APPRENTICESHIPS AND T LEVEL QUALIFICATION UPDATE – SUNDERLAND COLLEGE

REPORT OF THE SCRUTINY AND MEMBERS' SUPPORT COORDINATOR

1. Purpose of the Report

1.1 To meet with representatives from Sunderland College in order to discuss the operation of apprenticeships in the city and the introduction of the T Level qualification.

2. Background

- 2.1 In setting its work programme for the year, the Committee agreed to include an update on the operation of apprenticeships in the city and the background to the introduction of the T Level qualification.
- 2.2 Mr Iain Nixon (Vice Principal Partnerships and Commercial) from Sunderland College will be in attendance to provide a presentation and answer questions.
- 2.3 Sunderland College is the largest provider of apprenticeships in the city and one of the largest in the region, offering around 40 apprenticeship programmes.

3 Current Position

- 3.1 Apprenticeships have a long history in the UK. In the past they were associated with so called "traditional" trades such construction, engineering and shipbuilding industries central to the local and regional economy. Nowadays apprenticeships reflect both traditional and newer emerging sectors in the economy including:
 - o mechanical and engineering
 - construction
 - creative and cultural
 - education
 - health and care
 - businesses services and digital
 - o tourism and retail
 - transport and logistics
- 3.2 An apprenticeship can be defined as a real job with training. As employees, apprentices earn a wage and work alongside experienced staff to gain job-specific skills. Most of the training is 'on the job' within the workplace. Off the job, usually on a day-release basis, apprentices receive training to work towards a nationally recognised qualification, provided by a local college or by a specialist learning provider.

- 3.3 T Levels offer students practical and knowledge-based learning at a school or college and on-the-job experience through an industry placement
- 3.4 T Levels are intended to be one of the main choices for students after GCSEs alongside:
 - apprenticeships for students who wish to learn a specific occupation 'on the job'
 - A levels for students who wish to continue academic education
 - other qualifications not served by A levels or T levels, including sport science, performing arts and small qualifications designed to be taken alongside A levels.
