At the same time can I ask why it was stated it was of no cost to Washington residents when the cost was covered by Sunderland City Council, Sunderland Area Committee (SAC) and Crowdfunding (according to FOI), yet SAC receive their funds directly from the Council and the majority of Crowdfunding raised came from the Council also with less than £500 coming from individuals out of the £32,000 total. With all these financial constraints how is this money well spent? Is it not merely a vanity project from Silksworth Councillors?"

Keith Brown, a resident of Sunderland, has submitted the following question.

The planned new multi-storey car park in Holmeside is to be built on an extravagantly large site. Situated so close to the Museum and Winter Gardens it is a frivolous use of space within Sunderland's Cultural Centre.

It is an ideal place for a new National Glass Centre. A very small area could have reinforced concrete foundations for furnaces. All other, departments could easily be accommodated within a portion of this enormous footprint. The car park and entire area would be massively enhanced.

The council's intention is to regenerate Holmeside. With 265 new homes for several hundred people arriving just around the corner, increasing the cultural demand, why has this simple solution not been considered by Sunderland Council?
