

## LOCAL WILDLIFE SITES

**Consultation Statement** 

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## Introduction

In November 2021, the Environment Act took effect which seeks to protect and enhance our environment for future generations. The Act seeks to halt the decline in species by 2030, strengthen the biodiversity duty and require new developments to improve or create habitats for nature.

In order to help achieve these intended aims, the Act introduces a legal requirement for local authorities to prepare Local Nature Recovery Strategies and also introduces mandatory biodiversity net gain to be delivered as part of new developments from November 2023.

Between December 2020 and February 2021, the Council consulted on proposed boundary changes to existing Local Wildlife Sites (LWS) and proposed new LWS designations alongside the consultation on the Draft Allocations and Designations Plan. However, following the consultation, these proposed changes have not yet been taken forward and formally adopted by the Council.

Following the establishment of the South of Tyne and Wear Local Nature Recovery partnership by Defra (which encompasses Gateshead, South Tyneside and Sunderland), work has now commenced on the preparation of the Local Nature Recovery Strategy for the area, which will

- Map the most valuable existing habitat for nature;
- Map specific proposals for creating or improving habitat for nature and wider environmental goals; and
- Agree priorities for nature's recovery.

In order to help inform the preparation of the LNRS, it is now proposed that the changes to Local Wildlife Sites within the city are formally adopted by the Council.

This Consultation statement sets out detail of the consultation Sunderland City Council has undertaken on the Local Wildlife Site Report and accompanying Local Wildlife Sites Evidence Report, which set out the proposed changes. The statement summarises the responses to the consultation and sets out the Council's response, including where any changes have been proposed as a result of the responses received.

### What are the Local Wildlife Site Report and Local Wildlife Sites Evidence Report?

There are currently 63 designated Local Wildlife Sites in Sunderland, and the purpose of these documents was to review the sites in order to support the emerging Local Nature Recovery Strategy.

The review provided recommendations on currently designated sites, including minor and major boundary reviews, and also seeks to designate new sites.

The Local Wildlife Site Report sets out the proposed changes and the accompanying Local Wildlife Sites Evidence Report provides in depth information regarding each site, including maps.

The changes have been informed by local LWS designation guidance and are supported by the Local Wildlife Sites Partnership.

#### Consultation on the Local Wildlife Site Report and Local Wildlife Sites Evidence Report

Consultation on the proposals was undertaken between 18 December 2020 and the 12 February 2021 alongside the consultation on the Draft Allocations and Designations Plan.

The Local Wildlife Site Report and Local Wildlife Sites Evidence Report were made publicly available for comment for an 8-week period between 18 December 2020 and 12 February 2021. The documents were made available on the Council's website<sup>1</sup> and copies were available to view at Sunderland Civic Centre. Stakeholders were invited to make representations in writing by email or letter.

## Persons the local planning authority consulted

The Council wrote to all landowners affected by the proposed designations. The Council also wrote to all persons on the Local Plan Database, this includes statutory consultees, general consultation bodies and those who had previously expressed an interest in the Local Plan. Copies of the correspondence inviting persons to make representations on the LWS consultation is included in Appendix 1.

I am writing to inform you that Sunderland City Council is consulting on changes to the boundaries of existing Local Wildlife Sites and the designation of new sites, as part of the consultation on the Allocations and Designations Plan.

Local Wildlife Sites (LWS) are areas of substantive nature conservation value and make an important contribution to ecological networks in the local landscape. LWS include woodland, grassland and wetland habitats and associated species of conservation importance. They are selected and assessed following recognised criteria and Defra guidance. Details of the proposed LWS are presented in a Local Wildlife Site Review 2020 report, with location maps and supporting text for each site.

We believe that land in your ownership may include part or all of an existing or proposed Local Wildlife Site or sites, and as such we would welcome any comments you may wish to make on the proposed designation of the site/s.
