WASHINGTON VILLAGE CONSERVATION AREA: CHARACTER APPRAISAL & MANAGEMENT STRATEGY

REPORT OF DIRECTOR OF DEVELOPMENT AND REGENERATION

Strategic Priorities: Attractive and Inclusive Corporate Improvement Objectives: CI101, CI104

1.0 Why has the report come to the Committee?

- 1.1 To advise Environmental and Planning Review Committee of the responses received following consultation on the draft version of the 'Washington Village Conservation Area Character Appraisal & Management Strategy' and to seek Committee's comments on the revised document.
- 1.2 The Committee's comments will be reported to Cabinet at its meeting on January 14th 2009 when approval will be sought to a recommendation to adopt the revised Washington Village Conservation Area Character Appraisal and Management Strategy as Formal Planning Guidance.

2.0 Background

- 2.1 The Planning (Listed Buildings and Conservation Areas) (LB&CA) Act 1990 defines Conservation Areas as "areas of special architectural and historic interest, the character and appearance of which it is desirable to preserve and enhance". The Act stipulates that Local Authorities are under a duty to formulate and publish proposals for the preservation and enhancement of their conservation areas.
- 2.2 The Council also has an obligation under the Unitary Development Plan (UDP) Policy B4 to produce supplementary guidance in the form of character appraisals for conservation areas in the City. This reflects national planning guidance in Planning Policy Guidance Note (PPG) 15 'Planning and the Historic Environment' which encourages Local Authorities to prepare detailed assessments of the special interest, character and appearance of their conservation areas. Such documents may also contain proposals for preserving and enhancing the character of a conservation area.
- 2.3 The Council's performance in preparing up-to-date character appraisals for its conservation areas is currently the subject of the heritage "Best Value Performance Indicator" (BV219). The purpose of BV219 is to monitor local authorities' performance in relation to Sections 71 and 72 of the above Act.
- 2.4 The Washington Village Character Appraisal and Management Strategy is the seventh in a series of such studies that will address all fourteen of the City's conservation areas. It fulfils the Council's duties and obligations under the Planning (LB & CA) Act 1990. It will also help to satisfy the above BVPI target for 2008/09.

3.0 Current Position

- 3.1 Washington Village Conservation Area is focussed upon the historic village of Washington. At the heart of the village is the green, a focal point at the crossroads of key historic routes through Washington and the former location of a medieval two-row settlement. Buildings of particular note in Washington Village include Washington Old Hall (seat of the Washington family of which George Washington was a descendent), Dame Margaret Hall and Holy Trinity Church. As with other conservation areas in the city, the integrity and character of the area is coming under increasing pressure from householder and commercial property alterations. The Council's planning powers allow it to exercise tight controls over works to Listed Buildings, however, its powers to conserve unlisted buildings and other features in the Conservation Area are limited.
- 3.2 A Character Appraisal and Management Strategy (CAMS), adopted as formal Planning Guidance, would strengthen the Council's policies for the Conservation Area and help to protect their best features, including historic buildings, significant green spaces and mature trees, from the potentially adverse effects of property alteration and new development.
- 3.3 The draft Washington Village CAMS follows the relevant guidance set out in the joint Office for the Deputy Prime Minister (ODPM) (now the Department for Communities and Local Government)/ English Heritage publications 'Guidance on conservation area appraisals' and 'Guidance on the management of conservation areas' (2006). Part 1 of the document, the 'Character Appraisal', identifies and appraises the characteristics and features that give the Conservation Area its special interest. Part 2, the 'Management Strategy', addresses in detail the issues raised in the Character Appraisal by establishing objectives and proposals to secure the future preservation and enhancement of the Conservation Area's special character.
- 3.4 The draft document has now been subject to public consultation. A range of organisations and interested parties have been consulted, including English Heritage, national and local heritage societies, local residents and businesses, local architects and Ward Councillors. Copies of the Study were available for viewing at the Civic Centre, Washington Green Library and the City Library. A public exhibition was also held at Washington Old Hall to discuss the Management Proposals.
- 3.5 The period of consultation expired on 10th October 2008 and the Character Appraisal and Management Strategy has now been modified in light of the representations received. A summary of the responses and modifications is given below.

4.0 Summary of Consultation Responses and Modifications

4.1 In all, 4 written representations have been received out of a total of over 280 consultation letters sent and 12 people attended the public exhibition, of which

none completed comments sheets, but notes were taken covering the main issues raised in the discussions. Three responses were received from local residents and one from English Heritage.

- 4.2 Various additions and amendments to the document's text and images have been made in light of the comments received (see appended schedule).
- 4.3 There was largely a high degree of support for the document from residents, who expressed much interest in and concern for the character and appearance of the Conservation Area.
- 4.4 The schedule attached to this report summarises the responses received and, where appropriate, the corresponding modifications made to the document. A summary list of external consultees is also appended. Copies of the final (revised) version of the Washington Village Conservation Area Character Appraisal and Management Strategy are available in the Members' library.

5. Recommendation

5.1 The Committee is invited to make comments on the Washington Village Conservation Area Character Appraisal and Management Strategy.
