1. PURPOSE OF THE REPORT

1.1 The purpose of this report is to provide feedback from the Cabinet meeting held on 21 July 2010, which considered the Environment and Attractive City Scrutiny Committee's Policy Review into allotment provision in Sunderland.

2. BACKGROUND INFORMATION

- 2.1 The investigation into allotment provision in Sunderland conducted by the Environment and Attractive City Scrutiny Committee falls under the remit of the City Services Directorate and is within the service area covered by the Attractive and Inclusive City Portfolio Holder.
- 2.2 On 21 July 2010, Cabinet considered the Final Report of the Environment and Attractive City Scrutiny Committee's policy review into allotment provision in Sunderland.
