- reconfiguration of services to establish young people's health advisors (sexual health, contraception, substance misuse and smoking) as part of integrated locality teams aligned to Targeted Youth

- well publicised and accessible emergency contraception and Options advice including the establishment of Options advisor to offer counselling and strengthen development of contraceptive plan
- convene Rapid Improvement Workshop to strengthen services for teenage parents including termination of pregnancy and services for young parents with a particular emphasis on support to
 prevent second and subsequent pregnancies and ensure improved outcomes fro teenage parents and their children across each of the five EcM outcome areas
