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Our Vision and Mission

Tyne and Wear Fire and Rescue Service have a Vision that will be achieved by providing the people of Tyne and Wear with the Services they need, to the highest possible standard:

- Vision Statement: "Creating the Safest Community"
- Our Mission will help us to secure this Vision: "To save life, reduce risk, provide humanitarian service and protect the environment"

Through the development of its Integrated Risk Management Plan (IRMP) and the Strategic Community Safety Plan (SCSP) the Authority identifies priorities to respond to the needs of its communities, staff and the environment we live in. In addition to these priorities all Fire and Rescue Authorities are measured against two National Indicators (NI's). Tyne and Wear Fire and Rescue Authority ensures that it achieves its corporate goals through implementing these priorities and measuring them to reflect the overall performance of the Service, as highlighted below:

Goal One: To prevent loss of life and injury from fires and other emergencies and promote community wellbeing

• Reduce the number of deliberate primary fires and secondary fires

The Authority aims to continue with the successful delivery of its initiatives and build on partnerships to further reduce such incidents. The Authority aims to achieve its Public Service Agreement target of a 10% reduction by 2010 based on our figure reported in 2001/02.

• Reduce the number of primary fires and related fatalities and non fatal casualties (excluding precautionary checks)

The Authority aims to reduce the number of deaths and injuries from related incidents and exceed the Public Service Agreement target of a 20% reduction in the number of accidental fire-related deaths in the home by 2010 based on our figure reported in 2001/02.

Goal Two: To respond appropriately to the risk

Respond to the challenge of climate change and take all necessary steps to protect the environment.

Through the development and implementation of indicators to measure the level of CO₂ emitted from fires the Authority will be able demonstrate its response to such incidents.

Goal Three: To plan and prepare for exceptional events

 Work in partnership with key stakeholders to prevent the incidence of fire and other emergencies to make strong, safe and prosperous communities

Through providing a high level of service the Authority is able to respond to risks and the demands of the community, this includes challenging potentially malicious calls and providing tailored support via the Home Safety Check procedure.

• Provide a modern, well managed service that delivers value for money.

The Authority has implemented a robust process of evaluation in order to ensure that all initiatives and projects are reviewed for the effectiveness and to demonstrate value for money and efficiency savings.

An introduction from your District Manager

As Group Manager for Newcastle it is my responsibility to ensure that the staff of the Community Fire Stations (CFS) in Newcastle provide the highest standards of service to the community we serve.

Newcastle is the most diverse district in the Tyne & Wear Fire Service area consisting of large amounts of residential property, ranging from isolated pockets of deprivation to substantial commercial and industrial premises. These include major hospitals, universities, a large indoor retail shopping complex, a variety of entertainment establishments, transport networks and other large typical city centre risks. However we are more than aware that people are most at risk from fire whilst they are in their own home, and as a district Newcastle has approximately 111,000 homes.

All of our 4 CFS located within the District work together and share resources to ensure that they effectively target the risks identified in our area. It is my belief that preventing a fire occurring in the first place is far better than dealing with the consequences of that fire.

The work we carry out is extremely diverse and includes:

• **Operational Response** - A large part of our role is responding to many different types of emergency incidents. Operational firefighters have an assortment of skills which allow them to react appropriately at any given incident. These incidents include fires, road traffic collisions and chemical release to name but a few. Within Newcastle we have firefighters that are also trained in Swift water rescue, Heavy Rescue, Aerial appliances and Command Support.

Operational firefighters also carry out other vital tasks to reduce the risk to the community of Newcastle. The delivery of Home Safety Checks is key to our goal of preventing loss of life from fires and other emergencies. This is a proactive approach to reducing the risk of a fire occurring in the home. Last year in Newcastle over 8,000 successful HSC were carried out.

• **Prevention and Education** - We have a dedicated P.E team based at Byker and Colby Court. Their primary focus is to educate the community of Newcastle as to the dangers of fire. These stations also include a Community Safety centre, boasting a 60 capacity auditorium with state of the art IT presentation capabilities, and a smaller meeting room. The entire facility has been designed to be fully accessible and hence, enable usage by all of our visitors.

• **Protection and Technical** - The department ensures that fire precautions standards are maintained in non-domestic premises by carrying out a program of risk based fire safety inspections, they also provide advice to educate business/commerce on fire safety issues and utilise enforcement action if and when deemed necessary.

