely financial, rather than providing children with the opportunity to an outstanding education. I can no longer be a part in this. I can't work knowing that children are not supported appropriately. They are simply numbers on a page to the Local Authority. As long as they meet their financial targets then they consider themselves to have achieved their role. This is a travesty.

I would also like to highlight that the communication between the Local Authority and the school has been disappointing to say the least. We have had to fight for information and many decisions have been taken without the nursery's input and not a thought has been spared for the staff. The school has been a passionate place of work for everyone for years. Unfortunately, this means many of the staff will be out of a job and be placed into financial turmoil. This situation is made immensely worse due to the current state of the country as a consequence of the pandemic. Finding a new job is the most challenging it has ever been.

The Local Authority has said many staff can transition into the new Hetton Primary school however, we have been informed the positions are few and far between. This comes after originally being told that most could transition into the new setting. The anxiety that we all share is immense. I personally have a very challenging situation at home due to having two children with Autism. My well-being has been the lowest it has ever been and again support outside of the nursery this has been nil. If the nursery were to close, I no longer have the support of the school and staff, financially or emotionally.

I hope the outpouring of support from the community for our school shows that it is not something the Local Authority can remove so easily. It has been a cornerstone of the community for decades and will keep on being so if given the opportunity. There are many things the school can do to boost the class numbers and decrease the deficit, such as advertisements on local radio, newspapers and local advertisement through signs, leaflets and advertisement boards. Unfortunately, before we had an opportunity to do these the school was moved forward for closure. It feels that the decision was already made that the school would close before it was even discussed. The Local Authority is simply ticking the boxes they need to avoid any backlash. The future is uncertain, and I hope that the people who can prevent this from happening take the time to view our perspective and seriously consider the impact the closure will have on the staff, the local community and most importantly the children of our school.

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As a current employee of Hetton-le-Hole Nursery (7 years) I would like to oppose the proposal to close our school. I can't believe I'm writing this during a global pandemic. Closing the nursery would be truly devastating for the community, in a time of financial and emotional heartache.

It's the only outstanding nursery in Hetton and I feel as a staff member we have worked extremely hard to give the best possible care and support to the children and families in the community. When I started as a student in 2013, I couldn't believe the love and support the staff gave to all children and instantly fell in love with the setting. While studying my daughter Layla was two and started in our toddler room. The staff were fantastic settling her in and gave me reassurance. Layla went on into main nursery, and when she left, I left so at ease when starting her new school as she had the best possible start and confidence to go on to her new adventure.

Closing the nursery will mean letting down children with Special Educational Needs. Our setting has a qualified SENDco, who is also an Early Years specialist and is able to support all children who have additional needs to make outstanding progress during their time at nursery. I feel other provisions are less accessible or have no places to accommodate their needs.

Throughout my time parents have received the best possible care and support and it's shown with the outstanding feedback we receive. It makes me feel proud to be part of a setting that supports all children no matter their needs. This is because all the staff

are highly skilled, kind and caring. We will go above and beyond to support the children and families in our community.

I feel when Alan came to talk to our staff members in October 2020, it was made clear that we will be closing due to money troubles. The Nursery has incurred £76,000 of Covid-19 losses this year, however despite this the closing deficit (in year) was £58,449. The council have not provided any additional support.

The nursery was unable to furlough staff due to them being employed but the council. I feel if the council were in a position to furlough staff that the school's deficit would have been a lot lower. As a member of staff I asked to be furloughed as I wanted to help the nursery as much as I could.

I truly believe closing an outstanding provision in a global pandemic, especially when no other setting in the area is close to being as good as ours is disgusting and unfair to all of the staff, children and the whole community.

If the decision is made to close out outstanding school, then what support is going to be given to all staff?

Alan told me in my personal meeting which included HR, my union representee and Ruth Williamson, Headteacher that there will 5-6 positions available. I'm now not sure what to believe after listening to the YouTube meeting posted including the Hetton Primary Head Teacher saying she has fully trained staff to fill the new nursery positions. Now where does that leave me, and the rest of the staff at the nursery?

Making us redundant in a global pandemic is not the way forward. How will I find a new job when 2 million people are also in the same position? Can you please tell me why we are in this position when, the main reason put forward for this closure is financial? However, there are significant underspends in both the Early Years Inclusion Funding and Pupil Funding budgets. The combined underspend in the last three years amounts to £4,014,000. Can this not be spent on our setting?

Since October, Ruth, all staff and our fantastic parents have campaigned to show why our school should remain open. Can you not see why? Ofsted have rated us outstanding. The staff and the community deserve a better reason to why you want to close us, other than financial reasons.

## **Objection to proposal to discontinue Hetton le Hole Nursery**

At an Extraordinary meeting of Hetton Town Council held on 4 March 2021, it was resolved that the Town Council submit a formal objection to the proposal by Sunderland City Council to close Hetton le Hole Nursery School.

Town Council was unanimous in its' opposition and the position reflects the strength of feeling in the local community that this outstanding educational facility be saved from closure.

Details of the basis of the objection are below:

### **Non-compliance with Dept of Education guidelines**

Maintained nursery schools are required to provide high quality early education, led by specialist Head Teachers and delivered by qualified teachers especially in deprived areas and to put parents and families at the centre of their work.

D of E guidance November 2019 states "The decision-maker should give the greatest weight to responses from those stakeholders likely to be most directly affected by a proposal - especially parents of children at the affected school. The decision-makers are expected to adopt a presumption against the closure of maintained nursery schools". This has not been complied with.

### **Unfair Competition**

Sunderland City Council has permitted and encouraged unfair competition by allowing numerous private nurseries to undercut state schools by insisting that state schools are required to have higher qualified staff and meet the costs of being a school but only provide them with the same level of funding as private and voluntary providers. The Council is effectively privatising nursery education by the back door.

### **Opaque financial information**

The Council has been derelict in its duties by not actively involving and discussing with the school, the school governors, residents, families and Hetton Town Council possible ways to overcome the difficulties of falling roll numbers and the associated reduction in income because of unfair competition permitted by them.

It has been acknowledged in documented meetings that the financial vulnerability of the Nursery is not due to mismanagement of funds but due to the methodology behind the funding formula and the unavoidable costs associated with a Maintained Nursery School.

### **Non allocation of funding**

The City Council has not provided any Covid-19 relief funds to the school despite having received many millions from central government. Relief has been given to private nurseries. Covid-19 losses estimate at £74,381.00. In total over the last three years there was an under spend of £4,014,000 for the Early Years Funding and Inclusion Funding. Why has additional funding not been provided for this nursery and other maintained nurseries to clear any outstanding deficits to ensure these much-needed nurseries are adequately funded.

### **Inaccurate budget forecast**

The budget forecast is inaccurate. Toddlers are at 97% capacity and the baby room is in a similar position. Interest for enrolment for September 2021 is high. With toddlers moving up this will allow more places for the this much in demand service.

New residential developments close by such as Blossom Park (identified by SCC as a source for new intake) coupled with the nursery's other plans, as published in their recent power-point presentation, are likely to increase numbers. It would require no more than three additional children to eliminate the projected deficit.

### **Financial inaccuracy**

The Council referred to the uplift given to the nursery as the reason for at least one other school going into deficit while maintaining that all maintained nursery schools receive their additional financial support through an agreed formula. This is a deliberate distortion of the facts. In the funding year 2019-2020 five out of eight Maintained Nursery Schools ended the year with a deficit In-year balance.

**Objection from Hetton Town Council cont ...****Lack of consideration on effects on children**

Hetton Town Council believes on the grounds of physical, mental and emotional health as well as safety that it is inconceivable the Council is considering transferring these young and vulnerable children into temporary demountable classrooms for a period of up to 3 years and at the same time reconfiguring the asbestos ridden existing building. We have not been provided with the costings, but investigations would suggest that it will cost around £50,000 + VAT per year to rent them. We believe that this money should be allocated towards any deficits for the foreseeable future and during this interim period the Council should undertake proactive work with all interested parties to ensure the future success of Hetton le Hole Nursery school.

**Flawed decision making process**

Hetton Town Council is concerned about the legality of the Council Cabinet taking the decision to move forward to a statutory consultation 5 days before the pre consultation closed as this did not permit all responses to be considered.

I trust that Sunderland City Council will take cognisance of this submission in light of public and Town Council views which fully support the continuation of educational provision at this site for the benefit of current and future children of the town and beyond.

My son has attended this nursery on a regular basis for the past year. We use this nursery for many reasons, firstly being that my wife and I work full time and this nursery is the only one in our locality that has repeatedly achieved an outstanding ofsted report. Another reason is that the nursery was recommended by a number of our friends, all of whom have had children attend this nursery. This nursery not only supports our children but it supports our community. By closing the highest rated nursery in a deprived area you may be effecting the very education that you are employed to promote. The repercussions of which may reverberate through our children and future generations to come.

This school closure also creates extra stress and upheaval for my family. Not only has my son grown attached to the staff at this nursery but as I've previously stated my wife and I work full time. To add to this I am a serving member of the armed forces and I'm often away from home. This will likely mean that my wife will probably bare the brunt of this upheaval, not only working a full time job but also having to apply to different, lesser, nurseries in the area. How can you justify spending money on these temporary buildings whilst already having a fully operating nursery.

We believe the upheaval will create extra unwanted stress to our family and that the poor stability and security of demountable classrooms is irresponsible when used for children of such a young age.

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My name is Kelly Knight and I am a Nursery Officer at Hetton-le-Hole Nursery School. I am writing to you to highlight my objections to your proposal to close the nursery.

This nursery opened in 1945, and was the first maintained nursery school in Sunderland. It is a huge part of the community, supporting those families who need their services most. Families truly value our nursery, and this has been highlighted through their responses to this proposal, and their fundraising efforts – to date they have raised £3000 in a very short time. This highlights the communities feelings about the closure, that they completely oppose it. Yet the council still went ahead with the formal consultation, when 92% of people were against the closure during the pre-consultation. It appears like the community's feelings are being completely disregarded during this process.

There has been no consideration for the nurseries outstanding rating. It is the only outstanding nursery in Hetton with no other schools being able to match that in Hetton. The proposal highlights that alternative places will be available at the new Hetton Primary site, but this is only for 2-5 year olds. If the nursery were to close, there would not be an alternative setting for babies to attend which are outstanding. Where are the parents of those children going to send their children? Furthermore, will there be all year-round care for those children? Many of our parents require all year-round care. One of the alternative provisions available is a private day care nursery of which the standards are nowhere near as high as ours.

I am outraged that this proposal is being pushed through during a global pandemic. The staff have worked tirelessly as key workers to support families through these difficult times. Undoubtedly this has been an immensely stressful time for everyone involved and if the nursery closes then this will create even more stress for staff, parents and the community. It is so infuriating that we have operated as a key worker service and we are faced with closure, the nursery was not even offered any covid relief funds which had been allocated from the government.

Alan Rowan stated in November that there would be ringfenced positions at Hetton Primary for staff but the headteacher there recently said in a public meeting that she has staff with the necessary expertise to run the nursery unit. To close the school in the midst of a pandemic, where jobs are sparse and everyone is struggling is disgusting, but to then go back on promises of ring fenced positions is insulting.

We have been offered redundancy but this is a very short term option. After having 9 years service, I will be able to support myself for 1 month based off my estimated payment. This in turn causes me a great deal of anxiety as I am a single parent with 3 children and a mortgage to pay. Where is the consideration for staff?

In summary, I am completely opposed to the proposed closure of the nursery. I think it is outrageous to displace the staff and families at a time of uncertainty.

- Our 3yr old grandson has been attending Hetton le Hole nursery since he was 12 months old. He loves been there and has made so many friends.
- He will be starting school in September 2022. If his nursery is closed it means he will have to move from his safe place which he loves, to a different setting where his friends might not go to plus

he won't have his teachers. He will be there for a year and then have to move to a new school and do it all again. This will have a major impact on his emotional well being.

- Hetton le hole nursery have helped and supported not only our grandson but us as grandparents.
- Our grandson was recently diagnosed with a rare brain defect and all staff and Ruth have communicated with his health professionals to put a plan in place to help with his educational and complex needs. They have gone above and beyond to help him. Another reason we are really concerned about him having to move from nursery to nursery and then school. It could take months for another nursery to learn his needs.
- Our grandson is learning makaton sign language at nursery. They have trained staff who are amazing and he's picking it up really good. They have also given us help sheets so we can learn at home. I've looked around and do not see any other nursery that have trained staff in this field.
- Our grandson will NOT be attending Hetton primary, so why would we move him to the nursery for a year when he's in a perfectly outstanding nursery now.
- Putting children into Porter cabins and asbestos class rooms is really bad for their health. Especially for nursery aged children. My daughter worked in construction and knows full well the dangers of building sites, with dust, rubble, cement etc. Which is made more dangerous with children under 4yr old been put in that environment.
- A big concern is Hetton primary is right next to a busy road with no parking and also right next to Hetton comprehensive. So you have the danger off construction workers, more busy traffic and older children, with no parking. Doesn't take much for an older child to push one of the little ones into the road.
- Why will SSC not use the underspend to help out Hetton le Hole nursery and others that are facing closure?
- Hetton le hole nursery is set back away from roads and other schools. There is also a car park.
- The nursery garden has everything. There are nature walks, trees, etc. Not paving slabs like other nurseries around. One of the reason My daughter decided to send my grandson to Hetton le hole and not one of the others.

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To whom it may concern,

I am writing to you in response to the proposal to close Hetton le Hole Nursery School. I am currently employed as a senior leader at the school and I am very much against the proposal for many reasons.

Hetton-le-Hole Nursery is the only Early Years provision in Hetton-le-Hole that is graded as outstanding by Ofsted. No other settings currently can match the standard of the provision provided. Hetton-le-Hole Nursery has a qualified SENDco who is an Early Years specialist and can support all children who have additional needs to make outstanding progress during their time at nursery.

Children, staff, and parents have suffered immensely as a result of the Covid pandemic and do not need further trauma and upset in their lives. The school needs to remain open to support everyone – staff, families, the children and the local community.

Furthermore, Sunderland Council have not provided any Covid-19 relief funds to the nursery despite having received many millions of pounds from central government. The nursery has incurred £76,000 of Covid-19 losses this year, however despite this the closing deficit (in year) was £58,449. The nursery was unable to furlough staff due to us being council employees.

There have been mixed messages about ring fenced job opportunities at Hetton Primary since the beginning of the closure process. Senior leaders like myself have not been offered similar positions at Hetton Primary so expertise is immediately lost!

Year on year budget cuts have been made to the nursery funding, making it impossible for it to be financially stable. The leadership team have completed extensive restructures and the Headteacher has taken on many roles to reduce costings. Also funding decisions about Maintained Nursery Schools have not been made by parliament and the government is urging local authorities to hold off making decisions about their long-term futures. So with this in mind I am unsure as to why the proposal to close the nursery is even being considered at a time like this.

I would also like to question why the local authority is yet to provide the governors and parents with alternative options that they have considered before planning a full closure. In discussions with the school it was made clear that there are no alternatives, despite leaders being open to suggestions.

In government guidance for opening and closing maintained schools it also makes it clear that when proposing to close a maintained nursery school that certain points are

considered. One of these is plans to develop alternative Early Years provision which is equal in quantity and quality to the provision provided by the maintained nursery school with no loss in expertise and specialism. I would argue that if the school were to close then there would be a loss of specialism.

There are no other Ofsted rated outstanding provisions in Hetton-le-Hole. The Baby Room provision which I am currently room leader in, is being lost and the flexibility of all year round attendance will not be replicated at the primary school. I am very disheartened that there are no opportunities for the highly qualified and specialist leaders such as myself to move across into the alternative provision, so the specialisms will be lost.

The guidance also stipulates how the replacement provision is more accessible and convenient for local parents. There has been a lack of consultation with parents to gain their views, with their 'choices' for alternative provision for their child outlined in the proposal document.

This whole process is very unsettling and has caused very low morale amongst staff as it is uncertainty for everyone involved. Would it not be more efficient, effective and cohesive to protect, nurture and value the early years' expertise and specialisms already present within Hetton-le-Hole Nursery school?

I hope decision makers will fully listen to the views of the community before making a decision.

I urge you to save us and show that you value our work.

I believe that Sunderland LA is extremely lucky to have eight maintained nursery schools contributing to outstanding provision for the youngest children of the city, and that they should be highlighted and used as providers of outstanding practice.

As a previous Head Teacher of Hetton-le-Hole Nursery I also understand the role the schools plays within the community and the value that the families place on the setting, so to hear that it is at risk of closure was really sad. The school has very experienced staff with a wealth of knowledge and training that would be lost by the school closing.

Nursery schools have faced many years of financial instability, where it has been very difficult to balance the budget as a result of a lack of funding, however I do not believe closing the school is the only option to rectify the deficit budget the school has.

It has been shown with the Hard Federation of Mill Hill Nursery and Houghton Community Nursery that it is possible to reduce a nursery school's deficit and also to then go one step further and to build a surplus within the schools budget. I believe with this evidence that an option of Federating Hetton-le-Hole with another Nursery School across the LA should have been pursued before taking the decision to close it.

I sincerely hope that the Local Authority look again at the different options available and are able to avoid closing the Nursery School.

If children attend Hetton nursery then at least they have a choice of which primary school to go to, however if they are placed at a nursery within a primary school, they feel obliged to go to that school....even if they don't really want to.

I am saddened that the local authority is yet to provide the governors or parents with alternative options that they have considered before planning a full closure. In discussions with the school and governors it was made clear there are no alternatives, despite leaders being open to suggestions. Its not just the children this will affect, some staff may have the opportunity to gain employment at Hetton Primary, but sadly not all will.

The community have shown sheer determination to help save this nursery. Parents have put together a financial plan to improve the nursery's situation and they have also raised funds in the region of £3,000 in a couple of weeks. They feel that it should be allowed time to try and turn this situation around before such a major proposal is undertaken.

This just goes to show how strongly the community feels against these proposals.

It has also been noted that the council are arguing that the nursery has a deficit of up to £200,000 that they cannot support financially moving forward. The main reason put forward for this closure is financial, however there are significant underspends in both the Early Years Inclusion Funding and Pupil Funding budgets. The combined underspend in the last three years amounts to £4,014,000.

These underspends have resulted in a direct impact on the budgets and survival of all of the Maintained Nursery Schools. The council could utilise those underspent funds to save the maintained nursery sector in Sunderland, who are currently being disadvantaged by surplus funds not being used effectively.

In summary, if these surplus funds are used for the correct purpose, there is no need to close down an Ofsted rated outstanding nursery which has served the people of Hetton for over 75 years. The show of determination by the people of Hetton shows you that alone.

I am writing to do to express my feeling regarding the proposed closure of Hetton Le Hole Nursery school.

As a parent of a child who began his Early Years at this nursery only six month ago, I feel as though the upheaval for my child would be completely unfair. Our children have already missed their familiar settings, family members and been through enough this year. I despair at how you can contemplate closing the only stability in these children's lives at the moment. His emotional wellbeing will be knocked once again.

My eldest child attended Hetton Nursery School because of its outstanding grading - we travel from Seaham - over 6 mile away. As a teacher myself, I didn't even read the OFSTED report. The warmth and care you feel as soon as you walk through that door was enough for us to decide that this was the only nursery we wanted our children to attend - and I truly feel that, because of this experience at Hetton, she is now achieving at a much higher standard than most children of her age. This is the same within the job I do. Children perform much better academically when joining school from maintained nursery settings. They are provided with the most carefully tailored learning experiences from qualified professionals - only maintained nurseries offer this. They have an experienced Senior Leadership Team who are qualified and trained to prepare children for school settings and a qualified SENDco who can support SEN children to make outstanding progress. You can not

for one second tell me that private nurseries have this provision available at this standard - it's actually impossible.

Neither my oldest child or my youngest would be attending Hetton Primary - this outstanding nursery was chosen because of its unique learning experiences and attainments - I expect you assume that all children attending the nursery would want their child to attend that primary school?

My just turned two year old will NOT be attending a brand new nursery - sorry, I mean porta cabin - where he is completely unfamiliar with staff and surroundings in the middle of a pandemic. I very much doubt you have the funds to create jobs for all of the amazing QUALIFIED staff at Hetton Nursery. Upheaval for my child once again which will undoubtedly affect his emotional well being.

Traffic is another reason why my son would not be attending. Have you seen the build up of traffic on that road? Are you really expecting toddlers to access a nursery from that road? If you are then that is appalling. I am sure OFSTED would have a field day with safeguarding.

DFE guidance states that maintained nurseries should NOT be closed on financial deficit alone. What other reason can you provide me for closing the only outstanding setting in the area? The nursery has had no COVID relief funding during the pandemic. The community has raised thousands of pounds to clear some of this deficit. The determination and passion of the community can not be ignored. It speaks for itself.

The DFE also states that the decision maker should give the greatest weight of responses from the stakeholders most likely to be affected by the decision - 92% of those who responded to the pre consultation were against the closure. This can't be ignored as it is us, the stake holders, the parents, children, families, staff and community who refuse to accept this. What reason can you give me now for closure if not for financial deficit?

Hetton le Hole Nursery school is our family. They are our children's family. It is my little boy's start in life and your proposal to close is absurd, unfair and completely selfish.

To Whom it may concern

Looking at the information provided by Sunderland City Council, the reasons given for closure of Hetton Le Hole Nursery are

- 1- Financial
- 2- Sufficiency in the area.

Information provided to Hetton Le Hole Nursery School states there is a falling roll at the nursery school and there is a decreasing birth rate in the area and that the nursery's closure would "safeguard the wider sufficiency of nursery places in the Hetton Ward". Yet it was agreed on 11/3/2021 for the addition of a new 55 full time place nursery to be developed at Hetton Primary School.

This directly conflicts with sufficiency in the area being affected by Hetton Le Hole Nursery remaining open. Which is it, there are too many childcare places in the Hetton Ward, so Hetton Le Hole nursery school is surplus to requirement or there are not enough places in the ward so a new nursery class is required?

*"Feedback from consultation indicates there remains a preference in the area for maintained settings over nursery classes"*. This statement again conflicts with the closing of a maintained setting to open a nursery class; does this imply that feedback from consultations are not being used to inform the type of provision that is provided in the area according to parental choice?

Initial consultation on the closure of Hetton Le Hole Nursery School showed that out of the 541 responses, 92% disagreed with the proposal to close; this shows extremely high levels of disagreement for this proposal. What percentage of disagreement to a proposal is required for the proposal to be reviewed?

Overall, according to consultation information, it seems that to fill the gap of the closure of Hetton Le Hole Nursery School, a new nursery will be needed at Hetton Primary School indicating there is a need for places in Hetton.

In light of this, it feels that that the other stated reason for closure, the finances, is only applicable reason which goes against the advice of the DFE not to close a nursery purely on financial grounds if there is a need for places.

As governors of a maintained nursery school, we are aware that the Early Years funding formula across the country does not work leaving many a nursery school in financial difficulty but the DFE asks that no nursery school is closed on a deficit budget only as they look for a long term funding solution.

The closing of the nursery school will mean the loss of the expertise of the staff and leaders from the school. This expertise has allowed some of the most deprived children in Hetton to gain the skills and experiences that they need to thrive as the move into the primary phase of their education.

RESPONSE TO CONSULTATION TO CLOSE HETTON-LE-HOLE MAINTAINED NURSERY SCHOOL

To whom it may concern,

I am writing in response to the open consultation on the proposed closure of Hetton-Le-Hole maintained nursery school. I understand from the proposal that the primary reason for the proposal is financial. It is also made clear that the second reason given for closure is to 'safeguard wider sufficiency' in the area.

