Chairman's Welcome

The Chairman welcomed everyone to the meeting.

Apologies for Absence

Apologies for Absence were received on behalf of Councillors Emerson, Kay and McClennan together with Hazel Clark, Chris Marshall and Jen McKevitt

Declarations of Interest

Item 5 – Area Budgets Report

Councillor Marshall declared that she was a Council appointed Member of the Box Youth Project, she withdrew from the meeting during the consideration of the application for funding for the Box Youth Project.

Councillor Ball declared that she was a Council appointed Member of Ryhope Community Association, she withdrew from the meeting during the consideration of this application.

Councillor Scanlan declared that she was a Council appointed Member of St Mark's Community Association, she withdrew from the meeting during consideration of this application.

Councillors M. Dixon and Wood declared that they had attended meetings of the Friends of Backhouse Park and Friends of Barley Mow Park groups although they were not members of these groups.

Minutes of the Last Meeting of the Committee held on 5th October, 2015

Councillor Mordey referred to the seagull scheme in Mowbray Park; this was an important issue and he felt that there was a need for the feedback to be provided to the Committee. He acknowledged that the feedback had been considered by the Place Board however not all Members sat on the board. He asked that Marion Dixon be invited to the next meeting of the Committee to provide feedback on the matter.

1. RESOLVED that the minutes of the previous meeting held on 5th October, 2015 be confirmed and signed as a correct record.

VCS Area Network Progress Report

Paula Hunt delivered a verbal update on the work done by the VCS Network since the last Area Committee meeting. She advised that there had been 3 meetings held and each of the meetings had received a number of presentations. There had been no issues raised other than the Youth Zones which would be considered by the People Board.

The Chairman thanked Ms Hunt for her report and it was:-

2. RESOLVED that the VCS Network progress report be noted.

Northumbria Police Update

Inspector Jamie Southwell advised that he had contacted Durham Constabulary with regard to the Durham Coast Watch and had liaised with the officers and with Durham Heritage; there was a desire to expand the scheme to cover Sunderland and a meeting had been arranged to discuss this. He would be attending this meeting and would report back; he would find out where any funding required would come from.

Inspector Southwell then introduced the crime figures for the central area which covered the City Centre and Millfield. He advised that all crime had increased by 11 percent; this was the smallest increase in the force area and was in part due to changes in how crimes were recorded. It was due to these changes in recording that violent crime had increased by 49 percent.

Theft from motor vehicles had increased by 3 percent which was 4 additional crimes; there was still a problem with people not securing their vehicles or leaving valuables on display.

Burglaries from dwellings had reduced by 5 percent while there had been 40 fewer burglaries of properties other than dwellings; a reduction of 28 percent.

There had been 25 fewer shoplifting offences; all other areas within the force had seen an increase in shoplifting.

Antisocial behaviour had reduced by 227 incidents while there had been 72 fewer incidents of youth antisocial behaviour, a reduction of 23 percent.

He advised that the Frost Village had now opened and there had not been any issues; there had been a large crowd on opening night however it had been quiet the rest of the time due to the adverse weather conditions. The Christmas lights switch on had been a success; this was the second year in a row where there had not been any incidents.

For the East sector total crime had increased by 34 percent. Theft from motor vehicles had decreased by 25 percent which was 13 fewer crimes. Burglaries of dwellings had reduced by 2 percent; there had been a number of burglaries in the Long Streets area of Hendon however due to the amount of resources in the area at the moment there had not been any more burglaries. Burglaries of properties other than dwellings had reduced by 12 percent which was 8 fewer crimes.

Antisocial behaviour had reduced by 8 percent which was 48 fewer incidents; youth antisocial behaviour had reduced by 33 percent. There had been an increase in adult antisocial behaviour of 25 incidents.

The Chairman thanked Inspector Southwell for his presentation and it was:-

3. RESOLVED that the update from Northumbria Police be noted.

Tyne and Wear Fire and Rescue Service Update

Jeff Boath presented the update from Tyne and Wear Fire and Rescue Service. He advised that there had not been any deaths in the area as a result of fires. Deliberate fires were still an issue with there being a 50 percent increase in deliberate fires; these were mainly rubbish fires. The neighbourhood policing team had now moved into the central fire station. The new fire station at Marley Park had now been opened; although this station was not within the East Area it did mean that there were now more resources near to the East Area.

Councillor Price referred to the major incidents which had occurred recently including the major fire in Newcastle and the severe weather; he asked

whether there was any feedback on how these were managed. Mr Boath advised that the incidents had been well managed and that all of the resources had been made available.