• **Safety Works** - Is an interactive multi-agency safety centre, provided and led by Tyne and Wear Fire and Rescue Authority (TWFRA). Housed in a large open storage area which has been transformed to become an inner urban environment, including a house, street scene, metro and building site, the centre provides fully interactive, experiential activities for Tyne and Wear citizens of all ages, backgrounds and abilities.

• **Neighbourhood Fire Team** –They have a specific aim to drive down crimes such as arson and Anti Social Behaviour (ASB) fires making the city of Newcastle a safer place to live, work and visit. The Neighbourhood Fire team work closely with Northumbria Police and the Street Wardens ensuring the threat of ASB fires and arson is reduced.


Partnership - As a Service we are aware that the reduction of risk to our community can not be the responsibility of one agency; safety is enhanced by a multi agency approach. We work with a number of partner agencies including the Newcastle Partnership, Safe Newcastle, Northumbria Police, Street Wardens, and Your Homes Newcastle (YHN) to identify innovative ways to improve the safety of the people of Newcastle. This approach enables us to provide services tailored to the needs and risks of the local community we serve, thus striving for our vision of "Creating the Safest Community". Our Vision for the community will be achieved by providing the people of Newcastle with the services they need, to the highest possible standard.



What's a Priority at District Level?

In order to deliver the Authority's priorities and to focus on the specific risks within the district area a set of priorities have been established. Through measuring these priorities the Authority is able to monitor the performance of the district and demonstrate the success of the initiatives and partnerships within the area. The district priorities have been established by the District Managers and reflect not only the priorities of Tyne and Wear Fire and Rescue Service but also those of the Local Authority where appropriate.

The risk of incidents occurring within the Tyne and Wear area are factored in to the decision making process when priorities are being agreed and set at district and station level. The maps below clearly highlight the risk of incidents occurring in relation to the fire related National Indicators, the number of deliberate secondary fires (figure 1) and primary fires (figure 2) attended between April 2008 and March 2009.



In order to achieve the National Indicators set as service level priorities each one has been separated to enable each specific area to be monitored as a Local Indicator (LI) at district level. The table below clearly highlights the two National Indicators which are implemented at Service level and performance managed at district level. The performance and targets for these priorities are clearly highlighted within this District Plan.

How do we work with the Local Authority and other partners?

Since our districts were aligned with local authority boundaries we have actively sought to participate in the Newcastle Partnership by contributing to Newcastle 2021, the Sustainable Community Strategy, which outlines the key challenges facing the City of Newcastle. It sets out the vision, aims, and priority objectives that partners wish to work together to deliver in the coming years.

Newcastle's Local Area Agreement sets challenging improvement targets and describes what the Partnership will do to achieve them. We will make an active contribution to these national indicators:

• NI 141 Increased number of vulnerable people achieving independent living

With the agreement of T&WFRS policy Newcastle District will strive to support this measure by: Home Safety Checks (HSC) undertaken by our personnel will focus predominantly on vulnerable people. A minimum of 4,800 HSC will be carried out in 2009-10, making these residents safer in their own home. If necessary chip pans will be exchanged for deep fat fryers and fire retardant bedding may be issued.

A protocol with Community Care Alarm Services, YHN will ensure that we will train their mobile wardens to undertake HSC. Up to 6,500 HSC will be carried out by CCAS. A two way referral system has been put in place where individuals considered at high risk from fire will be referred to T&WFRS. We will refer individuals to CCAS if it is felt that they are vulnerable and would benefit from their services.

Individuals who are identified as suffering from hearing difficulties will either have a smoke alarm for the deaf fitted or be referred to Sensory support.

Referrals for persons at threat from domestic violence received from Newcastle Community Safety department will receive an enhanced HSC concentrating on the threat of arson as well as their own safety.

• NI 111 First time entrants into the youth justice system aged 10 – 17.

Working with partners and with agreement from the Service we will focus our resources towards this indicator, examples of where we support this measure include:

Phoenix Project - a scheme run at West Denton in partnership with Newcastle Youth Offending team. This scheme works with
young people who are known to be offending and those at risk of offending between the ages of 12 and 17. The main focus of
the course is to raise awareness of fire safety and anti social behaviour including deliberate firesetting. Life skills and direction are
provided enabling young people to become more responsible in their approach to citizenship and their own role in their community.