"The government remains committed to funding for maintained nursery schools in the longer term"  
(Nick Gibb, Minister of State for the Department of Education, on 31st October 2019).

Recent messages from ministers have echoed this commitment by advising decision makers not to rush into closing nursery schools before a long-term decision has been made by parliament

regarding their future funding. Children's Minister Vicky Ford said in November 2020 "We've already committed to longer-term funding for these nurseries and will set out our intentions soon."

The opening and closing maintained schools document states:

"The presumption against the closure of maintained nursery schools;

Proposers should be aware that decision-makers are expected to adopt a presumption against the closure of maintained nursery schools. This does not mean that a maintained nursery school will never close, but that the case for closure should be strong."

I worry that this decision is being considered contrary to DfE advice to local authorities to not close a maintained nursery based on deficit budgets whilst they consider longer term funding solutions for the maintained nursery sector.

I also worry that the argument is to safeguard wider sufficiency, and that the closure of a school is seen as the best course of action? I wonder if the impact of providing permission

for the opening a private childcare provider within half a mile of the school has had impact in any way on the sufficiency within that postcode area?

Anecdotally I have heard Councillors mention that the area has more maintained nursery provision than the rest of the city "so it will not be bereft of Nursery school provisions whereas other parts of the city are not so well served". I'm afraid this reveals a predetermined attitude towards the future of Hetton-Le-Hole Nursery School, and seems to disregard local parent opinion. You acknowledge yourselves within the proposal that there remains a local preference from parents for nursery schools over nursery classes – yet your proposal is to encourage parents to access a nursery class.

Does this suggest the council are not using local consultation to inform this decision?

There is speculation in the proposal that the closure of Hetton-Le-Hole would strengthen other maintained nursery provision. However, this can only be speculation – parents have the power to choose where their child attends and at present have a good range of options available to them in Hetton. For some parents, the choice will be PVI, for others it will be the quality of a nursery school. However, I would suspect that a parent priority for the very youngest children would be distance to travel and ease of walking with a pram / very young child. Parents have chosen to send their child to Hetton-Le-Hole Nursery School for a reason and to remove that school will not necessarily result in parents choosing to send their child where the council want them to (ie the newly agreed primary school). It would simply reduce the choice for parents in Hetton.

Financially, it is important to consider the impact of Covid-19 on the nursery, and I am aware that the nursery has incurred approximately £75,000 of costs directly linked to coping with the pandemic. The government has failed early years on a number of levels, but particularly on a financial level maintained nursery schools have suffered deeply. They cannot benefit from government Covid relief provided to schools (despite being a school) and yet they cannot benefit from rates relief or other benefits open to the PVI sector.

However, my response to this consultation is not focussed upon the short term financial impact of Covid-19, as this is an issue that has hit all nurseries. It would be unfair to consider the financial impact of 20-21 in this consultation at all. My response is focussed upon the wider issues and impact of the closure of this long standing, much loved nursery school.

Within the proposal, the financial information provided indicates that the in-year deficit was actually reduced in 2019-20 and has continued to reduce overall. There isn't an explanation for this within the proposal. It isn't clear if the 20-21 in-year deficit includes Covid incurred costs up to January 21 (I acknowledge it does not include Covid costs from January 2021 onwards). I also question at what point this information was gathered as a snapshot, as nursery budgets fluctuate across a year and it is difficult to say with any degree of certainty what the end of year bottom line will be (let alone a 3 year forecast).

I wonder what the financial story was for previous years (pre 2018)? As I have mentioned, 20-21 is an outlier year due to Covid and it seems unfair to use numbers on roll / financial position of this 20-21 year as part of forecasting, and as a reason to close the nursery entirely?

In the proposal, the term 'despite additional financial support' is used and I worry this may be misleading to the general public. This refers to the lump sum that each of the maintained nurseries receive but the way it is worded sounds like additional financial support from the council has been directed to the nursery to help reduce the deficit. To my knowledge, this has not been the case?

As a Headteacher of a maintained nursery school in Sunderland, I understand the difficulties the nursery has faced on a financial level and believe that Ruth and her staff have done all they can to make savings to the budget year on year. We all know that there have been funding issues that are stacked against maintained nursery schools for some time. However, I feel that it is important for Sunderland Council to show support for each of the nurseries at a time when decisions around funding from central government are still pending – particularly the lump sum.

I am not entirely sure that the basis for the proposed closure of the nursery is 'strong' if the issue of the deficit budget was disregarded?

Has the council explored other options before arriving at the decision of full closure?

If so, who has been involved in this consultation and has it involved the nursery school directly?

Are there opportunities to use the nursery site for development that would benefit from the nursery being closed?

- My 3yr old brother has been attending Hetton le Hole nursery since he was 12 months old. He loves been there and has made so many friends.
- He will be starting school in September 2022. If his nursery is closed it means he will have to move from his safe place which he loves, to a different setting where his friends might not go to plus he won't have his teachers. He will be there for a year and then have to move to a new school and do it all again. This will have a major impact on his emotional well being.
- Hetton le hole nursery have helped and supported not only my brother but us as a family.
- My brother was recently diagnosed with a rare brain defect and all staff and Ruth have communicated with his health professionals to put a plan in place to help with his educational and complex needs. They have gone above and beyond to help him. Another reason we are really concerned about him having to move from nursery to nursery and then school. It could take months for another nursery to learn his needs.
- My brother is learning makaton sign language at nursery. They have trained staff who are amazing and he's picking it up really good. They have also given us help sheets so we can learn at home. We've looked around and do not see any other nursery that have trained staff in this field.
- My brother will NOT be attending Hetton primary, so why would we move him to the nursery for a year when he's in a perfectly outstanding nursery now.
- Putting children into Porter cabins and asbestos class rooms is really bad for their health. Esp for nursery aged children. I worked in construction and no full well the dangers of building sites, with dust, rubble, cement etc. Which is made more dangerous with children under 4yr old been put in that environment. Not only that but putting any child in a Porter cabin is bad for their learning (whether nursery or not) as I myself had spent a year of my own education in Porter cabins on a building site so I know the effects it can have.

- A big concern is Hetton primary is right next to a busy road with no parking and also right next to Hetton comprehensive. So you have the danger of construction workers, more busy traffic and older children, with no parking. Doesn't take much for an older child to push one of the little ones into the road.
- Why will SSC not use the underspend to help out Hetton le Hole nursery and others that are facing closure?
- Hetton le hole nursery is set back away from roads and other schools. There is also a car park.
- The nursery garden has everything. There are nature walks, trees, etc. Not paving slabs like other nurseries around. One of the reasons my parents decided to send my brother to Hetton le hole and not one of the others.
- The nursery is not just a place for our children to learn but to make friends and also the whole nursery are like family. The care you receive from them all is outstanding. We would be heartbroken if the nursery were to close and all the children had to find somewhere else. They might not even get into a nursery that is close to where we live. Hetton le nursery is practically in our doorstep.

We really hope you listen to us all and take everything into consideration. We will do anything and everything we can to keep our much loved nursery open.

I object to Sunderland City Council's proposal to close the 'Outstanding' Ofsted rated Nursery School in Hetton-le-Hole because:

1. Sunderland City Council has failed to comply with the Department of Education Guidance of November 2019 of giving the greatest weight to responses from those stakeholders likely to be most directly affected by a proposal – especially parents of children at the affected school. The decision-makers are expected to adopt a presumption against the closure of maintained nursery schools.
2. Sunderland City Council has permitted and encouraged unfair competition by allowing numerous private nurseries to undercut state schools.
3. Sunderland City Council has been derelict in its duties by not actively involving and discussing with the Nursery, its governors, residents, families and Hetton Town Council possible ways to overcome the difficulties of falling roll numbers.
4. Sunderland City Council has not provided any Covid-19 relief funds to the Nursery despite having received many millions from central government.

I write to object to the closure of Hetton le Hole Nursery School. It had been a huge part of my family for many generation and now my son goes to the school and has done since she was 18 months old. 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Good evening,

I would like to formally object to the proposed closure of Hetton Nursery School, as outlined in the recent consultation ending on 23rd March.

I have several close friends with children attending the nursery and it's clear that this nursery means a lot to them and the Hetton le Hole community. The proposal to close and tear away what has been a solid and stable foundation for these children during the COVID pandemic is preposterous, they have had enough upheaval. This nursery has been rated outstanding and is catering for several children with additional learning needs, something that simply cannot be met anywhere else nearby at the present time. There is no other outstanding rated nursery school in the area, and none with the high quality of facilities and staff that Hetton has. Closing this nursery at such a precarious time could have long-standing negative impact on the future learning and development of these children.

The intended approach to ship these children across to Hetton Primary is ill-thought out and has gaping holes and issues. The current traffic around Hetton Primary is already causing problems (case and point a car accident just this week) and having more children attending will exacerbate the issue. Aside from the fact that Hetton Primary is not currently sufficiently equipped to meet the needs of these children and that reconfiguration of the building will mean the children in transition are potentially learning in prefabs or at risk of asbestos exposure.

There is a solid financial proposal from Hetton Nursery to increase fees in line with other nurseries and promote their services to nearby new builds, to increase their child spaces and repay the £200k deficit they have found themselves in through what appears to be a mix of budget cuts and insufficient allocation of funds from the council (rather than any mismanagement of finance by the nursery). The nursery's plan needs to be seriously considered by the council and not dismissed or not given time for, which has happened in recent meetings. The "tick box exercise" that these parents and children seem to have been subjected to is shocking, and I can see that a lot of Hetton & Houghton Labour voters are at risk of turning their backs on their local Labour MP because of their failure to passionately get behind their cause.

To spend millions of pounds changing around another school rather than giving a chance to a perfectly good existing one, which has 75 years of heritage in this community, seems ludicrous. Indeed, the Department for Education says that maintained nursery schools shouldn't be closed solely due to a deficit budget, yet no other reasons have been given for the council's proposal to close. The closure proposal is short sighted, the community are rallying around this nursery to save it for the future of their children and the heritage of their village, and I stand with them wholeheartedly.

My name is Samantha Garside and I am currently a Nursery Officer at Hetton Le Hole Nursery School. I am writing to share my objections to the closure of the school. I have had the pleasure of working here for 17 years now and I am outraged by the proposal to close the school.

We are the only nursery in Hetton that have been graded 'outstanding' by Ofsted. This shows that there are no other nurseries in Hetton that can match our standard of education and meet the needs of children from birth to 5 years of age. Our data outcomes show that children make outstanding progress during their time with us.

It has been stated that there will be a building for two-year-olds and three-year-olds at Hetton Primary but there is no mention of space for a baby room provision. With our baby provision currently rated as 'outstanding', parents will be unable to access provision of a similar quality. Has it been taken into consideration the impact that this is going to have on the families of the babies that are currently in our baby room provision? How are the parents going to continue working without having childcare?

I would like to add that I feel like that there has been no support given to the staff during this time. We have been told on several occasions that there will be ring fenced jobs for us at Hetton Primary but then it has come to light that the school have already got people ready to fall into these vacancies. Where does this leave the nursery staff during this very difficult time where many people are losing their jobs through Covid?

My daughter travels to Hetton from outside the area to bring her daughter to the childcare provision with the intention of her transitioning into the main nursery in September. The nursery is close to local bus links and is very convenient for her. She has made it clear that she will not be admitting her daughter to Hetton Primary if the proposal goes ahead. Her main reasons are around road safety concerns around Hetton Primary, with many accidents happening on Moorsley Road. She does not want her child at risk of serious harm. It seems like parental choice has been ignored during this whole process with parents being told where to take their children if the nursery was to close.

Why has the council not supported the nursery with funding which was allocated from central government to help clear of the deficit. I was also outraged to hear of the council's £4.14 million underspend in the Early Years, surely these funds could be used to save the nursery and properly fund all Maintained Nurseries?

Can the council not delay this closure because of the problems that Covid has caused? Other options have apparently been discussed, but these have not been shared with the staff?. Have the staff, families and most of all, the children not gone through enough uncertainty and anxiety over the last year. The nursery has been the only constant support throughout this time.

The nursery school has been in the centre of Hetton since 1945. The nursery community is a tight-knit family and I feel honoured to be a part of the nursery providing outstanding education and care to the children of Hetton. Parents and members of the community have come together as one to fundraise, pulling together ways to improve the nurseries financial situation. Can you find it in you to at least give us more time to rectify this financial burden? Or are finances more important than the quality of education?

I am a governor of the school and my eldest child went to the school. Both my children went to Hetton Lyons Primary School and my eldest went to Hetton School. I taught at Hetton School for over 20 years and was a governor there for 25 years.

I lived in Hetton for over 10 years before moving up the road to Haswell.

My main objections surround the reasons for the closure - cost and falling rolls.

As an ex teacher and current governor, I would have expected decisions/proposals to close a school would have been based mainly on the educational value its provides to the children of the City of Sunderland, (in this instance with particular emphasis to the children and parents of Hetton), with cost being way down the list.

Locally, Hetton-le-Hole Nursery School is the only early years provision/ nursery that is currently graded as outstanding by OFSTED.

I am writing to express my objection to the proposed closure of Hetton Nursery in the village of Hetton Le Hole. I understand the council proposes to build a new facility at the site of the existing Hetton Primary School, this would mean significant upheaval for the children who currently attend the nursery at the worst possible time given the pandemic we are very much still facing. Many of these children have special educational needs, are facing huge deprivation and social challenges already, the pandemic has only made life harder - as the council very well knows. This Ofsted rated Outstanding nursery is a safe place for these children, it's their constant, the implications of shifting them to a temporary facility (which I understand is the plan whilst the new facility is built) with unfamiliar staff who do not have the same level of knowledge of their needs is likely to have a significant impact on both their short and long term wellbeing.

The Head Teacher and her staff along with the local community have gone to great lengths to raise money to help clear the deficit incurred as a result of underfunding and the financial plan they have put together shows there is potential to clear address the funding issues, with the support of the council. I believe this demonstrates the clear bond the community feels to this nursery which has been part of the heritage of Hetton for over a century. I understand the council has a budget underspend in early years funding of almost 4 million pounds, it seems fair and sensible to allocate some of this funding to the babies and children of this nursery where there is a clear and urgent need rather than spending significantly more on a new facility which is not necessary. The council really needs to consider the demographic of this village and the real needs of the area here over and above the funding issue. I am also concerned that the new facility does not cater for babies, some of the babies in the current nursery will be on commissioned places due to additional needs, care plans, child protection concerns, are the council really proposing that these babies move to one of the private nurseries in the area at a greater expense to either TFC or the family? Won't this add additional pressure to already struggling families thus creating greater risk to those children and increasing the likelihood of further spending required by TFC in support of the family or indeed in relation to the care for that child outside of the family? Again I would urge leaders to consider the long term implications of this proposed closure, the nursery are providing a holistic service in this community and have been going above and beyond for families in need for decades.

In summary I wish to state my objection to the proposed closure and would like this noted in the consultation. I am a former resident of Hetton and a relative of a current pupil and staff member at the nursery.

I wish to strongly object to the closure of Hetton Le Hole nursery school.

My family carefully researched existing nursery provision to ensure that we got the very best provision for my granddaughter. This nursery proved, by its provision and outcomes, to be the best choice available to us. As a family we have been very pleased by the care and well rounded provision provided by the staff and headteacher. My granddaughter has made excellent progress there.

We were therefore devastated to hear that the nursery faces closure and that other children in our family would have to be placed elsewhere. I am well aware of the government guidelines which clearly state that nurseries should not be closed for purely financial reasons. This appears to be the main case put forward by the local authority.

IN 1997 the Labour party, of whom I am a member, promised to 'uphold family life' and 'tackle the division and inequality in our society' in part through a national childcare strategy. The north of England benefitted greatly from this push to create nurseries in deprived areas and to build bodies that supported the development of high quality Early Years education.

As a former educator I am saddened that Sunderland council no longer see the focussed support for high quality nurseries as a key priority and are willing to close such provision for financial reasons. This is all the more soul destroying when we hear that funding has been available over some years but has not been allocated to the nursery schools. The current school deficit is a mere drop in the ocean compared to the council underspend.

It has been stated that over 4 million pounds of funding for early years has not in fact been allocated. The headteacher of the nursery has reduced her staffing and made every effort to work within her budget. How is she to succeed when the council withholds funds for that sector? At the same time the council has allowed other competing provision to open and is currently claiming that Hetton school expand with new early years places. Their argument in that case being a rise in the number of places required.

I would add my voice to those of the other parents who see the value of maintaining this high quality provision. I would ask that the closure does not go ahead and that the council support this and other nurseries with appropriate funding so that our children continue to get the very best provision as demonstrated by Hetton Le Hole nursery school.

1. Sunderland City Council has failed to comply with the Department of Education Guidance of November 2019 of giving the greatest weight to responses from those stakeholders likely to be most directly affected by a proposal – especially parents of children at the affected school. The decision-makers are expected to adopt a presumption against the closure of maintained nursery schools.
2. Sunderland City Council has permitted and encouraged unfair competition by allowing numerous private nurseries to undercut state schools.
3. Sunderland City Council has been derelict in its duties by not actively involving and discussing with the Nursery, its governors, residents, families and Hetton Town Council possible ways to overcome the difficulties of falling roll numbers.
4. Sunderland City Council has not provided any Covid-19 relief funds to the Nursery despite having received many millions from central government.
5. Sunderland City Council has failed to provide additional funding for this Nursery and other maintained nurseries to clear any outstanding deficits despite having an underspend of over £4 million.

Please see attached document for my objection to the closure of the nursery. All necessary documents have been hyperlinked.

I strongly object to the closure of Hetton-Le-Hole Nursery School. This nursery has been in the community for 76 years; it has seen 14 prime ministers, the devastating miner's strike and is older than the NHS. To add to that, it was the first maintained nursery school to open in Sunderland. To me, history and heritage is something that is celebrated as seen in the local area with pit wheels and miners' statues, not something that is closed to make way for new builds. However, like all other settings, it is struggling at the moment to survive in a time of austerity created by a Conservative government and a pandemic. Seven and a half decades of children have gone to this establishment, including myself, my brother and my son (who is there at present), and left with an amazing foundation to build upon in primary school - as shown by the results that I will touch on later. Despite ever growing funding changes, numbers decreasing in the city and a deadly virus, this nursery still manages to achieve outstanding progress, which in my eyes makes it a sustainable setting.

Another reason I object to your proposed closure is the opening statement regarding its Ofsted rating. You state that its last full inspection was March 2015 despite a more recent inspection being carried out in May 2019. Albeit it was not a full inspection (but a short inspection), it did state that not only had they maintained the good quality of education, but also showed marked improvement and was therefore being put forward for a section 5 to move them to an Outstanding provision. [Click here for the full Ofsted report](#). Due to COVID this did not happen before you wrote your proposal, but the fact still remains that the Ofsted inspector on the day believed they deserved an Outstanding to put them forward for a section 5. In my eyes, and anyone reading the Ofsted report's eyes, this makes the nursery's provision 'Outstanding' - just without a section 5 **yet** to support the inspector's views.

### **This school continues to be good.**

The leadership team has maintained the good quality of education in the school since the last inspection. Based on the evidence gathered during this short inspection, I am of the opinion that the school has demonstrated strong practice and marked improvement in specific areas. This may indicate that the school has improved significantly overall. Therefore, I am recommending that the school's next inspection be a section 5 inspection.

This is extremely relevant as it means that the only nursery in the area that matches its potential Outstanding rating (as witnessed during its short inspection) is Houghton, which is not more accessible for parents in the Hetton-Le-Hole area. I cannot argue that there are other provisions in Hetton that have been awarded a 'Good', making them on paper the same as Hetton Le Hole Nursery School, but if they all were visited by Ofsted tomorrow for a Section 5, how many would achieve Outstanding? You may argue that right now they are not, but if we all took that view on other consultations that have closed recently, nothing would happen. For example how do we know Hetton Primary's nursery will get the numbers? How do we know how many children will be born in the coming years? How many children will the new builds bring? Everything is surely based on the hypothetical and what if, not what we know for sure, therefore the same way of viewing other consultations should be the same way of viewing this one. Had COVID not happened and the section 5 gone ahead, this nursery would now be Outstanding.

A further reason I object is based on your finances and what you are stating as being financially vulnerable. The current head teacher (when she arrived at the nursery) along with governors, managed the impossible of reducing a projected deficit of £179,950 to £46,000 in 2014/15. They saved an incredible £133,000 which they have been praised for. In my opinion, since that point and following that achievement, I wouldn't include the £46,000 they had in 2014/15, as that was not accrued by the current team and after their efforts should not be. The nursery have also lost £76,905 due to COVID which again, in my view, should not be considered towards the financial vulnerability or even stability of the nursery. I say that because I deem it to be morally wrong to do so. This nursery as well as all other education settings, should not be penalised for the impact of a deadly virus or for that matter, the closure back in March 2020 as that was a government decision. Unfortunately, the government did not contribute any money to nurseries to cover the loss of each child's monthly payment due to lockdown 1, so in that respect nurseries have suffered more than any business out there. Since 2014/15 (starting at £46,000 - as 0) the nursery has accrued £152,986. If the COVID impact is also deducted for reasons stated, then they have actually accrued £76,081 which if split over the last 6 years that Ruth Williamson has been head teacher is £12,680 average a year. Even if the council wished to argue that the £46,000 starting point in 2014/15 is still part of the

deficit, then the nursery has accrued £122,081 (without the £76,905 of COVID losses) averaging £20,347 a year over the last 6 years. This is not the £24,000 in year deficit average that Alan Rowan quoted to Hetton Town Council in a meeting on the 21st December. Personally, this average yearly deficit is not making the setting financially vulnerable when in reality there are a large number of factors surrounding the nursery's ability to balance. Some of these factors are: a new grading structure introduced by the council for staff, utility rates inflated, SLA chargers increased, a new funding formula for early years, loss of SEND bursaries, £3,000 taken unexpectedly by LA due to an error on their behalf from 2 years prior, school rates now being charged at around £4,000, schools now being charged for school meals and finally, the opening of a private nursery 0.5 miles away, meaning the nursery lost £12,000 from commissioned places. This list is only naming a few hurdles that the nursery has faced financially before COVID, and if this is what all nurseries in the city face, then it seems to me that they are not maintained by the council at all, but left to survive alone.

This objection is only further strengthened by the government funding that the council have had to ensure that early years is provided for adequately, and further funding for establishments for SEND, to support the city's most vulnerable students. From a Freedom of Information Request, it was found that Sunderland, not including this year, has ended the year (2017/18, 2018/19, 2019/20) with a surplus which when totalled results in a £4,000,000 surplus for early years and SEN, which has then been carried over each year into the overall DSG balance. Why is the council considering the closure of an outstanding maintained nursery when it is sat with millions of surplus funding? Why can this money not be used to ensure all 8 maintained nurseries in Sunderland have no deficits and are all maintained with the help of the local council? Why pool it into the DSG pot if it is needed? Is that not what the government gave the council the funding for, to ensure the children in Sunderland are provided for? By having a surplus, I will make the assumption that no education settings need it in the area, but when some are facing closure, I would say that in fact they do. You state in the consultation itself on page 1 that, "additional financial support mechanisms made available to the Council from central government to support the costs associated with maintained nursery schools have been fully utilised". With a significant surplus each year, I would say that it has not been utilised.

