1.4 Brief description of the activity:

Following significant resident consultation across the City of Sunderland utilising the Sunderland Council Resident Engagement Strategy Let's Talk Sunderland, five Area Plans (Coalfield, North, East, Washington, West) have been developed to ensure the priorities and action required, as highlighted by residents, are delivered within communities by the Council. Through the delivery of the Area Plans all services within the Council will now align their priorities and service specifications for the next 3 years to deliver the outcomes required.

Delivery of the Area Plans will be monitored through the five Area Committees. The five Area Plans replace the former Neighbourhood Investment Plans and remain Article 10 plans within the Sunderland City Council Constitution. The themes within each of the Area Plans directly support delivery of the three themes within the overarching City Plan – Smart Vibrant, Smart Healthy and Smart Dynamic.

The aspiration for the five Area Plans is that every resident in Sunderland will benefit from the delivery of the Plans. In addition, the plans will align services across areas to strengthen partnerships, enable co-production and grow community resilience.

The Neighbourhood Funding allocated to the five Area Committees annually can be utilised to support delivery of the plans, as well as add value to other potential funds available. All other outcomes will be delivered through the service programmes of Council services moving forward, which will be realigned, where feasible, to ensure delivery of the priorities within the five Area Plans.

NB. In relation to this Integrated Impact Assessment, no mitigating actions have been identified. Careful consideration has been given to the IIA however it must be acknowledged that the very nature of the plans is to create communities that are free from anti-social behaviour; where social isolation is minimised; and where everyone can be happy and healthy and feel a part of their community. The plans are designed to support all people including those with protected characteristics and other vulnerabilities. Where any barriers to individuals accessing a service are identified, these will removed in the most appropriate way. However, we recognise that whilst the council will make every effort to engage with all residents, some people do not want to be involved.

Through Network Meetings we have engaged with people from many protected groups, including veterans, BME Groups, Young People, Older People, people with disabilities, unemployed groups, etc.
