DETERMINATION OF AN APPLICATION FOR A REVIEW OF PREMISES LICENCE UNDER SECTION 52 OF THE LICENSING ACT 2003

JOLLY POTTER, RAILWAY TERRACE, SOUTH HYLTON, SUNDERLAND

Punch Taverns Jubilee House Second Avenue Burton Upon Trent Staffordshire

1.0 PURPOSE OF REPORT

1.1 To consider an application for the review of a premises licence relating to the above-mentioned premises.

2.0 DESCRIPTION OF DECISION

2.1 Members are requested to consider the application and to take such steps as they consider necessary for the promotion of the licensing objectives.

3.0 INTRODUCTION/BACKGROUND

- 3.1 An application has been received from Northumbria Police under Section 51 of the Licensing Act 2003 applying for a review of the above premises licence on the grounds of the prevention of crime and disorder and public safety (see Appendix 1 for copy of the application).
- 3.2 In their application, Northumbria Police are requesting that Members remove the designated premises supervisor and amend the hours for the sale by retail of alcohol on Friday and Saturday to cease at 23.30 in order to allow patrons to finish their drinks and leave the premises by the closing time of 00.20.

4.0 CURRENT POSITION

- 4.1 Once such an application has been received, the Council, in its role as the Licensing Authority, must advertise on, at or near the premises the fact that a review is to take place and invite representations from both Responsible Authorities and Interested Parties. This notice was displayed at the premises for the statutory period of 28 days commencing on 19 November 2010.
- 4.2 Before determining the application the Council must hold a hearing to consider it and any relevant representations received. For Members' information, no relevant representations were received from either a Responsible Authority or an Interested Party.

5.0 REASONS FOR THE DECISION

5.1 To comply with the requirements of Section 52 of the Licensing Act 2003.

6.0 ALTERNATIVE OPTIONS

6.1 None submitted.

7.0 RELEVANT CONSIDERATIONS/CONSULTATIONS

7.1 For Members' information, the provisions of sections 11.16 to 11.22 of the Secretary of State's Guidance (powers of a licensing authority on the determination of a review) apply to this matter.

'The 2003 Act provides a range of powers for the Licensing Authority on determining a review that it may exercise where it considers them necessary for the promotion of the licensing objectives.

The Licensing Authority may decide that no action is necessary if it finds that the review does not require it to take any steps necessary to promote the licensing objectives. In addition, there is nothing to prevent a Licensing Authority issuing an informal warning to the licence holder and/or to recommend improvement within a particular period of time. It is expected that licensing authorities will regard such warnings as an important mechanism for ensuring that the licensing objectives are effectively promoted and that warnings should be issued in writing to the holder of the licence. However, where responsible authorities like the police or environmental health officers have already issued warnings requiring improvement – either orally or in writing – that have failed as part of their own stepped approach to concerns, licensing authorities should not merely repeat that approach.

Where the Licensing Authority considers that action under its statutory powers are necessary, it may take any of the following steps:

- to modify the conditions of the premises licence (which includes adding new conditions or any alteration or omission of an existing condition),for example, by reducing the hours of opening or by requiring door supervisors at particular times;
- to exclude a licensable activity from the scope of the licence, for example, to exclude the performance of live music or playing of recorded music (where it is not within the incidental live and recorded music exemption);
- to remove the designated premises supervisor, for example because they consider that the problems are the result of poor management;
- to suspend the licence for a period not exceeding three months;
- to revoke the licence.

In deciding which of these powers to invoke, it is expected that Licensing Authorities should so far as possible seek to establish the cause or causes of the concerns

which the representations identify. The remedial action taken should generally be directed at these causes and should always be no more than a necessary and proportionate response.

For example, Licensing Authorities should be alive to the possibility that the removal and replacement of the designated premises supervisor may be sufficient to remedy a problem where the cause of the identified problem directly relates to poor management decisions made by that individual.

Equally, it may emerge that poor management is a direct reflection of poor company practice or policy and the mere removal of the designated premises supervisor may be an inadequate response to the problems presented. Indeed, where subsequent review hearings are generated by representations, it should be rare merely to remove a succession of designated premises supervisors as this would be a clear indication of deeper problems which impact upon the licensing objectives.