- FLAME A 2 day course for young BME. This course raises awareness of anti-social behaviour. It also encourages individuals to become more responsible in their approach to citizenship and their own role in their community.
- Fireteam a project ran in conjunction with Walbottle School which is based solely on teamwork and Fire Service ethos.
- Young Firefighter Association a scheme designed for young people between the ages of 11 and 17. It aims to provide personal development opportunities, self-discipline, develop leadership skills and a sense of citizenship. At present there are 3 branches in Newcastle at Byker, Colby Court and West Denton Community Fire Stations.
- Princes Trust A scheme run at Gosforth in partnership between the Fire Service and the Prince's Trust for 16-25 year olds that focuses on communication, motivation and teamwork.

NI 195 Improved Street and environmental cleanliness

We will support this indicator in partnership with other agencies in Newcastle

• The Neighbourhood Fire Team have a specific aim to drive down crimes such as arson and ASB fires, making the city of Newcastle a safer place to live, work and visit. We work closely with the Street Wardens and Northumbria Police in this area. The role of the Street Wardens is pivotal in the success of this strategy. They along with the other partners report and arrange removal of abandoned vehicles, fly tipping, and ensure empty premises are secured. This not only assists with the cleanliness of the City but also drives down ASB fires.

What's a Priority at Station level?

The table below highlights the relationship between the district priorities and those of the station. In order to achieve the Authority's vision and mission all districts and stations are expected to reduce the number of deaths and injuries as a priority. In addition to this each station is also designated individual priorities in order to address local risks and to achieve the overall district priorities. For example, as you can see from the table below Colby Court Community Fire Station has been challenged to reduce the number of

How is the District Performing?

Performance and Targets

In order to ensure that we provide an accurate and true reflection of the incidents attended in 2008/09 the information provided within this plan is based on validated data from April 2008 to March 2009.

Through the use of validated data we are also able to provide targets at Station level based on actual data rather than using unvalidated or forecasted data. As a result of this we are also able to provide examples of the effective prevention work carried out by the Prevention and Education Team and Arson Task Force Team against actual performance.

The following pages outline the improvement of each Performance Indicator at district and station level for 2006/07, 2007/08, 2008/09 and the district and stations targets set for 2008/09 and 2009/10.

In order to highlight the performance of the district and stations against its 2008/09 target we have used the following traffic light system throughout the plan:

- Green = Greater than or equal to target
- Amber = No more than 2.5% less than target
- Red = Less than 2.5% below target

The Authority sets its targets to reflect its priority of saving life, reducing risk, providing humanitarian services and to protect the environment. To ensure that these targets are effective it is important that they are applied appropriately to the risk at district and station level.

In order to tackle the issues within the district and station area the Authority generate targets based on the ratio of incident types attended by the individual stations. For example, a station who attends more false alarms than the majority of other stations will be expected to tackle that specific issue through the setting of a more challenging target.

The tables on the following pages highlight the performance of the district and stations in 2006/07, 2007/08, 2008/09, the targets the district and stations have been working towards in 2008/09 and the targets set for 2009/10.

Within the tables specific performance indicators have been highlighted, where the indicator has been highlighted these reflect a priority for the Service and where a District or Station has been highlighted this reflects a priority at that level. The initiatives being delivered relating to these priorities are featured later on within this plan.

Home Safety Checks

Home Safety Checks (HSC) underpin the preventative work carried out by the Service at district level. It is essential that the work undertaken by Districts is carefully targeted taking into account both national research and local intelligence.

As a service we look at a range of data; incident data, census data and other sources of information so that a risk map can be generated. The data collated in relation to the types of fires, the types of property affected, the number and nature of injuries, the gender and age profile of those injured or any fatalities as a result of the incidents that we attend is used to build up a picture of the risk within our community.

As a result a number of high priority groups have been identified throughout Tyne and Wear and will be targeted at district level, these include:

- Older people
- Children and young persons (including students)
- Black and Minority Ethnic (BME) Groups
- People with learning or physical difficulties
- Persons with mental illness or drug or alcohol problems
- Persons in rented accommodation
- People who smoke at home
- High risk areas using FSEC, Mosaic, Origins and five year fire data

In order to ensure that the Authority targets those members of the community at greatest risk any Community Fire Station will be delivering a HSC within their district area. Through the development of the HSC process and increased working with local partners and agencies the Authority aim to improve the process of delivery and the wealth of information provided, especially to those members of the public who are at greatest risk. For example, where a visually impaired member of the public may need extra support and guidance the Authority will refer them on to a specific worker.
