- reduce risk of homes flooding.

- have more and better housing
- ensuring residents, particularly those who require long term support from Adult Social Care, can enjoy independence and maintain control over their lives;

Strategic Housing Market Assessment (SHMA) shows a 745 affordable housing delivery within the City per year Strategic Housing Land Availability Assessment (SHLAA) sets out approaches to unlock stalled sites Shelter findings from listening project with renters demonstrated a proporation of PRS tenants within Sunderland were dissatisfied with their accommodation

Homelessness Health Needs Assessement was carried out and lived experience groups were interviewed, 21 recommendations from data around inclusivity and health inequalities in the homeless population Census 2021 - circa 122,000 dwellings in the City and lower than national average PRS in the City (14.9% in Sunderland vs 19% national).

Data has shown that strategic housing priorities remain Grow, Improvement and Support for vulnerable groups.