Licensing Authorities should also note that modifications of conditions and exclusions of licensable activities may be imposed either permanently or for a temporary period of up to three months. Accordingly temporary changes or suspension of the licence for up to three months may be imposed. This could impact on the business holding the licence financially and would only be expected to be pursued as a necessary means of promoting the licensing objectives. Accordingly, a licence could be suspended for a weekend as a means of deterring the holder from allowing the problems that gave rise to the review to happen again. However, it will always be important that any detrimental financial impact that may result from a Licensing Authority's decision is necessary and proportionate to the promotion of the licensing objectives in the circumstances that gave rise to the application for a review.'

Operation Barracuda was launched by Northumbria Police in January 2010 to improve both the safety and feelings of safety, of residents, visitors and employees affected by, or involved in the night time economy within Sunderland. The intention to reduce crime and disorder and to tackle crime and anti social behaviour through early intervention, to prevent escalation to more serious crimes. Two teams of officers, of a Sergeant and five constables, were provided to carry out dedicated patrols and licensed premises visits.

As part of Operation Barracuda The Jolly Potter has been inspected on seven occasions. On each inspection there have been issues identified at the premises, a spreadsheet has been attached to this document detailing each individual inspection.

One of the main concerns relates to the safety of the public on the premises. On two occasions when Police arrived at the premises it appeared closed as all curtains were closed and the metal front door roller shutter was pulled down. On closer inspection music was heard coming from the premises. The roller shutter was prised up by the Police Officers and upon gaining entry customers were still inside. Whilst inside it was identified that fire exits were padlocked shut and the only door in use was a rear exit through the kitchen.

On all inspections breaches of licence have been identified, these issues have been



raised with the Premises Licence Holders Punch Taverns and copies of the letters sent have been attached. Four letters have been sent on 22 March 2010, 27 March 2010, 6 May 2010 and 21 September 2010, issues have still not been rectified. There also seems to be a issue with drugs use on the premises as on six of the visits cocaine has been found in the toilets, the DPS Ann Young and Elsie Young who has also been managing the premises and holds a personal licence, have both been informed.

It is evident that licensing breaches have not been attempted to be rectified and that the management of the premises take a blasé attitude to their responsibilities under the Licensing Act. In this instance the Police request that the Licensing committee;

- Remove the DPS
- Amend the hours for retail sale of alcohol on a Friday and Saturday to cease at 23:30hrs in order to allow patrons to finish their drinks and leave the premises by the closing time of 00:20hrs.

- 1. It is a condition of the Premises Licence that the standard opening hours for the day inspected are that the premises must close to the public at 00:20 hours, with last sale of alcohol at 00:00 hours. On Police arrival the premises appeared closed as all curtains were closed and the metal front door shutter was pulled half way down the door. On closer inspection loud music was heard coming from the premises, when the Police gained entry there were approximately 40 persons within the premises still consuming alcohol. The till roll for the evening was seized by officers which showed the last sale of alcohol at 01:48 hours, the personal licence holder on the premises Elsie YOUNG informed Officers that the till was 1 hour fast. This is therefore, potentially, a breach of Section 136 of the Act.
- 2. No fire extinguishers were at the premises and there was no first aid box in place.
- 3. Fire exits were blocked with chairs and fire exit doors were padlocked.
- 4. The customers at the premises were extremely intoxicated.
- 5. Evidence of cocaine use was found in both the male and female toilets.
- 6. The music coming from the premise was excessive.

I must advise you that officers from Northumbria Police will be inspecting the premises again and, should it be found that they are operating in breach of **any** of the requirements of the Act, we would be obliged to consider dealing with the matter in a less lenient fashion.

Licensing Act 2003 Inspection of The Jolly Potter, Railway Terrace, Sunderland.

Following the inspection of the above premises carried out at 00:20 hours on Saturday 4th September 2010 by officers of Northumbria Police the following matters have been identified as requiring your attention:-

- It is a condition of the Premises Licence that the standard opening hours for the day inspected are that the premises must close to the public at 00:20 hours, with last sale of alcohol at 00:00 hours. On Police arrival approximately 25 customers were still in the premises consuming alcohol. This is therefore, potentially, a breach of Section 136 of the Act.
- 2. Fire exits were blocked with access to the premises by the rear kitchen door.
- 3. Evidence of cocaine use was found in the toilets.
- 4. The customers at the premises were extremely intoxicated.
- 5. The DPS was unable to operate CCTV and could not show the Police on request any CCTV footage The DPS stated that the footage was retained for 10 days, not 28 days as per the premises licence. This is therefore, potentially, a breach of Section 136 of the Act.
