1. WHY HAS THIS REPORT COME TO COMMITTEE?

This report has come to Review Committee in order to:

- demonstrate Sunderland's contribution to the annual, national consultation exercise – the Tellus Survey
- share the outcomes from that exercise
- seek members' views on how the information could be used

2 BACKGROUND

- 2.1 The Tellus survey is an annual, on-line survey managed by Ofsted, and administered by schools. It is in its third year, and so named Tellus3 for 2008. The survey is designed to gather the views of children and young people on a range of issues across the five outcomes to provide national benchmark data. The target is that 900-1,300 young people in years 7, 8 and 10 complete the survey in each local authority.
- 2.2 The questions in the survey are directly focused on gathering information for Ofsted's Children's Services inspections. A small number, particularly those relating to emotional well-being and substance misuse, are also for use by other government departments as part of the National Indicator Set for their work with local authorities.

TellUs3 took place between March and June 2008.

3. TELLUS3 IN SUNDERLAND

- 3.1 Ofsted randomly selected 61 Sunderland schools to work with children and young people to complete the survey. Special schools were included for the first time. In Sunderland, 24 schools took part in the survey this year: 14 primary and 10 secondary. See Appendix One for a list of schools that took part.
- 3.2 Approximately 1,400 responses were made by children and young people in Sunderland. A summary of all responses is included in Appendix Two.

4. WHAT DID CHILDREN AND YOUNG PEOPLE TELL US?

- 4.1 On the whole the responses made from Sunderland were comparative to those made by children and young people throughout the country. However some responses were significantly different to the national picture.
- **4.2** Children and young people in Sunderland responded more positively than nationally in the following:
 - They have one or more good friends
 - They can talk to an adult, other than their Mum and Dad
 - They feel safer on public transport
 - They have somewhere quiet at home to do homework
 - They find it easier to get help with work at school
 - More of them have been to the cinema, theatre or gym recently
 - They feel they get good information and help in planning their future
 - They like their local shops

Appendix Three sets out these specific responses in 2008 together with a comparison from 2007 to 2008.

- **4.3** Children and young people in Sunderland responded more negatively than nationally to the following:
 - Young people drink more frequently
 - A slightly higher proportion of pupils never enjoy school
 - Fewer children had been to music groups or lessons outside of school
 - They want their local area to be "cleaner and have less litter", to have "better parks and play areas" and for there to be "fewer young people hanging around"
 - A higher number would like to see 'better school lessons'

Appendix Four sets out these specific responses in 2008 together with a comparison from 2007 to 2008.

5. Comparisons over time

5.1 The Tellus survey has taken place over the last three years, but changes to the questions limits the value of drawing statistical comparisons over time. There are, however, common themes running through the survey in Sunderland over the period. Drinking alcohol remains, and that is being addressed through the new Risk and Resilience Strategy and other initiatives. Improving parks and play areas is also an issue and was identified as a theme for discussion at the recent State of the City debate. The success of the play pathfinder bid will bring 3.5 million to the city to develop and improve 28 play areas and establish a City Adventure Centre at Silksworth.

7. USING THE INFORMATION

(i) The general themes will contribute to the Children's Trust needs assessment.

- (ii) It will be presented to the Children's Trust Strategic Partnership and partners will be asked to consider how they can use it in their own organisations.
- (iii) Members may wish to consider how else the information could be used as part of the scrutiny process.