I am more than aware that funding is complicated in all local authorities and is based on the amount of children who attend the setting that use the 15 hours allocated by the government. As the numbers have declined at the nursery, that will have an impact on the funding. However, the decline in numbers started after the local authority failed to put in any protective measures on the planning applications or purchasing of the building in the middle of Hetton - only 0.5 miles away from the nursery. This resulted in a private nursery opening at that location from 2016, which flooded the market and impacted on other settings in the Hetton ward. This can be seen when Hetton Le Hole Nursery had 86 nursery places filled in 2016/17 autumn census, but by the following year this had dropped to 52. Had the council protected their own maintained nursery, then the high numbers would have been sustained. Numbers are also in decline across the city due to lower birth rates which are impossible to predict when they spike one year and decline the next. Plus, with COVID causing parents to lose their jobs and being unable to pay for childcare, places are being lost due to the pandemic as well as the positioning of the nursery. One reason I significantly struggle to understand the reasoning behind the fall in numbers at the setting as a reason for closure, is because you are opening another as part of Hetton Primary that offers the same number of places. If there are not enough numbers in the Hetton ward, why open another? It seems incredibly contradictory and simply used to suit the council's future plans for Hetton. Surely Hetton Primary, based on your argument for our nursery, will also run at a deficit due to a lack of children and have an impact on other settings such as the other maintained nursery 0.5 miles away (Hetton Lyons).

I also appreciate the census breakdown for our nursery that shows the declining numbers and how it has lost 58% compared to other settings losing 4%. However what you are failing to notify the public is the reason for their bigger percentage. For one, in 2016 Autumn census, Hetton Le Hole Nursery had 18 more children than Hetton Lyons Nursery (the other maintained setting in the Hetton ward), showing that at that time, it was a more popular provision. Second, your 58% decrease in those on roll includes COVID data from 2020, which is ridiculously unfair as all pupils had not yet returned and parents had suffered a lengthy lockdown from March of that year, and subsequently lost their jobs. This will have made it highly unlikely that they could pay childcare or need a place if they were at home. The nursery has gone on to gain numbers since, as parents have returned to work or acquired new jobs resulting in them needing nursery places. If you reported this data fairly (up to the lockdown) of the drop from 2016-2019, then they had a 48% decrease in the numbers on roll. This loss is clearly linked to the opening of the private nursery 0.5 miles away that opened in 2016 - the same time, the numbers began to fall. Due to the location of that establishment compared to Hetton Le Hole, it means that more people are likely attending due to seeing it in the centre of Hetton while our nursery is set back in a safe estate. Promotion can very easily solve this and with houses being built, children will begin to attend if it remains open. A plan for this has been put together by residents and parents which will be discussed later. Finally, this setting has seen numbers decline more severely than other settings due to the impact of the private provision, while others have maintained their numbers. At present, no other nursery is 0.5 miles away from Hetton Lyons, Eppleton, Easington Lane or Houghton so they have not seen the impact this can have, however I am sure Hetton Lyons will in the next few years, now that Hetton Primary's nursery has been given the green light. Sadly, I can see this problem being reflected at their establishment in the coming years and history repeating itself.

As for new builds, the council have repeatedly used this as a reasoning for an extension and nursery at Hetton Primary school so on that basis, it should be being considered in our consultation. At present, there is a housing development in Hetton Downs (Blossom Park) being developed as part of your housing and neighbourhood renewal scheme, which is 0.4 miles away from the nursery on foot. If our nursery remains open, it will reduce the carbon footprint of any residents living there with toddlers who are in walking distance. According to a Pupil Place Planning Statement Coalfields Document, a table outlines the amount of houses being built and the amount of children that are calculated to come from the housing developments in the area. Hetton Downs Phase 2 will create 122 houses resulting in a possible 28 1-5 year olds needing a nursery placement - see document (table on page 10) [See Pupil Place Planning Statement Coalfields Doc on this webpage](#). With the correct promotion, 28 extra children will need this nursery to remain open and certainly in walking distance to ensure the carbon footprint is low. An extra 28 pupils aged 2, 3 or 4 who require 15 hours, means that the nursery will contribute more to the lump sum across the city. If they don't require it yet because they are aged 0-2, then at least they will be bringing money into the nursery towards their budget until they reach the age of 3-4.

Taking the discussion back to finances, the nursery closure is also based on its impact on other settings when contributing to and receiving the annual lump sum. In the year 2019/20, the nursery generated £33,573. As the new provision is simply a nursery class attached to a primary school, surely it does not get the same funding and therefore won't contribute or require any lump sum. However, it seems quite misleading as nurseries don't need to contribute to this when the government give the local authority ample funding to cover all 8 nursery settings, with this year 2021-22 being £656,298 - which shared by 8 settings results in £82,037 each. [This is the supplementary funding allocation for maintained nursery schools](#). Therefore each nursery does not need to generate anything to pool together. In theory, they shouldn't be impacting on other settings



when the money is there. With that in mind, surely the council would then lose the £33,573 that this nursery generated in 2019/20 each year if they close. Plus in the funding year of 2018/19 4 maintained nurseries in Sunderland ended with an in year deficit, and the year after 5. Hetton Le Hole Nursery is not alone in this and therefore is not the only one impacting on other settings.

In addition to my other points, part of this decision must be compliant with the guidance given in the [Opening and Closing Maintained Schools document from November 2019](#) that states that: "Where a proposal is for the closure of a maintained nursery school, the proposer should set out plans to develop alternative early years provision clearly demonstrating that it will be at least equal in quantity and quality to the provision provided by the nursery school with no loss of expertise and specialism; and replacement provision is more accessible and more convenient for local parents." This is as a last resort as "decision-makers are expected to adopt a presumption against the closure of maintained nursery schools." When looking at the first part of the guidance, it is clear that the inclusion of a nursery as part of a new build at the Hetton Primary site is not equal in quality. Right now, Hetton Le Hole Nursery's building is established and safe, providing Outstanding provision, while the new build is not ready for the proposed closure of our own in September 2021. Instead, children will be moved into the primary building after reconstruction work takes place - reconstruction that will cost an incredible amount of money when handling an asbestos ridden building. Why not at least keep our setting open until the other is ready? Not only that, they cannot guarantee to deliver the same high quality education and progress. At the moment, Hetton Le Hole Nursery has an incredibly high percentage of children leaving where they should be for their age - creating an amazing foundation for them starting a primary setting. In 2018-19 89% were exiting where they should be, with the previous year being 83% and prior to that 80%. This supports what the Ofsted inspector saw at their short inspection in 2019, that the nursery has continued to improve.

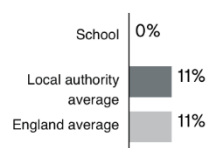

The only data that can be used to judge the like for like quality has to be Hetton Primary's data, that unfortunately shows that when the children move through that school and leave in year 6, only 44% make expected progress. Therefore, by being a part of the same primary, 56% starting in the new nursery will not meet expected progress by the time they leave in Year 6 based on that current data published by the government. Now, as much as we have been informed in several meetings and emails that this does not have to be the setting they go to, this is the one in your own consultation that is being described as the "alternative provision" you are providing in depth on page 5 and in the section for displaced pupils. As for other settings in the area (as displayed in your table on page 6), they all appear like for like with a 'Good' Ofsted rating but as discussed above, Hetton Primary is 'Good' yet has extremely poor results. The only two like for like on the list given is Houghton and Hetton Lyons as they are both maintained nurseries that come with their own level of expertise as stated in the Maintained Nursery Schools: the state of play report from March 2015. The primary settings and private given as alternatives: Hetton, Easington Lane, Eppleton and Hetton House are not given parents the like for like of a maintained nursery. Plus, as Houghton is further away from the current setting by 1.8 miles, it is not more accessible for parents, leaving only one alternative that is like for like being Hetton Lyons. There is surely no way that they can take in all displaced pupils and if they can, as discussed earlier, they will only be next to be earmarked for closure when Hetton Primary opens 0.5 miles away from it, and impacts on that setting the way the private nursery did at Hetton Le Hole. While I appreciate the variety of provision you are suggesting, every parent (including myself) that sends their child to our current nursery, does so because it is maintained; does so because it comes with significant expertise needed; does so for the safe setting in a private estate where no traffic impacts pick up and drop offs. Therefore, most of your suggestions do not cater for a like for like provision.

As for the other part of the guidance on the closure of a maintained nursery setting, it states that there should be with no loss of expertise or specialism. [In the Maintained Nursery Schools: the state of play report \(2015\)](#) it states that they: "provide high quality early education, led by specialist head teachers, and delivered by qualified teachers and nursery nurses" and "Nursery school head teachers are a unique cadre of specialist early years leaders who are highly qualified and knowledgeable about early years pedagogy. They have particular expertise in improving outcomes for disadvantaged children and supporting children with SEND." It is clear that Hetton Primary (offered up as the main alternative provision as seen from page 5 of your consultation) will not guarantee this expertise. For one, they will not require a head teacher with this level of expertise as it is in a primary setting, plus the staff will not need to be qualified with a level 3. This is further supported by a post that was on Hetton Labour's page from July 2020 (see below) which stated that although Sunningdale Primary School is not within the Hetton ward, it will cater for some of the Hetton ward pupils who have learning disabilities. Why would it have to cater for them when it is 6.4 miles away by car and 2 hours and 13 minutes away on foot? By posting this, it suggests to me that Hetton Primary cannot cater for the potential learning disabilities that may come their way after closing a maintained nursery, so Sunningdale is being offered up for support which is miles away. It certainly shows that the Hetton Ward is not capable of catering for these needs. Plus the staff at Hetton Le Hole are being offered the first jobs up there (which are not guaranteed) and are not actually being relocated as it stated in the proposal about redundancies, so the specialism cannot be guaranteed, especially running with a lost leader. Maintained nurseries are known for the staff costing more money because they are specialists in SEND that liaise with speech therapists etc, while that is not the case in a classroom setting in a primary school where SEND is catered for differently. An example of this, is that at the current nursery, they teach the children Makaton and it is used with a number of students who require it to communicate, does any other setting have staff trained in this?



As for being more accessible, it is on an extremely busy road that currently takes 15 minutes to pass on a morning (confirmed by a resident) without an extension and nursery being added. Only last week, there was a collision on that road. The current nursery is in a safe estate, set back from main roads where there is no traffic affecting drop off and pickups. The proposed new setting will not only be on a busy road but will also be less accessible when construction begins and heavy vehicles are accessing the site, plus new houses being proposed 2.5 miles away in Cragdale Gardens causing even more traffic. From the perspective of someone who is from Hetton, I can tell you that despite your thorough planning of a one way system to elevate traffic, that many people will continue to park on the road outside for a quick getaway for work. They will not want to be stuck in a one way system. This happens already in the small cul-de-sac opposite the site and will be made worse when more children attend. Plus it will not be a simple drop off as nursery children need to be lead to the building, messages passed to and from the staff to parents at drop off and pick up which will only cause traffic to build inside the school's premises itself. As for alternative settings, they are all situated on main roads except for Eppleton which is set back and Houghton which is far too far away for parents to travel. By offering up Eppleton and Houghton as an alternative, it is in complete contradiction to the pre- consultation, which stated that parents live closer to another provision to make it more convenient for us - yet these two options are further away. Finally, you have made an assumption based on postcodes that we live closer to other options, when in reality (until COVID), grandparents do drop offs and collections from the nursery. My own parents live 430ft away from Hetton Le Hole Nursery in The Avenue. That means there is zero carbon footprint as they pick him up and drop him off while I work. If I attend any other provision that is not Hetton House (which I do not wish to go private), then that zero carbon footprint stops and my parents then have to drive to the new location as the others are too far to expect a child aged 2-4 to walk.

Finally, you end the consultation by looking at the results of the informal consultation in which you say 92% disagreed with the council's proposal from 541 responses. It states on Sunderland City Council's own website that: "the people of Sunderland can exchange views to help influence decisions, inform the way services are delivered and improve their communities." It also says that "The views of local people in Sunderland really do matter and they do influence decisions that affect everything from how we provide services to the future of the whole city." If responses are taken seriously and can influence decisions and improve communities, then how is 92% against the closure of the nursery not enough? What is needed? 100%. I find this very contradictory and actually feel our voices have not been heard or listened to and because of that that my view really doesn't matter. I think the strength of feeling is abundantly clear, alongside the petition to keep the nursery open that to date has received 1,679 signatures (the last one being 1 day ago) [Link to petition](#). You

go on to state that the pre-consultation offered "no alternative option has been identified that would increase the viability". I don't think parents, residents, staff or Hetton Town Council should provide you (the local authority) with an option, surely that is what you are meant to do to maintain your nursery. Not only are you sitting on funding that has not been used for early years and SEND, you have also never discussed any alternative options yourself with the nursery prior to consultation. If you have been watching this setting since 2016 (which is clear from the dates in the consultation and from the HTC meeting in December with Alan Rowan), then why has the council not stepped in to help save the nursery? Instead, you have sat back and watched it become in your words "unsustainable", meaning you have failed your own maintained nursery and the children that attend.

On a final note before I offer up some ideas to improve the financial viability of the setting, I would like to address the lack of consideration from the council for its own residents during a pandemic. Frankly, you have made what has been an impossible time for all, but certainly key workers which I am, horrific due to your disgraceful timing. You have taken advantage of the pandemic to propose the closure of the nursery, meaning representations have not been able to be made in the way they usually would be. Parents have never been sat down by the local council and been told of this, instead the nursery had to send us an email. Instead, you offer up a Q and A months into the process in an attempt to address how parents felt, which is unacceptable. In my view, you have also been unable to gather everyone's views on the matter as well, as the elderly are isolated with no internet to even know this is going on, the same people that may be grandparents, great grandparents or former pupils of the nursery from when it first opened. Due to restrictions, people have not been able to go door to door or deliver leaflets to make them aware of this proposed closure. Other educational settings in the area and Hetton Town Council were not even aware until the consultations were out in the public domain, and may have remained in the dark had parents not spoken out in desperation about this. It states in the Opening and Closing Maintained Schools document that " the decision-maker must consider the expressed views of all those affected by a proposal or who have an interest in it, including cross-LA border interests. The decision-maker should not simply take account of the number of people expressing a particular view. Instead, they should give the greatest weight to responses from those stakeholders likely to be most directly affected by a proposal – especially parents of children at the affected school(s)". It is clear from the lack of people who even knew about this and how the pre-consultation of 92% against the closure was ignored, that you are not following the guidance and in fact are taking advantage during the pandemic.

Now in terms of the pandemic, children of all ages were forced out of their settings during lockdown 1 for a considerable length of time, unable to see grandparents, family, staff or friends. All stability for them was removed and they were forced to stay home with no visits to zoos, soft plays, aquariums, farms etc. They then return to nursery to a world where bubbles cannot cross, adults are wearing masks and they are being taught about washing their hands and not being in each other's personal space - whilst still not seeing family members. They return to seeing their family for an extremely small window over the Christmas period before entering another lock down where they cannot see them again. Nursery in the last lockdown was their only stability, their new norm. You now want to pull the rug from under them once again at the end of August to cause more upheaval when they move to another setting. A place unfamiliar, staff are not the same, friends have not followed and without the certainty of seeing family still for comfort. This is what they face because of your timing. How is this fair? How is this considering what is best for these children? It has been reported in the news only this week that Europe could see a third wave so we cannot guarantee this country will not suffer another lock down. A pandemic is not the time to move children and close a site. Parents have also faced the same horror of the timing as from November (when we were

notified of this), we have suffered unimaginable unease, stress and sleepless nights, worrying for our children with no comfort from family available due to lockdown restrictions.

Despite all of this, you seem to want the local people to come up with an alternative option to make the setting viable. The residents and parents have collaborated with the nursery and Hetton Town Council to look at ways to help. These include:

- Increasing the hourly rate at the nursery in line with other nurseries in the area from £4.50 to £5.00. This will generate an extra £17,436 which will more than pay for next year's in year deficit of £11,493 proposed by the council. Any extra can go towards paying off some of the deficit.
- Promotion of the nursery by nursery, parents and HTC through signposting, social media, leaflet drops and events, such as the Going On a Nursery Hunt that was a great success on the 20th March. It meant that people went on a trail that ended at the nursery so more people knew it was there - following COVID guidelines.



- Fundraising organised by parents to lower the current deficit. At the moment, it is on £3,413 and was set up on the 19th Feb ([click link for fundraising page](#)). In my view this is amazing considering we are in lockdown and will only increase when we are able to fundraise properly.
- Projection of those pupils aged 3-4 to be re-considered as a number of parents are moving children into 3-4 main nursery and upping the hours, so it will take them over the 15 funded hours needed to contribute towards the lump sum allocation. Plus with promotion, particularly with new builds, the nursery should gain more numbers. This can work as the head teacher is still getting people enquiring about places despite the proposed closure and more now than ever, because it has been in the media and online through residents raising awareness over its closure.

While I appreciate no-one wants to close a nursery, this particular decision seems to be ill thought out and ill timed. I hope we as parents, the residents of Hetton, the town council and staff are given time to make the setting more viable, before this decision is made. As the Maintained nursery schools: state of play report states: "England's maintained nursery schools are a remarkable part of our education system where the most disadvantaged children can access the highest quality

education. Rather than letting them wither on the vine through short-sighted attempts at cutting costs, we should be using them as a means of bringing up quality across the early years sector". Don't let this nursery wither; give us time alongside your support to ensure its viability.

It is deeply saddening and disappointing to see that the council want to close and Ofsted Outstanding nursery that has been at the heart of the community for 75 years. The outcry and support from families past and present demonstrates the importance and care people have for the nursery.

They are the most important part of all of this and currently they are happy and thriving at their nursery; these early stepping stones in their education and development are the most important and if we have learnt anything from the pandemic education is the key to the future of our country and no expense should be spared there.

What I find most disgusting is that the council have a £4 million understand on early years education and yet they want to close the nursery because of funding. The money is there and the council should be doing more to support the nursery; I would like to point out that the council are also being very underhand in using figures that show an increased deficit when no funding has been provided to support with PPE during the pandemic. As I teacher myself, I know there will not be any educational provision that is managing to balance their books in this current climate due to the unprecedented circumstance they have found themselves in and want to keep their staff and pupils safe; something the council has shown no consideration or support in by not providing extra funding.

I wish to object to the closure of Hetton-le-Hole Nursery School and Childcare.

As a parent of a child who attended the Nursery School and a previous member of staff, I cannot express my disappointment enough on hearing of the possible closure of the Nursery School.

I would like to give you my view points from both the perspective of a parent and a member of staff.

Parent:

- My son began attending the Nursery when he was only 2 years old, he is now 10. I can honestly say that the experiences and support he received from the staff and learning environment is still with him now. It is called the 'foundation stage' for a reason!
- He was lucky enough to engage in the forest school at the time and explore the fantastic outdoor learning environment. He is now a confident, friendly, social boy with an array of different friends.
- Not only did the fantastic staff support him emotionally and socially but he made fantastic progress academically, ensuring he was ready for school and his Reception year; I do not believe a nursery class within a primary school or a private nursery would have prepared him in the way Hetton-le-Hole Nursery School did.

Staff:

- I was lucky enough to be part of an inspirational team. The training staff receive is tailored to the needs of the children and the Early Years sector.
- Nursery Schools proved a bespoke package for the children that attend. Too often, nursery aged children can be lost in a Primary setting, and swept away with the National Curriculum and the whole school rather than with a focus on the Early Years Foundation Stage.
- All of the staff that work at the nursery are invested in the helping the children make progress and supporting their wellbeing.
- Funding for nursery schools has been massively reduced, impacting directly on the staff and secondarily with the children. That said, staff have ensured the children do not feel the repercussions of it.
- Senior leaders and governors began to address the deficit and made leaps and bounds with this. Unfortunately, due to the global pandemic, and lack of support from the local council,

this has been impossible to continue. However, they have demonstrated that it is feasible to balance the books and I believe they can continue with this.

- Expert and skilled teaching will be lost due to the reduction of staff.
- Money will be spent on temporary classrooms and to reconfigure of the primary school when this could be given to an already well established, outstanding Nursery to support them though these unforeseen difficult times.

I am writing to you to formally object to the closure of Hetton-Le-Hole Nursery School. My 2 year old daughter currently attends the school, and has done so since she was 8 months old. When selecting a nursery for her I ensured I chose a nursery that would provide the highest standard of care and education for her to narrow and close the gaps in her development due to ongoing health issues she has had since birth. My decision to send her to Hetton le Hole Nursery School was as a result of visiting the setting and instantly feeling this was the best place for my little girl both academically and socially/emotionally. That first instinct along with the schools results data and research suggesting maintained nursery schools offer a higher standard of education has proven to be right as [REDACTED] has made outstanding progress from her starting point under their care, and gaps in her development have narrowed. [REDACTED] has now moved from the baby room and is now currently in the toddler room. When deciding and selecting the nursery for her I wanted to ensure she was in one establishment from birth until her reception year. I did this to provide stability for her and also to work around my work commitments, finances and also my other family childcare arrangements. Penny is only part way through her early years journey at nursery and the transition will have a major impact on her emotional well-being. She is currently being assessed by a number of professionals each one commenting on how shy and reserved she is, this is a direct impact of the ongoing global pandemic. My daughter's extreme social shyness, exhibits itself when she comes into contact with unfamiliar adults and this now includes family members as she has not been able to see most of them throughout the pandemic. When unfamiliar adults are near her or try to speak or

engage her in activities she will cling to her familiar adults, cry, become distressed and this can result in her vomiting or becoming emotionally exhausted. It is because of this I feel a change in her nursery where she will be separated from her peers and familiar adults that have been her only other consistent during this pandemic would be truly detrimental to her development and well being. This negative impact, is avoidable and ill timed by the council when so many children and their families have had so much to deal with in such challenging times. It is because of her current needs than no other setting can meet the needs of my child as well as Hetton-le-Hole Nursery School does.

It is evident from the discussions I have had with staff and the comments in the nurseries ofsted reports that the staff expertise and leadership skills at this school are of the highest standards. This expertise and skill set will be lost if the nursery were to close. Splitting staffing between the limited opportunities at Hetton Primary and other nurseries means skill sets and expertise will be diluted and in many cases lost all together. Staff using makaton for example has directly benefited my little girl in gaining confidence to communicate her needs and their understanding of allergies, sensory processing and signs of visibility issues are all skills my daughter has directly benefited from. It is very much a team around my little girl at the nursery and everyone's input that is helping her to progress so well.

The nursery has a qualified SENDco who is an early years specialist and is able to support all children who have additional needs to make outstanding progress during their time at nursery. For parents like myself and many others this is of the utmost importance as our children need that expertise and experience to ensure they succeed. I have witnessed how speedily referrals have been made for my daughter, how the school team work with professionals to get the trickiest customers, like Penny, assessed by outside agencies and as a result make plans to ensure the children's needs are met. SEN children and children with additional needs need an outstanding start to give them the life chances they deserve and I know this is what the children at this nursery school get as I have seen it with my own daughter. I will forever be grateful to the staff for the amazing support they give my daughter daily and how speedily they have made referrals to meet her needs.

Children in nursery schools are less at risk during a Covid pandemic than those in a primary provision. The government reopened nurseries long before primary schools so my daughter quickly returned to nursery resulting in her having a smaller break in her education. The pandemic is still ongoing and there is a possibility that we may need to go into full lockdown again, something that was predicted early last year at the hospital my sister works in and has already been seen in other countries across the world. Stability, consistency and familiarity for the children is of utmost importance to ensure they meet their development milestones in such challenging times. With the possibility of another lockdown and restricted measures in place again being highly likely in the late autumn/ winter time it is vital this nursery remains open to support children they know and give them the best academic education and emotional support when their lives change again.

