2 Data and Intelligence

Guidance for this section

2.1 What data and intelligence has informed the activity?

Significant consultation has been held across the city with the voluntary and community sector – to understand the needs of the sector to ensure they are able to sustain their existence and delivery as well as grow their offer to meet the needs of local communities.

In February 2020 Cabinet approved that the Council agreed to support the voluntary and community sector in Sunderland to develop an independent Alliance.

Over the last three years in particular, the sector has supported the residents of Sunderland throughout the COVID pandemic and most recently through the cost-of-living crisis. Households in Sunderland who require support within their communities is extensive and significant data has been developed to further ensure targeted support in households with multiple vulnerabilities.

The council has facilitated several large-scale consultation events with the sector most recently to ensure the Alliance has the resources required to grow capacity and to support the emerging Sunderland social prescribing programme – Links for Life.

JSNAs noted the number of residents in Sunderland who require community support to improve resilience. as well as Financial Wellbeing Strategy and the Community Wealth Strategy have also informed the development of the VS Alliance.

Feedback from the voluntary sector and external stakeholders is telling us that the voluntary sector in Sunderland require support to grow and sustain their capacity. Social isolation is a key issue identified through feedback and the voluntary sector are supporting residents to reduce their isolation and loneliness which often stems from crisis or leads into crisis and poor health.

Consultation has been conducted through VCS Network meetings, as well as surveys and large-scale events Through this approach we have engaged with people from many protected groups, including veterans, BME Groups, Young People, Older People, people with disabilities, unemployed groups, etc.

Also used Welcoming Warm Spaces to gather residents' views on what should be included within the emerging social prescribing links for life offer, which will be delivered within communities by the voluntary and community sector.
