- Central Government is encouraging all local authorities with highway responsibilities to develop and adopt a LCWIP as set in its 'Ghanging Gear' document
- The whole population of Sunderland is expected to benefit through increased physical activity and healthier lifestyles.
- The proposals are intended to encourage groups that currently do not cycle to take it up. For example fewer women than men cycle regularly due to safety considerations. Provision of segregated paths will help overcome this. Similarly this will also encourage children, younger people and older people to cycle more often. Segregated paths will allow use of bikes designed for use by wheelchair users. Improved pedestrian provision will benefit everyone. Consultation with Elected Members and the public has highlighted a need for improved provision particularly in the Coalfields area of the City.
- The LCWIP contributes to the North East Transport Plan and Central Government as set out in 'Gear Change'.