Councillor Scanlan then asked where the rubbish fires were most likely to occur. Mr Boath advised that the issue was predominantly within Millfield; it was disappointing that there was still such an issue. The targeted response vehicles were doing proactive work and reporting dumped rubbish so that it could be removed.

The Chairman thanked Mr Boath for his report and it was:-

4. RESOLVED that the update from Tyne and Wear Fire and Rescue Service be noted.

East Sunderland Area Place Board Progress Report

The Chair of the East Sunderland Area Place Board submitted a report (copy circulated) which provided an update on the work of the Place Board against the priorities set out in the work plan for 2015/16.

(For copy report – see original minutes)

Councillor E. Gibson, Chair of the Place Board, introduced the report and advised that the work done by the board was summarised in paragraph 2.1 with the work plan included at annex 1. Maps of the cycle ways in the area would be circulated to Members. Councillor Mordey stated that the Cabinet would be receiving a report on cycle ways in the city centre which would look at improvements to the infrastructure and the installation of cycle racks. He thought that it would be good for the board to look at how cycle ways in the East Area could link into the facilities within the city centre.

5. RESOLVED that:-

- a. The Place Board work plan set out at Annex 1 be noted
- b. The development of an East Sunderland Cycle Way Strategic Plan be supported and endorsed
- c. Members support and promote the Make Waste Useful campaign within their communities
- d. The progress against the Highways Maintenance Programme 2016/17 be noted and a recommended list from the Place Board be brought to the March 2016 Area Committee meeting
- e. The progress against the work plan as set out in annex 2 be noted

East Sunderland Area People Board Progress Report

The Chairman of the East Sunderland Area People Board submitted a report (copy circulated) which provided the Committee with an update on the work of the People Board against the priorities set out in the work plan for 2015/16.

(For copy report – see original minutes)

Councillor Marshall, Chair of the People Board, introduced the report and advised that the work undertaken to date was set out in the work plan at annex 1 and also in the table set out in paragraph 2.1 of the report.

Councillor Mordey referred to the Holiday Hunger programme and stated that it did not look like the scheme had been successful when looking at the figures as only 90 children had been helped; the reality was that the scheme had been a success as these 90 children who had been helped were in real need; there was a need to look at how to market the scheme and target more families who are in need to ensure that there was a larger response next year. It was important to consider that people did not want to be seen to be taking hand-outs as this was damaging to their pride. He then referred to the self-harm figures which he felt were a real concern; it was important for people to be aware of the signs of self-harm to ensure that those who were self-harming were able to be identified and supported. There had been a lot of work done by Barclays Skills for Life and he felt that it would be beneficial to work alongside them.

Councillor English stated that a lot of options had been put to officers in relation to the Holiday Hunger programme by the Place Board and these would be incorporated into any future programme.

Paula Hunt advised that Washington Mind had been doing work on the Life Worth Living Toolkit, she felt that it was important to consider this toolkit as part of the work around understanding self-harm.

6. RESOLVED that:-

- a. The East Sunderland Area People Board Work Plan, as set out in annex 1, be noted
- b. The findings from the Holiday Hunger scheme and initial report on understanding self-harm be noted and further reports be received
- c. The progress against the Work Plan as set out at annex 2 be noted.

Area Budgets Report

The Head of Scrutiny and Area Arrangements submitted a report (copy circulated) which provided Members with the financial statement which detailed the current position on progress in relation to allocations of SIB and Community Chest funding and which sought Members approval of proposals for funding.

(For copy report – see original minutes)

Nicol Trueman presented the report and advised Members of the financial statements which were set out at paragraphs 2.1 and 3.1. There had been funds totalling £76,237 returned to the SIB budget and as such there was now £394,732 SIB funding remaining to be allocated. There were 14 requests for SIB funding totalling £162,156, as set out in section 2 of the report and at annex 1; should all of these requests be approved then there would be £232,576 remaining to be allocated.

Councillor Mordey commented that the Camping Exchange was a good scheme however he expressed concerns that the setup of the scheme was overly complex. Ms Trueman advised that the scheme would be managed by Reynolds outdoors store which would be maintaining all of the equipment as well as providing training in how to use the equipment. The voucher scheme was to allow one off access to schools which may not have participated otherwise; it was expected that the voucher scheme would help to increase participation levels.