Hetton-le-Hole Nursery School is the only early years nursery that is graded as outstanding by Ofsted in Hetton. Now more than ever children need an outstanding start to their education due to the inevitable declines in social and communication skills exacerbated by the ongoing global pandemic. No other setting currently can match the standard of the provision provided within the Hetton ward. The suggestion of Houghton Community Nursery School as an alternative provision is simply not an option for many parents like myself for a number of reasons. It is not accessible to many local families who live in Hetton as all



parents do not have access to a car daily for nursery drop offs and collections. Those parents who do have car access would be adding to daily commutes, and for many parents like me it is too far in the opposite direction to their place of work for this to be a suitable alternative. There are also no guarantees of places at these other settings for our children meaning the guidance around alternative places being of equal standard and quantity when providing alternative provisions for parents when a school is proposed to be closed are not being met.

I understand that there is a need to balance the books and look at finances, that is something the nursery have been very open to from the start of this consultation and proposal process. I think the timing of such a closure further impacting on our youngest children however is much more important. Finances need to be balanced, but children's emotional well-being, standards of education and parental choice to send their child to an outstanding establishment locally in these times must take priority and I ask you as both a mother and educationalist to enter into discussions with the nursery and formulate a plan to save it. My child has been significantly impacted by covid with her emotional well being and speech being affected the most, she will not cope in a new setting and I have made this clear in the multiple phone calls, emails and discussions I have had in regards to the proposal. What is the cost associated with forcing this change on children when they are not yet able to cope with these changes? For me a price cannot be put on an outstanding education or a child's mental state and happiness. There are alternatives available, there are ways to make this nursery remain open and whilst there are discussions to be had and decisions to be made to enable my little girl to stay where she feels safe, happy and cared for and is educated so very well, then I can see no other outcome other than for the nursery to remain open. It has been acknowledged in documented meetings that the financial vulnerability of the Nursery is not due to mismanagement of funds but due to the methodology behind the funding formula and the unavoidable costs associated with a Maintained Nursery School. Funding decisions about Maintained Nursery Schools have not been made by parliament and the government is urging local authorities to hold off making decisions about their longer-term futures until these decisions have been made\*. The council are saying that the nursery has a deficit of up to £200,000 that they do not have the capacity to clear and they cannot support financially moving forward. They also say that the nursery is de-stabilising the other maintained nurseries because of the lower contribution and higher outtake of the lump sum. The main reason put forward for this closure is financial, however there are significant underspends in both the Early Years Inclusion Funding and Pupil Funding budgets. The combined underspend in the last three years amounts to £4,014,000. Such underspends have resulted in a direct impact on the budgets and survival of all of the Maintained Nursery Schools. The council could utilise those underspent funds to save the maintained nursery sector in Sunderland, who are currently being disadvantaged by surplus funds not being used effectively. Nursery Schools are required to provide high quality early education, led by specialist headteachers, and delivered by qualified teachers especially in deprived areas and to put parents and families at the centre of their work.

DFE guidance (November 2019) stipulates that the decision-maker should give the greatest weight to responses from those stakeholders likely to be most directly affected by a proposal – especially parents of children at the affected school. As a parent of a child who currently attends the nursery, and as a parent who responded to the pre consultation, in which 92% of those responding did not agree with plans to close the nursery, I ask all committee members to work with all stakeholders to formulate a plan to save this nursery and to give my daughter and her peers who attend the nursery the stability they need, the education they deserve and leave them in a nursery where they feel safe with adults who know them well and care for them. Give the children the time they deserve to recover from the effects of this cruel

pandemic which had impacted their short lives so much and let's do what everyone wants to do and keep this nursery open.

Hetton le Hole nursery is not alone in this financial vulnerability. The implication of the Early Years Funding formula is now impacting across the wider Maintained Nursery School sector. Financial Benchmarking data reveals that in the last two years the number of Maintained Nursery Schools in Sunderland ending the year with a deficit balance is on the increase. In the funding year 2018-2019 four out of eight Maintained Nursery Schools ended the year with a deficit In-year balance. In the funding year 2019-2020 five out of eight Maintained Nursery Schools ended the year with a deficit In-year balance. Reserves are diminishing as Maintained Nursery Schools are having to endure funding shortfalls each year, this paints a bleak picture. We need to ensure our nursery schools are all protected starting with Hetton le Hole Nursery School. The current proposal allows the only ofsted graded outstanding nursery in Hetton-le-Hole to be lost in the interest of short-term cost saving. The long term impact of the lump sum being shared amongst the other maintained nursery schools will be insignificant.

As a result of closing the only outstanding nursery in Hetton the council would be effectively causing families from a deprived area of Sunderland to not have access to an outstanding nursery when it is needed most. It is my belief both as a mother and as an educationalist that all children are entitled to the very best education and Hetton le Hole has been recognised as a nursery which allows children to flourish and achieve outstandingly well in spite of their home circumstances, low starting points and family backgrounds.

Children and parents have suffered immensely as a result of the Covid pandemic and do not need this type of upheaval. I have my own role in a school to focus upon and my own families to support I do not need the additional worry, stress and anxiety caused by this proposal and the threat of closure keeping me awake at night. I never thought an outstanding nursery would be proposed to be closed and finances alone should not be the driving factor in any decisions to do so. My daughter is my world and her needs are my priority which is why I chose such an amazing setting to put her in for the first years of her life. She will simply not cope with a change in setting now as she has been affected immensely, like many children from Covid and the effects of covid on our lives. This is why she needs the nursery to remain open to ensure she has time to adjust socially and emotionally before moving into the next phase of her education in school. I have no doubt if she remains at Hetton le Hole Nursery School, with the adults and peers that have become her only other consistent during this pandemic, she will not only be ready emotionally for her transition into reception but she will excel having made outstanding progress academically too. She needs time to adjust when Covid restrictions are lifted and gain the social skills needed to do this.

Please reconsider and engage in discussions so our children are not further affected by this pandemic.

As a life-long resident of the Hetton ward, I email in utter amazement at the proposed plans to discontinue (close) Hetton-le-Hole Nursey School. This Nursery School has been in place at the Brewery Field Site for a number of generations and provides a centrally based location to provide an excellent education to the pre-school population of Hetton-le-Hole. At least three generations of my own family have benefitted from the education that they received from this Outstanding provision.

In recent times we have seen the establishment of pre-school provision at Eppleton Primary Academy School, the opening of the private Nursery School of Hetton House and now we have plans agreed to extend the school roll at Hetton Primary School including lowering of the age of entry. The traffic issues that will develop on Moorsley Rd do not bear thinking about and yet the planned closure of Hetton-le-Hole Nursery is still going ahead.

The Nursery is located between the churches of Hetton Methodist Church and my own church of Hetton Independent Methodist Church, where we have welcomed the Nursery on numerous occasions for their seasonal events to which parents and family have attended. This will no longer be feasible due to the considerable distance the pupils would have to walk from Hetton Primary School to our church. This social development of the youngsters in our historic social buildings seems very short-sighted at least.

In particular reference to the proposed closure of Hetton-le-Hole Nursery School, the only school in the Hetton ward rated as outstanding by Ofsted this should mean the school is showcased and funded an appropriate level to offer training and support to

other Nursery schools and nursery provision rather than being faced with the threat of closure.

I am writing this letter in response to the proposal to close Hetton-Le-Hole Nursery School. I am deeply saddened by this proposal and was in grave shock when I found out that the council was going to begin a closure process.

I have worked within this nursery since 2015, my children have attended this nursery and my youngest child is currently in the baby room. Family members have also attended this nursery. It has been part of our lives for such a long time and the thought of my child having to begin a settling process within another nursery whilst she is already part way through her journey at nursery worries me deeply as I believe it will have a major impact on her emotional well-being. There is no other setting that I feel will honestly meet the needs of my child and it is the only early years provision within my local area that is graded outstanding by Ofsted.

I am now also at risk of losing my job and because of this I feel like I have had to accept a job within the NHS as I need to think about my future, and that of my family. I have lost all faith within the local authority and education system and need to secure an income for my family, especially during a global pandemic. Many children and parents, as well as my own family, have suffered immensely as a result of the Covid pandemic and we do not need this as another worry.

The Council has not provided any Covid-19 relief funds to the despite having received many millions of pounds from central government. The Nursery has incurred £76,000 of Covid-19 losses this year, however despite this the closing deficit (in year) was £58,449. The nursery was unable to furlough staff due to them being council employees.

Budget cuts have been made to the nursery funding, making it impossible for it to be financially stable. The leadership team have completed restructures and the headteacher has looked at many ways in reducing the costings across the nursery. The nursery is not alone in this financial vulnerability. The implication of the Early Years Funding formula is now impacting the other Maintained Nursery School sector.

Alan Rowan has documented that the financial vulnerability of the Nursery is not due to mismanagement of funds but due to the methodology behind the funding formula and the costs of Maintained Nursery Schools. This has also been brought up in parliament (APPG) and the government is urging local authorities to hold off making decisions about their longer-term futures.

The local authority is yet to provide the governors or parents with alternative options that they have considered before planning a full closure. In discussions with the school and governors it was made clear there are no alternatives, despite leaders being open to suggestions. Financial Benchmarking data reveals that in the last two years the number of Maintained Nursery Schools in Sunderland ending the year with a deficit balance is on the increase, so why target our Nursery. There obviously needs to be some kind of rethink of how to adequately fund maintained nurseries.

Sunderland City Council permitted a private nursery to open within 0.5 miles of the nursery when the market for early years provision was already inundated with providers, so why could the council not have safeguarded the only outstanding provision within the area.

The nursery is at the heart of the community and has been established since 1945. This was the first ever Maintained Nursery School in Sunderland. My children are now achieving beyond expected at school because of the excellent foundation they received from the nursery. The staff that my children worked with, and that I currently work with, are highly skilled, kind and caring. They are also my work colleagues and together we are a family that go above and beyond to support the children and families that we work with.

Please reconsider the impact of this disappointing proposal, for the sake of the children, their families, the community and also the staff that work there.

I am writing to you to express my views on the potential closure of Hetton-Le-Hole Nursery School and to state that I object to the closure of this nursery school.

The first thing I would like to do is to tell you a little bit about myself and my family. I attended this nursery school in 1999 as a very young yet very impressionable toddler. When I started attending this nursery school, my parents were a fairly new married couple with two young children; myself born in 1996 and one of my younger siblings who was born in 1998. My parents then went on to have a third child in 2000 and then separated in 2001. My father worked full time and my mother took care of the household duties and took care of me and my two siblings at the time. Now as everybody knows, life goes on and people remarry and go on to have second families and this is often better for everyone involved. I ended up being the eldest of four children to my mother, and the eldest of five children to my father. So all in all, I have three younger sisters, then a younger brother followed by another sister. I want to say that we all went to this nursery, but it didn't stop there. My eldest niece and my two godsons went to this nursery. My youngest niece currently attends this nursery in the two year old room, my unborn nephew would also attend this nursery when the time comes and I hope that one day my own children will attend this nursery just like I did all those years ago.

This is the place where I made some of my very first memories. I remember getting excited carrying my snack money in my pocket and feeling so important. I remember making bonds with my first ever best friends. I remember playing in the big garden, riding around on the red trikes in all kinds of weather. I remember learning to tie my shoelaces and how proud I felt when I finally did it. I remember the staff always smiling, there was never a frown in sight. More importantly, I remember being excited about going to nursery to see my friends, to learn and to see the staff.

My niece is currently part way through her journey at nursery and the transition would have a major impact on both hers and her mothers emotional well-being. They have both built a good rapport with the staff at Hetton-Le-Hole Nursery School and they would both have to start that process all over again should the nursery close. Not only would this have an impact on their emotional wellbeing, but this closure would have a major impact on the quality of care and learning given to them as Hetton-Le-Hole Nursery School is the only facility in the area that has been graded as Outstanding by Ofsted. This being said, is it fair for people to be asked to settle for second best? The support at this nursery school for both children with special educational needs and their parents is exceptional. Hetton-Le-Hole Nursery School has a qualified coordinator who specialises in children in the early years category who have

additional needs and can therefore currently receive these additional needs and support mechanisms at this nursery whereas in other nursery facilities, this may not be available. This then puts the children who need that help and support at a major disadvantage as essentially by closing the nursery, you are taking away that support. All of the staff at this nursery are highly skilled, qualified, kind and caring and they would do their absolute best to go above and beyond for every child in their care. I can proudly say from personal experience that this nursery has provided my family with extra support when caring for a child, both myself and the youngest sister included, when it comes to medical needs.

As previously mentioned, a lot of my family members have attended and are now highly successful because of the excellent foundation they received from the nursery. For example, I achieved fantastic grades throughout school and I am now a Tax Advisor working for HMRC, one of my sisters is a Teaching Assistant in a primary school, another sister is a full time mother with one daughter and a son on the way, one sister is studying at college, my brother is currently working towards GCSEs, my youngest sister is doing an amazing job at school, my oldest niece and my godsons are constantly receiving awards for their amazing efforts and achievements at school, and like I said earlier, my youngest niece is just starting her journey through education.

A lot of people say that nursery is all about playing and you don't really learn anything from it. Well I disagree, Hetton-Le-Hole Nursery School built the fundamentals of a variety of skills for me, as previously mentioned. The point I'm making is that some of these fundamentals may look like playing but in fact these fundamentals can have a great impact on a child. This nursery school is where I developed my social skills, I made friends, I learned how to share and wait my turn. I developed my hand-eye coordination by doing various tasks and I learnt a great deal more from this nursery school, not only as a child but as an adult too.

Another point I would like to make is that the Covid-19 pandemic has put people through a lot of uncertainty with some losing their jobs, others being furloughed and some sadly losing loved ones due to the virus itself. Deciding to potentially close this nursery would have a major impact on a lot of these individuals as many would have relied on relatives who could have looked after the children in question but are unable to as the majority of the county are in a situation where we still cannot visit our friends and families. Although, it was mentioned by parliament that for childcare purposes you may mix with another household, this isn't always the case, especially if your loved ones are classed as vulnerable due to health reasons. With this being said, is now really the right time to be making such decisions? The staff at Hetton-Le-Hole Nursery School have worked throughout the pandemic and have gone to extreme lengths to ensure that every child is safe from any risk possible in the nursery setting. They have worn face masks and visors and this nursery has created bubbles to ensure that no bubble mixes with another, again putting the children's safety first.

As a current HMRC employee, I understand, possibly more than most, that the country has done a lot to support UK citizens in many ways during this pandemic, such as the 'furlough scheme', the 'self employed income support scheme' and the 'eat out to help out scheme'. These were all run by HMRC so I can see things from a business perspective as well as a personal one when looking at the closure of Hetton-Le-Hole Nursery School. The first thing I would like to point out when looking at the business side of things is the financial costs involved, it is a known fact that the council is allocating over five million pounds on a new build and the consultation report for the new build mentions that further money would be spent on a number of things including ICT equipment, furniture and demolition. The question in relation to this is, why can't the council clear the nursery deficit or at least provide an adequate amount of funding to keep Hetton-Le-Hole Nursery School open? The community

of Hetton have shown a great amount of determination to help save the nursery. Parents have come together to come up with ideas, plans and solutions to the nursery's situation but haven't been given the opportunity to share their ideas with the council at this time. The parents and staff of the nursery have raised funds in the region of £3,000 in just a couple of weeks, and I can only imagine that this will be continuing until a final decision is made. The Department for Education guidance states that 'maintained nursery schools' should not be closed solely because of a deficit budget position.

Bert Lance once said "if it ain't broke, dont fix it" which I'm sure you can see makes total and complete sense as this nursery school is at the heart of Hetton, and there is nowhere else in the vicinity that can provide this level of care for the children like Hetton Le Hole Nursery School can.

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To whom it may concern,

I currently have a child who is in attendance at Hetton le Hole Nursery School, having attended since the age of 1 in (order for us to return to work), that is wondering why we are putting up signs in shop windows, in our cars and in windows along the street saying 'Save Our Nursery'. Having to see the look on their faces when we explain why we are doing it is heart-breaking; it's already bad enough having to explain why things have changed so much over the past year due to Covid safety restrictions, but then to put this on top of everything else seems ill timed. It's bad enough worrying about will they be safe out of the house, but now parents are having to consider where can they send them now? Will other places have the same level of understanding as our Nursery, will they take the children for the same time periods to fit around our working patterns? How much extra is it going to cost? Will our children be happy swapping from place to place so soon in their lives?

It has been known for some time now that the funding situation of the nursery has experienced difficulties, the changes the management have made to improve the efficiency of the nursery and the adoption of multiple roles among staff have shown the parents the dedication of the team there. Alongside these changes there have been several fund-raising events involving the children, sponsored events, open days and raffles. It had been explained that this was due to ongoing year on year budget cuts, something that most people have come to expect in the aftermath of central government's austerity measures. However, through campaigning for the nursery, it has come to light that there is an apparent underspend by the council in the order of £4M for Early Years Inclusion Funding and Pupil Funding budgets? Through online discussions with others campaigning for the nursery the general thought on this is why and why can this funding be not used to alleviate the situation of this and other nurseries in similar predicaments. Also, the nursery has made it clear to us that it has received no Covid-19 relief funding, despite having council employed staff unable to be furloughed. Again, we are wondering why? I assume it is taking time to distribute the funds to where it needs to go?

We then have contradictory information from the council saying the nursery has a deficit value of around £200K and does not have the capacity to clear this and in fact our nursery is in effect dragging down others financially through the funding allocation system. Then we are told that Hetton Primary School is going to have a new building and there's millions of pounds available for that?

Maintained nursery schools should not be closed solely because of a deficit budget position, as advised by the DFE. Settling for a lower rated facility seems counter productive in the long term for Hetton le Hole. Breaking a team that provides an 'outstanding' level of education to this age group would be the real quantifiable loss to Sunderland.

The proposals to reassign pupils from the nursery to Hetton Primary School seems ill-advised given the fact that there will be an asbestos removal program running at the school, starting, we are led to believe, in the existing 'nursery area' of Hetton Primary. Also, the existing nursery children there will be moved into demountable classrooms along with the children from Hetton Nursery School. Why the nursery children from Hetton Primary cannot be moved across into a bespoke building, with excellent staff and an 'outstanding' rated teaching environment while the building work is carried out is yet to be explained. It would be a much better environment for all the children, provide Hetton Nursery School with further time in a post Covid environment to implement changes to improve their financial difficulties. It would also make programming the refurbishment and new build contracts in Hetton Primary simpler and improve the situation from a risk management point of view. Ultimately it would be better for the children to be in Hetton Nursery School while this work is carried out, an outstanding bespoke environment with better capabilities than the others available. This would also give the council more time in which to allocate underspent funding, distribute relief funding for Covid-19 and also allow the council to hold off making a decision, in line with central government while parliament can establish guidance on what to do with funding Maintained Nursery Schools.

The local community have come together over this proposal to object to it, over 800 people have joined a local Facebook group to coordinate efforts, as well as general support from the community as a whole. A sizeable amount of funding has been raised within a matter of weeks to help keep this nursery going. The history of this nursery is deep within Hetton le Hole's heart, the passion displayed by objectors is clear and the community feels that they will be at a real loss if this nursery were to be closed. It has been noticed that there has been little interaction between councillor's and the community before this proposal to close was raised and that throughout the process the community has been left wanting when it comes to consultation with Sunderland Council. We've seen no evidence, nor the nursery, of alternative options to close the nursery from Sunderland Council and ideas have been raised to improve the financial situation of the nursery by the community, including increasing the nursery's hourly charge rate.

In conclusion I would like to say that closing Hetton le Hole Nursery School would be the wrong thing to do at this time and therefore I object to the closure of Hetton le Hole Nursery. It may improve Sunderland's financial situation in the short term, but in the long run would be denying Hetton of an outstanding learning environment at grass roots level, having potential knock on consequences further down the line. It would also disrupt the children affected by the move, taken out of bespoke facilities and placed into temporary accommodations while a building site surrounds them. At best you could use Hetton le Hole Nursery during the works on Hetton Primary School to ensure a high-level educational basis for its future pupils. At least, you could grant Hetton le Hole Nursery another year to operate before reviewing. Either option would give Hetton le Hole Nursery time and a chance to turn around their financial difficulties after a year of lockdowns, backed by the local community, and keep providing outstanding nursery care and education to Hetton le Hole.

Hetton-le-Hole Nursery School is graded as outstanding by Ofsted and no other provider compares to the quality of provision offered in the local area. In addition to this, the nursery has a qualified SENDco who is an early years specialist and is able to support all children who have additional needs to make outstanding progress during their time at nursery.

Nursery Schools are required to provide high quality early education, led by specialist headteachers, and delivered by qualified teachers especially in deprived areas and to put parents and families at the centre of their work. DFE guidance (November 2019) stipulates that the decision-maker should give the greatest weight to responses from those stakeholders likely to be most directly affected by a proposal – especially parents of children at the affected school. The decision-makers are expected to adopt a presumption against the closure of maintained nursery schools. The pre consultation received 541 responses, in which 92% of those responding did not agree with plans to close the nursery.

Funding decisions about Maintained Nursery Schools have not been made by parliament and the government is urging local authorities to hold off making decisions about their longer-term futures.

I urge you not to close this outstanding nursery because of a funding issue which can obviously be dealt with by the council using the underspends mentioned above.

I wish to reject the proposal to close Hetton-Le-Hole Nursery School.

As a Parent, my Son has attended the nursery from 9 months old I have seen first-hand the impact and success it has had in developing its pupils who attend. It would be a huge disruption to both my Son and other children who attend the nursery to have to move settings and will cause a significant amount of unnecessary distress. The Covid-19 pandemic has caused a significant amount of unrest in our children already. The Government forced closure of all education provisions in March of 2020 lead to upset and confusion in my Son when he was finally able to return to nursery, this was minimised by the familiarity and comfort that he has with his current setting.

Imagine the level of upset and confusion in September when he is forced to move to another provision and start all over again making new peers and building relationships with the staff only to move on again into primary school in the September of 2022.

How is it justifiable to close a nursery while children are still progressing through their education? Surely a phased closing (if a closure is the decision made) would be more beneficial to all of the children involved, thus allowing them to finish their educational journey in one setting.

A closure of such a fantastic setting will come at a disadvantage to future generations, our second child was to be enrolled in this nursery from 9 months of age. This is now another full time place that will be lost by the local authority as we seek an alternative provision outside the area as we believe the care and expertise provided by Hetton-Le-Hole Nursery is the best of any provider in the surrounding area.

Moving on to the timing of the closure, it makes no logical sense whatsoever why the proposal to close would be from September 2021, the alternative provision (Hetton Le Hole Primary School as stated in your proposal) is not due to have its building completed until 2022. Surely now that this has been given the green light, the sensible option would be to delay the closure of Hetton-Le-Hole Nursery School (if it is to close) until after its completion?

What are the associated costs of erecting demountable classrooms and modifying an asbestos ridden building to create a temporary solution for an increased roll at the current Hetton-Le-Hole primary school?? (We will not worry about the potential health implications involved in altering a building laced with asbestos as this consultation to close appears to be based solely as a financial decision). This cost has never been disclosed, if it is more than the projected in year deficit of Hetton-Le-Hole nursery school then the closure in September 2021 makes very little sense.

It has already been highlighted that the Nursery can run in the year 2021/22 with a balanced budget based on an increase in the hourly rate by 50p. This supported by the fundraising efforts of parents (Currently over £3,600 raised) means that a balanced budget or even a small surplus in 2021/22 outweighs the cost of demountable classrooms and modifications to the current Hetton Primary site prior to its demolition... "But the Nursery still has a substantial deficit" will be the response from Mr Rowan et Al.

This is a SUNK COST. If you close the Nursery in September 2021 there is no way of recovering this deficit if the nursery closes. Allowing the Nursery to remain open even if temporarily for an additional twelve months will show that the Nursery can run in budget or at a small surplus.

