ANNUAL WORK PROGRAMME AND POLICY REVIEW 2008-2009

REPORT OF THE CITY SOLICITOR

12 JUNE 2008

1. Purpose of Report

- 1.1 For Members to determine the Annual Work Programme for the Review Committee during 2008-09, including the main theme for a detailed policy review.

2. Background

- 2.1 The Review Committee is responsible for setting its own work programme within the remit of

Schools, Special Education Support, School Governors, Special Units, Youth Services, Children & Young People's Citizenship, Youth Parliament, Derwent Hill, Children's Social Care, Youth Offending, Sure Start and progress against future actions from inspections of Children's Services.

- 2.2 A report approved by Cabinet on 28 May 2008 (set out elsewhere on this agenda) revised the terms of reference for the committees to align the subject focus to the relevant priorities of the Sunderland Strategy. The intention is for the committee to focus on the priority areas and targets in the Sunderland Strategy and Local Area Agreement and that the work of all six Review Committees consistently addresses those areas of performance requiring detailed examination.

- 2.3 This approach linked to strategic and LAA priorities is proposed to allow a clear themed focus on the outcomes for the people of Sunderland, and allow for cross-cutting examination of issues, with potential for linking areas of knowledge and expertise that would not ordinarily be brought together, so increasing the likelihood of the committees identifying novel approaches and solutions to the issues they consider.

- 2.4 The Sunderland Strategy priority on which it is proposed the committee bases its work programme is as follows:

Learning City: Creating a city with a thriving learning culture that supports personal fulfilment by ensuring that everyone can access their learning in a cohesive, inclusive city committed to social justice, equality and prosperity, and ensuring learning in Sunderland supports the city's economic prosperity and enabling individuals to thrive in the global economy.

- 2.5 All committees will take a role in the scrutiny of partnership and area issues and have a role in engaging with partners, external scrutiny, community and public engagement, engaging with media and area scrutiny.

3. Operation of the Committee

- 3.1 For the previous two municipal years the committee has operated within certain arrangements to allow it to manage a large amount of business in the most productive way. The arrangements are as follows.
- 3.2 The annual work programme divided into those reports which are for scrutiny and a separate 'information' category for items that are less of a priority at that time.
- 3.3 The latter, while requiring no discussion, will still enable any Member of the Committee to request that the item be rescheduled as a scrutiny topic at a future meeting. This information category provides the opportunity for the Committee to receive a diversity of reports to ensure a good general knowledge of Children's Services issues while focusing on a limited amount of detailed scrutiny.
- 3.4 The Committee also agreed that items for scrutiny will be limited as far as possible to three per meeting although flexibility will be necessary as the Committee will need to respond to new issues arising in addition to scheduled work programme items.
- 3.5 The Committee has previously managed all policy review evidence gathering through special evidence gathering meetings, site visits, commissioning of consultants and desk-based research. To further enhance and develop this Member-led approach the Committee may wish to consider smaller working groups involving members in pursuing issues in the work programme enabling discussion, development of ideas and preparation for the questioning of witnesses outside of Committee.

4. Suggested Topics and Methods of Enquiry

- 4.1 Topics for inclusion in the work programme may be single items for scrutiny, short term reviews over 2-3 months or a major policy review.
- 4.2 The following sections include all topics suggested by Members and the proposed method of enquiry, including from the discussions held at the Scrutiny Conference on 20 May 2008 and the Children's Services breakout session.

- 4.3 In selecting from the long lists members are asked to consider the revised terms of reference for the committee as referred to in section 2 of this report.

5. Policy Review

- 5.1 Policy review is the process of maintaining an overview of council policies and will usually examine whether the council's intended policy outcomes have been achieved. The process will also explore issues such as the service user's perspective.
- 5.2 Policy reviews are project planned with appropriate methodology applied to investigate the chosen topic. This may include meetings, site visits, surveys, public meetings or analysis of comparative practice in other local authorities. For the review of looked after children evidence was gathered at 3 specially

convened evidence gathering sessions with a selection of witnesses at each session.

- 5.3 Other reviews carried out by this Committee have included school exclusion, boys' attainment, out of school hours learning, community use of school buildings and multi-agency approaches to youth disorder. - 5.4 Following the selection of a topic for review, the Committee will receive a report setting out a possible approach to the review. This will include the terms of reference, definitions, links to corporate goals, partnerships, the national and local context, and proposals for gathering evidence.
- 5.5 The shortlist of Review Topics for 2008-09 is listed below. The Committee is recommended to select one topic from this shortlist for an in depth review.
