1.0 PURPOSE OF REPORT

1.1 To request the Sub-Committee to consider an application for the grant of a premises licence for the above-mentioned premises.

2.0 DESCRIPTION OF DECISION

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

With reference to the application for a premises licence to operate a Catering Van in the car park of Washington Football Club I would like to make the following comments.

We object to the granting of the licence to operate the catering van between the hours of 22:00 and 01:30 on a Friday, Saturday and Sunday night on the grounds that it is likely to cause a public nuisance.

The area in which the applicant wishes to site the van is a predominantly residential area. Complaints have been received from local residents regarding patrons leaving the Football Club late at night.

It is our opinion, based on previous experience, that the operation of the catering van in the car park during the late evening and early morning would encourage customers, primarily from the Washington Football Club, to leave the premises throughout the course of the night to purchase late night refreshment. Since it is unlikely that they will be allowed to return within the premises with food it is envisaged that they will gather in the car park area.

The presence of the van would also encourage people to remain in the area of the club beyond closing time whilst they purchase late night food. These events are both likely to result in the potential for customers to linger in the vicinity and create a noise nuisance to local residents.

RE: Application for a premises licence on site of Washington Football Club, for a catering van

Northumbria Police are in receipt of the above application and wish to object on the grounds of crime and disorder. The applicant has applied to operate within the ground of Washington Football Club which on the days specified (Friday – Sunday) operates as a pub. The venue mainly attracts customers from 2100hrs until closing at approximately 0130hrs who visit the venue to consume alcohol and participate in the regulated entertainment offered. Washington Football Club currently causes the Police problems with antisocial behaviour, disorder, noise nuisance and there are several complaints of assault attributable to the premises. Most of these issues emanate when patrons are leaving the premises and are lingering about waiting to go home. By allowing a catering van to operate from the grounds will only allow patrons to hang around the area longer when leaving the premises, causing disorder, and causing nuisance to neighbours.

The Spout Lane area is also a Police hot spot for youth anti social behaviour. Youths tend to congregate in this area until moved on by Police officers and the Police have many complaints recorded from local residents who request Police assistance with this matter.

The Police have concerns with this application as there have been previous problems with such a catering unit operating outside of the Groove Nightclub in Spout Lane. This unit was open alongside the Nightclub and was an added problem to the issues that were attributable to the nightclub. Patrons would hang around the area once the club had closed waiting for food, fights would then ensue and several arrests would be made by Police. The unit was also the cause of nuisance to the neighbours as people who had consumed alcohol and were in high spirits would be unaware of the noise they were making outside of the premises. Patrons who ordered food would also eat the food outside the premises and leave litter behind.

This application is one that would be detrimental to the area, cause unnecessary nuisance to the local residents and involve additional use of Police resources in the area to combat anti-social behaviour. In light of this, the Police oppose the application in its entirety; however should the application be granted believe that the conditions below should be added to the premises licence as a minimum requirement;

- The premise licence holder must ensure that at all times the catering unit is open to the public that a minimum of 1 SIA Door Supervisor be employed at the unit. The Door Supervisor must be employed separately from those employed at the Washington Football Club.
- 2. The premises licence holder shall ensure that on each day that Door Supervisors are engaged for duty at the premises, their details (full name, D.O.B. and licence number) are recorded in an appropriate book kept by the premises licence holder. In conjunction with this book, the licensee shall also keep an incident book. This record book and incident book must be available for inspection by Northumbria Police or Officers of the Council at all times the premises are open.
- 3. Staff at the catering unit must be provided with suitable communication equipment maintained in good working order, so should the need arise they can contact the Police at any time. This equipment should be a text/pubwatch radio or mobile phone.
- The premises licence holder shall be a member of the local pubwatch scheme and attend the pubwatch meetings or send a representative on their behalf.

RE: Application for fast food van at Washington Football Club


We, the undersigned, oppose the request for the license to have a fast food van in the vicinity of the Washington Football Club grounds.

A few years ago we were subjected to issues which resulted from a fast food van operating in the same area. These issues were noise/anti-social behaviour and littering. We have experienced excessive noise/volume levels from the music and also from people leaving the club and since the late license was granted, this now continues until early hours of the morning. On many occasions the police have been involved with anti-social matters. This is a waste of police resources which could be avoided.

Spout Lane/Beverley Court is a residential area and we already do not feel that a club with a late license is appropriate. Furthermore, if a fast food van is operating it is inevitable that these issues would worsen.

- It would attract people to stay in the area rather than dispersing in an orderly manner and at a reasonable time.
- The litter would extend to the areas surrounding the Football Club, i.e. Beverley Court.
- The noise would continue until the area is clear.
- There are also concerns regarding the noise of the motor running on the van.

We would be grateful for your response to this matter and hopefully we can come to an equitable settlement.

## Application for a Premises Licence For Late Night Refreshment for Hot Food Van In car park at Washington Football Club, Spout Lane

I write to oppose the application by Ian Brown for a premises licence for late night refreshment at a hot food van in the grounds of Washington Football Club in Spout Lane, Washington.

Spout Lane is a quiet residential area and the Football Club is situated in close proximity to my home and indeed to numerous homes, many of which are occupied by families with young children, as well as a number of elderly residents.

#### Public Nuisance

The operation of a hot food van late at night in this location would attract numerous people as they make their way home from an evening out. Due to the outside location the noise from customers as they wait for their food cannot be contained, and will be very noticeable late at night, when the background noise has died down. People who have had a drink are less inhibited and consequently tend to be noisier, talking in., loud voices and shouting

Many of the people using the hot food van will walk directly past my house and the noise will cause nuisance and disturbance both to me and to other residents in the vicinity as we are trying to sleep. There will be no measures which the operator can put in place to ensure that customers will not cause a nuisance or disturbance as they make their way home. It is also quite possible that some people will travel by car to use the van and this will be accompanied by the slamming of car doors and the revving of engines late at night.


There will be an increase in litter in Spout Lane. Anyone using the van is likely to eat their food whilst walking along the street and will discard the wrapping as they do so.

Clearly noise nuisance and litter are contrary to the Licensing Objective – Prevention of Public Nuisance.

#### Crime and Disorder

As well as the premises being used by those people leaving the Football Club, the van will attract people leaving other pubs which, at the end of a night's drinking, will further increase the risk of disorder around the premises and in the streets in the vicinity. This will result in a breach of the Licensing Objective-Prevention of Crime and Disorder.

For these reasons I strongly oppose the grant of a premises licence for late night refreshment to at Washington Football Club.