Councillor M. Dixon referred to the improving housing standards for vulnerable people funding request and advised that the Health Housing and Adult Services Scrutiny Panel on which he sat was carrying out work on this matter; he felt that it would be useful for the Area Board to liaise with the scrutiny panel. Councillor Mordey added that a lot of people who lived in hostels found it difficult to access GP services. Ms Trueman advised that the project would help to improve links between tenants and GPs and would help to remove the barriers to accessing services.

Ms Trueman also advised the Committee of the 12 previously approved Community Chest applications which were set out in Annex 2 to the report. There was a remaining balance of £25,594.46 remaining to be allocated across the 5 wards.

Members then discussed the applications and it was:-

7. RESOLVED that:-

- a. The financial statements set out in sections 2 and 3 be noted.
- b. The 14 SIB funding requests totalling £162,156 as set out in Annex 1 be approved.
- c. The 12 Community Chest approvals from the 2015/16 budget as set out in Annex 2 be noted.

REPORT OF THE CHAIR OF THE EAST SUNDERLAND AREA COMMITTEE

East Sunderland Area Committee Annual Report 2015 / 2016

1 Purpose of Report

1.1 To approve the East Sunderland Area Committee's Annual Report as part of the combined Area Committee Annual Report 2015 / 2016 to be presented to Full Council.

2. Background

- 2.1 This will be the fifth year that all Area Committee reports have been brought together in one combined report and presented to Full Council.
- 2.2 Area Committees are appointed by the Council to ensure improved service delivery at a local level in the context of best value and more efficient, transparent and accountable decision making. They deliver this role through:
 - Monitoring the quality and effectiveness of services delivered by the Council and other main providers in the area.
 - Working in partnership to develop efficient and effective solutions to city-wide issues as well as supporting local area priorities.
- 2.3 2015 / 2016 has been an incredibly busy and challenging year for us all. The Annual Report for 2015 / 2016 showcases some of the key achievements delivered this year through the dedicated work of the five Area Committees and their supporting Place and People Area Boards. It also highlights how we translate the principles of a community leadership council in practice and the central role played by local councillors in helping to strengthen our communities.

3. Annual Report 2015-2016

- 3.2 It is important that the Annual Report is viewed as a collaborative achievement and the Area Committee would like to thank everyone who has contributed towards the outcomes achieved through the work of the Area Committees and the supporting Place and People Boards.

We have also awarded grants from our Community Chest budget to the value of £46,116 to 53 organisations. The average grant value is £870 (to update end of March)

Highlights

- 46 additional landlords signing up to Sunderland Councils accreditation scheme 268 additional properties accredited in East Sunderland
- 25 Healthy eating sessions delivered teaching over 150 young people how to cook meals with locally grown produce
- 15 community clean ups have been held across East Sunderland attended by local councillors and partners with over 300 volunteers helping to clean up their neighbourhoods
- 20 edible zones were planted to create a green route running through Doxford and Ryhope to encourage healthy eating
- Weekend of WW1 themed activities to commemorate Captain George Mailing's Victoria Cross (guided walk, football competition, theatre production)
- A range of activity has been held to encourage people to use green space e.g. 12 walks were held engaging with 60 residents incorporating photography sessions to raise interest in the local area resulting in an exhibition showcased in the museum and Winter Gardens; helping residents to improve their mental health with the Arts Studio teaching participants to make their own pinhole camera and process the images using traditional darkroom techniques 191 residents participated in the project and produced 426 images which were published in a booklet and exhibition
- Working with Family and Adult Community Learning to develop of an E-learning portal providing up to 5,000 East volunteers with access to a variety of e-training modules for free
- Partnership in Practice (PiP) programme was delivered, in partnership with East C.C.G. working to raise awareness of the signs of dementia and what support is available to access for individuals, families and carers. Work involved over 250 Dementia Friends being trained up, all East GP surgeries becoming dementia friendly, over 500 people participating in local activities and events to understand dementia further, and the pilot of a youth health champion scheme being delivered in the secondary schools to Y10 and Y11 pupils.
- Six 10 week B Active and B Fit courses completed by residents in sheltered accommodation to reduce social isolation and increase physical activity.
- 33 small grants awarded to VCS groups to reduce social isolation, engaging with 2,463 new people in the community
- 195 pupils, parents and staff accessing work related learning, careers education and guidance via U-Explore software
- 50 pupils receiving mentoring support including interview skills, employment research, action planning, numeracy skills, CV's, introduction to further education and money management
- 24 pupils participating in a programme using the Youth Award tool. All pupils gained accredited awards and accessed information, support and guidance in relation to their future employment pathway to enable them to make positive life choices.
- 45 pupils participating in team challenges which included cooking, health and beauty sessions, gardening.
- 120 pupils attended pre volunteering workshops to understand the effect that volunteering could have on their employability and how it can improve their CV's while helping others
- 15 young people who were not in education, employment or training were engaged with as part of a work ready project. 7 moved into permanent employment
- 30 people attended a guided walk exploring the history of the first World War and captain George Mailing VC.
- 8 football teams (aged between 10 and 13) took part in the inaugural George mailing Cup football tournament
- Over 750 Y6 and Y8 pupils have visited Safetyworks, an interactive safety centre in Newcastle to keep them safe on their streets.