My next point I would like to raise surrounds the financial questions that are yet to be answered in regards to early years funding by central government and the allocation of funds provided by Sunderland City Council. It has been made clear by central government that the closure of maintained nursery schools should be delayed wherever possible until the reassessment of early years funding has been completed, (this was due to be done in 2020 but has since been put back until 2021). How can the proposal be allowed to continue with the potential for increased funding allocated from central government? I would also like to highlight the c£4000,000 underspend by Sunderland City Council in the areas of early years inclusion funding and pupil funding budgets over the last three years. Where has this money gone? And why is it being taken away from early years provisions including Hetton-Le-Hole Nursery School? These figures were obtained by a freedom of information request and on their own, notwithstanding any other arguments should be grounds to HALT the closure process until this is fully investigated. You cannot allow a vital resource in early years education to close, as well as have others across the city in a deficit when such an underspend has been allowed to happen. Where is this money and why is it not being used to help maintained nursery schools who have accrued a deficit???? This SIGNIFICANT underspend is now having a direct impact on the lives of the children in Hetton-Le-Hole and indeed other parts of the locality.

In conclusion, the decision to close Hetton-Le-Hole Nursery School is one that is immoral. The children, staff, and parents, have suffered enough disruption at the hands of the Covid-19 pandemic. The decision to close Hetton-Le-Hole Nursery School should be rejected outright at this current time based on the welfare of our young people. Immorality however, is something that doesn't seem to register with the majority of councillors and those who make such decisions. So in terms that can be understood, Hetton-Le-Hole Nursery should be allowed to remain open and this proposal should be rejected, at the very least for a period no shorter than twelve months to allow completion of the alternative provision and for a full enquiry to be held into the significant underspend in Early Years Inclusion and Pupil funding budgets.

Dear Members of the Board for School Organisation,

I write to object to the closure of Hetton-Le-Hole Nursery School.

I am shocked, saddened and appalled that Sunderland City Council propose to close the only Ofsted rated Outstanding Nursery in Hetton. My daughter is a current attendee of Hetton Le Hole Nursery, prior was my elder son, and going back in time, were myself and sister. The nursery is of sentimental value to my family, and so many, as we enjoy how so many Hetton families and families who travel in from neighbouring areas, simply love the nursery and have done since 1945. This is for the care and attention our little ones thrive in. Equally families appreciate, are thankful for, and do not forget the educational excellence, knowledgeable skill and expertise, and dedication that is provided at this Ofsted Outstanding establishment. SEN provision is of excellence, as you are aware. It was paramount in giving my son, who was diagnosed with Autism, whilst at Nursery, the best start to Education. Headmistress and team secured an Educational Health Care Plan ready for my son going to school and the best care and support for SEN was provided throughout. I believe that this attention at Early Years can depict what is needed later on i.e. whether a child can be supported and manage in mainstream school or if they need a place in an SEN school. My son started maintained primary school with the best possible early years foundation and he continues to flourish. From starting nursery school age 3 and unable to verbalise, I don't believe that his progress would have been so significant if he had not attended Hetton-Le-Hole Nursery school. Progression was simply miraculous.

I could have sent my youngest child to the nursery based at my elder child's school, but I chose to do two drop offs instead as I wanted my youngest to attend Hetton-Le-Hole Nursery School.

I am shocked that Sunderland City Councillors have heard but not listened to 500 plus objections to closing Hetton le hole Nursery School and have pushed to the more formal stages of proposed closure. I trusted that councillors are in a position because of their willingness to listen to Sunderland residents and to

put first the needs of the most important residents our children. Unfortunately recent actions are not demonstrative of this. SCC have not liaised with the public correctly in line breaking their own proposal criteria, closing the pre-consultation five days early, thus not allowing the public the allocated time to have their voice heard. Instead a decision to push forward to formal consultation was made. 92 per cent of responses received were objecting the closure of the nursery. I am failing to understand how Sunderland can raise a proposal then ignore 500 negative responses and say well we are going to do it anyway. In fact SCC has not adequately liaised with stakeholders overall. SCC has not actively discussed proposal with nursery, their governors, families/residents of Hetton and Hetton Town Council, to look at ways to address falling roll numbers also.

All of this is against DfE Guidance which states that maintained nursery schools should not be closed due solely to financial deficit. DfE guidance states that concerning closure proposals the greatest weight for the decision should focus on the responses of stakeholders. DfE guidance also says that in relation to closing maintained schools decision makers/proposers should 'adopt a presumption against the closure of maintained nursery schools.' It states that an equal alternative should be provided and that the alternative should be more convenient and accessible for local parents. Neither of these are met as porta cabins at the proposed replacement at Hetton Primary, a long walk away for little legs is no comparison to a centrally located beautiful setting in a nature garden. There are no other OFSTED Outstanding provisions in Hetton. The baby room will be lost as there will be no baby room at the new Hetton Primary Nursery. Safety Concerns are raised over traffic at the new Hetton Primary setting and concerns over the large amount of asbestos in the primary building set to be demolished whilst children are in porta cabins nearby.

It has been noted by SCC that the nursery deficit is not due to mismanagement from staff but from the funding from central government. I notice that each opposition is met with, paraphrase 'but nursery is in financial deficit.' I want to know why Sunderland Council cannot pay off the deficit? It has come to my attention that SCC have an underspend of £4 million! Many times over could this deficit (a comparably small £140,000) have been paid off, how can our children not be worth the spend? The Nursery has incurred losses due to covid of £76,000 and still the in year closing deficit was £58,499, and the nursery could not even furlough staff. Still despite council receiving millions from

central government the nursery did not receive any Covid Relief funds! To propose closure during a pandemic is utterly appalling. The Government have advised that LA's should hold off on any closures as decisions on future funding have not yet been finalised. Furthermore, the nursery is not the only maintained nursery in a financially vulnerable position.

The children have had enough to contend with, without it been suggested that they move from their much loved safe haven to porta cabins up at Hetton Primary. A long walk for little legs and porta cabins are not good enough! It is unlikely that any parents will chose to send their child to porta cabins, and are more likely to use the private nursery in the centre of Hetton. Key workers including staff and parents need support during this pandemic not to deal with the threat of losing their jobs or their childcare provision. Private nurseries have no requirements for Head Teacher, Teacher, SENCO, and are not subject to the rigorous inspections from OFSTED that maintained nurseries are subject to.

The Local Authority have encouraged competition for Hetton-Le-Hole Nursery School by allowing a private nursery to open in very close proximity to it. SCC has encouraged competition from a number of private nurseries allowing them to undercut maintained schools, which is unfair.

Parents have formulated a financial plan to improve nursery position however have not been given opportunity to share it with the council. Parents have set up a go fund me page which has raised in excess of £3000 in only a few weeks. An online petition has 1679 signatures, in support of saving Hetton-Le-Hole Nursery School.

I fail to understand why the opinion of SCC is this nursery is in financial deficit and closure is appropriate. This is your maintained nursery school; the Local Authority thinking and viewpoint is all wrong. I want members of the board to think about if their child attended, their grandchild, their niece, nephew, any child in their family and think about how they would feel if a child they cared for attended, loved and flourished in an Ofsted Outstanding Nursery Setting with staff care, dedication, skill, knowledge and expertise second to none, what would your opinion be of the LA who proposes such a loss. I then ask you to overturn your thinking from proposed closure, to this is our Local Authority Maintained Nursery; it is a fantastic early years setting that we are so proud of. I urge you to applaud the staff for being ofsted outstanding and providing a

service that that the residents of Hetton love and show appreciation by revoking your proposal to close. I urge you to support the asset, preserve it, keep it going. Do this for the children of Hetton and surrounding areas. It is not a robotic paper exercise where by the figures show the nursery is financially unsustainable. We are taking real, wonderful little children who want to stay at their nursery, can't they have that? Staff who actually love their job and are dedicated in everything they do every day for the children, cant they carry on? A real town, Hetton, who has shown in droves that they want to keep the nursery. Look at the proposal as a person with a heart, not as a robot with a business transaction in mind. Local Authority should be relied upon to provide what the people need, and listen to what the people want and parental choice.

It would be a sad day in Hetton-Le-Hole if you remove the nursery.

Key workers do not need the added stress of worrying about their children's upheaval if the nursery is closed and their children just moved into Hetton nursery without

any consultation. My son and his partner wanted my granddaughter to go to Hetton Lyons primary school as it has a better Ofsted report.

I cannot see the point of housing the children in temporary accommodation, with building work going on around them, when there is accommodation available in a perfectly good established nursery. I object to Sunderland City Council's proposal to close the 'Outstanding' Ofsted rated Nursery School in Hetton-le-Hole because:

1. Sunderland City Council has failed to comply with the Department of Education Guidance of November 2019 of giving the greatest weight to responses from those stakeholders likely to be most directly affected by a proposal – especially parents of children at the affected school. The decision-makers are expected to adopt a presumption against the closure of maintained nursery schools.
2. Sunderland City Council has permitted and encouraged unfair competition by allowing numerous private nurseries to undercut state schools.
3. Sunderland City Council has been derelict in its duties by not actively involving and discussing with the Nursery, its governors, residents, families and Hetton Town Council possible ways to overcome the difficulties of falling roll numbers.
4. Sunderland City Council has not provided any Covid-19 relief funds to the Nursery despite having received many millions from central government.
5. Sunderland City Council has failed to provide additional funding for this Nursery and other maintained nurseries to clear any outstanding deficits despite having an underspend of over £4 million.

6. The budget forecast produced by Sunderland City Council to 'justify' the closure is inaccurate and forecast additional pupils will eliminate the projected deficit.
7. Sunderland City Council deliberately distorted facts relating to the uplift given to the Nursery as the reason for at least one other nursery school going into deficit.
8. Sunderland City Council will be putting the Health and Safety of young and vulnerable children from the Nursery at risk by transferring them to temporary demountable classrooms /asbestos ridden reconfigured building for a period of up to 3 years.
9. Sunderland City Council's Cabinet took the decision to move forward to a statutory consultation 5 days before the pre consultation closed and this did not permit all responses to be considered.

The nursery has been part of the community for a number of years as a local outstanding nursery and has a large garden which is used on a daily basis which isn't near any main roads. You want to close this and open a new facility at hetton lyons which is on a main road and links into a school which has questionable teaching practices and does not focus on SEN children. Disgrace.

To whom it may concern,

I am writing to you regarding the consultations about the potential closure of Hetton-le-Hole Nursery School, and my concerns about this proposed closure.

My little boy started at Hetton-le-Hole Nursery School just before he turned 1 in 2017 as I returned back to work full time. We had looked at many nurseries before we chose Hetton-le-Hole Nursery School and none of them had been as welcoming, friendly, kind and professional as Hetton-le-Hole Nursery School. I remember the relief of having found this wonderful nursery; their guidance, support and professionalism with which they welcomed us and their warmth with which they run the nursery and look after our kids was and is still exceptional and back then and now making my return to work and continue working as smooth as it can possibly be. The cherry on the top was that this was the only outstanding nursery in the area, and it showed back then and still shows now every day how well deserved this outstanding Ofsted rating is. My little boy experienced delays in his motoric skills and the additional to his needs tailored support and expertise of the nursery staff has been amazing and helped him to develop amazingly.

Throughout the pandemic our kids have been through so many transitions and yet the nursery has been their secure place, staff going above and beyond to look after them and provide stability, continue their teaching and give warmth and care. I was in utter shock and disbelief when I heard that it might have to close. How any council could decide to close one of its best nurseries during a pandemic (as far as I believe Hetton-le-Hole Nursery School is the only early years provision graded as outstanding by Ofsted and no other setting currently can match their standard and care provided), when most businesses and institutions are struggling, instead of trying their utmost to protect this gem of a nursery that has been within our community for more than 45 years; one would hope that the goal would always been to go above and beyond to preserve the rare educational settings that are outstanding and show that our kids education is valued, hence our collective utter shock that closure was even considered during such troubling times.

Our children have suffered immensely during this pandemic, and staff have and are experiencing difficult challenges themselves, but never letting this influence and overshadow their care for our kids and they should not have to worry about the council closing their nursery while all of this is going on. It is even more surprising to me, that as so many businesses get support from their councils and the government that the council has not provided any Covid-19 relief funds despite government having issued very large sums. Yes, the nursery (as have most businesses and educational settings during this pandemic) has incurred a £76,000 Covid-loss this year, but this is partly due to not being able to furlough staff as they are council employees, creating an unfairness compared to private nurseries.

To make matters worse is that if Hetton-le-Hole Nursery School was to be closed, there is not even a comparable suitable learning environment for our kids ready yet. It seems like ill timing taking kids out of an outstanding, safe and secure learning environment moving them into demountable classrooms, to a site that is in construction, with an asbestos removal site next door, the unpleasant disruptive construction noise (especially for babies and toddlers, but I understand there is not even any baby provision and this is lost completely) and the impacts on outside play areas, and with the new build not ready for at least 2022 (if there are no delays- also not a given during an ongoing pandemic), seems illogical. In addition, the costing of temporary classrooms would go a long way in aiding Hetton-le-Hole Nursery School and would keep our children in their safe and appropriate learning environment; making use of an already established outstanding nursery with excellent staff and giving the nursery time to balance the budget during these difficult pandemic circumstances. Especially since it has been acknowledged in many meeting notes that the financial vulnerability of the nursery is not due to mismanagement of funds but due to the methodology behind the funding formula and the unavoidable costs associated with a Maintained Nursery School.

Adding to this is that no funding decisions about Maintained Nursery Schools have been made yet by parliament and the government and I believe they are even urging local authorities to hold off making decisions about their longer-term futures.

The council argues that Hetton-le-Hole Nursery School has a deficit of up to £200,000 that they do not have the capacity to clear and they cannot support financially moving forward, but instead of helping, they are willing to spend large sums into transitioning kids over into a not yet existing facility and having to spend even more in setting up demountable classrooms; plus even more illogical not trying to save this outstanding nursery during a pandemic, when there are significant underspends for inclusion early years inclusion of more than £4 million in the last 3 years and going against DFE guidance which states that maintained nursery schools should not be closed solely because of a deficit budget position.

Our kids wellbeing, education and safety, learning and playing in secure safe, construction free environments, keeping them mentally healthy and not causing even further transitions and instability, (all for a deficit that is proportionally so much smaller than other costs in transitioning them and unallocated funds that could solve the situation), is important to all of us; the impact of this proposed transition is extremely stressful and serious to all of us. Plus, settling for a lower rated facility seems counterproductive in the long term for Hetton-le-Hole.

The nursery does not expect a full relief and the community has pulled together to help funding the nursery through events, new financial proposals which have been put together with parents to improve the nursery's situation and the nurseries continued effort to streamline its efficiency are all ongoing initiatives to aid the nurseries position and situation and should be taken into consideration. The local community has stepped up and showed its support for Hetton-le-Hole Nursery School. The community strongly feels that this closure consideration comes at the most inappropriate time, and the nursery should be given more time to try and resolve the deficit under non-pandemic circumstances. The community is rallying, the nursery is at their heart, and we know what a gem it is, and how it keeps our children safe, supported and happy, but I wonder if this has been heard by the council?

I am writing to formally object to the closure of Hetton le Hole Nursery School. My granddaughter currently attends this nursery school and her current needs are met exceptionally well there. Due to the variety of needs she has, which now include social and emotional needs, due to the ongoing pandemic I don't believe another setting can meet her needs as well as Hetton le Hole Nursery School.

Due to covid my daughter, a key worker, has worked throughout the pandemic and as a result my granddaughter has attended nursery as usual. This has allowed her to continue to socialise in a safe environment with familiar peers and staff and this has allowed her to continue to develop and socialise during this pandemic. I fear how bad the effects of the pandemic would have been on my granddaughter if she hadn't been able to continue attending nursery with such skilled staff and surrounded by familiarity. This fear stems from my observations of my granddaughter when she goes out for her daily walks or when she goes to the shops where unfamiliar people surround her. She is now extremely shy and when she becomes upset and overwhelmed by being in close proximity to others she clings to my daughter or myself and cries excessively as she is unable to cope and this can result in her vomiting if she becomes too overwhelmed. As you can imagine this is really upsetting to observe. Also when professionals have visited her in nursery she has shut down and refused to eat, speak or move and therefore consistency in her educational setting is very much needed. The impact on my granddaughters emotional well being, as well as her developmental delays have been compounded by the pandemic and familiarity with adults she knows in an environment she knows is what is needed, not additional upheaval. She will not cope emotionally with a change in nursery and therefore closing the nursery will severely impact her emotionally and in terms of her progress and this will disadvantage her.



Hetton le Hole Nursery School is the only outstanding nursery school in Hetton le Hole, where I live. The childcare which my granddaughter attends at the school is outstanding and there is no other outstanding nursery in Hetton. Children like my granddaughter already working at a disadvantage due to the pandemic should be given the very best start in life and therefore an outstanding nursery should not be closed and an alternative solution involving discussions with the nursery and stakeholders is needed.

The nursery is situated close to where I live - I do collections of my grand daughter from the nursery on the days she attends and by closing the nursery you would be effectively making my daily collections lengthier as the local nurseries are not outstanding, this would impact on my health and also my daughter financially as no other local nursery offers the same outstanding service and same flexibility in their service locally.

The nursery has a qualified SENDco who is an early years specialist and is able to support all children who have additional needs to make outstanding progress during their time at nursery.

Nursery Schools are required to provide high quality early education, led by specialist headteachers, and delivered by qualified teachers especially in deprived areas and to put parents and families at the centre of their work. DFE guidance (November 2019) stipulates that the decision-maker should give the greatest weight to responses from those stakeholders likely to be most directly affected by a proposal – especially parents of children at the affected school. The decision-makers are expected to adopt a presumption against the closure of maintained nursery schools. The pre consultation received 541 responses, in which 92% of those responding did not agree with plans to close the nursery.

The Council has not provided any Covid-19 relief funds to the despite having received many millions of pounds from central government. The Nursery has incurred £76,000 of Covid-19 losses this year, however despite this the closing deficit (in year) was £58,449. The nursery was unable to furlough staff due to them being council employees.

Funding decisions about Maintained Nursery Schools have not been made by parliament and the government is urging local authorities to hold off making decisions about their longer-term futures.

This proposal is based solely on budget issues when the DFE guidance states that maintained nursery schools should not be closed solely because of a deficit budget. In the consultation report it mentions further funds to be spent on ICT, furniture, and demolition, which is predicted to be in the region of £2-£12 million. The council will not clear the nursery deficit or provide adequate funding. How can this spending be justified when there is no financial support being provided to support the best Nursery in the area?

DFE guidance says that maintained nursery schools should not be closed solely because of a deficit budget. All reasons for this proposal are around financial aspects. Funding from the government and LA has not been sufficient and the leadership of the nursery have done all that they can to maintain a healthy budget. However, the council could have used a tiny proportion of the £4 million underspend from the last 3 years to remove the deficit and provide the support required.

I call on you to support our children and our community by keeping open Hetton Le Hole Nursery. It is the best provision and children excel in their care. This simply cannot close.

We are writing to you in support of the opposition to the proposed closure of Hetton le Hole Nursery.

We have a grandson who started attending the nursery in 2020 and now through your proposals he and many other children may be unable to do so. He is part way through his journey of understanding and learning at the nursery, and this has been due to the incredibly supportive, understanding and caring staff who as Grandparents we cannot rate highly enough. We view the nursery as a vital community resource.

Hetton-le-Hole Nursery offers our grandson all that he needs in his learning and development, and the nursery is the only early years and nursery that is graded as outstanding by Ofsted. No other local nursery can match the standard of the provision provided, or the number of places needed to continue supporting children and parents through the current Covid pandemic and

beyond. The nursery has continued to educate the children of parents who have had to continue working as key workers or to offer vital respite to those parents who also had other children at home during this difficult year. Continuation and familiar surroundings are vital to the children who go to Hetton le Hole Nursery.

Our grandson's parents both have full time employment, his father is a member of the armed forces, and it is important for him to know that his son's education is continuing in an outstanding nursery supported by dedicated and caring staff.

Despite having received millions of pounds from government, the Council has not provided any financial Covid support to the Nursery. What will happen to the trained staff who have studied for many years to be able to give the educational support and development that the children need if the nursery is to close?

Will they all be able to gain similar employment locally? Probably not. So, where does all that expertise and dedication go? And, how does that support local employment opportunities?

Our grandson has developed enormously since he has attended the nursery, and there were no plans for him to go elsewhere until he was of primary school age. Given this proposal, where is parental choice catered for?

The proposal is for the nursery to close this year and for the children to be educated in demountable classrooms until a new building is ready in 2022. To date I understand that the council have failed to share the financial comparisons for running the nursery until 2022 and the costs for temporary classrooms.

What risk assessments have the council taken in relation to asbestos in demountable classrooms and the additional money spent on reconfiguring the building, instead of investing in an already established, outstanding nursery?

The council is proposing to allocate in excess of £5 million on a new building. The consultation document also mentions further funds to be spent on ICT, furniture, and demolition, which may be in the region of £2million+, yet the Council will not provide adequate funding to the nursery and does not seem to have worked effectively with the Leaders and governors ( who have worked extremely hard to balance the budget in difficult circumstances) to develop a sustainable business plan. The Council has the resources to do this. This is not supporting the local community!

The main reason put forward for this closure is financial, yet the council seems to think it prudent to spend in excess of £5million on a new build nursery, however there is underspending in other areas of educational budgets.

Despite leaders being open to suggestions, the council has not proposed any alternatives to the Nursery to prevent its closure. Deprived areas such as Hetton le Hole need this much valued resource for young children and their families.

The council's current stance does not demonstrate investment in its local area or its people of today and tomorrow.

The pre consultation received 541 responses, in which 92% of those responding did not agree with plans to close the nursery.

The baby room provision is being lost and the flexibility of term time only element of the nursery will not be replicated at the primary school. This is vital to working parents. If government encourages nursery take up how can parents do this if places are at a premium? Does this create elitism, and if it does, how can a Labour led council condone this?

The local community have shown their fierce determination to save the nursery. Parents have put together a financial plan to improve the nursery's situation, however they have not been allowed to share this plan with the council. They have also raised funds of £3,000 in a very short time. The community must be allowed time to continue to try and turn this situation around before such a major proposal is considered.

There is a clear lack of consultation with the community and their proposals are being ignored. The voice of the local community must be heard to save this vital and much needed nursery.

My granddaughter attends the nursery as did I and my siblings in 50's and 60's.

When deciding to submit this it was difficult to decide what to say as there are many points I could make in support of the nursery such as :

**HISTORY AND COMMUNITY:** the nursery has been at the heart of our community since 1945 nurturing and feeding (yes feeding!) generations of our children through times of rationing after the

2nd World War and 2 miners strikes when some families had nothing ...and it's still feeding our children today with money from its own budget receiving no extra funding for food from the Local Authority ("LA") or Together For Children ("TFC") the funding for free School meals for nursery age children has been withdrawn! At a time when many families rely on food banks... what will happen to these children if the nursery closes?

**SUCCESS AND ACHIEVEMENT:** the staff have worked tirelessly over the last few years to achieve and maintain their Ofsted "Outstanding" rating sending our children off to primary school well prepared socially and academically for the years ahead ...surely this should be valued and celebrated ? Especially as they are the only nursery in the area to achieve this rating.

