2 Data and Intelligence

2.1 What data and intelligence has informed the activity?

The Environment Act is introducing a new requirement for development to deliverable a measurable biodiversity net gain of at least 10%. The requirement will be mandatory for any major planning applications submitted after 12 February 2024 and most minor planning applications submitted after 2 April 2024.

Whilst it is a developer's responsibility to deliver any net gain required as a result of their development, it is acknowledged that it may not be possible to deliver the necessary net gain on the development site and therefore off-site mitigation may be necessary.

As the Council has considerable land holdings within the city, including areas of nature conservation value, it was considered that utilising Council owned land to delivery biodiversity net gain should be investigated, as this would support development within the city and also improve the management and ecological value of Council owned land.

In order to investigate the best mechanism to utilise Council owned land as a BNG resource, Council officers have been gathering intelligence through online resources, training and conversations with other relevant stakeholders such as Durham Wildlife Trust and neighbouring authorities.

After considering all options, it is considered that entering into long-term lease agreements with Durham Wildlife Trust (or other delivery partners as appropriate) would represent the best option.

The intelligence gathered has been primarily focussed on the best mechanism to use Council owned land holdings for the delivery of biodiversity net gain.

Notwithstanding this, it is recognised that improving biodiversity and nature access within communities can have wider benefits to the resident population. It is intended that existing access arrangements will be retained.

The Council will also work closely with the Trust to maximise employment of local labour where possible and to facilitate education, skills and lifelong learning, including the use of apprenticeships where possible.

The use of Council owned land for biodiversity net gain ensures that existing habitats will be protected and enhanced. The management of sites may create potential volunteering opportunities to raise awareness and create a greater sense of community stewardship. These will be considered through the management plans. It is possible that increasing public access to these sites may have a negative impact upon anti-social behaviour by providing enhanced access to wildlife sites which are often isolated and not overlooked. Signage and interpretation will be considered as part of the management plans, where appropriate.

7.6 Outline how you will measure the anticipated impact(s)

It will be a requirement for management plans to be prepared and approved by the Council. The impact upon community wealth building will be calculated by monitoring the number of volunteering opportunities created and the number of people who have actively engaged in these. Any potential anti-social and community safety risks will be identified and mitigated as part of respective management plans. Through greater access to nature and opportunities for volunteering it is hoped that increased sense of ownership will gradually lead to a reduction in any antisocial behaviour that may occur.