REPORT OF THE CHAIR OF THE AREA PLACE BOARD

East Sunderland Area Place Board Progress Report

1 Purpose of Report

1.1 In June 2015 the Local Area Plan's priorities associated with Place were referred to the East Sunderland Area Place Board to action on behalf of the Area Committee. This report provides an update on the work plan, as set out in **Annex 1**.

2 Key Areas of Influence / Achievements

2.1 Outlined below is a summary of the key areas of influence / achievements of the East Sunderland Area Place Board up to 29 February 2016.

Actions	Outcome
Area Priority: 2 Develop stronger sustainable and well used community assets	In January 2016, the Area Board received an update from the Heritage Coast Partnership. The Partnership lead on the coastal path SIB work delivered during 2014 / 2015 which involved the installation of fourteen interpretation boards along England's coast path which runs through Ryhope and Hendon.
and facilities.	Following on from the coastal path project the Partnership has secured future funding from the Heritage Lottery Fund and the Community Foundation to connect coastal communities to their coastline by encouraging awareness and appreciation of the heritage within the coastal area.
	A Project Officer is located with Ryhope Community Association and is keen to hear from existing and new groups, who are interested in delivering a programme of community and partnership engagement which can deliver coastal education events, awareness raising and volunteering opportunities.

Area Priority: 2 Develop Stronger sustainable and well used community assets	In December 2015, members from the Area Board received a map of the East area cycle network, which indicates prospective routes for consideration as part of a future strategic cycle network plan.

	Overall the Area Board agreed that the principle of encouraging cycling is a priority. The Area Board were made aware of a pilot being delivered in the city centre. It was proposed that an evaluation of the pilot is carried out and reported back to a future meeting as there maybe pieces of work that could act as a catalyst to start elsewhere in the East, based on lessons learned.

Since September 2015 each area has approximately 90 staff across services who work as a team out in the community with this 2% of the population. East area team are located in Riverview Health Centre. It is proposed that Area Committee keep a watch and brief on how the Integrated Team progress in the area and receive future reports, where relevant. Area Priority: In February 2016, Area Board welcomed the newly appointed

Apart of their role is to work alongside the Area Board to consider how best to reduce demand on A&E services, with a specific focus on:

- i) Parents and carers of young children,
- ii) Black Minority Ethic (B.M.E.) community, and
- iii) Substance misuse users

The following points were discussed, under:

1. Parents and carers

- A new booklet has been designed and shared across all East G.P. practices, who will share the booklet with new parents / carers.
- The booklet covers advice and guidance around common childhood illnesses and how to access alternative urgent care services if they have concerns around their child's / families health.
- As well as targeting new parents, existing parents / carers will receive the information via the Immunisation Team.
- In addition to the booklet a 'starter' kit will complement the booklet consisting of items, such as, medicine, cream, thermometer.
- An 'app' aimed at people looking after young children, as well as those about to become parents has been produced by medical specialists. It gives easy-tounderstand guidance on common ailments affecting children, as well as advice on when and where to seek further treatment.
- As part of the Integrated Teams, training sessions on Common Childhood Illnesses will be rolled out across the city.
- Agreed to share contact details of the East Community Connector Hubs and Children Centre venues which could host these training sessions, if required.
- Recommend that £10,000 is aligned to enable quotes for publicity materials to be gathered for future consideration.
 The publicity materials will promote 'accessing alternative urgent care services' in the East area.

2. B.M.E. community

Further statistical information was required to see if there
was any data available which could identify which B.M.E.
communities were frequent flyers to A&E, along with an
analysis of trends.

3. Substance Misuse Users

- Changing Lives have had their homeless project extended for a further year, it was agreed to meet with representatives from the organisation to understand what there are delivering as part of their contract with the CCG, which could contribute towards future discussion around this topic.
- It is proposed to pool CCG and Council data sets relating to drug / alcohol misuse, ideally trying to identify trends relating to age groups and locations.
- It was noted that there is work on-going around the hostels via the Hostel Strategic Working Group, and the recently funded SIB project.