**ALTERNATIVE PROVISION:** The proposed new nursery at Hetton Primary is only going to have places for 2-4 year olds 9am -3pm term time only there is no mention of care for babies or before/after school or in school holidays which is not much use to working families therefore, forcing them to use the private sector.... once the private nursery in Hetton has the monopoly it will be free to increase its charges as it will have no credible competition and the LA will not be able to do any about it ...this will cause distress to many already struggling families trying to make ends meet.... and it could mean that the new proposed nursery becomes a "white elephant" that no one will use because it doesn't provide the care they need. The LA state that there is sufficient provision locally however, when I enquired with Eppleton Academy recently I was informed that they were not admitting any new nursery pupils at the moment. There are several new homes being built in the Broomhill, Eppleton, Hetton Downs areas with a second phase planned for Broomhill where are these children going go? The LA like to promote their "Walk/cycle to School" agenda but it's a long walk to Hetton Primary especially with a toddler!

**FINANCE:** Yes the nusery has a deficit this is due to years of underfunding and the fact that the LA granted planning permission for the private nursery to open in direct competition hanging its own provision and staff out to dry. Apparently there is a big underspend in the Early Years budget? Why is this? Why isn't the money been allocated appropriately as required by law? It can't be saved up to be used on other projects. Morally how can the LA justify closing such a valued local resource and loosing such hard working dedicated staff for such a small deficit when it is spending 42 million building the new City Hall when it would have only cost 5 million to repair and upgrade the existing Civic Centre? Seems wrong to me and to many others no doubt.

**IN CONCLUSION:** I would ask the Leader and Members to consider the points raised above. I know some of you may think my comments amount to nothing more than ancient history and sentiment but this affects our community and people's lives. No doubt at the end of the day everything comes downs to money but our children deserve the best start in life. I understand that If it turns out that the nursery must close the plan is to transfer the children to the new proposed provision at Hetton Primary surely therefore, this would constitute a "Transfer of Business" and and the planned new posts at Hetton Primary should be ring fenced to existing staff at the nursery as employment law requires. This would also provide continuity of care for the transferring children some of whom may be vulnerable and have complex special needs.

I am writing this email as an **objection** to the closure of Hetton Le Hole Nursery School.

To say that I am disappointed by the decisions being made by Sunderland City Council is an understatement. I personally feel that since the plans were effectively 'leaked', everything has been done and orchestrated in the most underhand manner. The fact that the Hetton Le Hole councillors were unaware of the proposed closure speaks volumes and I wholeheartedly believe that Sunderland City Council initially wanted to let this fly under the radar and get through public consultation without much backlash. I would like to draw your attention to my views regarding the potential closure of Hetton Le Hole Nursery School.

I felt the need to email my personal views due to both my children attending the nursery previously and now my niece and nephew attend.

I am saddened and dismayed at the actions that have been brought against the nursery.

At the time when my children required nursery care – I researched and visited several nurseries and came to the decision that Hetton Le Hole Nursery offered all the necessary provision for my children by a considerable margin (despite additional travel being required)

As a full time working parent it was essential that I was offered wraparound care and holiday cover where applicable. The nursery could not have been more accommodating to me and my family.

I am strongly against the closure for a multiple of reasons but the main being my second child required SEND support throughout his time there and the assistance and support we received was nothing short of outstanding. Nothing was too much trouble for Ruth and her excellent caring staff – I am 100% sure that he would not have received the multiple agency support so regularly and the same standard of care anywhere else. In fact nothing in the new proposals assures me that children and families in similar situations will receive anywhere near that level of care we did? Can this be guaranteed?

As far as my niece and nephew ( who attend currently) are concerned this closure will bring real disruption to them in an already very challenging and difficult 12 months – more disruption is the last thing children need. Again my brother chose this nursery due to my recommendation, it's outstanding Ofsted rating and it's flexibility to accommodate modern families where often 2 parents work fulltime. Can this need be accommodated elsewhere – when I researched it was a definite no. I feel this is a real step backwards for nursery care in the local area.

I also would note that the council have not supported the nursery in any form of relief funds due to the pandemic. From earlier zoom meetings I noted that the nursery has incurred over £70,000 of

Covid 19 losses – final year figures I believe were in excess of £50,000. Staff were also unable to being furloughed due to be categorised as council employees.

Should the new proposals go ahead I doubt whether the excellent skilled staff will be accommodated at Hetton Primary in new employment resulting in expertise lost in our local schools!

I would not have considered using Hetton Primary myself – especially as the children will not be benefiting from the outstanding staff currently at Hetton Le Hole Nursery and they will also be using demountable classrooms as the new build will not be ready intime – again a point I find staggering to say the least. £5 million invested on the new build yet we are debating a relatively low deficit in comparison. A huge effort has taken place to balance the accounts however regular budget cuts have made it impossible to have any financial stability. Restructures / cost cutting exercises were taking place whilst my youngest child attended. The deficit is not due to mismanagement of funds but funding decisions

I fail to see the reasoning behind closing the leading nursery in the area – which has consistently been praised for it's Ofsted achievements.

The nursery is at the centre of the town and has been for decades and it would be a travesty to see it closed

I look forward to a positive outcome for the nursery

When reading the response to the proposed closure I was struck by the high number of responses and the fact that an overwhelming majority of these disagreed with the proposed closure; there is a direct link between this and the standing the nursery school has in the community of Hetton-le-Hole; it is very important to the local community who understand the value of having such a high-quality school providing education and care for children from Birth to 4 years old in their locality.

There is substantial expertise in the staff who work in a maintained nursery school; the staff who work at Hetton-le -Hole are steeped in child development, understand in great detail the developmental pathways of our youngest children and give the children they are working with the best foundation and start to their educational journey. The government is committed to supporting Nursery Schools in England. They have repeatedly asked Local Authorities not to close nursery schools at the present time as they still finalising the way in which they are going to fund nursery schools in the future. The City of Sunderland Council could be moving to close Hetton-le-Hole only to be informed by central government that they have decided on a way to fund nursery schools which is individual to each school (and therefore will not impact on other nursery schools) and could be made at a level where a plan to reduce the deficit is achievable. **It is premature to close a maintained nursery school before this funding has been announced.**

As a resident of the City of Sunderland I would like to make the point that we should be cherishing all the maintained nursery schools that we have across the city. In my professional role, I have been a maintained nursery school Headteacher for several years, I have visited nursery schools in the UK and internationally. The maintained nursery school provision in Sunderland is a real beacon of the highest quality provision. When hosting a national conference for the organisation Early Education we were able to show delegates around the city's nursery schools; it was such a proud moment to be able to talk about our nursery schools as trailblazers and share the expertise the city has in early years. Sunderland's Nursery Schools are the jewel in the crown; they should be valued and utilised to their full potential, for example, as training and support hubs for the early years sector. Hetton-le-Hole Nursery School would be an integral part of this model and could support the development of others.

The country is going through a very difficult time at the moment; communities need support and places where they can go for help and reassurance; now is not the time to be closing an established maintained nursery school that is a valuable support network for parents and families from the local community.

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Dear members of the board for school organisation,

I write in objection to the closure of Hetton-Le-Hole Nursery School. Myself and my sister attended this nursery approximately 25 years ago, my nephew who has ASD attended this nursery school a few of years ago and made rapid gains in his speech and language development and social development which I feel he wouldn't have so promptly, in preparation for reception, without Hetton-le-Hole nursery schools early years educator's expertise. My Niece currently attends this nursery school and has developed even more independence, self-awareness, resilience, and good relationships as the nursery fosters personal, social and emotional development.

I conducted my Childhood and Early Years Master's degree research at Hetton-le-Hole Nursery School. I chose this setting as it is graded 'outstanding' and it had been a part of my family for generations. I focused my masters on how pedagogy based on child-initiated play helps promote children's development and part of my findings was that the outdoor space of this nursery promoted risk taking and real-life connections and had a free flow access between indoors and outdoors compared to another nursery I did research in which was located upstairs or had limited outdoor space. An outdoor environment offers space and therefore is particularly important to those children who learn their very best through active movement and learn predominantly through sensory and physical experiences. Not all children are lucky enough to attend such a well-equipped nursery with exciting and challenging outdoor areas.

To risk the loss of this setting through inadequate funding will have wide ranging societal ramifications as the maintained nursery school offers quality early education and care within a rather deprived area of high need. Publicly funded maintained nursery schools were designed to sit alongside children's centres in a marrying function addressing a national political commitment to eradicate poverty by 2020 (Solvason, Webb & Sutton-Tsang, 2020). The broader remit is that Hetton-Le-Hole Nursery School alleviates and mitigates the effects of disadvantage and poverty.

Pulling the rug from under the nursery during a pandemic adds insult to injury. This maintained nursery school has been the fourth emergency service. During the coronavirus pandemic Hetton-le-Hole Nursery School proved once again its value to our community, while many private settings were forced to close this nursery absorbed the additional pressure by remaining open for vulnerable children and key workers. The staff at Hetton-le-Hole nursery school want to give the most disadvantaged children the best start in life and are committed to providing a life changing start for children. They have seen families go through some terrible times especially during the pandemic but they were there along the way. It might have just been a smile in the morning or actually supporting and listening to parents needs in the evening at close of day. It's like building a house, we need to get the early years foundation stage right so that future learning isn't damaged.

Far from closing this nursery you should be deciding a future financial settlement and agree and implement a long-term formula for funding. Sunderland City Council needs to give money to buy specialist early years resources, for building maintenance, to provide even more training to already highly skilled staff and provide emergency funding for costs incurred due to covid19. Lose the nursery and you lose a vital part of economic infrastructure. There is also a fiscal value added by this nursery in supporting the learning of disadvantaged children experiencing SEND issues, families with preschool children in need or in crisis (Solvason, Webb & Sutton-Tsang, 2020).

A rational system would make best use of the highest quality provision that already exists for the most disadvantaged in need children as a beacon of good practice excellence for the sector as a whole, instead you are allowing our finest early years provision to be lost in the interest of short-term economic savings. Recognise and champion the history, accumulated knowledge and expertise contained in Hetton-le-Hole nursery school. The action to close the nursery during a pandemic is either unwarranted negligence or its an unknowledgeable oversight to see the nurseries excellence.

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Hi,

I am writing to you to **object** to the proposal to close Hetton-le-Hole Nursery School. The reasons for my objection are outlined below:

- The nursery is currently the only setting in Hetton-le-Hole which is graded outstanding. As a professional who also works in education, I appreciate the amount of work that goes into education of that quality. I can't believe that this proposal is even happening when teaching at this nursery was described as 'extremely strong'. To close this nursery would result in invaluable expertise and experienced and passionate educators being lost to Hetton-le-Hole, which in turn would impact families and the wider community. The quality of education must not matter to decision-makers.
- We are currently in the midst of a global pandemic, which has negatively affected everyone. The school has remained open to key workers, even during the most recent lockdown offering a place of security and continuity for children and parents. Why disrupt the staff and families lives more?
- I think it is terrible that the staff are losing their jobs during this time, where jobs are harder to come by. Ringfenced jobs were promised, and then taken away, so valuable expertise that those staff have are inevitably lost to the area. The staff have worked tirelessly to ensure that the children make outstanding progress from their individual starting points. Why close a nursery which has the children at the heart of everything they do?
- The pre-consultation showed that 92% of respondents did not agree with the council's proposal so why then did it go to the formal consultation? This shows the total disregard for the views of the community. The nursery is highly valued, and will continue to be!
- Parents have worked to fundraise for the school and this is now over £3000. They have formulated plans with leaders to help address the school's large deficit but these have not



been entertained by decision makers. Can the school not have extra time to turn this around before the decision for closure is made?

- The nursery has endured year on year budget cuts which have made it immensely difficult for it to operate and be financially stable. There have been restructures, and the Headteacher has taken on numerous roles in order to save money. Furthermore, the nursery received no Covid relief funding that was allocated from central government which I understand was in the range of millions. The nursery incurred £76,000 of losses due to COVID-19.

To summarise, I think it would be terrible to close this well established and successful nursery so quickly during these troubling times. The council should be trying to protect this nursery, it's families and the staff. This whole situation is very unsettling, and I hope that decision-makers will fully consider the views of the community before making a decision.

**Subject:** Response to the Proposed Closure of Hetton-le-Hole Nursery School

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To whom it may concern,

My name is Amy Brennan and I am currently employed as Senior Lead/ Designated Safeguarding Deputy at Hetton-le-Hole Nursery School. I am writing to you today to express my deepest sadness and objection to the formal proposal to close my school.

I started my time at Hetton-le-Hole Nursery School as a student in 2012 and was employed following my college placement. When I started as a student, my little boy was already attending Hetton Lyons Nursery School, where I had also volunteered previously to my placement at Hetton-le-Hole Nursery School. I quickly discovered that the education and care at Hetton-le-Hole Nursery School is second to none and from then on I chose to place my own son within Hetton-le-Hole Nursery School for holiday care. The care and education he received from the staff was outstanding. He loved his time there and still has many fond memories nine years on.

I must express the detrimental effect that this whole consultation process has had on not only my mental health but that of my son's too, worrying his mother is no longer going to have a job to provide for him. I am appalled that the Local Authority have railroaded this process through, despite being in the middle of a global pandemic. There has been very little consideration to staff, yet we are expected to carry on as normal, continuing our usual high standards of service. The staff's mental health has been overlooked completely by the

council and this is extremely disappointing. The communication from the council during this process has also been less than desirable. Is this the thanks we get as key workers continuing to provide an outstanding service to the community during the Covid-19 pandemic?

I am also planning to extend my family and I will be sending my child to Hetton-le-Hole Nursery School, as it is the only outstanding nursery in Hetton. My knowledge and expertise allow me to have a clear insight into the best possible care and education for my children, and unfortunately there is no other provision that will meet my expectations as a mother.

As a resident of Hetton, I am bitterly disappointed that the Local Authority are gunning to close an outstanding early years provision, which has been at the heart of the community for the last 76 years. The local community, parents, staff and the local Hetton Councillors have put their hearts and souls into saving our school and this is evident through the fantastic fund raising that has taken place lately. Over £3000 has been raised by the dedicated parents and community, and the petition against the closure of our nursery to date has 1,679 signatures. Does this sound like a nursery school the local community of Hetton want to lose? There also appears to have been a lack of consideration of the views of the community by the Local Authority. It clearly states in DfE guidance (November 2019) that decision makers should give the greatest weight from the stakeholders who are most directly affected by a proposal, especially parents of the affected school. Our pre-consultation response received 514 responses, 92% of which directly opposed the proposal. It appears like this pre-consultation was a box ticking exercise, with the views not fully considered. Why was the consultation taken to formal proceedings with such a high level of opposition? Are the views of the local community not valued?

Hetton-le-Hole Nursery School is the only early years provision that is graded as outstanding by Ofsted in Hetton-le-Hole. No other setting can currently match the standard of the provision provided, due to this. The Headteacher has extensive knowledge and I have witnessed first-hand the improvements that she has made since she took over the role. Her knowledge as a Special Education Needs and Disability Coordinator (SENDco) allows the best possible support and adaptations for children who have additional needs, to make outstanding progress during their time at Hetton-le-Hole Nursery School.

The children and parents who attend Hetton-le-Hole Nursery School have already suffered immensely as a result of the Covid-19 pandemic and absolutely do not need this type of upheaval. Some families have lost income by being furloughed, while others have lost their jobs completely during this pandemic. They do not need the added stress of losing the one consistent thing during the past year, their child's school. I can only begin to imagine how it must feel to be a parent who is possibly looking towards being forced out of their chosen educational setting. As a parent I would be heartbroken, not to mention how many little lives will be affected if the decision is made to close. Children have not seen many of their family members for over a year, aunts, uncles, cousins, grandparents, family friends included. They have spent every week day with us consistently over the past year. For many, we are the only adults outside of their home that they have seen and attending our nursery has been the only opportunity for children to socialise with other children. Our

nursery is their familiar. Hetton-le-Hole Nursery School is their constant. To them, we are their family and they are ours.

I understand the Local Authority have the view that the nursery school is not financially viable. However, the Local Authority has not provided any Covid-19 relief funds to the nursery despite having received many millions of pounds from central government. The nursery has incurred £76,000 of Covid-19 losses this year, however despite this; the closing deficit (in year) was £58,449. Staff were also unable to be furloughed due to us being council employees.

Alan Rowan stated in the first initial meeting with staff that this is, **“All about money.”** yet there is an underspend of over £4million in early years across the City of Sunderland. Why can't money from this underspend be put towards keeping an outstanding provision open? This money is the children's from central government, yet they have been deprived of it. Alan Rowan also explained about the new provision that was to be built at Hetton Primary and it was made extremely clear to staff that both proposals were very much done deals and would work hand-in-hand together.

Also in the first initial meeting, Alan Rowan stated that there would be, **“At least eight jobs.”** for staff from Hetton-le-Hole Nursery School at the new Hetton Primary provision and talked about slotting staff and 'TUPE' staff from the nursery straight to the new provision.

***The following information is taken from the Together for Children Organisational Change Policy September 2020:***

7.2 In most cases posts will be filled utilising slotting in and ring-fencing during a first round of recruitment:

- **Slotting in**, without the need to go through a recruitment process, shall apply where there has been no significant change in the duties and responsibilities of a post following restructuring and where the number of posts available is equal to or in excess of the number of existing post holders. To qualify for this treatment a post must be of the same grade before and after restructuring, with no other member having an accepted comparable claim to be considered for the post.
- **Ring-fencing** of applications for posts will apply where the previous structure contained posts that carried substantially the same duties and responsibilities but the number of staff exceeds the number of posts available in the new structure, or where there are similarities between old and new posts but with significant differences that do not make them suitable for slotting in.

### **Part 3 – TUPE**

#### **19 What is TUPE?**

**19.1 TUPE refers to the Transfer of Undertakings (Protection of Employment) Regulations. The main purpose of the TUPE regulations is to preserve continuity of**

employment and to safeguard the employment rights of all employees whose employment transfers to another employer as a result of a relevant transfer e.g. a transfer to an academy trust as a result of a conversion of a maintained school or the transfer of catering staff to a new catering provider.

**19.2** The TUPE regulations were first introduced in 1981 to protect workers involved in transfers. They were introduced to comply with the European Community Directives covering the transfer of employees. The 1981 regulations were replaced in 2006 by the Transfer of Undertakings (Protection of Employment) Regulations 2006.

**19.3** The 2006 regulations were then supplemented in 2014, but not replaced, by 'The Collective Redundancies and Transfer of Undertakings (Protection of Employment) (Amendment) Regulations 2014. References to the "TUPE regulations" should therefore be taken as referring to both the main 2006 and supplementary 2014 regulations.

**19.4** The Regulations contain specific provisions to protect employees from dismissal before or after a relevant transfer.

**19.5** Representatives of affected employees have a right to be informed about a prospective transfer. They must also be consulted about any measures which the transferor or transferee employer envisages taking concerning the affected employees.

**19.6** The Regulations also place a duty on the current employer to provide information about the transferring workforce to the new employer no later than 28 days before the transfer occurs.

**20** When does TUPE apply?

**20.1** Subject to certain qualifying conditions, the TUPE regulations apply:

- (a) when a business or undertaking, or part of one, is transferred to a new employer;  
or
- (b) when a 'service provision change' takes place (for example, where a contractor takes on a contract to provide a service for a client from another contractor).

These two circumstances are jointly categorised as 'relevant transfers'.

**20.2** Those employees employed immediately prior to the transfer will automatically transfer on their terms and conditions to the new employer under the TUPE regulations. The new employer takes over responsibility for the transferring employees and inherits most liabilities in relation to employment related matters. The transferring employees retain their continuity of service for the purpose of both statutory and contractual employment rights.

Since then, staff have been told they cannot TUPE across to Hetton Primary, but jobs will be ring-fenced to us. Staff have been constantly fed sporadic numbers of jobs available for 'ring-fencing' at the new provision at Hetton Primary, starting from eight available jobs, to five, back to eight and then more recently three, which is including a teacher position, meaning only two available positions for nursery practitioners. This is somewhat different from the eight positions Alan Rowan had pledged to staff. However, despite being provided with this information, during the Hetton Primary cabinet meeting on Thursday 11<sup>th</sup> March 2021, Nichola Hill (Headteacher) implied that there are in-fact no jobs to be ring-fenced as she has a staff which are qualified to work in their new provision. If there is an opportunity for limited staff to gain employment at Hetton Primary, it will not be all, especially the leaders at Hetton-le-Hole Nursery School, so expertise will be lost.

The DFE guidance states that maintained nursery schools should not be closed solely because of a deficit budget position. If this is the case, why are our Local Authority proposing to close our nursery because of a deficit position?

Beatrice Merrick, the Chief Executive of Early Education, and a consultant working with the DFE, who is in regular contact with the Sunderland Nursery Headteacher Group, has stated:

***“Government has made a clear commitment to continued funding, so although there has been uncertainty from year to year for the last 4 years, going forward there should be confidence that there will be additional funding for maintained nursery schools as an integral part of the funding formula. I am speaking to the DfE lead on nursery school funding tomorrow afternoon and will find out then whether they expect to make an announcement before Christmas or whether this will be in January, but we do expect significant change in how the funding will be distributed from 2021-22 to address the historic inequalities, and this has the potential to help Sunderland as a historically less well funded LA.”***

It is my understanding that the Local Authority is allocating in excess of £5 million on a new build. However, it is states in the consultation report that there are further funds which will required to cover ICT, furniture and demolition. Why not utilise the current nursery building, which is already established? This is estimated to be in the region of £2-£12million. I find it very hard to believe that a deficit could not be cleared by the council, but millions of pounds can be spent on the new build. The leaders and governors have worked hard to balance the budget, albeit in very difficult circumstances.

I have learned that there is asbestos in Hetton Primary and this is a concern. Furthermore, the idea of children being taught in demountable classrooms is worrying especially when it is for a full academic year. Furthermore, the council hasn't yet shared their financial comparisons for running the nursery until 2022 and the costings for temporary classrooms.

Maintained Nursery Schools are required to provide high quality early years education. This is lead by specialist headteachers, qualified teachers and early years educators. These schools tend to be in areas of deprivation and have a sole focus on families for their work.

Following the fall of Children's Centres due to funding cuts, Maintained Nursery Schools took up that role too. Surely we can't let those vulnerable families down by closing the nursery too.

Why is Hetton-le-Hole Nursery being singled out in this proposal? The implications of the Early Years funding formula are now having an impact across the wider Maintained Nursery School sector. It is detailed in financial Benchmarking data that in the last two years that the amount of Maintained Nursery Schools in Sunderland ending the year with a deficit is on the increase. In 2018-19 four out of eight ended the year with a deficit in-year balance, and in 2019-20 this increased to five out of eight. Funding reserves are continuing to diminish and Maintained Nursery Schools are enduring funding shortfalls each year. This is most certainly very concerning. Any decisions made by the Local Authority regarding the closure of Hetton-le-Hole Nursery School is likely to be premature, and a resulting closure of the Nursery school would lead to lack of sufficient high-quality early years education in the Hetton-le-Hole area.

Within government guidance for opening and closing maintained schools it is made clear that the case for closure needs to be strong for the proposal for closing a Maintained Nursery School. The proposer should:

1. plans to develop alternative early years provision clearly demonstrating that it will be at least equal in quantity and quality to the provision provided by the nursery school with no loss of expertise and specialism; and
2. the replacement provision is more accessible and more convenient for local parents.

I feel like proposal does not meet either of these points. There are no other Ofsted outstanding provisions in Hetton, therefore equal provision of quantity and quality is impossible. The loss of the Baby Room further contributes to this and due to the lack of posts available for the leaders of this provision, the expertise is undoubtedly lost. Parents have spoken on numerous occasions about their safety concerns, particularly Moorsley Road, and that the new provision at Hetton Primary is not accessible to them. As a resident of Hetton, who will be directly affected by the increase in traffic, I can fully appreciate how this is a concern for parents.

