COMMUNITY ACTION IN SUNDERLAND WEST – PROGRESS REVIEW Work Plan 2010/11: Environmental and Street Scene Improvements, including Shopping Centres

- 1. Why has it come to Committee?
- 1.1 The report provides an update of outstanding issues from the 2009/10 work plan and shows progress against agreed actions in the current year's (2010/11) work plan, **Annex 1a**.
- 2. Work Plan 2010/11: Environmental and Street Scene Improvements, including Shopping Centres
- 2.1 Thorndale Road Shops: This work has been approved by the committee and Phase 1work has commenced after being approved, under the Emergency Funding Protocol, by the Deputy Chief Executive. These first phase works, following discussion with the Police, consist of initial clearance, ground works, shrub works and landscaping and pin kerbing to the fence side of the shopping parade. One fence has been removed and the other is to be re-painted and the pavement has received a deep clean. Phase 2 will consist of removal of the raised bed at the gable end, which will remove the 'hideaway', grassing and shrub planting, pin kerbing, pavement, kerb and barrier works. The final phase will consist of engaging with the shop owners to seek improvements to the shop frontages.
- 2.2 Pallion Road Shops: Whilst this work has been approved by the committee, final costings are awaited. The work to the shopping parade, and its environs, will consist of painting barriers and street furniture, kerb works and re-grassing of verges and 'worn' open spaces. Once this work is completed, owners of empty shops will be engaged regarding ensuring properties do not detract from the area and appropriate steps will be investigated to tackle irresponsible pavement trading.
- 2.3 Tree Planting Programme: This has been the subject of a presentation to committee and, as agreed, a Strategic Investment Plan application is being submitted to this meeting. The proposal is for an initial programme of planting starting from Premier Road and through Springwell to European Way. This would improve the environment and assist in tackling climate change issues. The application will be discussed as part of the Financial Report.
- 2.4 Future Actions: The development of the Green Space Strategy for the West will assist in prioritising environmental improvements and their future delivery. Consultation has begun on the strategy, which may lead to the development of localised 'master plans'. However, Members may wish to consider small scale improvements within neighbourhoods, that will compliment the emerging strategy.

Recommendation:

• Note the progress of the environmental improvements, as detailed in 2.1 and 2.2 and approve up to £30,000 of Strategic Investment Plan funding, subject to full appraisal and consultation, for the completion of the Pallion scheme and Phase 2 of Thorndale Close scheme.

- 1. Why has it come to Committee?
- 1.1 The report provides an update of outstanding issues from the 2009/10 work plan and shows progress against agreed actions in the current year's (2010/11) work plan, **Annex 1a**.
- 2. Work Plan 2010/11: Youth and Play
- 2.1 In September, an Officer from City Services presented a report on the Play and Urban Games Strategy (PUGS) 2007-2012 review. The report provided Committee with information on the performance management and achievements made since the introduction of the Strategy, for example, the percentage of children and young people with access to high quality play within 1km from their home increased from 19% to 70%. It also requested Committee to comment on the consultation framework and identify locations for future play development sites.
- 2.2 Since that time, work has progressed on developing play opportunities, with environmental improvements, in the agreed priority area of South Hylton and proposals are being developed, which involve the use of Section 106 funding with potential support from this committee.

Recommendation:

• Agree the further development of play site and environmental improvements in South Hylton and a possible application for funding to this committee.

1. Why has it come to Committee?

1.1 The report provides an update of outstanding issues from the 2009/10 work plan and shows progress against agreed actions in the current year's (2010/11) work plan, **Annex 1a**.

2. Work plan 2010/11: Traffic and Parking

- 2.1 At its last meeting the committee requested accident statistics for the area to assist it in determining its priorities. These are currently being compiled and will be available for the meeting
- 2.2 The committee requested a review of the provision of dropped kerbs and has been discussed at the Traffic and Parking Task and Finish Group and an update will be provided to the committee.
- 2.3 The committee also asked for further details, relating to costs, of a number of potential road safety schemes. These are:
 - Allendale Road. The provision of a raised pedestrian crossing to further slow traffic down at the main entrance to Farringdon Community Sports College. The project would also prohibit traffic from the blocking access to the College's entrance for emergency service vehicles. The scheme is estimated at £25,000.
 - Ettrick Grove. The provision of a chicane and 'build outs' at the junction and vicinity of Mount Road. The total cost of the scheme is estimated at £21,000.

Recommendation

- Note the updates to be provided.
- Agree the preparation of detailed schemes and funding applications, as referred to in 2.3.

- 1. Why has it come to Committee?
- 1.1 The report provides an update of outstanding issues from the 2009/10 work plan and shows progress against agreed actions in the current year's (2010/11) work plan, **Annex 1a**.
- 2. Work Plan 2010/11: Reducing Anti Social Behaviour (ASB) and Secondary Fires
- 2.1 At its last meeting, the committee approved the use of the Emergency Funding Protocols to support an application from Local Multi Agency Problem Solving Groups, of £41,108, for a multi agency ASB project.
- 2.2 Operation Freedom involves a team of two Police Constables, two Commmunity Safety Officers and a Council ASB Officer patrolling the key ASB locations across the entire Sunderland West area every evening for the first month to create an impact and then every Friday and Saturday evening between 5pm and 11pm. The operation is supported by Special Constables and duty resources when available.
- 2.3 This project is a new way of addressing ASB and crime in Sunderland West and involves a lot of joint working with the community, young people and a range of partner agencies. The project targets ASB geographically and includes prevention, intelligence, enforcement and reassurance tactics. Work is undertaken in relation to the sale and access of alcohol, for example confiscation of alcohool from young people, intelligence gathering and off licence checks.
- 2.4 The project will also improve engagement with youths in all wards of Sunderland West and seek to break down barriers between the young and older residents within communities. The funding is until March 31st and includes resources for additional youth work sessions, which will help to reinforce the positive messages of the initiative.