It was recognised that presently there are different work streams addressing substance misuse users. It was agreed to gather more detailed information and present a report back to Area Board before any recommendation is made to the Area Committee.

However, during the discussion it was acknowledged that within Doxford there are no health services available (GPs, pharmacies, optician, dentists, etc.) and concerns were expressed with the number of new housing developments scheduled for the ward that the existing provision in the neighbouring wards will not be able to cope with increased demand. It was agreed to seek the support of Area Committee in escalating the matter, via the Portfolio Holder, to the Clinic Commissioning Group to establish a dialogue to highlight concerns and consider, alongside planners and developers, how to enhance the infrastructure to attract health services into Doxford.

Work Plan 2015 / 2016 Review:

Following on from the December 2015 Area Committee approximately £200,000 SIB remained to be allocated with one Area Committee remaining.

SIB pipeline projects

In the New Year the Area Board reviewed their work plan to identify which area priorities where pending or needed further work carried out. During these discussions two SIB 'pipeline' projects were discussed, these included:

- i) Employment and Enterprise Support for people with learning disabilities and / or Autism, and
- ii) Social Action and Volunteering Programme (Doxford, Millfield and St Michaels)

It was recommended that further information was collated and shared with Area Committee as part of the budget report, as set out in item six.

Introduction and Background

- East Sunderland Area Committee are considering the possibility of establishing a Re-Use Network made up of East VCS organisations that can work together to collect, sort, reuse and up or down cycle unwanted household items.
- The creation of the Network would contribute towards the Council's bulky
 waste collection service by providing an alternative. The Area Committee
 want to see local people getting involved in its delivery, providing opportunities
 and access in developing traditional skills i.e. carpentry via up-cycling
 courses.

Applications will be considered from VCS groups who have a management committee, constitution and bank account with dual signatories. VCS groups must adhere to accounting requirements in accordance with the Companies Act.

Introduction and Background

- Sunderland East Area Committee identified the need to increase employment and enterprise opportunities for individual who reside in the East area who have learning disabilities and / or autism.
- A report submitted by Sunderland's Learning Disability Partnership Board, Employment Sub Group, outlined and recommended the need to provide better opportunities to gain employment or to develop an enterprise for people with Learning Disabilities and / or Autism.
- A partnership approaches to the programme will be prioritised.

Expected Outcomes

- Increase levels of employment and self-employment within the East Area of Sunderland with a minimum of thirty individuals who reside in the area, who have learning disabilities and / or autism, by:
 - Supporting to generate and develop ideas for a business and set up a micro enterprise.
 - Supporting to search and apply for vacancies, attend interviews and communicate with employers.
 - Provide initial on the job support for six months and outreach support for those who need it.
 - Support personal assistants to develop their ability to support someone in the workplace or to help them run a micro enterprise.

7. Reducing Holiday Hunger 2016

CALL FOR PROJECTS

Sunderland East Area Committee would like to invite local East based Voluntary and Community Sector (VCS) groups, public and statutory providers only, to submit a full application that will 'administer a holiday hunger scheme to approximately 870 households / 1,187 children (2015) who currently qualify for free school meals.'

Applications will be considered from VCS groups who have a management committee, constitution and bank account with dual signatories. VCS groups must adhere to accounting requirements in accordance with the Companies Act.

Introduction and Background

- Sunderland East Area Committee recognises that holiday hunger is a problem for families who normally receive free school meals. Providing those extra meals during school holidays can be a real struggle for many families. At this time, welfare changes are reducing income level, unemployment remains high and efficiencies to youth work and holiday provision adds to the burden.
- There is a real concern that some families will struggle to meet the costs of feeding their children during the holidays. Evidence also suggests that food banks experience a peak in demand during school holidays.
- The Area Committee want to support the area's most vulnerable families by providing supermarket vouchers for eligible families. Approximately 1,187 (2015) children who currently qualify for free school meals.
- It is proposed to offer a £10 voucher for each child during weeks four and five of the Summer holiday. The majority of the budget will be aligned to vouchers, with approximately a third available for the administration of the scheme.
- The project should have a lifetime of no more than three months from the date of approval.
- All beneficiaries of the project will be located or reside across the Sunderland East area.

Expected Outcomes

• Reduce child poverty and provide better services for people in poverty.
