Responses as of 16th January 2020

There has been a total of thirteen responses.

- Q1. The majority of schools use the exemplar plans to cover all Key Stages, one school uses 'Discovery RE' rather than the Agreed Syllabus (AS) and one school does not use an Agreed Syllabus.
- Q2&3. Half of the schools use the 'Bridging Unit' yet all of the schools indicated that they would like to see a 'Bridging Unit' on the new syllabus.
- Q4. Nine responses state that they have used a wide selection of the 'Teaching and Learning Activities' including visits and speakers.
- Q5. The majority of schools have found the '4 Concepts' of great use in planning their curriculum.
- Q6. Schools would like to keep the following aspects of the current AS:

Units on non-Christian faiths.

Key Concepts

Exemplar plans for the Key Stages.

Key guestions

Q7. Schools would like to see the following incorporated into the new AS:

Summaries to help create a more coherent document.

A change to Y6 with a focus on knowledge rather than comparisons of religions. A simplified syllabus.

To use the format from Post 16 pages to add detail to KS1&2

Progression maps.

Examples of resources, activities and key texts.

Examples of assessments and planning to support them.

- Q8. The majority of schools stressed a need for CPD to support a new AS and the delivery of RE in view of the lack of specialists leading on RE.

Responses as of 16th January 2020

There has been a total of three responses.

- Q1. Schools using the AS are using the Y7&8 exemplar plans an a range of the 'Key questions' provided in the AS.
- Q2. All schools use a 'Bridging Unit'.
- Q3. They all use a variety of 'Teaching and Leaning Activities' including artefacts, thinking skills and 'Enquiry Based Learning'.
- Q4. The concepts have been very useful for curriculum planning and in building deeper understanding.
- Q5. All of the schools deliver RE at KS4 either as a full GCSE course in an option block or as core RE, sometimes alongside PHSE.
- Q6. They would like to keep the 'Bridging Unit' and KS3 plans.
- Q7. There were no suggestions for the new AS.