In summary, as a mother, member of the community and as a member of the outstanding team at Hetton-le-Hole Nursery School, I am in objection, and would urge the Local Authority to reconsider their proposal.

I am saddened to learn that Sunderland City Council propose this Ofsted rated Outstanding Early Years Setting, more so because whilst we are mid pandemic.

My daughter attends currently and my elder son previously. My daughter enjoys and learns each day at nursery whilst my son benefited from the SEN expertise greatly, following being diagnosed with Autism Spectrum Disorder. I cannot understand why SCC would wish to remove an outstanding education setting from our children and offer alternative arrangements at Hetton Primary new build in the form of temporary porta cabins. Parents will be forced to choose between this or other

private nurseries in Hetton which are not required to have in place Head Teacher, Teacher, SENCO nor be subject to the same rigorous Ofsted inspections that maintained nursery schools are. Expertise will be lost.

I am appalled to learn that SCC has an underspend of £4 million yet cite financial deficit as reasoning to propose Hetton-le-Hole Nursery. The Nursery has been loved by children and families since 1945 and the nursery is irreplaceable.

DfE guidance states that it should be presumed that proposers would favour not closing maintained nursery schools also that reason for closure should not be solely due to financial deficit. It also states that an alternative that is more accessible and convenient and there should be no loss of expertise. I object on the basis also that these conditions are not met. Replacement is porta cabins at Hetton Primary which will lose expertise and will only cater for ages 2 plus thus losing baby provision.

SCC has failed to listen to stakeholders, closing pre consultant five days prior to scheduled finish thus taking away those days for the public to voice their views. Despite around 500 objections SCC ignored this and pushed through to final stages of consultation, ignoring the will of the people.

I urge you to overturn your decision to close, and instead to save Hetton-le-Hole Nursery School.


Dear Mr Rowan

I object to Sunderland City Councils proposal to close of the Ofsted rated Excellent Hetton le Hole Nursery School, which was established 75 years ago. I object on the following grounds:

1. Maintained nursery schools are required to provide high quality early education, led by specialist headteachers and delivered by qualified teachers especially in deprived areas and to put parents and families at the centre of their work. D of E guidance November 2019 states "The decision-maker should give the greatest weight to responses from those stakeholders likely to be most directly affected by a proposal – especially parents of children at the affected school. The decision-makers are expected to adopt a presumption against the closure of maintained nursery schools". This has not to have been complied with.
2. Sunderland City Council has permitted and encouraged unfair competition by allowing numerous private nurseries to undercut state schools by insisting that state schools are required to have higher qualified staff and meet the costs of being a school but only provide them with the same level of funding as private and voluntary providers. The Council is effectively privatising nursery education by the back door.
3. The Council has been derelict in its duties by not actively involving and discussing with the school, the school governors, residents, families and Hetton Town Council possible ways to overcome the difficulties of falling roll numbers and the associated reduction in income because of unfair competition permitted by them. It has been acknowledged in documented meetings that the financial vulnerability of the Nursery is not due to mismanagement of funds but due to the methodology behind the funding formula and the unavoidable costs associated with a Maintained Nursery School.

4. The Council has not provided any Covid-19 relief funds to the school despite having received many millions from central government. In total over the last three years there was an underspend of £4,014,000 for the Early Years Funding and Inclusion Funding. Why has additional funding not been provided for this nursery and other maintained nurseries to clear any outstanding deficits to ensure these much-needed nurseries are adequately funded.
5. The budget forecast is inaccurate. Toddlers are at 97% capacity and the baby room is in a similar position. Interest for enrolment for September 2021 is high. With Toddlers moving up this will allow more places for the this much in demand service. New developments close by such as Blossom Park (identified by SCC as a source for new intake) coupled with the nursery's other plans, as published in their recent power point presentation, are likely to increase numbers by at least 3 which would eliminate the projected deficit.
6. The Council referred to the uplift given to the nursery as the reason for at least one other school going into deficit while maintaining that all maintained nursery schools receive their additional financial support through an agreed formula. This is a deliberate distortion of the facts. In the funding year 2019-2020 five out of eight Maintained Nursery Schools ended the year with a deficit In-year balance.
7. Hetton Town Council believes on the grounds of physical, mental and emotional Health as well as Safety that it is inconceivable the Council is considering transferring these young and vulnerable children into temporary demountable classrooms for a period of up to 3 years and at the same time reconfiguring the asbestos ridden existing building. We have not been provided with the costings, but investigations would suggest that it will cost around £50,000 + Vat per year to rent them. We believe that this money should be allocated towards any deficits for the foreseeable future and during this interim period the Council should undertake proactive work with all interested parties to ensure the future success of Hetton le Hole Nursery school.
8. Hetton Town Council is concerned about the legality of the Council Cabinet taking the decision to move forward to a statutory consultation 5 days before the pre consultation closed as this did not permit all responses to be considered.

To whom it may concern.

We are writing as Head Teacher and Governors of Pennywell Early Years Centre in response to the formal consultation to close Hetton le Hole Nursery School.

It is of great concern that Sunderland Council members do not appreciate that all Nursery Schools are the jewel in the "Education Crown" of the LA and have longstanding OFSTED judgements at Outstanding and Good levels. They have provided the highest standards of education and care for children and families in areas of vulnerability and need for many years and have not faltered in their services to their communities throughout the pandemic.

At a time when the government are acknowledging the impact of the highest quality early education on improved life chances for children, it seems short sighted to close an outstanding provision which the community want to save. Additionally, as we emerge from the pandemic the need for the highest quality Early Years Provision, judged at the same level of expectation for schools not private providers, is needed to narrow the gap for the neediest children and continue to ensure that Sunderland's key workers are able to continue working.

We agree with the following points raised by Hetton le Hole Nursery School: -

- Hetton le Hole Nursery School is the only early years provision/nursery which is graded as outstanding by Ofsted within its locality. No other setting currently can match the standard of the provision provided.
- The nursery has a qualified SENCo who is an early years specialist and is able to support all children who have additional needs to make outstanding progress during their time at nursery.
- Other provisions are less accessible or have no places to accommodate the wide range of needs.
- Children and parents have suffered immensely as a result of the COVID pandemic and do not need this type of upheaval.
- Key-workers need support during this pandemic. They do not need to worry about the council closing their child's nursery.
- Children in nursery schools are less at risk during a COVID pandemic than those in a primary provision. The government re-opened nurseries long before primary schools so children had a smaller break in their education. The pandemic is still ongoing and there is a possibility that we may need to go into full lockdown again. All Sunderland Nursery Schools have remained open throughout and have managed their services very efficiently and safely.

- The council has not provided any COVID-19 relief funds, despite having received many millions of pounds from central government. Hetton le Hole Nursery has incurred £76,000 of COVID-19 losses this year, however despite this the closing deficit (in year) was £58,449. The nursery was unable to furlough staff due to them being council employees.
- Limited staff may have the opportunity to gain employment at Hetton Primary, but it will not be all, especially the leaders, so expertise will be lost.
- The council is allocating in excess of 5 million on a new build. In the consultation report it mentions further funds to be spent on ICT, furniture and demolition, which is predicted to be in the region of £2-£12 million. The council will not clear the nursery deficit or provide adequate funding. Leaders and governors have worked extremely hard to balance the budget in difficult circumstances.
- Year on year budget cuts have been made to the nursery funding, making it impossible for it to be financially stable. The leadership team have completed extensive restructures and the Head Teacher has taken on many roles to reduce costs and demonstrate a high level of efficiency.
- It has been acknowledged in documented meetings that the financial vulnerability of the Nursery is not due to mismanagement of funds but due to the methodology behind the funding formula and the unavoidable costs associated with a Maintained Nursery School.
- Funding decisions about Maintained Nursery Schools have not been made by parliament and the government is urging local authorities to hold off making decisions about their longer-term futures.
- The council are arguing that the nursery has a deficit of up to £200,000 that they do not have the capacity to clear and they cannot support financially moving forward. It is also reported that the nursery is de-stabilising the other maintained nurseries because of the lower contribution and higher outtake of the lump sum. The main reason put forward for this closure is financial, however there are significant underspends in both the Early Years Inclusion Funding and Pupil Funding budgets. The combined underspend in the last three years amounts is significant (Freedom of Information Act information)
- Such underspends have resulted in a direct impact on the budgets and survival of all of the Maintained Nursery Schools. The council could utilise those underspent funds to save the maintained nursery sector in Sunderland who are currently being disadvantaged by surplus funds not being used directly for the youngest children in the city.
- The local authority is yet to provide the governors or parents with alternative options that they have considered before planning a full closure. In discussion with the school and governors it was made clear there are no alternatives, despite leaders being open to suggestions.
- DfE guidance states that Maintained Nursery Schools should not be closed solely because of a deficit budget position.
- Nursery Schools are required to provide high quality early education, led by specialist Head Teachers and delivered by qualified teachers, especially in deprived areas and to put parents and families at the centre of their work. DfE guidance (November 2019) stipulates that the decision maker should give the greatest weight to responses from those stakeholders likely to be most directly affected by a proposal, especially parents of children at the affected school. The decision makers are expected to adopt a presumption against the closure of maintained nursery schools. The pre-consultation received 541 responses in which 92% of those responding did not agree with plans to close Hetton le Hole Nursery School.
- In the government guidance for opening and closing maintained schools it also makes it clear that proposers should be aware that decision makers are expected to adopt a presumption against the closure of maintained nursery schools. It states:

This does not mean that a maintained nursery school will never close, but that the case for closure of a maintained nursery school, the proposer should set out:

1. Plans to develop alternative early years provision clearly demonstrating that it will be at least equal in quantity and quality to the provision provided by the nursery school with no loss of expertise and specialism; and
2. The replacement provision is more accessible and more convenient for local parents.

There are several reasons why it is felt that the proposal does not meet either of these points. There are no other Ofsted rated outstanding provision in Hetton. The baby room provision is being lost and the flexibility of term time only element of the provision will not be replicated at the primary school. There are no opportunities for the highly qualified and specialist leaders to move across into the alternative provision, so specialisms will be lost. Parents feel that the accessibility is a safety concern and the alternative provision is not more convenient.

- The nursery is not alone in this financial vulnerability. The implication of the Early Years Funding formula is now impacting across the wider Maintained Nursery School sector. Financial Benchmarking data reveals that in the last two years the number of maintained nursery schools in Sunderland ending the year with a deficit balance is on the increase. In the funding year 2019-2020 five out of eight maintained nursery schools ended the year with a deficit in-year balance. Reserves are diminishing as maintained nursery schools are having to endure funding shortfalls each year, and this paints a bleak picture.
- Nursery schools are expected to operate in a competitive market without having the same freedoms as their private competitors. Sunderland City Council has permitted unfair competition by allowing a private nursery to open within 0.5 miles of Hetton Lyons Nursery School, will this have a similar effect on their fate?
- The plan allows the only Ofsted graded outstanding nursery in Hetton to be lost in the interest of short-term cost saving. The long term impact of the lump sum being shared amongst the other maintained nursery schools will be significant.

Every nursery school in the city has provided the highest level of education and care for its local community. Through the Partners in Pedagogy actions they have trained many students at degree and vocational levels to continue to provide the best for Sunderland's children into the future and provide employment for individuals within these communities which include training to further develop their skills. All North East universities and colleges acknowledge the quality of the placements provided for their students from each Nursery School.

We ask that you value their contribution for the whole city over many years and support their continuing existence.

We are proud of our unique contribution to the families of Sunderland and all nursery schools are embedded in Sunderland's educational heritage.

To whoever this may concern

I am writing on behalf of the Governing Board of Oxclose Community Nursery School in response to the open consultation for the proposed closure of Hetton-le-Hole Maintained Nursery School. From the information shared the proposal states the primary reason for the closure is financial, and the secondary reason being to safeguard the wider sufficiency in the area.

Sunderland City Council have stated a decreasing birth rate in the Hetton ward has led to the falling roll at Hetton le Hole Nursery School. However, it does not make sense that it has been agreed to open a 55 full time place nursery class in Hetton Primary School. Surely developing another provision on such a large scale in an area with a falling birth rate contradicts Sunderland City Councils decision making for the Hetton Ward.

Consultation information indicates if the Nursery School closes there will be a gap in the sufficiency for early years place in the Hetton Ward. Hence the development of a nursery class in the Hetton Primary School. It is unethical to deliberately close one school for the benefit of another.

Feedback from the consultation has indicated there is a preference in the area for maintained nursery school education over other early years providers. *The Well-being Future Generations Bill which makes provision for public bodies to act in the pursuit of the United Kingdom’s environmental, social, economic and cultural wellbeing by meeting wellbeing objects. states under point 7:*

**Wellbeing duty on public bodies: ways of working**

*In full filling its wellbeing duty under section 5(2), a public body must take account of the following.*

- (a) The importance of balancing short term needs with the need to safeguard the ability to meet long-term needs, especially where things done to meet short term needs may have a detrimental long-term effect;*
- (c) The importance of deploying resources to undertake long –term planning.*

# Oxclose Community Nursery School

There were 541 responses to the consultation from which 92% disagreed with the closure of the nursery school. This indicates a high number of residents in the Hetton ward value the impact the nursery school has on its community and its cultural background. There is a wellbeing duty on public bodies to safeguard the social and cultural wellbeing of its citizens. It appears there has been a disregard for the views of Hetton community.

Finance has been given as a reason for closing the Nursery School. The proposal states, 'despite additional financial support'. This point needs to be explained in more detail as it is misleading to those who will be making the decision of the future of the nursery. I am assuming the statement refers to the Lump Sum awarded to all maintained nursery schools from central government. This fund essentially supports the operational statutory duties placed on all maintained schools. The wording in the proposal infers this particular nursery school has received something extra and not their entitlement as part of the early years funding.

Using finance as a reason for closure goes against the advice of the DFE, Nursery Schools 'should not be closed purely on financial ground or deficit budget, if there is a need for places. Funding for Maintained Nursery School remains in a consultation period with Central Government, but it has been acknowledged there is the intention to fund in line with other maintained school formulas linked to the operational costs incurred by a maintained school. It is premature make a decision on the future of this nursery when not all of the facts have been gathered about the future funding.

Nursery schools have traditionally supported communities with a high level of services that have a significant impact on the outcomes for children. Alongside this they have a culture of social and community inclusion, that families embrace. The performance of this particular nursery school has to be commended, it has managed to maintain high levels of support, care and education despite significant long term under funding.

## Section B - EQUALITY ANALYSIS GUIDANCE - Assessing impacts on people

### Version 4: July 2015

#### Introduction

We want to make sure our services meet the needs of all our residents and that nobody is excluded by the decisions we make. Therefore we must actively consider the different needs and lifestyles of people within the city when we are delivering services, creating policies, making changes and making decisions. This makes good business sense because it makes services more effective and efficient. It also helps us to meet equality law by refining our services and proposals to prevent unintended negative impacts on particular groups. **Considering equality ensures decisions taken, policies implemented and services provided best meet the needs of *all* Sunderland's residents, now and in the future.** Ultimately it results in better decision-making and stronger outcomes.

This guide reflects the advice of the Equality and Human Rights Commission and explains how you can ensure you are adequately considering equality so that you can meet the requirements of the Equality Act 2010 and Public Sector Equality Duty. The guide explains:

## PART 1 – Legal Requirements

The **Equality Act 2010 bans unfair treatment** and **promotes equal opportunities** in the workplace and in wider society. It protects everyone from unfair treatment through covering **nine key protected characteristics**:

- age
- disability
- gender reassignment
- marriage and civil partnership
- pregnancy and maternity
- race
- religion or belief
- sex
- sexual orientation.

Protected characteristics are explained in more detail later in this guide. They are the grounds on which discrimination is unlawful. The Act defines discrimination as:

- **Direct discrimination:** when someone is treated less favourably than another person because of a protected characteristic. This includes discrimination by association or perception (i.e. because someone is linked with someone with the characteristic or they are wrongly presumed to have the characteristic)
- **Indirect discrimination:** when there is a rule, a policy or even a practice that applies to everyone but which particularly disadvantages people who share a particular protected characteristic.
- **Harassment:** This includes behaviour that might make people feel humiliated or degraded, even if it is not directed at someone. (E.g. if someone overhears racist or homophobic language)
- **Victimisation:** Treating someone badly because they have, for example, made or supported a complaint about discrimination

The Act also places the **Public Sector Equality Duty** on Local Authorities and other public bodies. The Duty requires public authorities, in the exercise of their functions, to have **‘due regard’**, (consciously think about) the three aims of the Duty:

- Eliminate discrimination, harassment and victimisation and any other conduct that is prohibited by or under the Act.
- Advance equality of opportunity between people who share a relevant protected characteristic and people who do not share it.

- Foster good relations between people who share a protected characteristic and those who do not share it.

The Equality Act explains that having **due regard** for advancing equality involves:

- Removing or minimising disadvantages suffered by people due to their protected characteristics.
- Taking steps to meet the needs of people with certain protected characteristics where these are different from the needs of other people.
- Encouraging people with certain protected characteristics to participate in public life or in other activities where their participation is disproportionately low.

This encourages public bodies to **understand how different people will be affected by their activities** so that policies and services are appropriate and accessible to all and meet different people's needs. This can **support and open up people's opportunities**, and help deliver **policies and services that are efficient and effective**. This means that **consideration of equality issues must, by law, influence the decisions reached by public bodies**.

Although the legislation does not state how the duty must be met, public authorities must have an adequate evidence base to demonstrate that they have gathered and considered adequate intelligence to allow them to pay 'due regard' to the aims of the Public Sector Equality Duty. In a large organisation like Sunderland City Council it is important that we can do this in a standardised and systematic way that would provide evidence to defend any potential legal challenge. **The way we do this in Sunderland City Council is through Equality Analysis.**

## PART 2 – Assessing Relevance

### When should you consider Equality?

Much of the Council's activity can have an impact on equality. Remember that this is about maximising the positive potential as well as minimising the negative. Analysis of the equality impact of your work should be an integral part of the decision-making process and a core service-improvement tool and should be carried out on:

- Policy and strategy development,
- Practices or activities,
- Decisions (including financial decisions regarding withdrawal of funding) and implementing decisions,
- Implementing policy developed by other organisations (e.g. Government departments),
- Service planning, assessments and reviews,
- To inform procurement and commissioning exercises.

However, it is important to consider the relevance of equality to your work before spending time carrying out any analysis of the equality impacts. It is highly likely that anything effecting service to people or that can affect future access or standards will be relevant. Examples may include changes to service delivery such as reduction, withdrawal or new ways of delivering. In some cases it may be immediately apparent that equality is less relevant (e.g. where it does not affect service delivery or employees). However in some cases it may need some further consideration to determine whether it is relevant.

**Consider the following questions to help you determine whether it is necessary to complete an Equality Analysis.** This is not intended to be an exhaustive list but it will help you to determine the equality relevance of what you are doing. It is likely that if you answer 'yes' to any of the following questions, you will need to analyse the equality impacts:

- Does the policy affect service users, employees or the wider community?  
Even if the policy affects a small number of people, consideration needs to be given to the level of impact. A large impact on a small number of people can sometimes be more significant than a smaller impact on many people.
- Is it likely to affect people with particular protected characteristics differently?
- Is it a major policy, significantly affecting how functions are delivered?
- Will the policy have a significant impact on how other organisations operate in terms of equality?
- Does the policy relate to functions that have been identified through engagement as being important to people with particular protected characteristics?

- Does the policy relate to an area with known inequalities?
- Does the policy relate to any equality objectives? This can include having an key impact on any of the city transformational priorities: Economy, Health and Well-Being, Education and Skills.

**If you decide that a policy is not relevant to equality, you should be confident of your reasons for this. The fact that 'no information is available' is not adequate to justify a decision that a policy is not relevant to equality.** Recording your reasons why a policy is not relevant will help you to increase transparency, encourage engagement and may assist in demonstrating compliance with the general equality duty. To aid with transparency Equality Analysis must be available to decision makers and therefore will usually be published as part of the cabinet papers.

## PART 3 – Equality Analysis

Everyone has a complex mix of protected and other characteristics which influence how they experience services and life more generally. Therefore they are impacted differently by what we do and what we change. We must **identify where we can improve what we do, or what we are planning, to mitigate any negative impact, maximise the positive outcomes and do more to advance equality of opportunity and promote good relations** between different groups of people. Equality Analysis is Sunderland Council's way of doing this. Regular completion of Equality Analysis will also help us to build a picture of the cumulative impacts of different decisions.

In addition to meeting the legal requirements, fully considering equality issues will help:

- evaluate and identify the likely impact of proposed changes on different parts of the community, different groups of service users or employees of the council,
- improve customer service and access through improved understanding and getting things right first time,
- manage demand through better customer service and by identifying and tackling issues early to stop them escalating,
- deliver efficient and effective services,
- improve satisfaction with Council services by providing excellent customer service,
- motivate the workforce,
- aid decision making,
- integrate equality and diversity considerations into the everyday business of the Council and aid service planning,
- improve the reputation of the Council as one which listens to all of its communities.

In addition to the advantages outlined above the Equality Analysis will also **provide a paper- trail of considerations to** create a record so that of adjustments made and how a conclusion was reached. This provides crucial information to decision-makers as they make choices on behalf of Sunderland. The Equality Analysis must be presented with any decision papers to **ensure decision makers have full information when making a decision. This is particularly important to comply with the law.** This becomes more crucial at a time when difficult decisions on the use of resources and future service delivery need to be made because we must be able to demonstrate the decision making was lawful if challenged.



## PART 4 – Maximising Benefits and Reducing the Risk of Legal Challenge

### Good intelligence makes a good Equality Analysis

Intelligence is about using data and information more effectively to improve decision making and lead to better outcomes. It is a result of the collation and analysis of a number of sources of information. All that we do should be intelligence led to ensure we are maximising efficiency, improving outcomes and making sound decisions. Therefore, equality information and understanding should be an element of this way of working.

To carry out successful equality analysis, requires:

- The views of a range of officers involved in service delivery who have a good understanding of the service
- The views of existing, potential and non- service users, from all backgrounds
- Population data
- Research intelligence
- Consideration of the equality impacts based on the data
- Development of ways to minimise the negative impacts and maximise potential benefits.

The collation, processing and analysis of the information is needed to develop a fuller picture of the potential groups of people who will be affected and how the proposals will impact on them. It will show which groups and individuals are particularly vulnerable to changes due to their reliance or heavy-use of a service, or where there is under-representation in the profile of users which could be increased. By considering these factors, investigating potential barriers and collating information where it is not already available, outcomes for all people in Sunderland will be improved. **A failure to gather relevant data and information, and analyse it to consider the equality impact, could lead to costly legal challenges for failing to comply with the Public Sector Equality Duty.**

### Good timing makes good Equality Analysis

Equality analysis begins **as soon as possible**, either before policy development starts or at the early stages of projects and review. When fully integrated into developing proposals and undertaken early in the process **equality analysis allows options to be revised to take account of the findings and decisions taken with full understanding of the potential impacts**. The gathering of information that is part of undertaking the analysis will also help to inform refinements to the aims, objectives or scope of the project. **The analysis is an on-going process not a one-off event**. It should develop alongside a piece of work and be a core part of data analysis and research.

Although completion of the template is important, this should be a by-product of an on-going process that results in an **action plan** to address gaps in knowledge, develop responses to the negative impacts and set out the performance management approach to monitor implementation and outcomes and a refined way forward

Case law demonstrates that it is not sufficient to carry out analysis at the end of the policy development process because:

- it may still be discriminatory or have adverse effects on particular groups
- opportunity to advance equality may be missed
- it is unlikely that you will be able to demonstrate you had due regard when the decisions were being made and may be left open to legal action.