COMMUNITY ACTION IN SUNDERLAND WEST – PROGRESS REVIEWWork Plan 2010/11: Responsive Local Services (RLS)

1. Why has it come to Committee?

1.1 The report provides an update of outstanding issues from the 2009/10 work plan and shows progress against agreed actions in the current year's (2010/11) work plan, **Annex 1a**.

2. Work Plan 2010/11: Responsive Local Services

- 2.1 RLS is a method of area working designed to:
 - Increase levels of resident satisfaction through providing services that are responsive to community needs and effectively communicating improvements
 - Tailor services in recognition of differing area/locality circumstances either through local problem solving or adapting service standards
 - Recognise and enhance the community leadership role of elected members.

The current scope of RLS covers the service areas of Litter, Graffiti, Refuse, Grass Cutting and Dog Fouling. It also provides the opportunity for a wider range of issues to be considered within a context of local problem solving.

Service Requests

2.2 The tables below provide a view of the volume of service requests for the services in scope for August and September 2010.

What does the analysis tell us?

- 2.3 The most significant numbers of requests relate to both 'refuse and recycling' and 'rubbish and litter' which is reflected across all areas. This pattern is consistent with previous months and although the numbers regarding refuse are higher than others, when represented as a percentage of total bins collected (less than 0.01%), the service standard is being consistently applied.
- 2.4 The analysis regarding rubbish and litter relates to individual service requests. A further

analysis has been undertaken to identify any specific areas to consider. In this respect two areas have been identified – general littering in Pallion and street scene improvements to Thorney Close and Pallion shopping areas, both of which are being addressed.

- 2.5 The volume of requests has reduced in the highlighted areas from August to September. In respect of refuse this relates to the introduction of the blue bin scheme and the expected increase in customer queries during the transitional period. The high levels of garden refuse have also impacted upon service requests although this is a seasonal issue with an expected decrease in requests.
- 2.6 It is also clear that from the requests received, a high percentage are staff reported, demonstrating that our frontline staff are reporting and addressing these key issues before they become a problem for residents.

Extending the scope of the service

2.7 An analysis of all service requests and staff reported intelligence, not limited to the scope of RLS, has shown that service requests for enforcement (dumping of waste), noise and street lighting are also relatively high – refer to the tables below. In this respect it is recommended the scope of RLS be widened to include the three additional service areas.

2.8 The highlighted areas of the analysis are demonstrating a trend showing a reduction in service requests for the 'dumping of waste' from August – September. Although this is a positive trend the reasons for it occurring are not immediately apparent and further analysis is being undertaken in this respect. A specific example of enforcement activity in the West area to address the dumping of waste is detailed below:

Rheims Court – household waste.

Evidence found relating to the previous owner. The investigation is ongoing.

Intelligence group

- 2.9 A partnership group has been established to share information and intelligence relative to each Area Committee's geographical boundaries with a view to identify any service issues and interventions. The group consists of representatives from the Council, the Police and Gentoo who will meet prior to each area committee cycle. The first meeting of the group occurred in early October. Any significant issues identified by the group will be brought forward to Area Committees in a report that will explain the issue/s and also provide options for a service response. Members can then debate options and provide recommendations.
- 2.10 The main issue relating to the West Area, as discussed at the October Intelligence Group was the number of Customer Requests received to deal with Noise. A proposal to pilot an 'Out of Hours' Noise Service is currently being developed and will be further reported to Area Committee on 27 October 2010.

City Services: Area Response Managers

2.11 The new structure for Street Scene includes six Area Response Managers, one for each area of the City and one for the City Centre. It is anticipated that these will be appointed by December 2010. These Area Response Managers will lead locality based teams delivering Responsive Local Services that are aligned to local conditions and priorities. The Area Response Managers will work with the Area Committees, Area Officers, partners and residents to identify and tackle key issues.

Recognition for Action

2.12 There is now a dedicated section on the Council's intranet to enable staff to post good news stories which can be publicised to demonstrate that the council and partners are addressing local issues. In addition to a dedicated email address which is responsivelocalservices@sunderland.gov.uk, enabling staff to post stories for the media team to respond too and publicise as appropriate.

The Staff Reporting Line is also being used to report good news stories and the Communications Team are collating the stories to share with the media and include within the Community Newsletters.

Winter Maintenance

2.13 Following the severe weather experienced during the winter of 2009/2010 all Area Committees requested some additional information to be made available, for residents and members, regarding the approach to winter maintenance. In response, additional information has been prepared and is now available on the Sunderland.gov website via a dedicated 'Winter Maintenance' page which highlights the gritting routes and the location of salt/grit bins. In addition an article on Winter Maintenance will be included within the November issue of Sunrise.

Also additional training has been delivered to employees working in the Contact Centre in relation to winter maintenance services enquiries and the Street Scene winter maintenance teams are now able to communicate more effectively via mobile phones to coordinate activity and report any service issues.