### **The Risk of legal Challenge**

There are a number of challenges to public sector decisions that have been made using the Public Sector Equality Duty, or other relevant legislation that preceded the duty. It is important to remember that even if the decision has been made appropriately, if the required process has not been followed, then the decision making itself can be challenged. In essence the issues tend to relate to:

- Failure to start equality considerations early enough
- Failure to gather adequate information (including consultation)
- Failing to provide enough detail during consultation and engagement for the participants to make a rounded and intelligent response
- Failure to adequately analyse information gathered
- Failure to present information to decision-makers
- Failure to draw decision-makers attention to their equality duty

There are a number of cases where councils have been found to have breached the law and some cases where councils have been able defended their actions. More information about individual cases can be found on the Equality and Diversity Forum website

## PART 5 - How to carry out Equality Analysis

This equality analysis guidance and the associated template is designed to stimulate discussion by the team leading on developing proposals for decisions, new or revised policies and strategies or reviewing service delivery options. It does not seek to provide a checklist questions or categories to be 'ticked-off', but it is designed to ensure existing knowledge within the service, customer and service-user feedback, data and intelligence and consultation are **analysed to identify the potential impacts** on individuals and groups of individuals with particular characteristics. **Where this knowledge is not available, part of the process must be to gather it.** This guidance is designed to provide additional support and direction by highlighting some key questions for consideration. These questions should not be seen as exhaustive, they are not a series of questions to work through but rather a starting point to stimulate discussion. When undertaking the process, it is envisaged that additional questions will be considered and alternative perspectives added.

The next section provides a step-by-step guide to completing the template. It is broken down by section and provides some additional information about the sort of questions and broader areas that might be addressed. It is important to recognise that **the person making the decision or advising the decision maker needs to undertake the analysis.** This is a core part of policy-making.

### 1. Purpose and Scope

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This section of the assessment covers the broad rationale and intentions of the activity. It sets the **context and aims** of the proposal and any specific target audience. It is also where the sources of intelligence and information that have been used should be outlined.

- **Purpose** – Outline the decision to be made, policy to be developed or nature of the service. Think about the aims of the Duty and which protected characteristics it is most relevant to. Consider why it is being undertaken or proposed and why it is necessary, what the intended outcomes or benefits are and over what period the actions will be implemented and the outcomes have an impact. Also describe who or where the target for the intervention or decision is. This could be a specific group of people or organisations or a location such as a neighbourhood, individual ward, community or area of the city as well as the city as a whole. The impacts could also be wider than Sunderland and link to activities in other authorities. If this is a service review, you must state the 'as is' and 'to be' so that the changes are transparent.

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- **Information, analysis and intelligence** – Outline which sources of information and intelligence and have been used to inform the assessment and **provide a description of what the intelligence is telling you** about each of the protected characteristics or any other group which may be disadvantaged as a result of the decision. In this assessment it is important to remember the Council is required to give due regard to:
  - Eliminate unlawful discrimination, harassment and victimisation and other conduct prohibited by the Equality Act.
  - Advance equality of opportunity between people who share a protected characteristic and those who do not.
  - Foster good relations between people who share a protected characteristic and those who do not.

**Each of these aims must be considered in turn in relation to the protected characteristics (refer to appendix 1). The more detailed the description, the better your understanding will be of the issues.**

It is important that you have appropriate and reliable information to analyse because understanding the impact on different groups is a key step in identifying whether a policy, service or activity might unlawfully discriminate. This will also help to identify any gaps in data. You should collate and analyse information to give you as much intelligence relating to each of the protected characteristics as possible. Information can be found from a wide range of sources <http://www.sunderland.gov.uk/index.aspx?articleid=5745>. Information may include, but is not limited to:

- the Census and other statistical data to help you identify the numbers of people with different characteristics (available through the ONS and NOMIS) <http://www.sunderland.gov.uk/index.aspx?articleid=3331>
- knowledge of employees and partners
- the results of consultation and engagement with the public and the voluntary and community sector
- feedback, including comments, praise and complaints from customers, service-users and Councillors
- qualitative and quantitative research
- existing local service-reviews and planning reports
- research and examples from national, regional and local sources
- Joint Strategic Needs Assessments <http://www.sunderland.gov.uk/index.aspx?articleid=6789>
- Comparisons with other authorities or services
- Recommendations from inspectors and / or peer reviews

The analysis you need will be dependent on what your topic. However, the following are often useful questions to ask yourself (there will be others):

- Who wants, needs and uses the service? Does this differ for different groups?
- Who does not use the service? What are the barriers?
- Is the service easy to access for everyone? (This can include communications methods)
- Do outcomes, experiences or satisfaction differ between people with different protected characteristics?

- What are the key findings of any engagement you have undertaken? Can this be broken down by protected characteristics? If not, how will you ensure you understand the impact on all groups?
- Could any one particular group experience poorer quality of life or increased isolation due to this work?
- If there is a greater impact on one group is that consistent with the policy, commissioning or service aims?
- If the activity has negative impacts on one group, what action can be taken to mitigate it?
- Is any part of the policy, service or activity unlawful under the Equality Act 2010? (Could it lead to discrimination, indirect discrimination, harassment or victimisation, or does it fail to make an adjustment for disabled people?)
- Will the activity deliver practical benefits for particular groups?
- Are there any missed opportunities to advance equality of opportunity and foster good relations?
- Does anything else need to change to enable this policy, service or activity to be effective?

**You must be able to evidence your conclusions. For example, if you conclude that the activity will generally benefit all service users without any evidence to support this conclusion, it may make it difficult to demonstrate compliance with the Duty.**

### **Gaps in intelligence**

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In some cases there won't be enough data and information to analyse to lead to intelligence on all of the protected characteristics (data is often more sparse in relation to religion and belief, sexual orientation, marriage and civil partnership and gender identity and reassignment). In this section you should highlight where this is the case and consider whether efforts are needed to fill the gaps. This could be through focused consultation or specific research/engagement activity. If this is not possible in the short-term, consider how you can increase your understanding in the short-term before undertaking more robust research in the longer-term. It is vital that considerations are based on evidence, not assumptions. Any proposed action to mitigate knowledge gaps should be included in the action plan.

Analysis of data and information may also highlight which groups of people are not benefiting from the decision in the way that was anticipated. You should describe in this section which groups these are, and whether you will amend the proposed decision to ensure that the outcomes for the groups in question are positive one. This should also be reflected in the action plan.

### **Additional benefits/Other individuals or groups impacted on**

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Although not a statutory requirement in the Equality Act 2010 or Public Sector Equality Duty, there are a number of priorities for Sunderland which mean that wider equality considerations will need to be made if we are to meet the Council's objectives as well as its legal duties. There is recognition that some groups typically face more difficulties in accessing opportunities in life. Examples can include:

- People who have low incomes (specifically relevant when considering access to services and employment due to travel and child-care costs. There may be cumulative impacts of cost increases on large families)
- People who are physically isolated due to access to transport, cost of transport, locations, health or disability.
- People without access to a car or regular public transport (this can often be more relevant for women and disabled people)
- Ex-offenders
- Ex-armed forces
- Homeless people who may not have access to a home address or land-line
- Those without access to (and ability to use) technology for example internet/computers

You should consider and note how you can **maximise the positive impact and minimise the negative impact** on the City's Transformational Priorities for all of these groups, in addition to the protected characteristics. Some areas for consideration could be:

#### Economy

- Will the work support economic independence and help people out of poverty?
- Is there potential to create employment, particularly for groups who find it harder to access employment, or particular types of employment?
- Will your work have a negative impact on people with low incomes, and therefore make them further excluded?
- Could the work create or remove barriers to using the city centre? (e.g. making it more age-friendly)
- Could it negatively or positively affect businesses?
- Could there be a positive impact on housing choice?
- Could it have a positive impact on transport and connecting people to work, business and facilities?
- Will it reduce demand on the public sector? Will this be for all groups?
- Can it create diversity of events? Will these meet differing needs?

#### Education and Skills

- Is there potential to increase/share skills or training opportunities? Could this be focussed on particular groups? (E.g. Not in Employment, Education or Training - NEET)
- Could the voluntary sector be positively used to build skills for particular groups?
- Could traineeship or apprentice opportunities be created?

#### Health and Well-being

- Is there a way to reducing loneliness and isolation?

- Is it possible to build community relationships?
- How can active lifestyles be promoted to all groups?
- Could it encourage better and more flexible employers that will see people participating and staying in work because they are healthy?
- Can it support ways to help people ageing well and demanding less of the social care system because they are healthier

## 2. Summary of Impact on People

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The summary table is where the key findings from the analysis and interpretation of the data and information should be summarised. This must cover any expected or potential impacts for people within each protected characteristic. This must outline how the proposals will impact on an individual or group's ability to live a full, active and engaged life, or whether they disadvantage or further disadvantage individuals or groups with specific characteristics. As this provides a summary list of the impacts it is important that any conclusions are based on information which is clearly referenced. **It must be easy to see what data and information has been used to reach a decision or justify a statement, and it must be transparent for the public to scrutinise.**

The analysis should be approached with an awareness of the different ways in which practices, policies or decisions can disadvantage people.

- A **negative impact** can include direct discrimination, failure to make reasonable adjustments and unintended adverse impact (where people enjoy fewer opportunities experience barriers when seeking to access a service or unfair or negative treatment).
- A **neutral impact** would be if there were no noticeable harmful or less favourable effects. Remember that the same impact can have different significance for different groups. For example a universal service may be withdrawn but have a greater impact on disabled people because they are less able to access the alternatives. Where possible, consider whether a neutral impact can be made positive.
- A **positive impact** is where both intended and incidental positive impacts should be recorded.

The summary table is broken-down by the protected characteristics as outlined in the Equality Act 2010, this ensures that active consideration is given to each characteristic in the analysis, and provides space to list what the impacts are and whether they are positive, neutral or negative for that specific group. Each of the aims of the Equality Duty must be considered for each group.

## Action Plan and Monitoring

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Although the legislation does not stop you from making difficult decisions it must be noted that where equality considerations are significant, these would not be outweighed by financial decisions. The decision and rationale must be clear and transparent.

Broadly this can take the form of one of four options:

- **No major change:** The intelligence highlights no major concerns for any protected groups. Small changes to improve the outcomes may still be appropriate, and should be in the action plan, but they are not significant enough to change the approach.
- **Continue despite negative implications** – Although the analysis does suggest negative outcomes for one or more specific groups, they are relatively proportionate and cannot be avoided or mitigated. The overall outcome of the proposal or decision is also considered crucial or overwhelmingly positive. A clear rationale should be reflected in the equality analysis to demonstrate the considerations should the decision be challenged.
- **Adjust the policy/action/decision** – The analysis highlights one or more significant negative outcome in relation to one or more protected characteristics; however a single or a number of actions can be taken to adjust the proposal to reduce, prevent or mitigate negative outcomes whilst still achieving the overall objective. The action or actions should be outlined in the action plan.
- **Stop** - The analysis highlights one or more major problems with the proposal which has a serious impact on individuals with protected characteristics and which cannot be avoided. Therefore the policy or decision must be stopped from going any further. Retain the document with the analysis of your findings and your interpretation.

Your analysis should be comprehensive enough to inform discussions about how relatively small changes could be made to reduce or stop adverse impacts or unlawful conduct. This includes discrimination, harassment, victimisation or a failure to make reasonable adjustments for disabled people. The changes should be things that can easily be altered without the need for significant resources, such as altering a process, changing an application form, updating information. If bigger changes are needed these should also be included in the action plan so that formal agreement can be obtained to carry them out and for the resources needed to make the changes. Also consider whether there are adjustments that can be made to maximise the positive impacts.

When considering whether there is mitigating action which could be taken, consideration should be given to:

- Are there different ways of delivering the service?
- Could the service be promoted better with groups who are under-represented in the service?
- Could procedures be altered to make it easier for customers to access and use services?
- Could application forms and methods of requesting a service be altered to make them easier for the public?

### **Action Plan**

From these discussions you should develop an action plan to address the problems with the proposal, detailing who will be responsible for completing the task and when it will be completed by. In most cases this will be before the decision, change or policy takes effect.

The action plan must demonstrate:



- Action – what is to be achieved?
- Who – who will be responsible for completing it?
- When – when will the action be completed?
- Monitoring Arrangements - how will success be measured?

The action plan will form the basis for the activities that will be undertaken going forward. In some cases some of the actions may need to be carried out by people in other teams or even a different organisation. The progress with the action plan and expected outcomes needs to be monitored to make sure they are completed and have the intended impact. To do this performance measures need to be set out next to each action. These performance measures need to be specific, measurable, achievable, relevant and timely. **As a minimum there should be an action to monitor and review.**

### **What happens next?**

In order to support decision-making and transparency details of this assessment should be available for publishing. The duty to give due consideration includes making sure that equality analysis is shared with decision-makers so they can make informed decisions.

The completed equality analysis should be a **core part of the decision-making process** and as such should be **shared with those responsible for making the decision relating to the project**. As such, the **fully completed** equality analysis should accompany **all** Cabinet reports as part of the printed papers. It is not sufficient to provide a summary or for the document to be provided as a link. In addition, all equality analysis – whether being presented at Cabinet or otherwise – should be published on SharePoint, with the relevant document, i.e. policy, strategy, etc. appended within the document. <http://citypoint/equalityanalysis/default.aspx>. This supports transparency and the sharing of information and best practice within the Council. By building this library of information and analysis, better understanding and improved decision making about equality issues can be reached across the Council. Equality Analysis will be loaded from SharePoint onto our website to help meet our Public Sector Equality Duty.

The following sections provide further information about the protected characteristics, and highlight some of the issues that may stimulate questions. Whilst considering these it is important not to stereotype individuals or groups. Individuals can also face challenges posed by more than one protected characteristic, which should also be considered during the analysis.

### Protected Characteristics

**Age** – The type of service required and the way in which services are accessed varies by age. When considering age it is important to consider the impact on all age groups, but younger and older people often experience age-related inequality the most. It is also important to remember that in within older and younger groups there can be wide variations.

Sunderland aspires to be an all Age Friendly City which is barrier-free, designed for diversity, and is inclusive and cohesive - a city of choice for all generations. Age Friendly environments allow people to age well by staying active, connected and positively contributing to the economic, social, and cultural life in their community long into their old age. Age Friendly cities design and adapt their natural and built environment for residents of all ages and different capacities – accessible and safe road and transport infrastructure, barrier-free access to buildings and houses, and public seating and sanitary facilities, among others. Tools for information dissemination are adapted to cater to the capabilities and resources of all residents. Age Friendly cities can prevent and delay age-related illnesses through the provision of community support and health care services, enabling older people to maintain their health and independence for as long as possible. These support services benefit younger generations too.

This is a lifecourse approach that promotes positive ageing, however, in doing so it must also encourage people to take more control over their lives and to access opportunities to achieve an improved quality of life.

Age can broadly be broken into four categories:

- The First Age is characterised by dependence and education.
- The Second Age is characterised by maturity, independence and familial and social responsibility, broadly cover those in their 20s to retirement.
- The Third Age refers to people with good health and independence but lesser work responsibilities, this often includes those who have recently retired.
- The Fourth Age includes a graded increase in dependency which can be referred to as a Transitional Age, 70/80 age group and Older People (80+ age group). Within and across these groups there will be additional age-related impacts. For example those who are newly or

recently retired will face different impacts to those of the same age who are still working or more vulnerable older people. For this reason precise age-banded distinctions are unhelpful as individual's aging process varies greatly.

Some key considerations relating to age include:

- Is communication age-appropriate, for example tailored or in a specific format?
- Is parent/carer/advocate involvement necessary and been considered?
- Does, or can, the action improve trust and relationships between age groups?
- Are there any age-related disability or health concerns to be considered?
- Is access by different age groups impacted by changed hours of access? Would they feel safe attending alone?
- Will all age groups have access to the service, and could this be significantly reduced due to a lack of own income?
- Is a venue and environment physically accessible and age friendly e.g. with a buggy, public transport or walking/cycling?

**Disability** – Disability is a wide-ranging characteristic and the needs of different people with disabilities will be highly varied. It is therefore crucial to consider the specific impacts on people with different disabilities, and differing severities of disability. Conditions covered under the Equality Act can also change in severity over time and services must respond to an individual's changing needs. A person is considered to have a disability if he or she has, or has had, a physical or mental impairment which has a substantial and long-term adverse effect on their ability to carry out normal day to day activities. It includes recurring and progressive conditions and certain illnesses and conditions such as cancer and HIV. Disability can cover a range of mobility difficulties, lower manual dexterity or other physical disabilities, hearing impairments, visual impairments, learning disabilities, mental health conditions, communication difficulties, long-term health conditions of illness.

Some key considerations relating to disability include:

- Have 'reasonable adjustments' been made in accordance with the duty? This may mean changing the way services are delivered, providing extra equipment and / or the removal of barriers.
- Could any changes result in increased isolation for disabled people?
- Is the policy likely to affect people who have low incomes? It is important to recognise that disabled people often already face economic exclusion and so this could affect them more.
- Are the facilities to be used physically accessible to everyone? This includes both getting to and around a location and access to facilities within a location.
- Is information accessible? This may be affected by the media used, the format and how it is delivered?
- For some people stressful or new situations are particularly harmful. Will people who suffer from stress or anxiety be put off using the service or attending?

**Sex** - Sex equality relates to the impact on men and women and boys and girls. Analysis shows that men and women access different services and in different ways, and often take different roles in society. It is also important to recognise that there are some people whose biology differs from current cultural assumptions about what makes up 'male' and 'female'. These people are sometimes referred to as intersex. We need to ensure that someone isn't excluded from service provision or employment because they are taking on a traditional gender role:

Some key considerations for sex include:

- Are there any physical implications for the way a service is delivered? Think about whether there are likely to be any differences in the way a man and a woman might interact with the service.
- Could parenting or caring responsibilities impact on access or use of the service? Single parents can also face additional challenges.
- Is provision made for expectant or new mothers (breastfeeding, health and safety, rest and changing rooms)?
- Does access rely on having a car? In one-car households this can disadvantage a stay-at-home partner.

**Marriage and Civil Partnership** – Unlike other protected characteristics, the duty relating to marriage and civil partnership refers only to eliminating unlawful discrimination, harassment, victimisation and other prohibited conduct. This means ensuring that if a service or benefit applies to some people because they are married, civil partners must enjoy the same rights of access and fair treatment. Often simply recognising the increasingly wide range of relationships people have and respecting these will ensure that services are fair and respectful.

Some key considerations relating to marriage and civil partnership include:

- Does the service have anything specifically relating to marriage? If so, does this also cover civil partnerships?
- Does terminology reflect the wide range of relationships in society?

**Pregnancy and Maternity** – During a pregnancy and whilst caring for babies additional challenges and needs can lead to discrimination if these are not met, such as responses to breastfeeding, requests for maternity leave and flexible working patterns following the birth of a child. In general this will affect women. However, you may also want to consider how flexibility can also support all types of parents (e.g. fathers, adopters.)

**Race/Ethnicity** – refers to people defined by their colour, nationality (including citizenship), ethnic or national origins. In general this refers to people who do not identify as White British. It also covers Travellers and Gypsies, asylum seekers and refugees.

Some key considerations relating to race and ethnicity:

- Has culture been taken into consideration? Different cultures can interact in very different ways. This can influence face-to-face interaction (e.g. courtesy - handshaking, eye-contact, the presence of members of the opposite sex, diet, naming systems) as well as styles and timing of provision or access and the way information is shared or access promoted.
- Will any groups experience increased isolation or low trust and confidence because of previous negative experiences? A reluctance to access a service or raise concerns can be due to poor previous experiences with authorities either in the UK or abroad or a lack of appropriate service provision.
- Will anyone experience increased isolation due to a lack of support mechanisms? For example exclusion from community life or not having family nearby.
- Will those with a nomadic lifestyle be disadvantaged? Does provision require an 'address' or 'postcode'?
- Will those with language difficulties be disadvantaged? This could be further impacted by issues related to age.
- Do you understand enough about the roles different people play in different societies to understand impacts?

**Religion and Belief** – Religious or philosophical beliefs, including a lack of belief, affect life choices and influence what approaches will be appropriate to communicating or providing a service. This includes some more widely known about religions such as Christianity, Islam, Sikhism etc but also belief systems such as Humanism, or a lack of faith such as Atheism.

Some key considerations relating to religion and belief include:

- Is the terminology used correct or could it be insensitive?
- Will access to services be limited by religious obligations, such as attendance at formal worship services?
- If food is relevant, will appropriate diets be catered for, for example halal and kosher, vegetarian and vegan options? Different options should be kept separate and clearly labelled.
- Will uniforms provided or dress required allow religious dress codes to be met?
- Will access to places of worship or meeting be unduly affected by closures or restrictions, particularly relating to transport?

**Sexual Orientation** – A person's sexual orientation is usually defined as an attraction toward the same sex (lesbian/gay men and women/homosexual), the opposite sex (heterosexual) or to both sexes (bisexual). This is often shortened to Lesbian, Gay and Bisexual (LGB). Sexual orientation is one of the areas we tend to have less data on and so it can be more important to engage with LGB people to understand differing needs. Often barriers arise for LGB people when there is an assumption of heterosexuality. It may need to be made explicit that a service is accessible or it may need to be delivered differently to reflect family structures and relationships and maintain appropriate privacy.

Some key considerations relating to sexual orientation include:

- Are different types of relationships reflected? For example is language inclusive and not based upon an assumption partners are of the opposite sex.
- Is privacy maintained? Some lesbian, gay or bi-sexual people are not 'out' and arrangements, wherever possible, should not compromise privacy.
- Will take up be lower due to previous negative experiences?
- Can services be delivered in a way that does not assume nor require identity of sexual orientation?

**Gender Reassignment** – Gender reassignment covers those who intend to, are in the process of, or who have undergone gender reassignment (changing the biological sex they were born with) and who have or do experience gender dysphoria (where someone feels distressed because the body they were born with, or the sex they were assigned at birth, is not the same as their gender identity).

Trans is an umbrella term for people whose identity differs from what is typically associated with the sex they were assigned at birth. People under the trans umbrella may describe themselves using one or more of a wide variety of terms – including transgender. Non-binary is a term for people whose gender identities do not fit into the gender binary of male or female. A non-binary person might consider themselves to be neither male nor female, or to be in some sense both male and female, or to be sometimes male and sometimes female. People who identify as non-binary will sometimes prefer to refer to themselves using pronouns which are not gendered, for example 'they' or 'ze'. Ensure issues of gender identity are not confused with issues of sexual orientation.

Some key considerations for gender reassignment include:

- Do facilities such as changing areas provide privacy and allow for discretion? Is physical contact handled sensitively?
- Do processes and facilities ensure sensitivity and privacy if someone is under-going gender re-assignment?
- Does provision take into consideration personal safety and fear of crime? Fear of crime and victimisation can be high amongst transgendered people.
- Is single-sex provision necessary because combined provision would not be effective? For example in accommodation or support for victims of domestic violence.

**Multiple Protected Characteristics** – It is important to remember that most people have a number of the characteristics outlined above. This may mean that the barriers or issues they face are different or are multiple. For example, a lesbian, gay or bisexual person in their 20's may have a very different experience in relation to their sexual orientation to someone in their 60's or 70's because of the change in societal attitudes over time. There could be different issues again as a person ages further and long term health issues or disabilities may occur. For example, a carer not only needs to be sensitive to a person's health and personal needs, but also may need an understanding of personal

relationships, faith, culture and so on. Another example of the impact of multiple characteristics would be to consider the experiences of males and females in different cultural contexts and whether these may be different.
